If you shudder at the thought of meeting up with snakes, it may ease your mind to know that Michigan has only one poisonous species—the Massasauga or swamp rattlesnake. And even this rattler, confined to the lower peninsula and Bois Blanc Island, is too small to inflict a fatal wound except, perhaps, to a small child. There is no authentic record of a person dying in this state from a bite of a native snake. Superstitions and myths have generated many false fears about snakes and clouded the generally beneficial role these reptiles play in the "balance of nature."
