Former Tawas City Man Wins in National Shoot

Hitting targets for 284 points out of a possible 300, Trooper Robert Steinhurst of the Michigan State Police Department's No. 1 pistol team won first place in individual competition at the national pistol shoot last week.

Staged at Camp Perry, Ohio, more than 2,337 marksmen entered the National Rifle Association sponsored meet.

Steinhurst was awarded a 357 magnum Smith and Weston trophy revolver for winning first place in the police category. Some 217 police officers were entered in this section.

The Michigan State Police team walked away with first place in this competition. Top challengers were the Los Angeles police team, the United States Border Patrol team and the California Highway Patrol team.

This meet is considered the "world series" of pistol shooting in the United States. Steinhurst is rated third highest pistol shot in national police competition.

Top shooter on the state's No. 1 team, Steinhurst belongs to a select group of marksmen who have shot more than 2,000 out of a possible 2,700 in competition. Only 52 men in the history of three-gun competition have done this.

In individual competition at the Camp Perry meet, standard 45 caliber weapons were used, firing "hard ball" ammunition. A total of 30 rounds were fired by each individual competitor, 10 shots slow at 50 yards, two groups of five shots (20 seconds for each group) at 25 yards and 10 shots rapid fire (five shots in 10 seconds) at 25 yards. Nineteen of the 30 rounds fired by Steinhurst were in the bulls-eye.

Escape Injury in Bay Boat Collision

Two 15-year-old Tawas youths escaped injury Monday afternoon in a boating accident near the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock at East Tawas.

Operators of the two boats involved were Edward Collier of Coast Guard Road, East Tawas, and Matthew H. Hoag of Tawas City.

The crash was reported to the Iosco Sheriff's Department Tuesday morning. Damage to the Collier boat was listed at \$700 while damage to the Hoag boat amounted to \$650.

Football to Take Sports Limelight

That football will soon take over the sports limelight was emphasized this week with the announcement of pre-season grid preparations at Tawas Area High School.

Head Coach Herbert Escott said Monday that football candidates would be taking physical examinations Friday, August 14. Examinations are to be given by Dr. Earl Hasty, director of the district health department.

Escott said that football candidates may have physical examinations given by local physicians, if they so choose, but, in either case, parents are required to sign examination cards and return them to the school. No one will be allowed to practice without a signed card.

Varsity candidates are to receive uniforms August 23 at 7:00 p. m. Junior varsity candidates are to receive uniforms the following day.

County to Receive Deed for Airport

A deed turning over 120 acres of federal surplus forest land in Baldwin Township has been signed by the United States Department of Justice and is to be turned over to Iosco County for airport use. The transaction received approval of the United States Department of Agriculture last Thursday.

Congressman Elford Cederberg announced from his Washington, D. C., office that the deed has been passed on to the Milwaukee Wisconsin, regional headquarters of the forestry department. It will be presented to the Iosco Board of Supervisors at its August session next week.

The county has sought federal property for airport use for the past several years. The land being made available is located northeast of East Tawas off US-23. The county owns an additional 80 acres adjacent to the federal property.

Iosco has approximately \$8,000 on deposit with the state department of aeronautics for airport construction. The money is to be matched by state and federal funds.

On receipt of the deed, the county is to contact the state board of aeronautics and ask for bids on improvements.

Estimated cost for clearing, grading, seeding and constructing one east-west landing strip is \$30,000. Engineering on the project was completed more than a year ago.

State County Clerks Meet Here Next Week

Iosco County Clerk George A. Prescott announced Tuesday that the program for the 52nd annual convention of the Michigan Association of County Clerks has been completed and all is in readiness for the association's three-day confab in the Tawas August 16, 17 and 18.

Although the convention is to get underway officially Tuesday, pre-convention registration will start Monday, August 15, at the Barnes Hotel in Tawas City.

This is the third major convention of state officers' associations to be held in the Tawas this

summer. County treasurers and sheriffs' associations met here in June.

Officers of the association are Luella M. Smith, president, Wash-ton County; Rex Martin, vice president, VanBuren County; George A. Prescott, secretary, Iosco County; Esther Hettinger, treasurer, Allegan County.

Following final registrations Tuesday morning, the 52nd annual convention will be called to order at 9:30 o'clock by President Smith. Welcoming the clerks to this county will be Mayor George Tuttle of Tawas City and Mayor Elmer Werth of East Tawas.

