Muddy Streets Draws Complaints at Meeting

Complaints over the condition of First Avenue and connecting streets in Huron Gardens and North Park Acres Subdivisions drew action of the Tawas City Council Monday night. The council is to inform Dryer Brothers Construction Company of Midland, which constructed water mains in the two new subdivisions last summer, that final payment of \$5,000 on the work was being withheld until streets were returned to their original condition. A delegation of home owners from the two new subdivisions attended the council meeting Monday night and complained that streets in that area were in such condition that it was impossible for fuel oil trucks to make delivery. One resident stated that truck drivers had to carry fuel oil to his home in five-gallon cans. Another home owner said that he has been unable to get his car into his garage in months, due to the muddy conditions. Another person voiced the fear that work would not be completed until next spring, due to the heavy fall rains.

Truck Driver Had Close Call in US-23 Collision

A 20-year-old truck driver from Mt. Clemens narrowly escaped injury last Thursday when his 1½-ton van-type truck rammed a pickup truck and rolled over on US-23 south of the Singing Bridge. A government-owned air force post exchange vehicle from Selfridge Air Force Base, the truck burst into flames when it came to a stop on its side in the center of the pavement. Driver Richard G. Ehrke told investigating state police and Arenac County Sheriff's Department officers that he opened the door on the passenger side but, because of its weight, he was unable to flip it back and make his exit. The door finally slammed shut, trapping him inside the flaming vehicle. Coming to his rescue was Henry Oates, Alabaster Township supervisor and building contractor, who was working near the crash scene. He climbed on top of the

Tentative Approval Given Subdivision

Tentative approval for accepting a plat of the River-View Subdivision was given by the Tawas City Council Monday night. The subdivision, owned by Herman Fahselt, contains 16 lots. Mr. Fahselt told the council that several changes had been made in the original plat which had been presented several years ago. He asked that preliminary approval be given, although a barn is located in the middle of one street at the present time. Fahselt assured the council that the barn, which is being used for storage purposes, would be removed before any lots were sold along the street. The council stated that before final approval could be given to the plat, the barn would have to be removed and the street constructed. In the event that the barn was not removed, Fahselt would be required to post a \$1,000 performance bond to protect the city's interest. In other business, Supt. Peoples State Bank Gets Approval for New Branch

Authorization to establish and operate a branch office in Tawas City was received by the Peoples State Bank last week, according to an announcement last Friday by G. N. Shattuck, vice president and cashier. The East Tawas bank had petitioned the state banking commission for its proposed Tawas City branch office during late summer, following purchase of the property once owned by the L. B. Smith estate on US-23 across from Fletcher's. Mr. Shattuck said Monday that plans for the new banking facilities here would be drawn up during the winter months "in order to get an early start next spring on construction."

He said that the type of building to be constructed was still to be determined by the bank's board of directors. "It will include complete and modern facilities for banking," he said. "The building will be designed in such a way that it can be enlarged should there be need for future bank expansion," said Mr. Shattuck. The property on which the bank is to be located consists of six lots, three facing US-23 to the south and three facing Court Street to the north. Facilities will include a large parking area.

Work of razing the old Smith residence is being handled by John Swartz of Au Gres. Also to be removed is a concrete building originally constructed for a frozen custard store and later used as a pizza carry-out.

Winter Carnival is Scrapped by SV

In an effort to concentrate more of its efforts on the actual operation of Silver Valley, it was decided last Wednesday night by the winter sports committee to discontinue the annual winter sports carnival, queen's contest and other outside activities. Faced with the annual problem of financing operation of the winter sports facilities and the added expense of the carnival activities, the committee announced its intentions at a meeting of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce. L. G. McKay Jr., treasurer of the winter sports committee, explained that such a move would allow the committee to spend more time on improving the winter sports park, rather than spending so much time and energy on its promotion. "We feel that such a move will be a benefit to those people, local or visitors, who actually use Silver Valley," McKay stated. "Instead of worrying about the queen's contest, banquets and dances, we will be able to devote

all of our time to such things as safety, improvements to the toboggan slides and ski area and construction of a new skating rink."

