## Iosco Equalized; Werth Asks for New Assessment Study

Iosco County was equalized at \$23,545,547 last Wednesday, or at 49.86 percent of the state figure of \$46,956,647, as the Iosco County Board of Supervisors concluded its stormy seven-day April session.

The final figure adopted was \$134,447 higher than the total assessed valuation figure brought in by the board at the start of this month's session. Before adopting the report of the board's equalization committee, much discussion was heard, both in committee and from the floor, concerning "irregularities" found on reporting sheets sent to the state tax commission. It was stated that some supervisors were not following the tax assessors' manual and were reporting valuation increases as "adjustments" rather than "new."

The equalization committee recommended that all records of new and adjusted real and personal property be kept on record by supervisors, assessors and the various boards of review and to submit them to the equalization committee at future April sessions. A resolution by Supervisor Elmer Werth of East Tawas, which called for the board to request the state tax commission to come in this year and re-equalize Iosco County, was stated by a nine to nine roll call. However, the state tax commission can be called in should an individual supervisor request such action.

Mr. Werth said that in reviewing tax rolls, he found that East Tawas tax assessments were higher than in other tax units of the county while that city's percentage on state equalized valuation remains lower than other tax units. Before adopting the corrected equalization report, the board deducted \$98,000 from East Tawas' state tax figure and \$12,000 from Wilber Township. The difference was made by adding a "penalty" to six townships.

However, Mr. Werth said this week that penalizing does not correct assessments. "In re-equalizing, there still remains a wide variation in assessed figures on real and personal properties."

The East Tawas mayor said that after talking with Prosecuting At-

torney Paul Harvey Monday, he felt that rather than call in the state tax commission, the board of supervisors should hire a private firm to conduct a study of tax assessments. The state tax commission made spot checks in Iosco County in 1952, but the board of supervisors was in agreement last week that such findings were inadequate. Werth said that following the last check by the state tax commission, it was agreed by the board to assess at one-third of the actual cash value on personal properties. He said that he has found, in some instances, where supervisors were assessing at one-fifth of the cash value.

"A gentlemen's agreement is no good when it comes to assessing," said Mr. Werth. "Some type of policy must be set up and I hope that the supervisors will see fit to hire a private study of assessments in this county."

## Appeals Jury Verdict to Higher Court

A guilty verdict brought in by a six-man justice court jury last Thursday has been appealed to circuit court by Joseph Ray Stoecker, 44, of Bad Axe. He was arrested March 18 and charged with driving under the influence of inebriating liquor. State and city police officers had arrested Stoecker the night of March 18 following a high speed chase through the Tawas. In his defense last Thursday, the defendant testified that, at the time of his arrest, he was under the influence of carbon monoxide poisoning due to a faulty muffler on his car. The appeal has been set for the first day of the June term of Iosco County Circuit Court.

## Tawas School Faculty is Nearly Set for Next Year

Two teachers remained unsigned as of Tuesday and there were three other vacancies to be filled on the faculty of Tawas Area High School, according to Supt. Reynold Mick. ## R. G. Schreck, Lumber Dealer, Dies in Florida

Robert G. Schreck, prominent East Tawas businessman, died Sunday, April 24, at Bradenton, Florida. He suffered a heart attack the previous Friday. He and Mrs. Schreck had been vacationing there. The body was shipped to East Tawas and funeral services were held at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon at Christ Episcopal Church. The Rev. Paul Sutton will officiate. Interment will be in Greenwood Cemetery.

Coming here from Ely, Minnesota, Mr. Schreck served as supervisor of the Huron National Forest. About 25 years ago, he entered the lumber business at Tawas City later establishing the business at its present location in East Tawas.

He had been a member of the board of directors of the Peoples State Bank since organization in 1927. He was chairman of the East Tawas board of public works and took active interest in civic affairs. Mr. Schreck was instrumental in the building of the Lumbermen's Monument on the AuSable River.

A member of Christ Episcopal Church, he was a member of Baldwin Lodge, F and AM; the Bay City Consistory, and Baldwin Lodge, IOOF. Mr. Schreck was born February 18, 1892. Survivors include his wife, the former Miss Martha Trezona, whom he married at Duluth, Minnesota; a son, Charles of East Tawas; and a daughter, Mrs. Royce B. McKinley of Evanston, Illinois.