Principal speaker Tuesday morning will be Robert J. Moon-ey, chief of vital records section, Michigan Department of Health. He will discuss cooperation with doctors, hospitals and funeral directors.

Following a business session at 1:30 p. m., the convention will split into discussion sections.

At 5 o'clock, the clerks will assemble at Michigan Waterways Commission Dock at East Tawas for a boat trip around Tawas Bay. The trip is to be sponsored by the Iosco County Board of Super-visors.

Evening activities will include a smorgasbord at the Barnes Hotel. D. Hale Brake, president of the Michigan Institute of Local

Government, will be principal speaker.

Wednesday's program will start with an election panel and panel discussion on county clerks and community leadership.

The clerks will board the Au-Sable River Queen, stern wheel paddle boat, at 1:00 p. m. for an excursion trip down the world famous AuSable River.

The annual banquet is to be held at the Holland Hotel in East Tawas at 7:00 p. m. John H. Halbert, superintendent of Whittemore-Prescott Area Schools is to introduce the evening's speaker, Irene Meyers of Fort Wayne, Indiana.

The convention will conclude here Thursday morning with panel discussions and reports. Adjournment is scheduled for 12 o'clock noon.

Add New Shovel—

USG Quarry Modernization Finished

United States Gypsum Company completed the modernization of its mechanical equipment at the Alabaster quarry this week with the addition of a new 190B Bucyrus Erie shovel.

After its construction at the Milwaukee, Wisconsin, plant of Bucyrus Erie, the huge piece of equipment was disassembled and loaded on 12 railroad flat cars for shipment to Alabaster.

Work on re-assembling the shovel has been underway since July 6. Final testing of electrical equipment will take place this week and it will go into operation sometime next week.

This 300-ton giant, with 89-foot boom and 60-foot-long "stick," replaces a 200B shovel which has been in service at Alabaster for the past 35 years.

Used for loading blasted gypsum rock into rail cars and for stripping shale, the shovel has a four-yard bucket which is capable of scooping a six-ton "bite."

As is the case in all of the United States Gypsum Company's heavy quarry equipment, the new 190B is electrically powered. Huge motor generators convert 2,400 volts of alternating current to 250 volts for direct current motors.

Through new structural design during past years, the 190B is much more compact than the shovel which it replaces. "Because of its advanced design, it will be capable of doing more work than the old shovel," said Maynard VanOrnum, works manager at Alabaster.