'On Pan, Into Fire' on Bad Check Rap

A 52-year-old Detroit man, already on probation for writing no account checks and scheduled to appear before Judge Herman Dehnke last Friday for probation violation, was arrested Friday morning in East Tawas after he passed two no account checks. Otto R. Olsen was arraigned in Iosco County Circuit Court for probation violation and bond was set at \$1,000. Earlier in the day, he was arraigned before Justice A. J. Goulet on the new case and his bond was set at \$500. He was held at the Iosco County Jail. Olsen purchased a ring and watch from C. V. Miller, East Tawas jeweler, Friday morning. He paid for his purchases with a \$138.99 check written on a Detroit bank. Mr. Miller became suspicious, however, and told Olsen that he would have to enlarge the ring. Miller said he could pick it up in an hour. Miller took the check to the Peoples State Bank and a hurried call to Detroit revealed that Olsen had no account with the Detroit bank. He was immediately apprehended by state and city police at the Holland Hotel, where he spent the night. Police said that Olsen had also passed \$50 in "worthless paper" at the A and P Store and were checking other local merchants to see if any more checks were in circulation. Iosco County probation authorities said that Olsen was presently out on \$100 bond from Detroit.

Would Hire Night Man for Tawas City Fire Hall

At the suggestion of Mayor George Tuttle, the Tawas City Council Monday night decided to hire a new city employee to take care of nighttime fire calls at the city hall.

According to the mayor's plan, an old meeting room in the basement would be converted into an apartment for the new employee's living quarters. An extension phone would be located there to receive incoming calls. Duties of the new employee would be to take incoming fire calls, notify all firemen as to location of fires, have doors open, the truck running and ready to go by the time volunteer firemen arrive. This idea met with the enthusiastic approval of councilmen. Fires at night are always a problem for a volunteer fire department and it is believed that following such a plan would greatly improve the efficiency of the fire department. It was suggested that the city contact Tawas and Alabaster Townships and present this idea to the two township boards to see if they would participate. Tawas City has a working agreement to furnish fire protection for both townships. It was said

that such a plan would be of particular benefit to the two townships, because of the distance of fire truck runs.

Indiana Men 'None the Worse' After Tawas Bay Dunking

Two Indiana men were rescued after a cold dunking in Tawas Bay last Wednesday when their outboard motor boat overturned during a fishing trip about one-quarter mile off-shore from Tawas Point. Rescued after being in the cold water for more than one-half hour were Donald M. Davis, 67, Fort Wayne, and Kenneth Smith, 69, Huntington. A work party of United States Coast Guardsmen from Tawas Point had been unloading timber at the boathouse when they heard a noise which they described as "sounding like geese honking." It turned out that it was the cry for help by Davis and Smith and a rescue boat was immediately dispatched to the scene when the overturned boat was spotted. A Detroit fisherman, C. W. Murphy, who had been fishing only a short distance away from the two men, was the first to arrive and he helped Davis out of the water. Davis had recently undergone an operation on his leg and he was a non-swimmer. Getting Smith out of the water was another matter. Coast guardsmen said that Murphy was unable to pull Smith into the boat because of the latter's size. "He weighed nearly 300 pounds. After being rescued, the two men were taken to the Tawas Point Life Boat Station where they were given a hot bath and put to bed. Smith told the coast guardsmen that he was having trouble starting the outboard motor. It started suddenly on full throttle and the boat overturned. The two men held on until help arrived. Smith said that he had taken his overcoat off to start the motor. Holding onto the boat's anchor rope while in the water, Smith said that his fingers were about to give out when help came. "I kept moving all the time and my legs were warm." After resting for several hours, the men returned to their house trailer at the East Tawas State Park, none the worse for their experience. The money released includes \$860,000 for ammunition and fuel facilities at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda. Col. Moderator for the program will be Bill McIntosh, who is teacher vice president of the P-TA. The most serious vandalism reported was a broken plate glass window at the former location of Dimmick's Drug Store.