### Cable's Resort Sold to Flint Couple

Sale of Cable's Tawas Resort on Bay Drive, Tawas City, was announced Tuesday by Cecil Cable. New owners are Mr. and Mrs. Allen J. Chisholm of Flint. The transaction is effective immediately. The resort is to open May 1 under the management of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Richter of East Tawas. Mr. Chisholm is an official of General Motors Corporation.

Mr. Cable said that he would continue to operate his retail hardware business which he purchased from Randall M. Fox in December 1956. The Cables had operated the resort since moving to Tawas City from Redford 13 years ago. Starting first with a cabin set-up, through the years the Cables have developed the business into one of the finest 14-unit resorts on the shore. The transaction did not include the Cables' home on US-23.

### To Hear Report on Recreational Project

A report on more and better recreational facilities is to be made at next Monday night's meeting of the East Tawas Council.

Operation of the athletic field at East Tawas has been taken over by the Lions Club. The club is to raise money for the project and city money may be appropriated. A long-range project under consideration by the council and the Lions Club is lights for the field, additional tennis courts, repair of present tennis courts and new shuffleboards.

### THREE CUB PACKS FORMED BY TAWAS CITY LEGION

Three cub pack dens have been formed by the Jesse Hodder Post, American Legion, according to Cubmaster Robert Dakin. Any parents interested in forming additional dens should contact John Brugger or Thorald Curry.

A budget of \$237,332 for county operation during 1961 was adopted by the board of supervisors at the conclusion of its April session last Wednesday. This figure represents the total estimated expense of county operation for next year. Anticipated fees from county offices are expected to be \$20,000, leaving a balance of \$217,332 to be raised by taxation. The 1961 budget shows an increase of \$11,332 over the current year's budget. The board of supervisors allowed increased departmental expenses in nearly all county offices.

Largest increase was in the sheriff's department, which is to receive \$27,300 for departmental expense as compared to \$16,784 this year. Other increases were as follows: Treasurer's office, \$3,300 compared to \$1,550; clerk's office, \$2,800 compared to \$1,950; prosecuting attorney, \$1,600 compared to \$1,200; probate judge, \$2,160 compared to \$1,550. Departmental expense of the register of deed's office was reduced from \$3,055 to \$2,010 in 1961. Direct relief was granted an increase of \$4,000 while the department of social welfare remains the same.

## Make Plans to Fete Visiting Mayors

Plans are now being made for mayors exchange day, May 16, as part of the annual observance of Michigan Week in this community. Arrangements are being made by Kenneth Conn, president of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association, and members of the Tawas City Council.

Mayor George Tuttle will go to Beulah on the western side of the state and will trade places with Village President Philip Ehaman. At East Tawas, plans are now being made by businessmen and civic officials to entertain Mayor R. J. Alexander and wife of Oak Park, who will arrive there Sunday, May 15. Mayor Elmer Werth and his wife will go to Oak Park in the exchange. Mayor Alexander is an engineer with a construction background and is presently director of the Oakland County Department of Public Works.

## 'Were You Counted?' Asks Census Supervisor

With the 1960 census of population and housing virtually completed, District Supervisor George W. Myles today announced the beginning of a "were you counted?" campaign to insure that no resident of the area has been overlooked.

Persons who believe they have been missed by the census takers are urged to notify the census district office by means of "were you counted?" forms. Area residents may pick up a copy of one of these forms starting Thursday at the Tawas City post office. Prompt mailing of the "were you counted?" forms will speed up the compilation of preliminary figures for the area.

Preliminary figures presenting the total population of incorporated places of 10,000 or more population, and for counties, will be issued as soon as the district supervisor is convinced that a complete count has been made. Final, detailed population figures will be issued in Washington later this year after the returns have been tabulated on the census bureau's electronic computers.

The importance of a complete count was stressed by the district supervisor. He pointed out that the population figures compiled in the current census must stand as official until the next federal census.