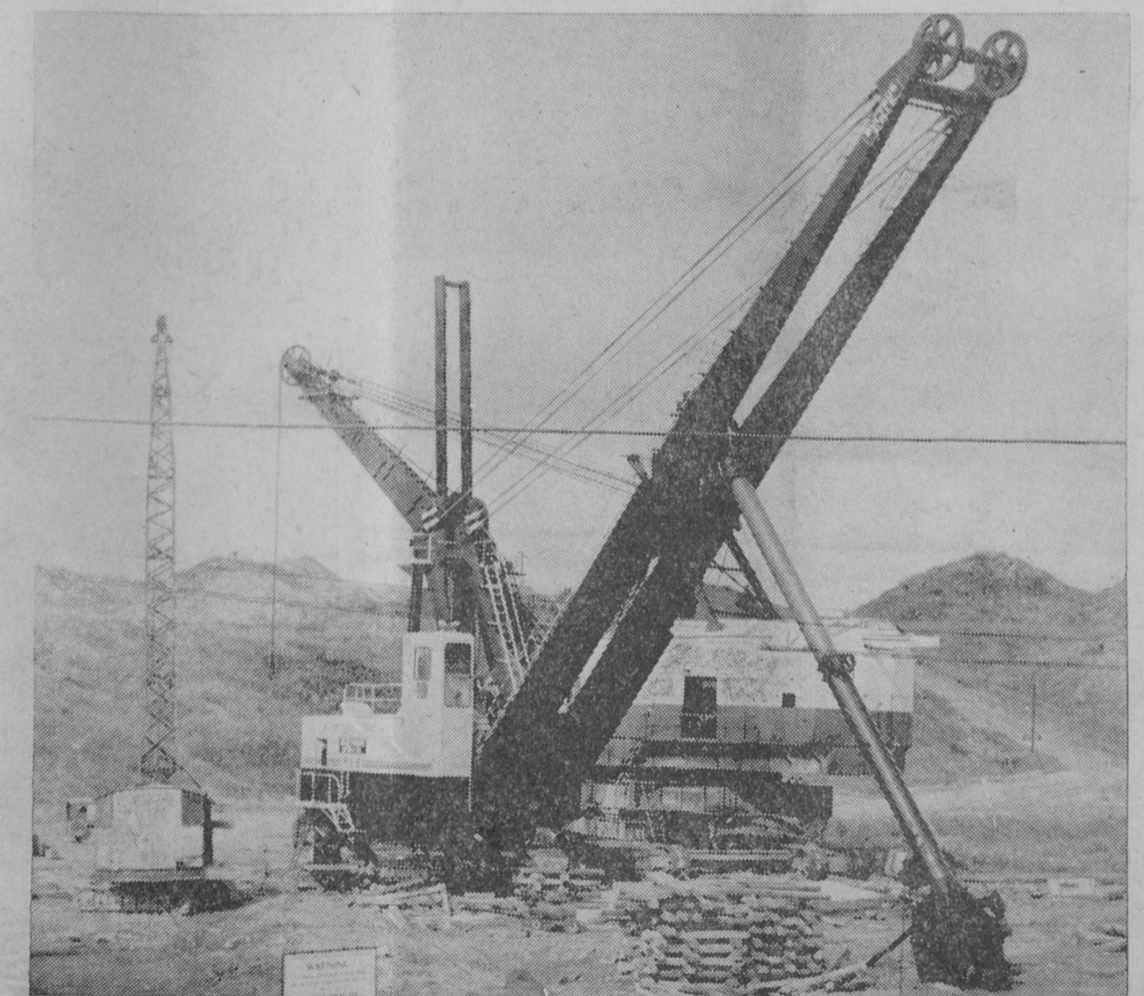
USG workers who will operate the shovel when it goes into operation in the quarry include Orval Proper, George Hoshach, Jack Wellna, James Blust, Frank Hill and Clare Herriman.

Assisting in assembling the new shovel was a factory representative, Peter Baker, mechani-

cal foreman, and Vaino Gustafson, electrical foreman, supervised the work for USG. Others who worked on the project were Leonard Furst, Patrick Erick-

son, Waldemar Bischoff Jr., Nelson Bessey, Gordon Redfield, Joseph Wemert, Fred Musoff, Audley Walstead, Stanley Lazur-wicz, Elmer Erickson and Alex

Klish. Baker, long-time employee of USG, had helped to assemble the old 200B 35 years ago and was its first operator.

Whittemore Branch Bank Opens Next Monday

Grand opening and open house for the new Whittemore branch office of Farmers and Merchants State Bank, Hale, will be held Monday and Tuesday, August 15-16.

J. Morley Stevenson, vice president and cashier of the bank, announced this week that a ribbon-cutting ceremony would be held at the entrance of the new quarters Monday morning at 9 o'clock.

Participating in the ceremony will be bank officers, members of the board of directors, civic officials and representatives of the Whittemore Chamber of Commerce.

Located in quarters formerly occupied by the Whittemore Post office, the building has been completely remodeled and redecorated. Construction was by Provoast, Bowlby and Provoast, Whittemore.

The Whittemore branch will be under the supervision of Mrs. Irene Jordan, a native of Whittemore, who is presently employed at the main office in Hale.

The new branch office will be open Mondays and Wednesdays, 9:00 a. m. to 3:00 p. m., and on Fridays from 9:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. Mr. Stevenson said that as soon as business warrants, the branch office will be open six days a week.

The new branch office has re-

ceived approval of both the Michigan State Banking Commission and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. All deposits are insured up to \$10,000.

This has been the second expansion move by Farmers and Merchants State Bank during the past 14 years. The new branch was opened at Rose City June 16 of last year.

Whittemore has been without banking facilities since the "bank holiday" of 1933.

