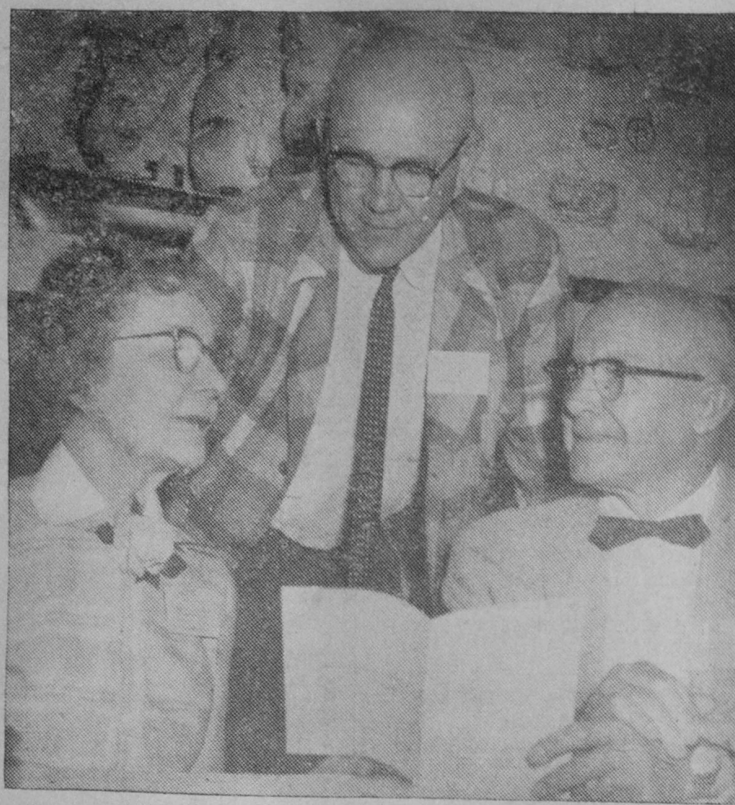

Welcome Extended to Conventioneering Clerks

Some 150 persons have been registered for the 52nd annual convention of the Michigan Association of County Clerks which opened its three-day convalescence here Tuesday morning.

Host to the group is Iosco County Clerk George A. Prescott, whose invitation to hold the 1960 convention here was accepted by the group at its session last year.

This week's convention is the third to be held this summer in the Tawas, by state county officers associations. County treasurers and sheriffs associations met here in June.

Following the call to order by President Luella M. Smith of Washtenaw County, the convention county clerks were welcomed to Iosco County by Mayor George Tuttle of Tawas City and Mayor Elmer Werth of East Tawas.

Principal speaker Tuesday was Robert J. Mooney, chief of vital records section, Michigan Department of Health, Business and discussion sessions followed.

Last evening, the clerks enjoyed a boat trip around Tawas Bay. Sponsored by the Iosco County Board of Supervisors, the clerks, their families and guests met at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock at East Tawas where they boarded fishing party boats.

D. Hale Brake, president of the Michigan Institute of Local Government, was the principal speaker last night, following a smorgasbord at the Barnes Hotel.

Today's activities will start with an election panel and panel discussion on the role played by county clerks in community leadership.

Entertainment this afternoon will include an excursion trip aboard the AuSable River Queen, a stern-wheel paddle boat which makes daily trips between Five Channels and Cooke Dams.

The association's annual banquet is to be held tonight at the Holland Hotel in East Tawas. Irene Meyers of Fort Wayne, Indiana, is to be the evening's speaker.

The convention will conclude Thursday morning with panel discussions and reports. Adjournment is scheduled for 12 o'clock noon.

East Tawas Rejects US-23 Speed Hike

A change in speed control zones in East Tawas proposed by the state highway department and state police met opposition at Monday night's council meeting. Some 15 residents of the city attended the meeting.

No decision was reached on any of the proposed changes and the highway department is to report back with further recommendations at a future meeting.

Fred Egan, highway department engineer, had recommended that the council concur with a proposed plan which would raise the speed limit from 30 to 35 miles-an-hour from a point east of the Bay Street-US-23 intersection to the vicinity of the state police post.

This met opposition from the council and from residents, who contended that a five-mile-an-hour increase would endanger pedestrians attempting to cross US-23 to the state park.

Also opposed was a plan to increase the speed limit from 35 to 45 miles-an-hour from a point east of the state police post past Tawas Beach Road. This met opposition from residents of that area who contended that the intersection was dangerous and an increased speed limit would only add to the danger.

Egan said that a radar check in that area indicated that vehicles were traveling faster than the speed limit and requested that city police enforce speed zones on US-23 more rigidly.

Mayor Elmer Werth asserted that he did not think that the solution to the problem was to establish speed zones to "comply" with the speed of drivers.

