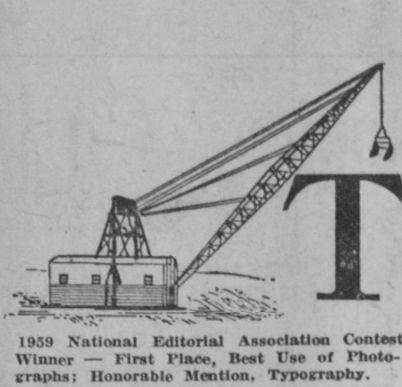

TWO WAFB PILOTS DIE IN CRASH

Voodoo Plummet Into Saginaw Bay

Wreckage Found by Skin Divers Near Caseville

Wreckage of an air force TF-101B Voodoo jet plane, which crashed into Saginaw Bay west of Caseville Monday afternoon, was found Tuesday by an armada of air and sea rescue craft.

Listed as dead in the crash are Captains Howard D. Wandel, 34, of Hudson, Indiana, and Hilton Sewell, 31, of Thaxton, Mississippi. The two men were on a routine training flight from Wurtsmith.

A rescue helicopter was dispatched from Wurtsmith Monday afternoon shortly after a Thumb area resident reported seeing a military plane crash into Saginaw Bay. Ground control headquarters at Wurtsmith had lost radar contact with the ill-fated plane.

Air force officials said that the men gave a disaster call at 1:25 p. m. Monday. Several "May Day" calls were received but radio contact was lost after that.

Search for the missing plane and pilots had to be discontinued Monday night due to high winds and ice conditions in Saginaw Bay. After high winds hampered operations late Monday, the weather turned for the better Tuesday with warm temperatures and an offshore wind.

On hand to assist when the search resumed at daybreak Tuesday were three state police skin divers. A wing tank had been spotted floating in the bay late Monday afternoon by state police who were using high powered binoculars. The skin divers searched this area until dark Monday night and again Tuesday. Operations were later shifted to an area where an oil slick had been spotted by a private plane.

Also joining in the search were coast guard rescue raft from Tawas Point and Harbor Beach which were pulled out of dry-dock Monday night. Also assisting was a commercial fishing boat from Caseville.

Wandel was in the rear seat of the TF-101B, a Voodoo training ship. Sewell, in the front seat of the twice-the-speed-of-sound jet, was piloting the craft.

The ill-fated plane was the first Voodoo ever to crash in Michigan. Captain Wandel has been stationed at Wurtsmith since March 1957, Captain Sewell since January of this year. Captain Wandel and his wife, Patsy Ann, are the parents of three children. Captain Sewell and his wife, Margaret Ann, have two children.

A Selfridge Air Force F-102 Delta Dagger is believed to have crashed in the same general vicinity last summer.

Calvin Opens Bay Shipping

The Benjamin Calvin, a 12,000-ton ore carrier owned by Boland and Cornelius Steamship Company, Buffalo, New York, opened the 1960 shipping season here Sunday when it was loaded with 10,000 tons of gypsum rock at United States Gypsum Company's crib in Saginaw Bay.

Scheduled to arrive a week earlier, the Calvin was forced to remain in the Saginaw River for several days because of unfavorable water conditions. After it cleared the mouth of the river, it became ice-bound in Saginaw Bay overnight.

Maynard VanOrnum, works manager at USG's Alabaster installation, said that this year's shipping season was starting a little later than normal due to ice conditions in the Great Lakes. The Calvin's arrival officially opened the shipping season here.

Plans for preventing and suppressing forest fires in the Tawas district were made and discussed. A movie was shown covering the work of the forest service.

Musolf of Tawas City, Howard Ho-facer of Oscoda and Joseph Bannister of Hale; Conservation Officer Arthur Leitz and Fire Officer Bert MacGregor, both of the Michigan Department of Conservation.

Also attending were Fire Wardens John L. VanPatten of West Lake, Carl L. Slosser of Hale, Ronald E. Korthals of Big Island Lake, Peter Stevens of Jose Lake AuSable Forest Products Association was represented by V. B. Shultz and Gary W. Whitford, both of East Tawas.

The general opinion of those present was that if the local population would use care with fire, the ever present fire hazard could be handled.

Gen. Humfeld Urges Area to Open Hearts-Homes to SAC

Stating that "peace insurance" was the vital mission of the Strategic Air Command, Brig. Gen. Harold E. Humfeld told a gathering of some 225 Iosco County men last Wednesday that everyone, the military and civilian population alike, share in the responsibility of carrying out this tremendous mission.

General Humfeld, new commander of the 40th Air Division with headquarters at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, was guest of honor at a noon luncheon held at the Oscoda Methodist Church, sponsored by the Oscoda Kiwanis Club. Guests included members of the Tawas Kiwanis Club, the Hale Lions Club and other Northeastern Michigan citizens.