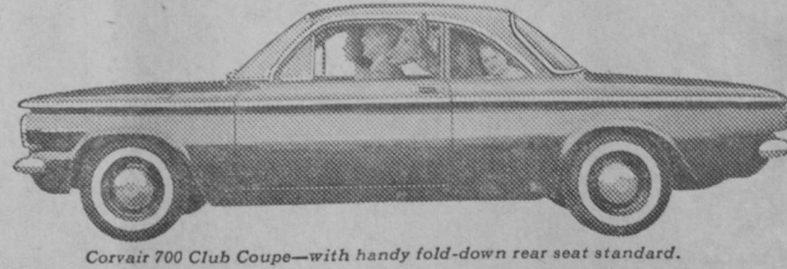

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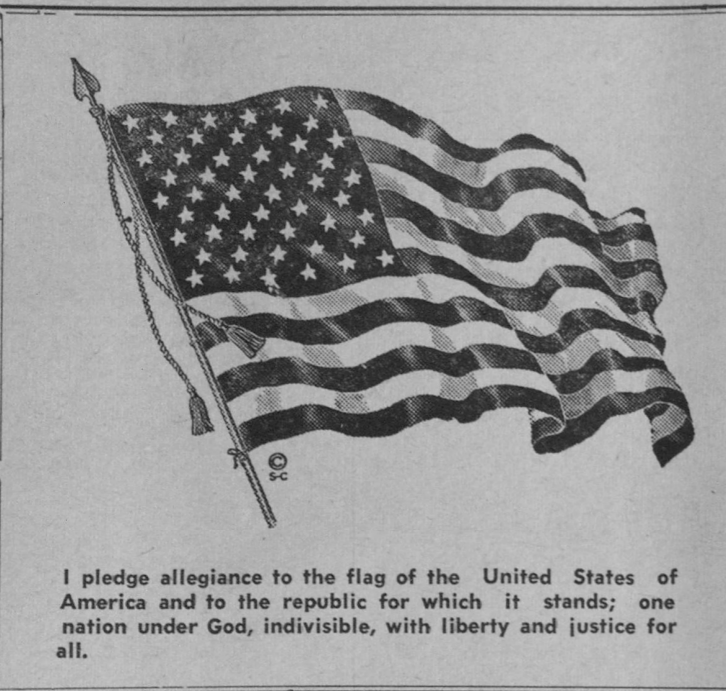

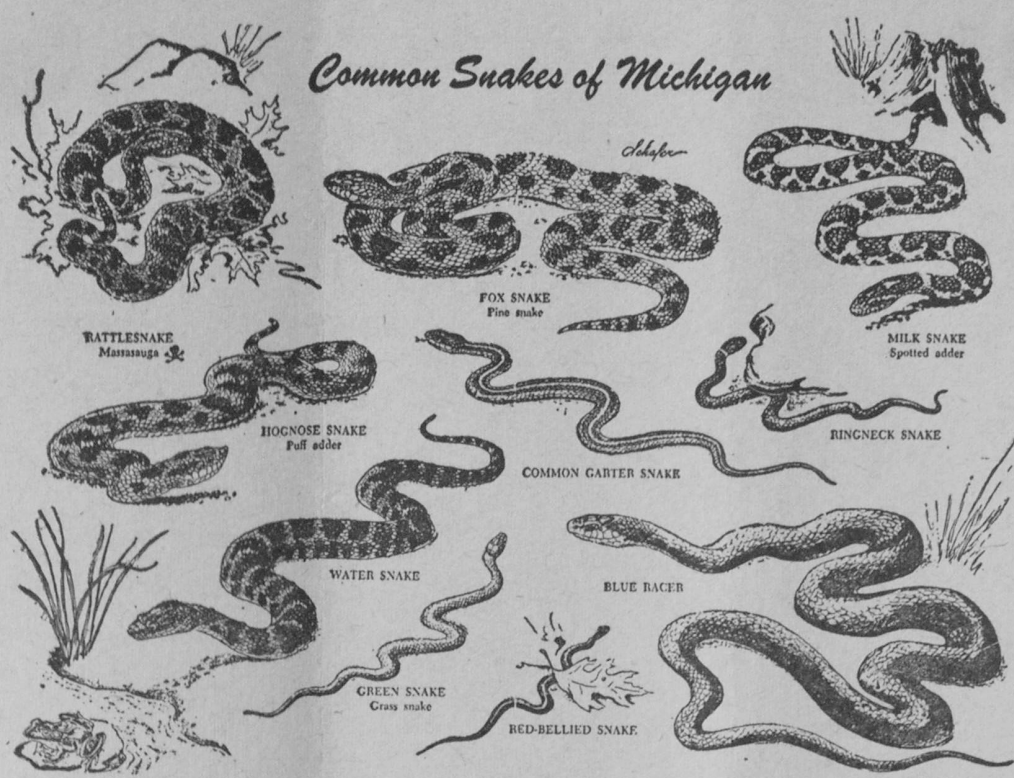

There is no authentic record of a person dying in this state from a bite of a native snake. Superstitions and myths have generated many false fears about snakes and clouded the generally beneficial role these reptiles play in the "balance of nature."

