Property Owners Inquire About Forest Fire Losses

Property owners in the vicinity of the Tawas City dump in Baldwin Township were present at Tuesday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council and asked for discussion on last week's forest fire in that area.

Wesley Parrott of East Tawas and Mr. and Mrs. Henry Born of Bay City were present and asked the council for consideration of an offer to cover the cost of property damaged or destroyed in last week's forest fire.

A fire last Tuesday, said by the property owners to have been started at the dump, burned over about 200 acres of land, which included federal forest land and property owned by Mr. Parrott and the Borns.

Parrott was the heavier loser, with freshly-cut timber, a garage, a portable sawmill and other property destroyed. The loss of Mr. and Mrs. Born was a quantity of standing timber.

City Attorney Allan C. Miller, speaking for the council, said that it would take court action to decide issues at hand. He said that the city council did not have the authority or precedent to determine the issues or take any action.

Miller said that it would have to be determined by court action whether the city would be covered by governmental immunity when operation of a city dump is operated completely by taxation; whether negligence was shown in its operation, and exact causation of the fire.

The city dump is located on federal property. Mayor George Tuttle said that as far as he knew, there has been no official word as to who started the fire or if it had started at the dump.

In other business, a letter with an enclosed check was read from Attorney Paul Harvey, representing the Bay City Scrap Company. He wished the bonds which the city now holds released and the \$300 check to replace the bonds. The bonds are being held to guarantee the lake bottom and shore is clean of debris after the

recent scrapping of the Western States. The council decided to hold up any action on this until after an inspection of the lake bottom and dock can be made.

Low bid of Orville Leslie and Sons was accepted for a new police car. After a meeting of the purchasing committee, it was decided to omit the automatic transmission. This dropped the price from \$800 and the old car as a trade-in to \$660. Only other bidder was McKay Sales Company.

A letter from Milton Adams of the Water Resources Commission was received Wednesday stating that the City of Tawas City has received priority over other applicants on a federal grant for sewage pollution control. No word has been received as to whether or not the city's bond issue has been approved by the Municipal Finance Commission.

Huron-National Merger Completed

Consummation of the merger of Huron Portland Cement Company of Detroit and Alpena with National Gypsum Company of Buffalo, New York, has been completed.

Involving an exchange of stock, the transaction gave Huron Portland stockholders, the John B. Ford Jr., Emory Ford and William W. Crapo families, National Gypsum stock worth approximately 67 million dollars.

The acquisition agreement was reached in early January, at which time Melvin H. Baker, chairman of National Gypsum, said Huron Portland, whose Alpena mill is the largest cement plant in the United States, would be operated as an independent subsidiary.

The acquisition adds about 35 million dollars to National Gypsum's 1959 sales prospects, boosting the latter's total to 215 million, reported Mr. Baker.

Herald is Winner in National Contest

Publishers of The Tawas Herald learned through an advance announcement from the National Editorial Association this week that the Herald has won one of the top three awards for best use of photographs in the 1959 NEA National Better Newspaper Contest.

"The selection of your newspaper for this high award is indeed an honor, since the judges this year were confronted with a great number of entries—a total of 2,003," states Edgar S. Bayol, executive vice president of NEA.

National Editorial Association is a nationwide organization composed of newspaper publishers. Last year the organization held its annual convention in Detroit.

Award plaques are to be presented at the annual awards night banquet Wednesday, June 17, at the Broadmoor Hotel in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Tornado Exercise Termed a Success

"We could sum up last Friday's tornado alert exercise with these words—it was a success," was the way Charles Kurtzrock, deputy civil defense director for Iosco County, described last week's practice.

"Members of civil defense sincerely hope that such a disaster never strikes the area, but it is well to be prepared for an emergency," he stated. "I think that everyone who participated last Friday learned a great deal."

At approximately 2:00 p. m. May 15, a "tornado" struck the Tawas City and East Tawas area. This make-believe tornado came out of the south and took a northwesterly course.