"Federal aid funds are allotted to states and state funds, in turn, are allotted to counties and municipalities on a per capita basis. So a short count means a short allotment. Thus, it is imperative that we have a complete count. The help of every resident of the area

is needed to reach this goal," he said. It is possible that some advance census report forms have not been picked up by census takers, the district supervisor said. He urged persons still holding such forms to mail them to the local census office.

## Two State Troopers to Transfer June 15

Impending transfer of two veteran state police troopers at East Tawas was announced last week by Lansing headquarters. Trooper Walter Wiedbrauk, who has been assigned here since September 1949, will go to Niles and Trooper Warner Palmer, who has been here since April 1951, will go to the Ypsilanti post. The transfers are effective June 15.

Among the 75 transfers announced last week, Troopers Donald J. Ulrey of Romeo and Theodore Reszka of Brighton will move to East Tawas.

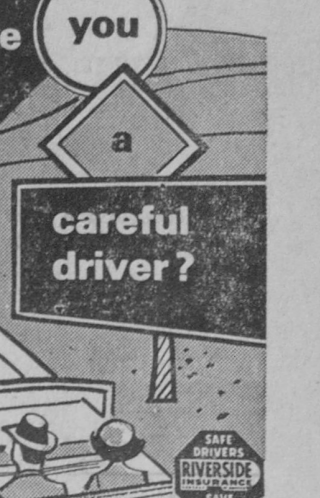

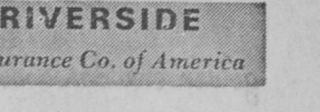

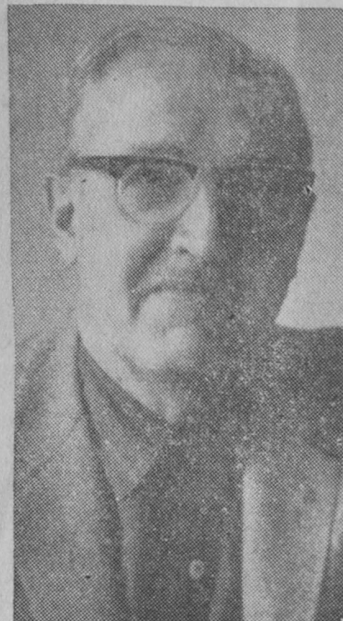
## Awarded Citations for Public Service to Nation

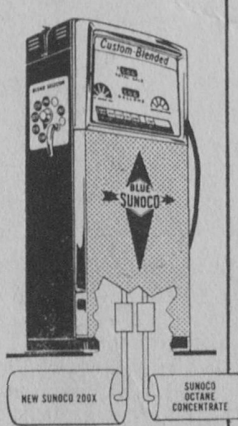

APRIL SESSION

**April 12, 1960**

Pursuant to statute, the Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order in April session at 9:30 a. m. by the clerk who ordered roll call. The following supervisors were present: Ashton, Bellville, Blust, Brabant, Burgess, Everett, Jordan, Little, Long, Oates, Rodman, McKenzie, Smith, Pollard, Webb, Werth, White, Kochenderfer. Absent: Stephan.

The clerk of the board called for nominations for temporary chairman, this being the yearly reorganization period. Mr. Bellville nominated Mr. Long for temporary chairman. Supported by Ashton. It was moved by Werth supported by Blust that the nominations be closed and the clerk instructed to cast the entire ballot for Mr. Long.

Mr. Long took over as temporary chairman and called for nominations for permanent chairman. Mr. Little nominated Mr. Long for permanent chairman. Supported by Blust. It was moved by Werth supported by Blust that the nominations be closed and the clerk instructed to cast the entire ballot for Mr. Long.

Mr. Long took over as permanent chairman for the coming year.

Chairman Long called for nominations for chairman pro tem. Mr. Brabant nominated Mr. Oates. Supported by Werth. It was moved by Jordan supported by Smith that the nominations be closed and the clerk instructed to cast the entire ballot for Mr. Oates. Mr. Oates was named chairman pro tem for the coming year.

It was moved by Burgess supported by Rodman that the board recess until 1:30 while the chairman and chairman pro tem made the new committee appointments. Motion carried unanimously and the board did then recess until 1:30 p. m.