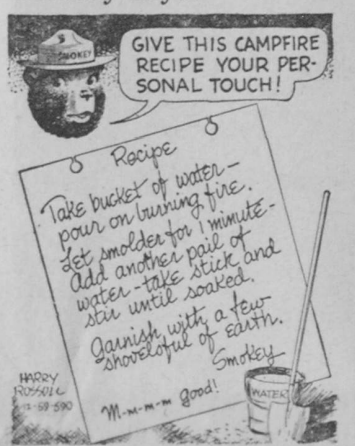
School will not be in session on the following dates:

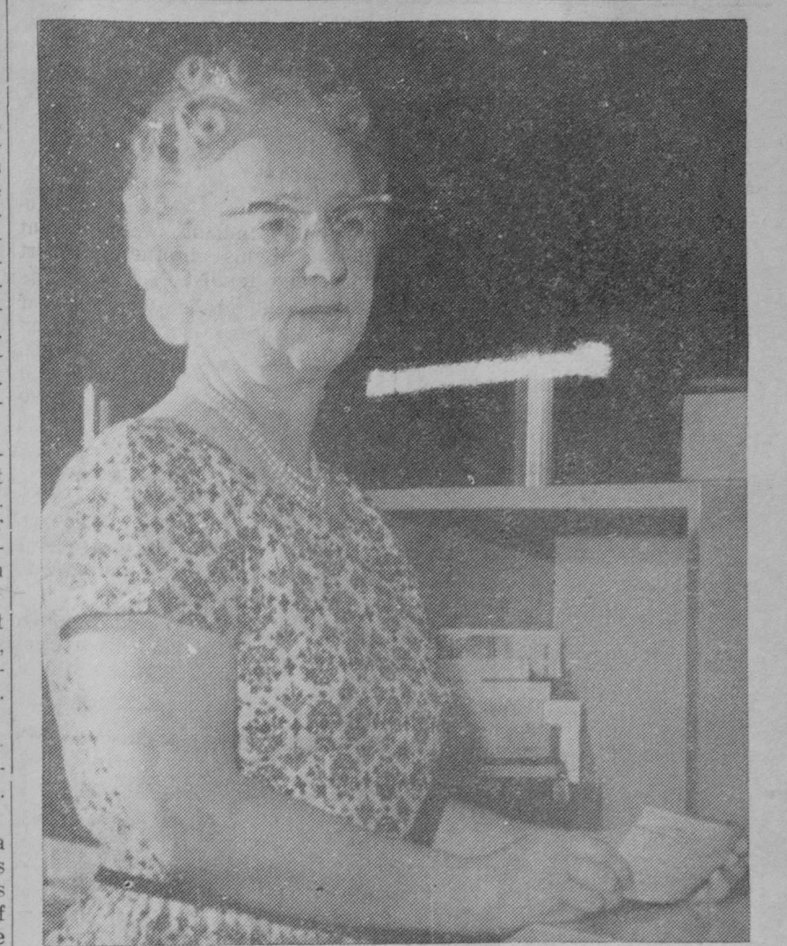

Clifford Wilkinson and James DeRosia, Michigan Bell Telephone Company employees of East Tawas, recently heard another "ringing besides a telephone buzzer while they were trout fishing above the Rollways camp site last week. They ended the fishing trip with a dead rattlesnake and nine noisy rattles or sometimes called buttons.

Michigan's fishing license sales are on the skids for the sixth straight year according to the figures for the first seven months of 1960. As of July 30, only 671,390 licenses and trout stamps were reported sold which is about eight percent below last year's total for this period. Also, this was approximately the same percentage of drop in sales last year and this has been the trend in the license sales since 1954.