His command includes Wurt-

smith, K. I. Sawyer and Kincheloe Air Force Bases in Michigan and Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Ohio.

In outlining SAC's mission as a retaliatory striking power, General Humfeld said that SAC receives about 18 percent of the national budget while carrying about 90 percent of the deterrent power.

Stating that the combined striking power of ADC fighters and

SAC bombers would be essential to air defense and offense for the next 10 years, General Humfeld said that during that time the United States Government will have spent from 800 million to one billion dollars on real estate and property in Northern Michigan.

Outlining Wurtsmith's role in SAC, the division commander said that within the next three years there will be an influx of 3,700 to 4,000 military personnel here and the government will have spent 300 million dollars at Wurtsmith.

General Humfeld said that the three Northern Michigan bases would have the newest and most modern equipment. Wurtsmith will have 10 or more B-52H bombers, 10 to 20 KC-135 jet tankers and one ADC fighter squadron, presently equipped with F-101 Voodoo interceptors.

Of the latter, General Humfeld asserted that it made good sense to utilize runways costing in the neighborhood of \$10,000,000 for both bombers and fighters. Speak-

Port Gypsum Case Heard by Supreme Court

Reargument on the Port Gypsum case was heard last Tuesday before the Michigan Supreme Court at Lansing. No date has been set as to when an opinion on the case will be handed down by the high court.

The case, brought by Dr. Malvern Obrecht and other property owners adjacent to the installation and the Michigan Department of Conservation, contests a 1957 decision handed down by Circuit Judge Herman Dehnke which allowed National Gypsum Company to construct its lake loading installation south of Tawas City.

The supreme court asked for rearargument on the following two questions:

1. Does a riparian proprietor have the right, irrespective of legislative assent, to construct a permanent dock extending whatever distance to seaward as is necessary to reach either the ship channel or waters of sufficient depth to accommodate lake steamers?

2. Of what legal effect is the permit which National Gypsum Company obtained from the department of conservation after this case was decided in the circuit court?

Property owners were represented by Attorney James Brooker of Bay City. The Michigan Department of Conservation was represented by Assistant Attorney General Nicholas V. Olds. Attorney John Watkins of East Tawas represented National Gypsum Company.

May Develop Two New State Parks

The AuSable Point area and the Tawas Point area are two of 40 along Michigan's Great Lakes shoreline chosen by the United States Department of the Interior for possible development as state parks.

In a recent report of a federal survey of the entire Great Lakes shore, it was recommended that the AuSable Point area, include 1.5 miles of shoreline westwards from the point and span an inland area of nearly 300 acres. The recommendation for Tawas Point area included a shoreline of four miles and an interior area of 1,500 acres.

Shortage of funds for state parks makes acquisition and development of these and other areas impossible at this time, according to Arthur E. Elmer, conservation department parks chief. However, a lessening of the critical money situation would place the AuSable Point area and the Tawas Point area high on a priority list.

Gocarts Forbidden on Highways and Streets

Parents of children operating four-wheeled motorized gocarts are being cautioned by Sgt. Frank Roti, commanding officer of the East Tawas post of the Michigan State Police, to warn them that it is not only dangerous but illegal to use the machines on streets and highways.

Now that warmer weather is here, the gocarts, or midget cars as they are otherwise called, will be wheeled out but unless their operation is restricted they can be hazardous.

Two-wheel motor scooters are licensed under special regulations for street and highway use the same as motorcycles, but the secretary of state's department does not license the midget cars because they are not equipped for safe operation on streets and highways.

Gocarts must be operated either on private property or on parking lots or tracks specifically authorized for their use when other vehicles are not occupying these areas.

Among the dangers of operating gocarts on streets and highways are their smallness and low height

which make it difficult for other motorists to spot them, the immature judgment and inexperience of drivers, whose ages range from as young as six years to 14, much slower travel speeds than other (See GOCARTS, page 8.)

Three Vacancies on Hale School Board

There will be three vacancies to be filled on the Hale Area Board of Education at the July election. To be elected are three trustees, one for three years and the other two for four years.

Nominating petitions are available at the high school office. Fifty registered signers must accompany each petition. To be registered, a school elector must register with his township clerk and a copy will be forwarded to the school.

Signed petitions must be returned to the Hale Area School office by 4:00 p. m. May 13 or to the secretary of the board of education by 4:00 p. m. May 14, if the nominees' names are to appear on the ballot.

Stormy First Day Starts April Supervisors' Session

After routine reorganization Tuesday morning, during which Glenn Long was re-elected chairman for 1960, the first day of the April session of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors turned into a stormy one.