**AFTERNOON SESSION**

Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m., roll call was ordered by the chairman. The same supervisors were

present as at the morning session. Chairman pro tem Oates read the following list of committee appointments.

Drains and Ditches—Webb, Jordan, Ashton.

Roads and Bridges—Rodman, White, Burgess.

Building and Grounds—Everett, Brabant, Werth.

Judiciary — Werth, Stephan, Ashton, Smith.

Conservation — White, Burgess, Jordan, Kochenderfer.

Officers' Bonds—Bellville, Brabant, Oates, Everett.

Civil Defense—Stephan, McKenzie, Ashton.

Insurance—Kochenderfer, Bellville, Oates.

Aeronautics — Oates, Everett, Jordan.

Upon motion by Everett supported by Brabant, the committee appointments were unanimously accepted and adopted.

Clarence Krueger addressed the board in regard to a problem he had attempted to take up with the prosecuting attorney's office regarding the placement of a fence across a public fishing stream. He was told that the matter would be checked into by a committee of this board.

Communications were ordered

read and suspended when a delegation appeared before the board to protest the March action of retaining the appointive system for road commissioners.

Melvin McCormick addressed the board stating that he represented the union group from National and also many people in this county who had voted in 1958 on the ballot asking whether or not the election of road commissioners should be returned to the people.

Mr. McCormick stated that many people believe that this board should follow the dictates of the people in this vote and that in as much as this board had asked the people for an opinion on the matter that they should have received more consideration.

Chairman Long stated that he voted as he did because the appointive system had spread representation over the county in a better manner than the elective system.

Mr. Werth stated that he believed Mr. McCormick had a proper question and that this board should further consider the matter. He emphasized, however, that this board would not let itself be subjected to pressure groups for he felt certain that each member of this board always voted for what each one believed to be for the best interest of this county as a whole. Supervisor Werth suggested that the appeal of the delegation present be turned over to the roads and bridges committee for further study.

Joseph Reinke of Tawas Township stated that the people couldn't understand why they were asked to vote on the question if they were to be disregarded.

Mr. Burgess stated that this board shouldn't have asked for an advisory ballot in the first place. By due process of law, they had gone to the appointive system without too much difficulty and with great improvement. His opinion was that in 1958 the board members should have stood by their decision to make the change and not ask for the vote they did.

Ralph DeGesie of Burleigh Township stated that he felt that this board had been given a mandate by the voters and that the mandate should be followed.

Chairman Long referred the

matter to the roads and bridges committee for further study. He informed the group present that this committee would make a report by 3:30 Thursday afternoon, April 14.

The remainder of the communications were read and referred to the proper committees by the chairman.

Mr. Oates reported to the board that the special nursing home committee had located a private investor interested in building an adequate nursing home for Iosco County and that the committee was working with him.

Committees were ordered to their respective duties, balance of the board to be at ease subject to the call of the chair.

Upon call to order at 4:25 p. m., the clerk was instructed to open the sealed bids for the printing of the proceedings of the supervisors for a five-year period.

The bids were discussed and computations made and it was then moved by Little supported by Bellville that The Tawas Herald be awarded the printing of the supervisors proceedings for a five-year period at a cost of \$120 per folio. The motion carried upon the following roll call. Ayes: Ashton, Bellville, Blust, Brabant, Burgess, Everett, Jordan, Little, Long, Oates, Rodman, McKenzie, Pollard, Webb, Werth, White, Kochenderfer. Nays: Smith.

The matter of a vacancy on the Iosco County Welfare Board caused by the demise of Harry Cross was brought before the board.

Mr. Little nominated Mrs. Bernice Herriman as a recommended replacement to fill the vacancy.

Mr. Werth nominated Edward Nelkie.

It was moved by Pollard supported by Jordan that the nominations be closed and that a secret ballot be taken.

Tellers were appointed and results of the secret ballot were as follows: Mr. Nelkie 11, Mrs. Herriman seven. Edward Nelkie was recommended to fill the unexpired term of Harry Cross on the Iosco County Welfare Board.