All phases of the county's civil defense team went into action. Using four ambulances from the two cities, Tawas City was cleared of all "accident victims" in 51 minutes and the East Tawas area was all clear in 47 minutes.

"Although this was only a test and ambulance drivers knew the exact locations of accident victims (school children volunteers), it proves that by a combined effort of all units and all citizens, Iosco County is well equipped to handle any emergency in our area," stated the deputy director.

Taking part in the exercise were: The Civil Defense Unit of Iosco County under the supervision of Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell, director; Mr. Kurtzrock; Sister M. Olivia, administrator of

Tawas Hospital, and her staff; Michigan State Police Post at East Tawas, which handled traffic during the exercise.

Also participating was the Jacques Funeral Home and Mofatt Funeral Home, both furnishing ambulances.

Director O'Farrell paid special tribute to medical physicians and registered nurses of Iosco County who participated. "They are to be commended for their splendid cooperation in this exercise, along with the several women's organizations which gave of their time to help at the hospital during the program."

Stern Wheeler to Ply AuSable

Visitors who come to the Iosco area may have illusions of the "Old South" when they take a look at the AuSable River this summer. A person with imagination could easily see bales of cotton piled along the river bank, for operating between Five Channel and Cooke Dams will be a stern-wheel paddle boat, designed along the lines of similar craft plying the Suwannee River.

Now under construction for Howard Brubaker, Oscoda boat operator, is a 55-foot-long pleasure boat, which will be powered by eight-foot-high paddle wheels. The double-decked craft will carry about 100 passengers on its AuSable River pleasure trips.

The hull of the craft is being constructed by Melvin Brown, well-known fisherman south of Alabaster, and the paddle wheel drive assembly is being built by Cholger Service in Tawas City.

The drive assembly consists of an angle iron frame with wooden paddles. To be operated by a chain drive, the paddle wheels will dip about eight inches into the water. The craft will have a draft of about nine inches, fully loaded with passengers, to insure maneuverability on the back waters of the AuSable.

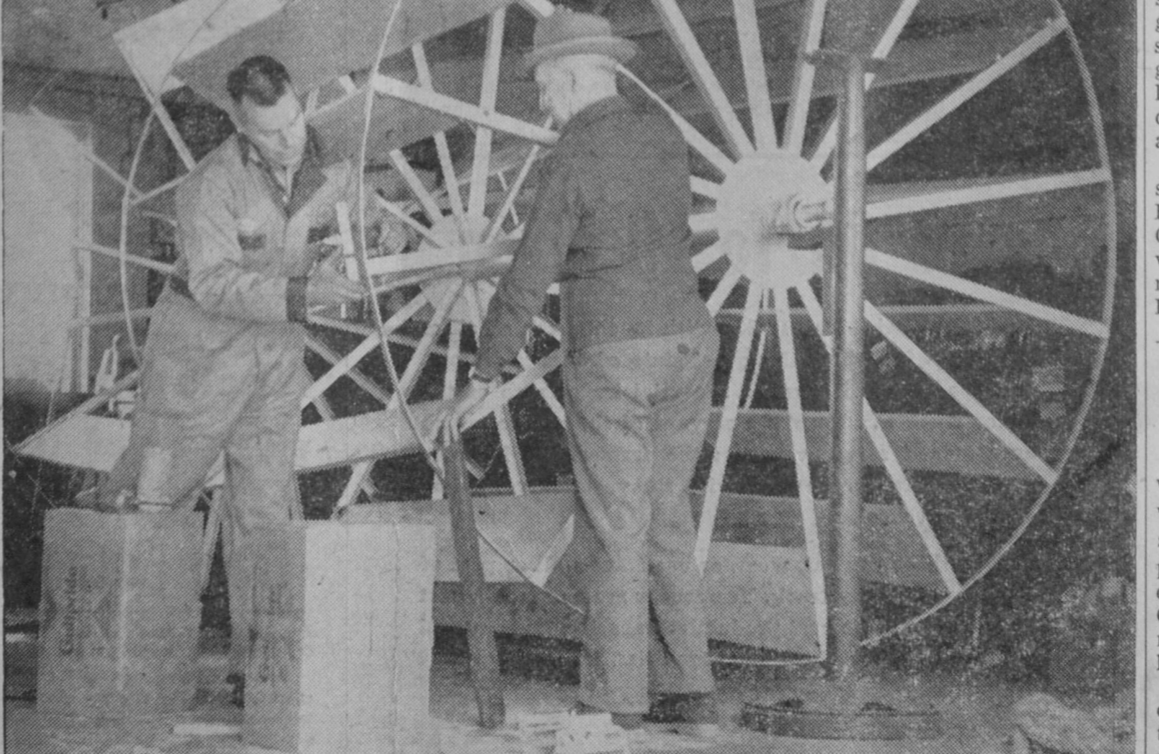
Herbert Cholger said this week that plans for the craft were outlined by Brubaker after he made a recent trip through the South. He snapped several pictures of a boat and contacted the owner to learn of specifications and to take close-up snapshots of the