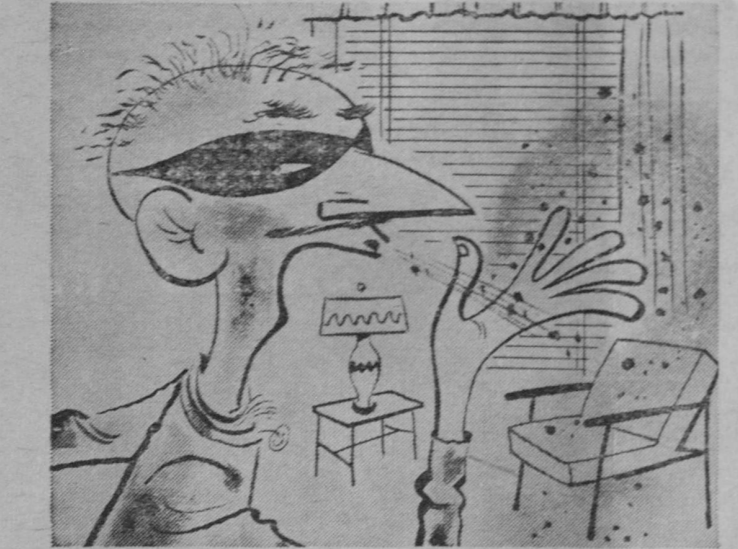

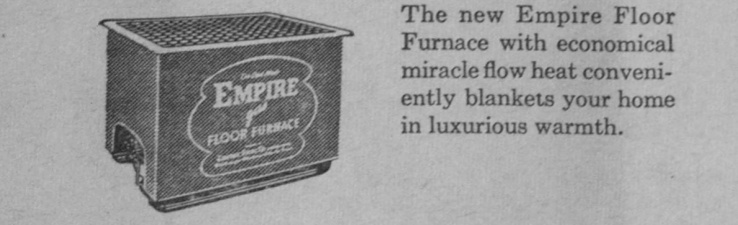

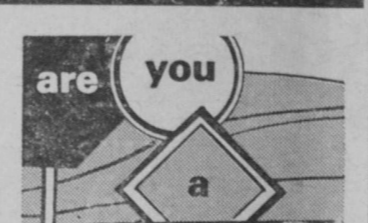
CHRISTIAN SCIENCE

SOCIAL SECURITY AGENT HERE THURSDAY, NOV. 12

Because more earnings can be counted toward social security beginning this year, higher benefits will be payable to many workers who will retire in future years, according to Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City social security office. Beginning with 1959, up to \$4,800 of yearly earnings will be taxed and credited to a worker's social security account. Up until this year only the first \$4,200 of yearly earnings was creditable and therefore taxable.

This increase in the taxable earnings base recognizes the general rise in earnings levels since the old maximum of \$4,200 was established in 1954. Mr. Ellifritz said. Social security benefits for the worker and his family are figured from the average earnings credited to his social security account. This change in the law means that a higher proportion of yearly earnings will be counted in figuring the benefits payable to a worker and to his family when he retires, becomes disabled or dies.

Outdoors WITH EMERY

Here are a few important items that deer hunters should carry as a must with them in the woods hunting: Compass, waterproof matches, small hunting knife, small piece of rope and a map if you are not familiar with the area.

During the deer rifle season, do not wear black, brown or white clothing (including a white handkerchief). The clothing should be red or the ever increasing popular yellow material that is visible much farther than the average red jackets and trousers. Another important thought about clothing for deer hunting is prepare for the various weather conditions that prevail during the season. For the fellows that like to sit on a runway, warmer clothes are required than for the hunters that like to stalk the deer while roaming throughout the woods.

Bow hunters will wind up their regular deer season Thursday, November 5. This will allow the deer herd somewhat of a rest for 10 days before the regular rifle season that starts November 15.

Conservation department specialists from various states encountered rumors of a disease going around several states that caused the low pheasant population this year. They disproved this rumor after checking the pheasants in various areas. It still looks like the food, cover and shelter, cold, snow and rainy nesting weather determine the next year's population of birds.