Mr. Little read the following report of the finance committee. Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

Your audit recommendations have been noted by the finance

committee and proper steps will be taken to correct the same.

Upon motion by Little supported by Everett the report was unanimously accepted.

It was moved by Little supported by Everett that the following communication be forwarded to the auditor general's office. The Board of Supervisors Tawas City, Michigan Gentlemen:

Reference is made to the audit report of the county records prepared by the auditor general's department covering the calendar year 1958.

On page 10 under the "General Comments," reference is made to the payment due the county of an amount of \$21.15 for service of civil papers by the sheriff's department.

Recommendation is made here that action be taken to collect, and your prosecutor has received communication requesting that appropriate action be taken.

In view of the negligible amount involved and in consideration of the fact that the debtor is no longer a resident of this area and no longer practicing in the State of Michigan, it is my recommendation that your board by appropriate resolution charge off and cancel the account as uncollectible.

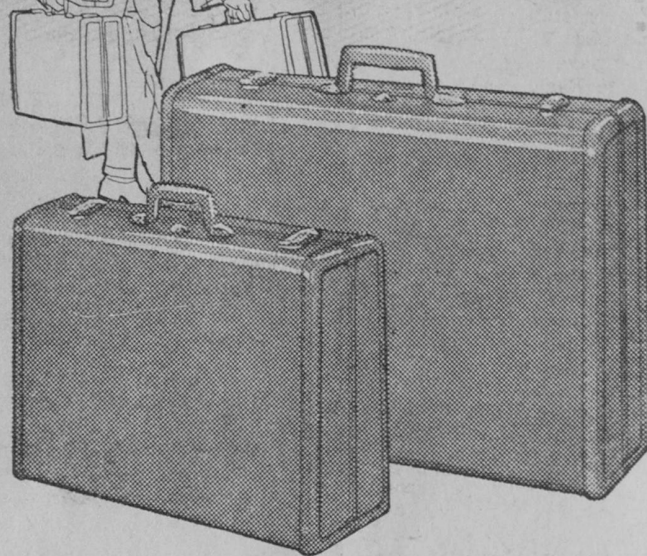

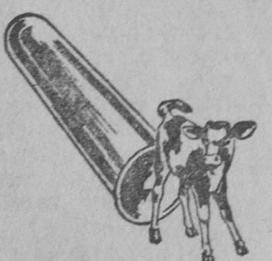

**IOSCO COUNTY FOOD HANDLING REGULATIONS**

By virtue of the power vested in the Board of Health of District Health Department No. 2, comprising the counties of Alcona, Iosco, Ogemaw and Oscoda, under Act 306 of the Public Acts of 1927 as amended by Act 198 of the Public Acts of 1941 and Act 84 of the Public Acts of 1954, the following regulations are hereby provided to be in effect in the Counties of Alcona, Iosco, Ogemaw and Oscoda, State of Michigan.

The Board of Health of District Health Department No. 2 hereby adopts the following regulations:

**Section 1. Definitions**

The following definitions shall apply in the interpretation and enforcement of these regulations:  
A. Restaurant.—Restaurant shall include all places where food and drink is prepared, stored, handled and dispensed for consumption by the public at the establishment; and shall include places in which food and drink is prepared for direct consumption elsewhere.

The types of establishments covered by these regulations include but are not necessarily limited by the following: restaurants, coffee shops, cafeterias, cafes, luncheonettes, taverns, drive-ins, soda fountains, caterers and schools.

B. Itinerant Restaurant shall mean one operating for a temporary period in connection with a fair, carnival, circus, public exhibition or other similar gathering.

C. Employee shall mean any person who engages in the preparation or serving of food or drink, or who comes in contact with any cooking or eating utensil, or who is employed in a room in which food or drink is prepared or served.

D. Food shall mean all substances except drugs and medicine used or intended to be used for human consumption.

E. Drink shall mean all liquid substances except drugs and medicine used or intended to be used for human consumption.

F. Utensils shall mean any kitchenware, tableware, glassware, cutlery, container or other equipment with which food or drink comes in contact during storage, preparation or serving.