The storm "broke" over board action last month in which a resolution calling for elective road commissioners, instead of appointive, was turned down by a 10-7 margin. The resolution had asked that the board follow the dictates of the people, who, in 1958, voted by a large margin to have elective road commissioners.

After discussion from the floor, the matter was turned over to the board's roads and bridges committee for a recommendation. The committee is to report out at 3:30 p. m. Thursday.

With a fair crowd in the gallery of the courtroom, first person to address the board was Melvin McCormick, president of the union local at National Gypsum Company. McCormick asked, "Why has the vote of the people been ignored?" Stating that he and his fellow union members who accompanied him had no axes to grind, McCormick felt that the board had lost its option to appoint road commission members when a vote was taken. "I don't think our group of people are the only ones who feel this way," he said.

According to Michigan statutes,

a board of supervisors has the power to appoint members of the road commission or allow the people to elect them. The prosecuting attorney has advised that the board is not held responsible for the 1958 board's action.

In answer to Mr. McCormick, Chairman Long said that, insofar as his township (Tawas) was concerned, he felt the people did not understand what they were voting for in 1958. He said that many voters had approached him saying they did not understand the entire question.

Long said that it was his per-

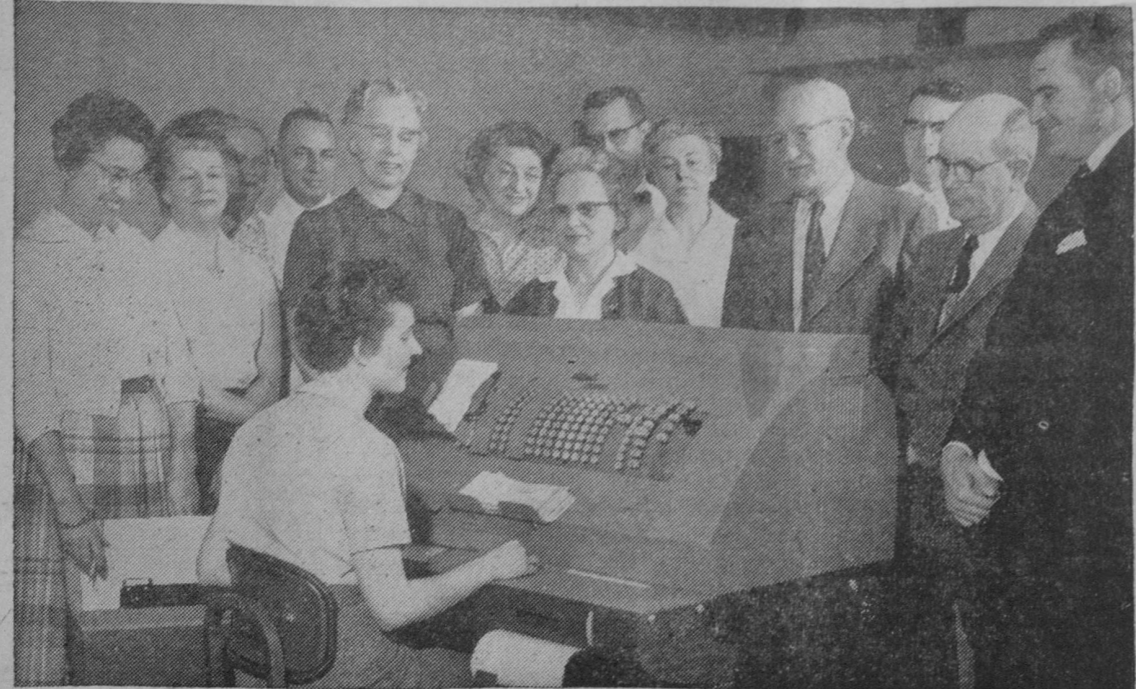
Under this new system, each depositor has an electronic signature, a code letter arrangement which automatically and positively identifies every transaction of each account.

Thursday, April 14—Loon Lake Farm Bureau meeting, 8:00 p. m.

Thursday, April 14—The social security men will be at the Federal Building, East Tawas, from 10:30 a. m. until 2:00 p. m.

Monday, April 25—Iosco DHIA meeting at Martin Siegrist's home, Burleigh Township, 8:00 p. m.

On Thursday, April 14, we will conduct an Iosco County beef tour. The stops this year will be at George Holzheuer's farm at 1:00 p. m. and James Mielock's, 2:30 p. m. At the Holzheuer farm, we will discuss parasite and disease control. Mr. Holzheuer has been working in cooperation with the extension service and Dow Chemical Company, in controlling external parasites with the use of new chemicals. These will be briefly described at his farm. Wilton Finley, Michigan State University animal husbandry specialist, will review parasite control and some of the new legislation that may affect the control of our parasites and diseases.