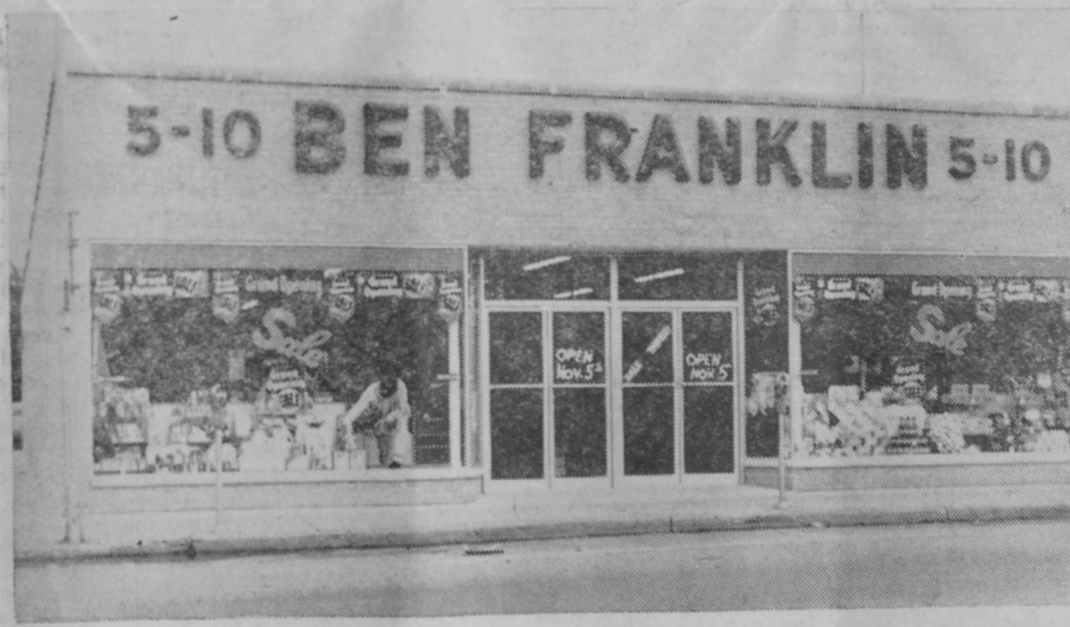

Braves Lose to NEM Leading Gladwin, 25-7

An injury-riddled Tawas Area Braves squad was trampled by the championship-bound Flying Gs of Gladwin Friday night, 25-7, as the Gs notched one more win in their unbeaten season. Gladwin will move into Standish Friday night for a showdown battle with the second place Arenac Central Panthers in a game which will decide the final standings of the Northeastern Michigan Conference.

The Flying Gs were not to be denied in this meeting with Tawas, although the Braves gave a good account of themselves in the first half with a surprise defensive move which held Gladwin to one touchdown.

However, Gladwin solved the four-four first half defense employed by the Braves and fairly riddled the middle of the Tawas line after intermission.

Tawas was handicapped considerably through the loss of Center Duane Sanders and Guard Bob Frank, who were injured in practice this week and did not dress for Friday's game. Quarterback Pete Bolen, who injured his hand earlier in the week, re-injured his leg early in the game and this handicapped the Tawas offense.

Had Tawas been up to full strength, however, it probably would have made little difference in the final outcome of the game.

Gladwin, a team which Tawas had beaten last season, is well-balanced this year and boasts plenty of speed, poise and power in the backfield, as well as a husky line which has been scored against only three times this year.

After a scoreless first period, Gladwin's power began to show, although it had an assist by a Tawas bobble. The Braves had stepped Gladwin's offense cold and the Gs punted on fourth down. Tawas fumbled the ball and Gladwin recovered on the Tawas 45. In nine plays, the Flying Gs drove to their first touchdown. Fullback George Flach doing most of the heavy work with 19 yards gained in four plays. He cracked through the center of the Tawas line on the last carry for one yard and the TD. The PAT was missed.

Tawas had the ball for six plays after Gladwin drew first blood but finally had to punt on fourth down. Dwayne Ulman, whose toe actually kept Tawas in the game all night, punted for 35 yards. The ball was fumbled and Tawas recovered on Gladwin's 41. Bolen unlimbered his arm on the next four plays and hit End Jim Wilkusi with a 16-yard heave and End Arnie Stump with a five yarder. Two more passes went incomplete and Gladwin finally took over on downs, the first half ending 6-0.