G. Health Officer shall mean the director of District Health Department No. 2 and/or his authorized representative.

H. Owner shall mean the person holding the legal title to, renting, leasing or having possession of the property in question; and shall include any manager, operator, or person in responsible charge.

I. Person shall mean and include any individual, firm, corporation, club, society, association or partnership, institution, public body or other entity, and includes the plural as well as the singular and the feminine as well as the masculine.

**Section 2. Permits**

It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a restaurant, as defined in section 1, in the counties comprising District Health Department No. 2 who does not possess an unrevoked permit from the health officer. Such a permit shall be posted in a conspicuous place in the restaurant. Only persons who comply with the requirements of these regulations shall be entitled to receive and retain such a permit.

A permit granted shall be valid only to the operator to whom it was originally issued. The operator of a newly established restaurant, or of a restaurant at which there has been a change of ownership is required to obtain a new permit. New permits will be granted to continuing restaurants provided regulations continue to be met.

A permit may be temporarily suspended by the health officer upon the violation by the holder of any of the terms of these regulations, or revoked after an opportunity for a hearing by the health officer upon serious or repeated violation.

Any restaurant, the permit for which has been suspended, through the application of its operator may have the permit reinstated. Within one week following the receipt of a satisfactory application, accompanied by a statement signed by the applicant to the effect that the violated provision or provisions of these regulations have been corrected, the health officer shall make an inspection; and thereafter as many inspections as he may deem necessary to assure himself that the applicant is again complying with requirements. In case the findings indicate that compliance is satisfactory, he shall reinstate the permit.

**Section 3. Personal Health and Disease Control**

No person who is affected with any disease in a communicable form or is a carrier of such disease, or who develops boils, sores or lesions shall work in any restaurant; and no owner shall knowingly employ any such persons. Each employee shall have a medical examination at least once a year; and each shall have in his possession a "health card" showing that the results of the medical examination have been satisfactory. These health cards shall be supplied to the employees by the office of District Health Department No. 2, and shall be signed by the District Health Officer.

When it is established to the satisfaction of the health officer that there is danger of the transmission of an infection from an employee to other persons, the health officer is authorized to require any or all of the following measures: (1) the immediate exclusion of the employee from all restaurants; and (2) the immediate closing of the restaurant until no further danger of disease outbreaks exist.

**Section 4. Examination and Condemnation of Unwholesome or Adulterated Food or Drink**

Upon complaint to the health officer, samples of food and/or drink, including bottled and canned food or drink, may be purchased and examined by the health officer as often as may be necessary for the detection of unwholesomeness or adulteration. The health officer may condemn and forbid the sale of, or cause to be removed or destroyed, any food or drink which is unwholesome or adulterated.

**Section 5. Inspection of Restaurants**

At least once every six months, or once a year in case of seasonal restaurants, the health officer shall inspect every restaurant located in the area of District Health Department No. 2. In case the health officer finds the violation of any item of sanitation, at his option he shall make a second inspection after the lapse of such time as he shall deem necessary for the defect to be remedied; and the second inspection shall be used in determining compliance with the terms of these regulations. Any violation of the same item of these regulations on such a second inspection shall call for an immediate suspension of the permit.

The person operating the food establishment shall upon demand of the health officer permit access to all parts of the establishment and shall permit copying of any or all records of food purchases.

**Section 6. Sanitation Requirements for Restaurants**

All restaurants shall comply with all of the following items of sanitation:

Item 1. Cleanliness of Employees.—All employees shall wash their hands before starting work; and shall keep their hands clean at all times. No employee shall resume work after using the toilet room without first washing his hands. All employees shall wear clean garments. Employees shall not use tobacco in any form while preparing or serving food.

Item 2. Wholesomeness Of Food and Drink.—All food and drink shall be wholesome, free from spoilage, adulteration, and safe for human consumption. It shall be prepared, processed, and handled so that it is protected from contamination and spoilage, and so that disease transmission is minimized. Portions of food once served customers shall not be served again.

All milk, fluid milk products, ice cream and other frozen desserts served shall be from approved sources and shall be pasteurized or made from pasteurized milk products.

Milk and fluid milk products shall be served in the original containers in which they were received from the distributor or from an approved-type bulk dispenser; provided, however, that this requirement shall not apply to cream which may be served from the original bottle or carton or from an approved-type dispenser.

