



When declared delinquent, registrants may be ordered for induction ahead of all other registrants. All registrants with altered draft certificates are urged to obtain new ones from their local board prior to July 1. Up to that time, new certificates will be issued without question. After that, the new delinquent procedure will be in effect.

Draft registrants in many instances have been changing their registration certificates to indicate an age of 21 or over to represent falsely that they are eligible to purchase liquor or to be admitted to places forbidden by law to persons under the age of 21. Selective Service is working closely with liquor control and police officials in an attempt to curb these practices.






