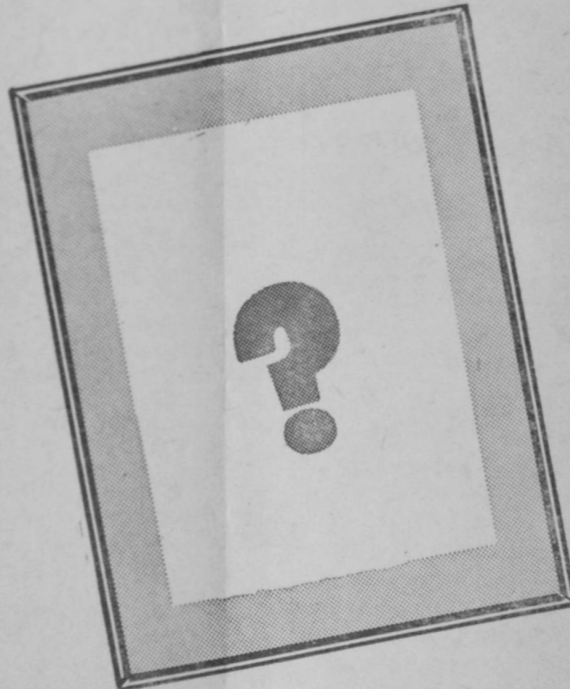
Plans were completed for an Easter ham supper to be held Saturday, April 16, at the club building. Everyone is invited.