Item 3. Storage, Display and Serving Of Food and Drink.—All food and drink shall be stored, displayed and served as to be protected from dust, flies, vermin, rodents, unnecessary handling, droplet infection, overhead leakage and other possible contamination. Handling of unwrapped food by direct contact with fingers or hands shall be avoided insofar as is possible. Sugar shall be served only in covered dispensers or in wrapped packages for individual service. Instructions as to storage of any food product which appear on the manufacturer's or processor's label shall be followed. Leaking cans or cans which have swollen ends shall be discarded as soon as they are discovered.

No live animals or fowl shall be kept or allowed in any room in which food or drink is stored, displayed, prepared or served except guide dogs accompanying blind guests. A satisfactory program shall be carried out to control flies, roaches and rodents in all areas where food or drink is stored, prepared, displayed or served. If poisonous materials are maintained on the premises for the control of rodents and insects, such materials shall be stored in containers which are so labeled that the contents can be easily identified; and shall not be stored

with food products. They shall be stored and applied so that food, utensils and equipment used for preparing food as well as the employee's clothing cannot be contaminated.

Frozen foods shall be kept at or below 0°F; however, bulk ice cream may be stored just prior to serving at 5° to 10°F. Frozen foods which have been thawed or reached room temperature shall not be refrozen.

Item 4. Refrigeration Equipment.—Refrigeration equipment adequate in size and capacity shall be provided in which readily perishable food and drink shall be kept at a temperature not to exceed 45°F. under use conditions. Waste water disposal from such refrigerators shall comply with safe plumbing practices.

Item 5. Disposal Of Wastes.—The sanitary disposal of all liquid wastes from the restaurant shall be required.

All garbage and refuse or trash shall be kept in suitable covered containers in such manner as not to become a nuisance.

Item 6. Toilet Facilities.—Every restaurant shall be provided with adequate and conveniently located toilet facilities for its employees. In all new food establishments such facilities for each sex shall be provided for use of the public and so arranged that traffic is not through the food preparation or kitchen area. The doors of all toilet rooms shall be self-closing. Toilets shall be kept in a clean condition, in good repair, well lighted and well ventilated. Handwashing signs shall be posted in each toilet room used by employees. In case privies are permitted and used, they shall be separate from the restaurant building and shall be of a sanitary type constructed and operated in conformity with the Standards of the State Department of Health.

Item 7. Water Supply.—Hot and cold running water under pressure shall be easily accessible to all rooms in which food is prepared or utensils are washed; and the water shall be adequate in quantity and of safe, sanitary quality.

The water shall be from a municipal source when available. A non-municipal supply should meet the sanitation standards of the Michigan Department of Health; and, for all water supplies installed following the effective date of these regulations, such conformity shall be required.

Item 8. Lavatory Facilities.—Adequate and convenient hand washing facilities, separate from dishwashing facilities, shall be provided to conveniently serve food preparation areas and toilet locations. Such facilities shall include hot and cold running water, soap, and approved sanitary towels or air dryers. The use of a common towel is prohibited. No employee shall resume work after using the toilet room without washing his hands.

Item 9. Construction And Installation of Utensils And Equipment.—All show and display cases, windows, counters, shelves, tables, refrigerating equipment, sinks and other equipment used in connection with the operation of the restaurant shall be so constructed as to be easily cleaned and shall be kept clean and in good repair.

All equipment shall be installed so as to facilitate cleaning of surfaces or places where food particles, spillage, splash, debris, or dirt may accumulate. Equipment shall be so arranged so that there is sufficient working and storage space to enable the keeping of all parts of the establishment in a clean and orderly condition during periods of maximum activity.

All equipment used for the storage, preparation and serving of food shall be of such material and design as to be smooth, impervious and easily cleaned; capable of withstanding scrubbing and the corrosive action of foods and cleaning compounds. Surfaces which come in contact with moist food shall be non-toxic.