At the James Mielock farm, a calf dehorning and castrating demonstration will be conducted. In addition, Mr. Finley will review the feeding program for the beef cow and calf herd.

Home gardeners and farmers have shown increasing concern over which sprays will be safe to use in their gardens and fields this year.

Spray contamination and its harmful effects on food plants aroused nationwide interest during the cranberry incident last November.

Dr. Ray L. Janes, associate professor of entomology at Michigan State University, says gardeners and farmers will have no problems if they learn to use sprays correctly and know their limitations.

Senator Prescott Announces He Will Seek Re-Election

Senator Charles T. Prescott, president pro-tempore of the state senate, said today he will seek re-election to an eighth term from the 10 counties comprising the 28th senatorial district.

One of the four senators with more than 14 years of service, Prescott's contribution to state government and the welfare of his district were recognized in 1959 by his elevation to president pro-tempore of the senate. It is the highest honor the senate can confer on any of its members.

This means that Prescott presides over the senate when the lieutenant governor is absent, a situation that has kept Senator Prescott closely confined to his Lansing duties in recent months.

Prescott has been on the job daily over the past 15 months while the legislature struggled with taxes and budgets during 1959 and in recent months of the 1960 session.

"My duties as president pro-tempore have kept me from making my periodic visits to the district," said Prescott, "but I think that after the next two weeks time will permit me to renew my friendships."

Prescott, as always, maintains his legal residence at Prescott, where he owns a farm. While attending legislative duties, he maintains a room at a Lansing hotel.

After 14 years as a senator, Prescott said he believes that his seniority gives the voters of his district a distinct advantage in the capitol hall.

He is chairman of the conservation committee and a fighter for progressive conservation methods and administration to benefit all of the upper end of the Lower Peninsula. He is vice chairman of the senate business committee, one of the most powerful committees of the senate, and a member of the committees on agriculture and municipalities.

His district of 10 counties is the largest in the state, geographically, and keeps him busy with many "local" problems. An example is his successful fight this year to help airports at Clare and Roscommon and Tawas Point.

Prescott in 1959 was a key fighter against a state income tax and an advocate of "economy in government" to the exclusion of frills in government and a battler for years for a balanced budget as required by the state constitution.

The counties in the 28th district are Alcona, Arenac, Clare, Crawford, Gladwin, Iosco, Ogemaw, Osceola, Oscoda and Roscommon.

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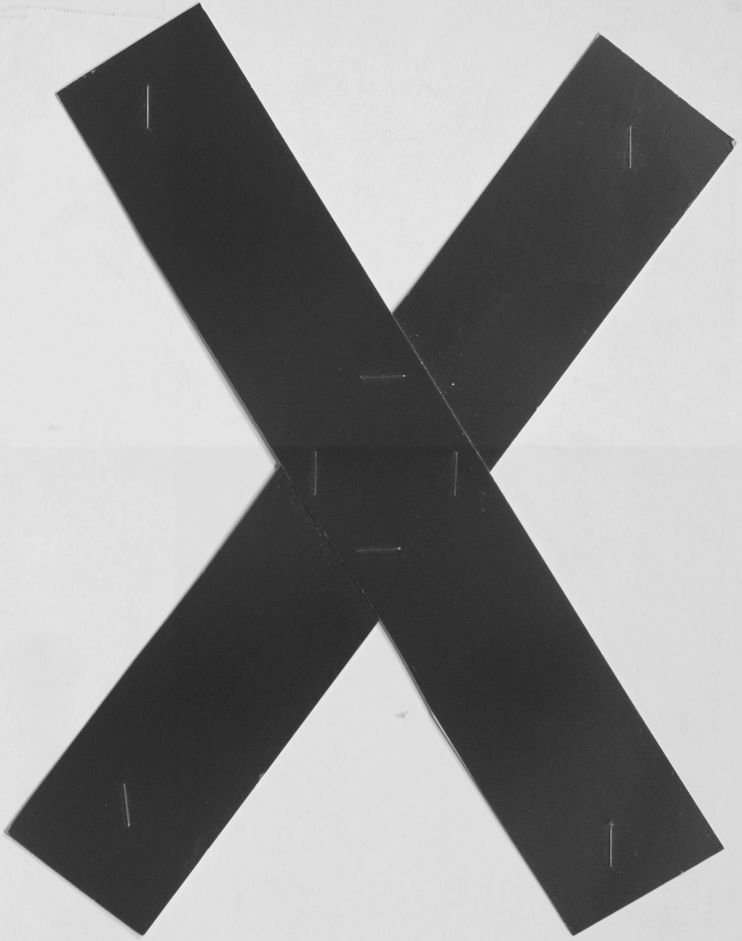
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