After a couple of exchanges for possession of the ball at the start of the second half, the Braves found themselves with their backs to the goal line and Ulman quick-kicked to the Tawas 37. In two plays, Flach powered his way for 38 yards and another Gladwin touchdown. The PAT was again missed.

Tawas Area lost little time in countering with its best offensive punch of the night when, in four plays after the kickoff, Halfback Jim Brooks scampered 35 yards for a touchdown. The score was set up on a 12-yard pass from Bolen to Wilkusi, an eight-yard gainer by Halfback Ken Herriman and a five-yard run by Halfback Herman Rollin. The PAT was good, coming on a pass from Bolen to Rollin, and it looked as though the Braves might still be in the game.

Gladwin soon proved this idea to be only wishful thinking as they pounded right back to score another touchdown as the fourth quarter opened. After that man, Flach, had again picked up 42 yards in three rushing plays, Quarterback Howard Smith hit Halfback Doug Reisman with a pass. Reisman, who was all alone behind the Tawas secondary, loped into the end zone with the score which broke Tawas Area's back. Quarterback Smith added insult to injury by skittering around right end for the PAT.

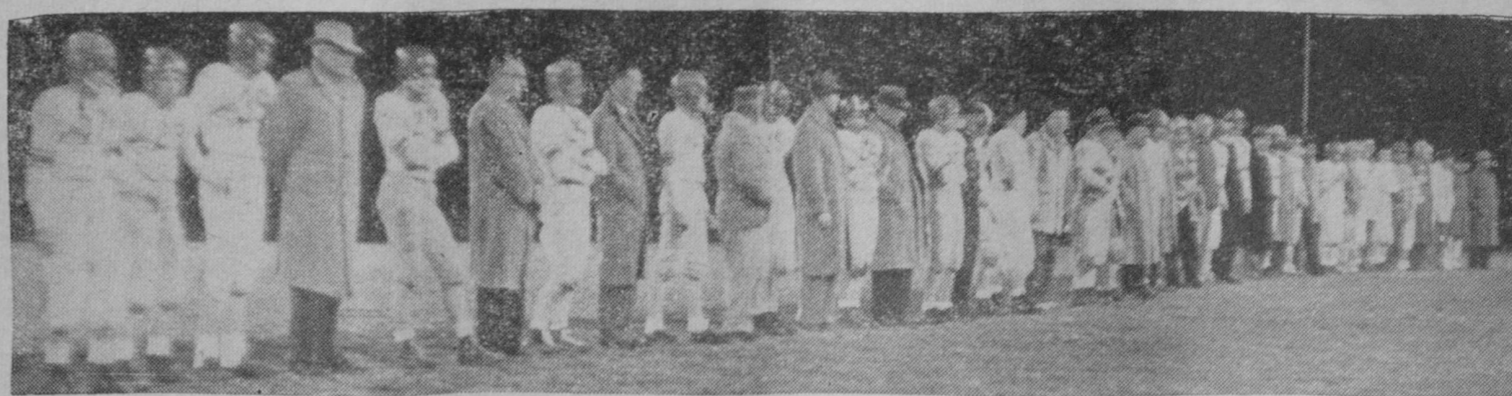
With Tawas' morale at its lowest and its offensive cannons firing "blanks," the Flying Gs took over on fourth down and then, in six plays, hit pay dirt again. As might be expected, Flach, was again the workhorse as he set up the touchdown with a 34-yard stomp. Halfback Don Hale got in his two cents worth by pounding right up through the middle of Tawas Area's defense for six yards to score. The PAT was missed and that ended the scoring.

Tawas Area will finish out its 1959 football season this Friday night, meeting Beaverton at the Tawas Area athletic field. This

will be the homecoming game as well as dad's night, which was rained out two weeks ago.

With one contest left on the league schedule, a big one at Standish, where the Flying Gs tangle with second place Arenac Central, who downed Whittemore-Prescott in a non-league affair, 38-6. A win or a tie would put Coach Gene Gilbert's aggregation on top, but a loss would result in a three-way tie for the top and the conference flag. In other games played last week, Roscommon had no trouble beating Arenac Eastern at Twining, 47-0; West Branch outscored Pinconning, 20-12, and Houghton Lake defeated Beaverton, 27-12.