Item 10. Cleaning And Bacteriacidal Treatment Of Utensils And Equipment: All multi-use eating and drinking utensils shall be thoroughly cleaned after each use, shall be rinsed free of washing compounds, and subjected to an approved bacteriacidal treatment process by the following or other equivalent procedures approved by the health officer:

Immersion for at least one minute in clean hot water at a temperature of at least 170°F. (2) Exposure for a period of at least one minute, including immersion time and draining time, to a solution containing (a) at least 50 ppm available chlorine, or (b) 200 ppm of an approved quaternary ammonium compound which is labeled to show its effectiveness in water having a hardness at least equal to that of the water in use, or (c) 12.5 ppm of an approved iodophore in acid solution.

Utensils subjected to effective bacteriacidal treatment shall not exceed a bacterial count of 100 per unit, based upon the average count of at least four dishes, glasses, or other representative utensils. The bacterial count shall be determined by the standard plate count and swab method.

All multi-use cooking utensils used in the preparation and serving of food and drink shall be thoroughly cleaned and effectively subjected to an approved bacteriacidal process following the day's operation.

before being stored in a clean, dry place protected from flies, dust and other contamination. If, for some good reason, dish-drying cloths are used, they shall be clean and used for no other purpose.

Item 11. Single Service Eating And Drinking Utensils.—These utensils shall be obtained in closed containers and shall be stored in such containers in a clean, dry, protected place until ready for use. They shall be handled and dispensed in such manner as to prevent contamination of such surfaces as come in contact with the mouth of the user. They shall be used only once, after which they shall be disposed of in a suitable manner. The use of these utensils is mandatory in all food establishments which do not have adequate and effective facilities for the cleaning and bacteriacidal treatment of multi-use utensils.

Item 12. Floors.—The floors of all rooms in which food or drink is stored, prepared or served; or in which utensils are washed, shall be of such construction as to be easily cleaned, shall be smooth, and shall be kept in good repair.

Item 13. Walls And Ceilings.—Walls and ceilings of all rooms shall be kept clean and in good repair. All walls and ceilings of rooms in which food or drink is stored or prepared shall be finished in a light color; and shall have a smooth, washable surface up to the level reached by splash or spray.

Item 14. Doors And Windows.—When flies are prevalent, all openings into the outer air shall be effectively screened and doors shall be self-closing, unless other means are provided to prevent the entrance of flies.

Item 15. Lighting.—All rooms in which food and drink is stored, prepared or in which utensils are washed shall be well lighted.

Item 16. Ventilation.—All rooms in which food or drink is stored, prepared or served, or in which utensils are washed, shall be well ventilated.

Item 17. Surroundings.—The area immediately adjacent to a restaurant shall be kept clean and free of litter and rubbish.

**Section 7. Communities Having Ordinance Provisions Regulating Restaurants**

These regulations shall not conflict with any of the ordinance provisions in effect in any organized community in Alcona, Iosco, Ogemaw and Oscoda Counties. Such community ordinances shall have precedence.

**Section 8. Penalties**

Any person who violates any of the provisions of these regulations shall be fined not more than \$100.00 or not more than 90 days in the county jail, or both, at the discretion of the court having jurisdiction of any such offense.

**Section 9. Repeal And Date Of Effect**

All regulations and parts of regulations in conflict with these regulations are hereby repealed. Before these regulations shall take effect, they shall be submitted to the county boards of supervisors in Alcona, Iosco, Ogemaw and Oscoda Counties for their several approvals; and only after the consent of all four boards is granted, these regulations shall be published as required by law, and copies shall be filed in the offices of the county clerks of each of the aforesaid counties.

**Section 10. Saving Clause**

Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of these regulations be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remainder of such regulations shall not be affected thereby.

**Section 11. Amendments**

With the approval of the several boards of supervisors, the Board of Health of District Health Department No. 2 may from time to time amend, supplement or change these regulations.

**Section 12. Effective Date**

These regulations shall be deemed to be in effect ten days after the Boards of Supervisors of Alcona, Iosco, Ogemaw and Oscoda Counties give their approval, allowing time for the publication of said regulations in each of said four counties.

The regulations having been approved by the Boards of Supervisors of Ogemaw, Iosco, Alcona and Oscoda Counties shall hereby be declared effective.