drive mechanism.

The new craft is expected to go into operation about Memorial Day, or shortly thereafter. Indi-

cations are that this authentic Suwannee River boat will become one of the area's great tourist attractions.

Brubaker has operated a conventional pleasure boat on the AuSable River for the past several summers.

Virden admitted to police that he stabbed to death his wife, Marie, 47, at the family home on the outskirts of South Branch early last Thursday morning as she was preparing his breakfast. After stabbing his wife with a hunting knife he then stabbed himself a number of times in the chest.

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BELL INSTALLS NEW DIAL SYSTEM AT WURTSMITH
 A new \$92,000 dial system at Wurtsmith Air Force Base switched into operation Monday, May 11, changing all on-base telephone numbers to four digits. Civilians and off-base personnel

who frequently call the base were urged to obtain new extension numbers to help speed calls through. "All former three-digit numbers now are obsolete," said Capt. Norman Rheame, base communications officer. Captain Rheame emphasized,

however, that the main base telephone number remains the same, SEneca 9-3611. The new switching equipment can handle up to 600 phone lines and doubles the size of the former system which had been working at capacity. It provides better service

for the Air Defense Command and is keeping pace with the current expansion of the base as Strategic Air Command facilities are installed. Initial planning for the new dial system at Wurtsmith was begun in May of 1958 by Michigan Bell

Telephone Company, working closely with base officers. A highly-trained crew from Western Electric Company, manufacturing and supply arm of the Bell system, began installing the equipment in February of this year and wound up testing the

system near the end of April. Several thousand feet of cable installed by Michigan Bell also are necessary to expand the various communications facilities to serve the air defense mission at Wurtsmith. Another project of more than

nine miles of underground cable and nearly four miles of aerial cable will get underway by Michigan Bell in June to operate navigational aid units on a new runway now under construction and to serve new SAC installations now being built. Cable completion

is scheduled for September. "All these telephone projects point to one thing," said Captain Rheame. "To provide the base—as well as the country—with the most modern and efficient communications system possible in the interest of defense."