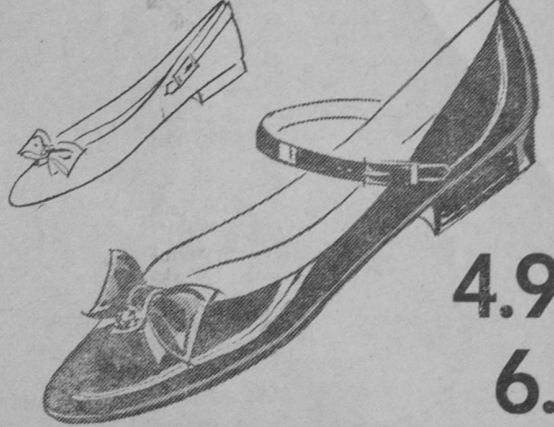

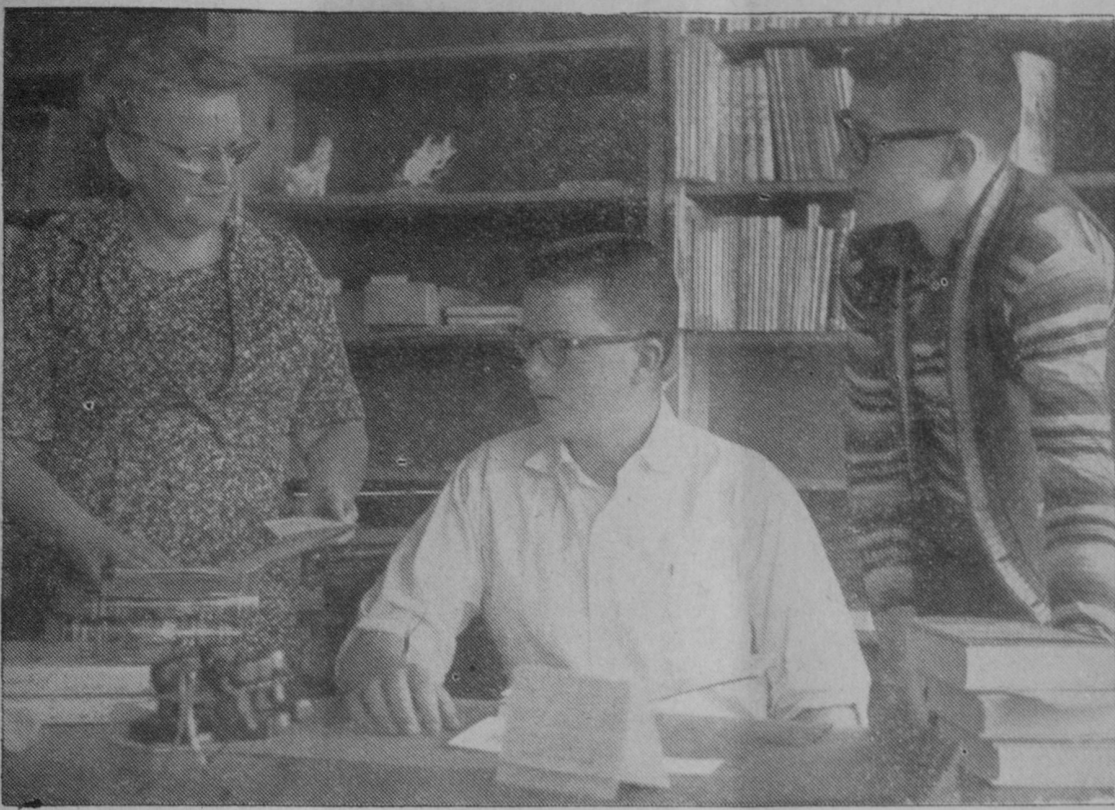

Pedestrian Deaths Account for One-Fifth of Fatalities

If only to locate his car in a parking lot, everyone in this motorized United States is at one time or another obliged to use his own two feet for getting some where.

Whatever the necessity for walking may be, statistics show that it can be dangerous. Pedestrian fatalities in Michigan annually make up about one-fifth of the state's traffic fatalities and one-tenth of the injuries. The reason for the lower pedestrian injuries is obvious: A pedestrian is no match for an automobile.

Yet pedestrians appear to ignore this inequality, for in 70 percent of these accidents, it was the pedestrian rather than the automobile driver who was at fault. One of the more common pedestrian actions, for example, is simply walking out into the street and into the side of a moving vehicle.

During the past five months, the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police have been calling attention to the traffic law violations committed by drivers which most frequently contribute to traffic accidents.

Currently this program is focusing attention on the no-yield bully who takes or assumes the right-of-way at the cost of safety to others. For the first time in this program, attention can now be directed at the pedestrian as a traffic violator for it is this same insistence on right-of-way which most often produces pedestrian accidents.

Because a human being is relatively fragile, as compared with even the smallest of the compact automobiles, the law and the courts have granted certain protective privileges to the pedestrian.

In those laws which define the responsibilities of drivers who must yield the right-of-way to other traffic, the term "other traffic" also includes pedestrians. And a pedestrian is defined as "any person afoot."

But the law also imposes various responsibilities for pedestrians, particularly where conflicts between walkers and automobiles most often occur. For that reason, pedestrian crosswalks are marked out at street intersections, special pedestrian traffic signals are used and local ordinances are prescribed to fit local pedestrian situations.

In general, the pedestrian is limited to the sidewalk. Where such facilities are not provided, as on the open highway or rural roads, the law requires the pedestrian to walk on the left side of the road, facing traffic. Where possible, such walking should be done on the shoulder rather than on the traveled portion of the roadway.

At signal-controlled intersections, the pedestrian is required to obey the same signals required of the motorists, unless otherwise instructed by a special pedestrian signal such as the "Walk" and "Don't Walk" lights or by a police officer directing traffic. Although state law does not specifically prohibit the pedestrian from crossing an intersection against a red traffic signal, most local ordinances rule that he must wait for the green or walk signal. The yellow signal is a warning to both pedestrians and drivers that there is insufficient time to cross the intersection before the signal changes. When a pedestrian is caught in the middle of an intersection on such a yellow light, drivers must permit him to regain the curb safely before they may proceed.

Pedestrian fatalities constitute almost half of the state's urban traffic fatalities. While rural pedestrian fatalities amount to only 15 percent of all rural deaths, half of the rural pedestrian accidents result in a fatality because of the higher speeds at which they occur.
