Wreckage Found **Calvin Opens** by Skin Divers Near Caseville

TF-101B Voodo jet plane, which crashed into Saginaw Bay west of Caseville Monday afternoon, was found Tuesday by an armada of air and sea rescue craft.

Listed as dead in the crash are Captains Howard D. Wandel, 34, of Hudson, Indiana, and Hilton Sewell, 31, of Thaxton, Mississippi. The two men were on a routine training flight from Wurtsmith.

Port Gypsum Case Heard by Supreme Court

Reargument on the Port Gypsum case was heard last Tuesday before the Michigan Supreme Court at Lansing. No date has been set as to when an opinion on the case will be handed down by the high court.

The case, brought by Dr. Mal-vern Obrecht and other property owners adjacent to the installation and the Michigan Department of Conservation, contests a 1957 decision handed down by Circuit Judge Herman Dehnke which allowed National Gypsum Company to construct its lake loading installation south of Tawas City.

The supreme court asked for reargument on the following two questions:

1. Does a riparian proprietor now have the right, irrespective of legislative assent, to construct a permanent dock extending whatever distance to seaward as is necessary to reach either the ship channel or waters of sufficient depth to accommodate lake steamers?

2. Of what legal effect is the permit which National Gypsum Company obtained from the department of conservation after this case was decided in the circuit court?