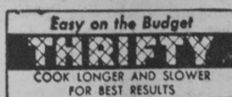

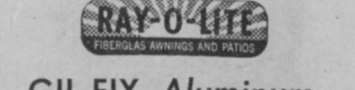
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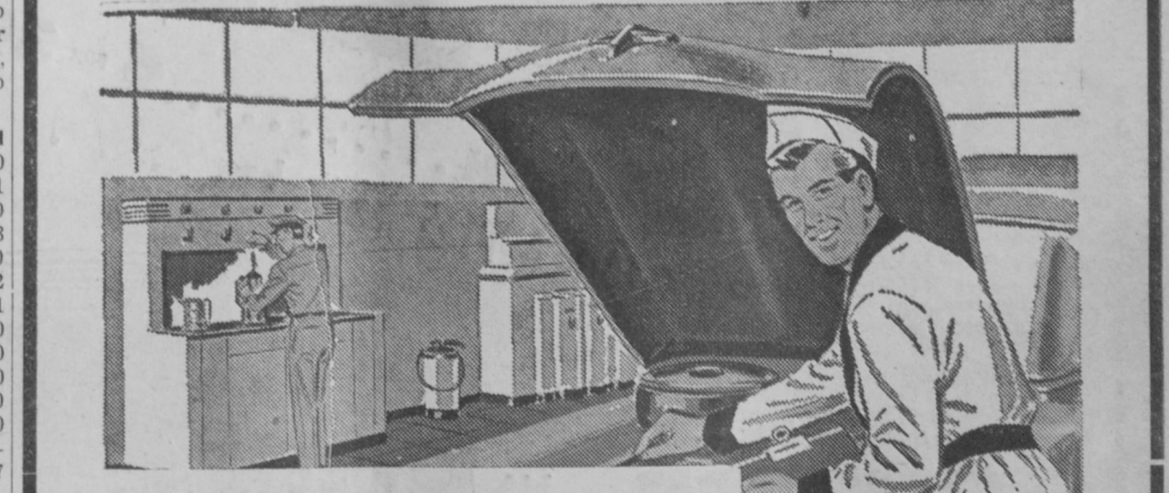
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Farm Events

I recently met with Grant Township Farm Bureau at the Olen Herriman home. Discussion led to what kind of a "program" should we have for the county? The thought expressed by Lloyd Little, township supervisor, was shouldn't we develop a program that would be of interest in Iosco County? This group came up with the basic idea that more of us should learn about what we have in Iosco County.

An inventory of our resources would seem to be a first step. A second would naturally be how we can best use them.

If other Farm Bureau groups and other organizations feel the same way, such an "inventory" is easily possible. What do you think?

Weight at weaning time can be a useful guide in selecting beef herd replacements, but you need to take into account the sex and age of the calf and age of the mother.

William T. Magee, beef cattle scientist at the Michigan Agri-

cultural Experiment Station, learned how these facts must be taken into account as a result of research he is doing in performance testing of beef cattle sires.

Guides set up by Magee to balance out weaning weights of calves before putting them on feeding test include:

1. Each day older a calf is at weaning time, its weight is 1½ pounds heavier, on the average.
2. Steer calves are 15 pounds heavier, on the average at weaning time (six months of age) than are heifer calves.
3. Two-year-old heifers will have calves that at about 50 pounds lighter at weaning than they will have as mature cows.
4. Three or four-year-old cows will have calves that weigh at weaning in between two-year-old heifer's calves and mature cow's calves.

Magee also noticed some other factors that influence weaning weights, in addition to these four listed.

Differences in weaning weights are due to mothering ability of the individual cow, genetic differences, the calves' makeup and environmental differences, such as, disease and access to feed.

About one-fourth of the difference in weaning weights is caused by genetic differences, one-fourth by mothering ability of the cow and one-half by environmental differences.

This points out one of the difficulties in working with livestock under experimental conditions. No matter how strict the control is, it is impossible to set up a study in productive traits where the only differences that show up in the animal's development will be caused by genetic factors.

When your dairy cattle go out on lush pasture this spring, you will want to keep in mind a new, effective, cheap method of blood prevention.

R. S. Emery, a Michigan State University faculty member doing research on dairy feeding, points out that penicillin is a cheap feed additive for blood control. However, it does lose its effectiveness in about a month.

It can be used effectively when there is reason to believe that blood will occur soon, as when cows are turned into fresh pasture. It is more effective as a preventative than feeding hay and less expensive than using poor pasture.