The wind-up of games scheduled for this Friday night include the big one, Gladwin at Arenac Central, West Branch at Roscommon, Beaverton at Tawas

During halftime ceremonies, fathers of the junior varsity players were introduced.

After getting the ball on the losers' 20 because of a poor pass in punt formation, Halfback Tom McCutcheon went the last seven yards around end to score. The winners came right back on a nine-yard reverse by Halfback Tom McBeath and a run by Quarterback Gunnard Johnson for the conversion gave the Bucks a 13-0 first quarter lead.

McCutcheon added the third touchdown in the second period and picked up the extra point on a run. Guard Rich Johnson set up the scoring play when he intercepted an Eagle pass on the 45 and ran to the two. The tally gave Roscommon an intermission bulge of 20-0.

Johnson scored in the third period on a 12-yard end run and repeated after the kickoff with a 36-yard run at the opposite end. McCutcheon scored the conversion on a run through guard. A fumble recovered by Halfback Bob Stockton set up the next

In the third period, the Bobcats recovered a fumbled punt on the losers' 20 and Halfback Ed Barnes went the last 12 yards to pay dirt with Bell plunging for the extra point and a 20-6 third-quarter advantage. In the final frame, Quarter-

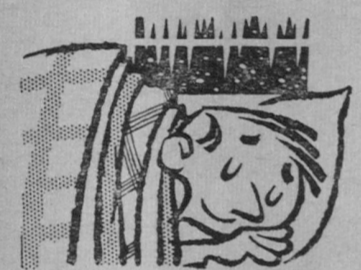

Posters Describe Michigan's Greatest Traffic Killer

Descriptions of the greatest traffic killer in Michigan, who last year caused the deaths of almost 500 people, were being posted throughout the state this week by police officials.

Named only as Too Fast Con,

the police posters warned all drivers and pedestrians to be on the alert for this highway killer who fails to adjust driving speed to adverse conditions of road, weather or traffic because of ignorance, bad judgment or impatience.

Too Fast Con is the second in a series of characterized traffic law violators the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police is calling attention to as drivers who are "unwanted in Michigan."

In police accident records, Too Fast Con is short for "speed too fast for conditions."

Police Chief George Ruth of Tawas City points out that the problem with this traffic law violator is not high speed but rather "excessive" speed in a particular situation which calls for a reduction of speed in order to maintain control of the automobile.

"Too many of our otherwise good, law-abiding drivers think that if they stay within the posted speed limits of the community or the state speed limits of 65-55 miles per hour on the open highway, they are exercising due caution," said Chief Ruth.

"Unfortunately, though these drivers think they are legally correct, they may be violating the law which insists that speed be reasonable and proper. Conditions of road, weather and other traffic often change the speed requirements of what is reasonable and proper at that time and in that location," Chief Ruth pointed out.

A look at the state's accident statistics in terms of speed, confirms the statement that high speed is not as serious a problem as excessive speed.

The largest number of fatal accidents last year occurred between 31 and 40 miles per hour; the next largest between 41 and 50 miles per hour. There were four times more fatalities at speeds between 21 and 30 miles an hour than there were at 61 to 70 miles per hour.

Excessive speed, speed too fast for conditions, was reported as a contributing factor in 45 percent of the fatal accidents in Michigan last year in which law violations were present. In addition to killing 497 people, 5,492 were seriously injured and there were innumerable property damage accidents also resulting from excessive speed. Total cost of these "speed" accidents is estimated at 67 million dollars for last year.

Too Fast Con is described on the police poster as being anyone, any age, either sex. Although this unwanted driver appears physically mature, it is believed that emotional immaturity is the basic character deficiency of this problem driver.

This is apparent in studying the records of traffic accidents involving excessive speed. The Too Fast Con is inclined to be over-confident of his or her driving ability when conditions indicate a reduction of speed is a reasonable precaution. Coupled with impatience, this over-confidence will make the Too Fast Con overdrive his headlights at night, will encourage him to take an extra five or 10 miles over the posted speed limit and will prompt him to disregard requirements for safe stopping distances when the road is slippery, when visibility is reduced or when traffic is such that sudden and unexpected stops may occur.