The penicillin can be fed in the cow's grain. Although it works well, the cow's rumen will develop enzymes which destroy the penicillin in about a month. It is no longer effective then.

Penicillin is less expensive than anti-foaming agents like oil and it is also a great deal more convenient.

Farm families and city homeowners alike want the best shade trees around their homes. So, for you folks who are transplanting

trees this spring, Michigan State University Forester Karl Dressel offers some planting suggestions.

Whether you are planting new trees from a nursery or just moving one to another place on your property, the techniques are about the same.

Before you buy or transplant any shade tree, consider the species. The so-called fast growing trees are usually short lived and break easily in storms besides causing a few problems. These trees, the boxelder, cottonwood and Chinese elm, all have brittle wood and their roots are famous for stopping sewers. Along with boxelder trees come boxelder bugs and the cottonwood produce a lot of cotton-like fuzz to clog your screens in the spring. On the other hand, the hardwood species (oaks and hard maples) take a little longer to produce shade, but in the long run, they are generally better.

To give that young tree a better chance, you will want to transplant as early as possible—before the leaves start to come out. The planting hole should be one-third larger than the root system. Trim back the side branches to balance with the roots but do not cut the top. Save the soil in separate piles and replace the topsoil first—next to the roots. Fill the hole half-way and then pour in two or three pails of water and replace the rest of the soil.

Many Iosco farmers are continuing to find a weed-killing chemical called 2,4-D, one of the best choices for controlling weeds in corn.

That is the report from Boyd Churchill, farm crops scientist at the Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station.

Some of the newer chemicals can do little better job of knocking out weeds. But when farmers figure the weed control they get for the cost of material, 2,4-D has the edge.

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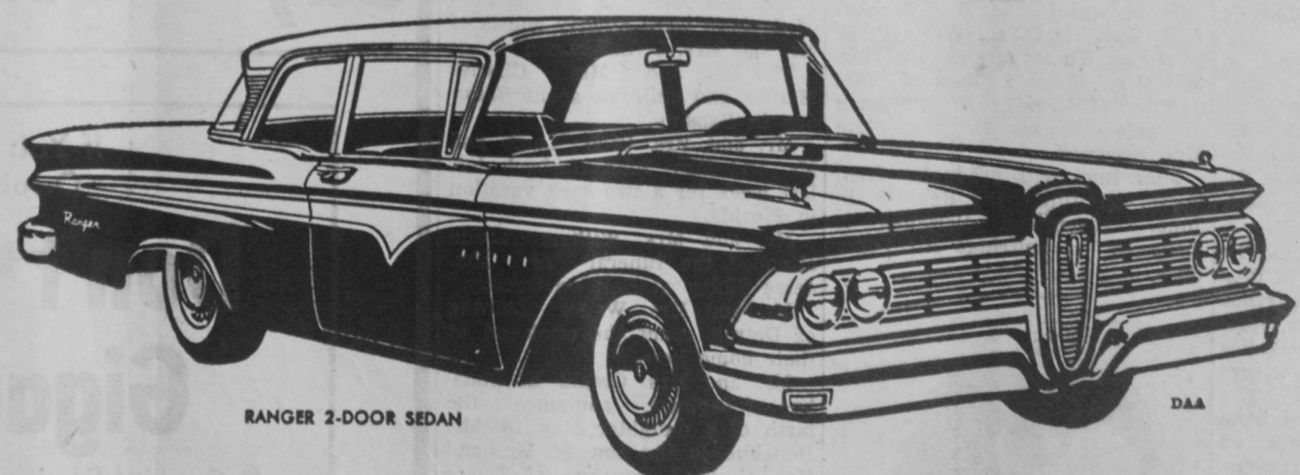

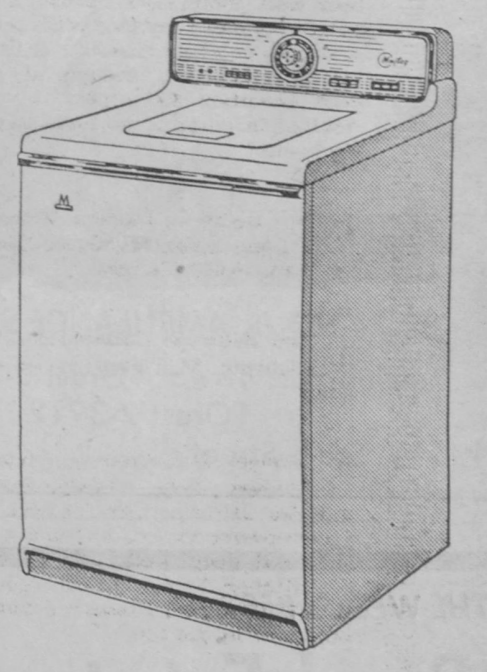

MRS. IDA SIBLEY

Mrs. Ida Westervelt Sibley, well-known poet and early pioneer of Iosco County, passed away May 14 at the age of 84 years.

Born at Oakland in Kent County July 26, 1874, she came to Wilber Township with her parents, John Garfield and Annie Dains Westervelt, in a covered wagon in September 1876, when two years of age.

In 1902, she came to Reno Township where she and her husband operated a country store. During her residence in Reno Township, she served for 16 years as postmaster of the Siloam post office. They owned the freight building at Taft and operated the freight office of The Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company.

Through her acquaintanceship with many pioneers, she gained an intimate knowledge of the early lumbering days and pioneer living which, as a poet, she expressed in many of her poems, contributing much to literature on the pioneer life of Michigan.

Several of these poems have been accepted by the Michigan Historical Commission for publication in the Michigan History Magazine. She authored the book, "Wood Smoke and Other Poems," published in 1953.

She was a member of the Methodist Church of Wilber Township and of the Daughters of the American Revolution. In her younger life, she had been a professional dressmaker in East Tawas and Reno Township.

She is survived by her husband, Jesse F. Sibley; a daughter, Mrs. Margaret D. Bentley of Whittemore; three sons, Jesse J. John E. and Norman O. Sibley, all at home; one sister, Mrs. Evelyn Crego of Wilber Township; one brother, Cecil Westervelt of Flint; two grandchildren; 10 great grandchildren; seven nieces, and six nephews.

Services were held May 17 at the Hale Methodist Church. The Rev. John Calvin Newman, assisted by the Rev. Dwight Lawson, officiated. Interment was in Evergreen Cemetery, Hale.

To Commemorate Seaway With Stamp

United States Post Office Department will issue a four-cent St. Lawrence Seaway opening commemorative stamp through the Massena, New York, post office on June 26. A stamp identical in design, except for the necessary differences in the caption and denomination, is being released simultaneously at Ottawa, Canada. The Canadian stamp will be in the five-cent denomination.

The stamp will be 0.84 by 1.44 inches in dimension, arranged horizontally, printed on the Geopress in red and blue on white paper, and issued in sheets of 50. An initial printing of 120 million of these stamps has been authorized.

Reproduced on the stamp are the emblems of both nations, the maple leaf for Canada and the eagle for the United States, enclosed in interlocking links superimposed over a background of the Great Lakes. Across the top of the stamp is the wording, "St. Lawrence Seaway" and across the bottom, "United States." To the left of the design is the lettering, "Postage," arranged vertically, and the denomination, "4c," appears in the lower right corner of the stamp.

Collectors desiring first-day cancellations of the four-cent St. Lawrence Seaway commemorative stamp may send addressed envelopes, together with reitance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Postmaster, Massena, New York. A close fitting enclosure of postal card thickness should be placed in each envelope and the flap either turned in or sealed. Envelopes submitted should be of ordinary letter size and each must be properly addressed. An envelope must not be sent for return of first-day covers. The outside envelope to the postmaster should be endorsed "First Day Covers 4c St. Lawrence Seaway

Stamp." Orders for covers must not include requests for uncanceled stamps. For the benefit of collectors desiring stamps of selected quality for philatelic use, the four-cent St. Lawrence Seaway commemorative stamp will be available at the Philatelic Sales Agency, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D. C., on and after June 27. To insure prompt shipment, mail orders to the agency should include no other stamp issues. The Philatelic Sales Agency does not service first-day covers.

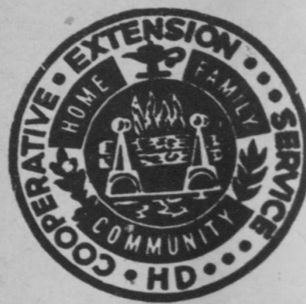

Mrs. Janie Scott, who gives talks throughout the United States for Simplicity Pattern Company, offers you help. You can attend her class of instruction on Monday, May 25, from 1 to 3 o'clock. It is being sponsored by the Arenac County Extension Service and we are all invited to come.

Asparagus and rhubarb may be in your garden today, perhaps a more plentiful supply than you can eat. Your freezer or extra canning jars on the shelf offer two ways to put some aside safely for another day after the fresh supply is gone.

Have you learned about "snapped" asparagus? Is it different than any other? The answer is "yes." Asparagus is harvested by snapping off the stalks or by cutting them off. When harvested by snapping, the asparagus breaks off at a tender spot, resulting in a stalk that is tender, full length, with nothing to throw away. It is simply washed and cooked.

When harvested by cutting, the stalks are cut close to the ground. The white or light green part is usually tough or woody, needs to be cut off and so becomes waste.

Snapped asparagus will cost more per pound than cut asparagus but the edible portion cost may be the same. You will have to make your own comparison check to see.

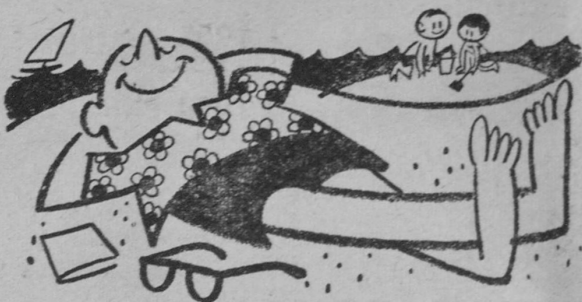

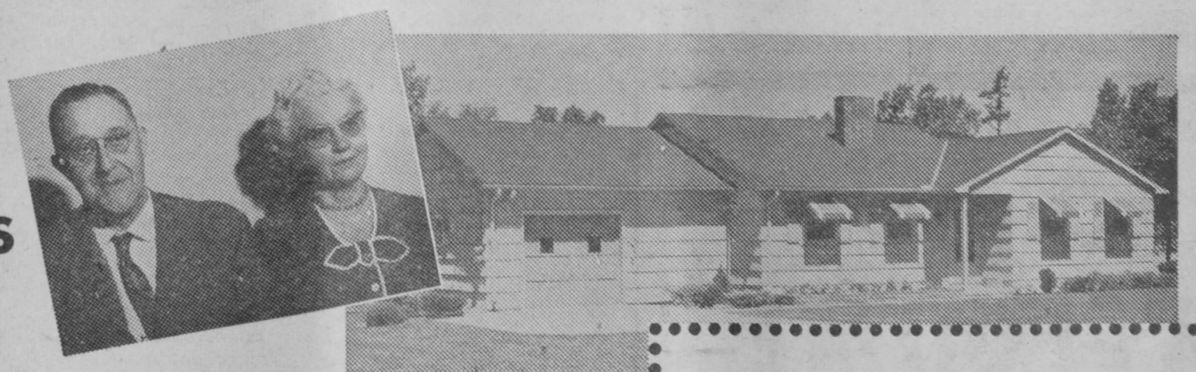