It was also recommended that "no-passing" yellow lines be painted at the intersection of Tawas Beach Road. Numerous collisions have occurred there and it was felt that this would tend to reduce the danger.

In other business, the council authorized the city attorney to prepare the necessary legal work to establish a special assessment district for construction of a sewer line on East Washington Street between Adams and Grant. Petitions were presented by property owners from that area asking for this action.

Concurs With State—

City Council OK's Change; Chief Differs

Tawas City Council concurred with recommendations of the state highway department and state police in changing a speed control zone on US-23 in Tawas City.

Fred Egan, engineer for the highway department, attended the Monday night meeting and recommended that the south-bound lane from Vic and Zel's Restaurant to Ninth Street at the Tawas River Bridge be changed from 35 to 40 miles per hour.

He said that a recent radar check of traffic in that area indicated that a high percentage of motorists were averaging only five miles an hour over the speed limit. Checks in other sections of US-23 revealed that speed limit signs were being observed.

The 45-mile-an-hour speed zone is to be moved from Tawas Motel east to Ninth Street.

Egan said that he believed the change would improve the flow of traffic through the city.

City Police Chief George Ruth pointed out that the Ninth Avenue-US-23 intersection was dangerous and that a speed increase may result in accidents. He said that a safety hazard exists west of the bridge when motorists slow down to turn into motels.

The 30-mile-an-hour speed limit through the business district will remain unchanged.

In other business, Stuart White of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company appeared before the council and told of a proposed 400,000-barrel jet fuel storage terminal which is to be located in the area, perhaps south of Tawas City.

The terminal would serve as an example of the size of the task which TBYC has undertaken, the international race has been hosted by such clubs as the Southern Yacht Club of New Orleans, one of the largest and oldest yacht clubs in the world; the Buffalo Canoe Club, Buffalo, New York; Crescent Sail Yacht Club, Detroit, where the event was held last year, and several large eastern clubs.

Council OK's Salary Increase for Quarters

A \$15-a-week wage increase was granted to James Quarters, city garbage collector, at the Monday night council meeting. This would bring his weekly salary to \$90.

The council had taken a proposed wage increase under consideration at its last meeting. The decision to raise the wage was based on an increase in population.

The collector had asked for a \$20 increase, but it was pointed out that the city budget would not be adequate for this amount.

Quarters told councilmen that many residents were not following the rules and regulations for garbage collections. He asked that old garbage cans with rusty bottoms be replaced.

As a means of improving sanitary handling, residents are requested to wrap garbage in newspaper before disposing in cans.

The superintendent of public works was directed to pick up any incinerators which remain on the street right-of-way in various sections of the city. Numerous warnings have been sent to violators about this condition but complaints have been received from the Bay Drive area.

Mrs. Montgomery Resigns from C of C

Mrs. Bertha Montgomery, office manager for the Tawas Chamber of Commerce since April 1953, announced her resignation from that position last week.

Her resignation is effective September 10. Applicants for the job are to contact the office in person and then will be interviewed by a committee appointed by the board.

Iosco's Oldest Industry—

The broad mouth of the AuSable River at AuSable-Oscoda has been a haven for commercial fishermen for nearly 120 years. It is still a bustling fishing port today, the only change being that diesel engines have replaced the white-winged fishing smacks of the long ago.

However, the major difference during recent years has been the actual product of Lake Huron. The lake trout, pickerel and herring have long since disappeared and only small quantities of the once-abundant white fish are being netted.

Fishermen of today have turned their labors toward catching the chub and popular yellow perch.

There are some 17 different fishing outfits operating out of the AuSable River today. Most are newcomers to this area of the Great Lakes and the names of Charlevoix, Menominee and Green Bay are painted on the sterns of stout fishing vessels, reflecting the extent of the nomadic search for fish.

Long familiar names of fishermen families, like Matthews and Colbath, still operate out of AuSable, but other oldtimers are gone from the scene. Two East Tawas family names, long associated with commercial fishing, Trudell and Lixey, are operating out of AuSable.

Registration Days Set at Oscoda

Pre-school registration for kindergarten students will be held at Oscoda Elementary School Tuesday and Wednesday, August 23-24. All other new students in grades 1-6 may register on Thursday and Friday, August 25 and 26.

It is now mandatory by state law that all children entering school have inoculations for diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, polio and smallpox. It is also advisable that each child have a physical before entering school.

The county nurse and area doctor will be here Tuesday and Wednesday, August 23-24, to give shots and physicals. If possible, please follow this schedule for registration:

AG—9:00-11:00 a. m.—Tuesday, August 23.
HL—1:00-3:00 p. m.—Tuesday, August 23.
M-Q—9:00-11:00 a. m.—Wednesday, August 24.
RZ—1:00-3:00 p. m.—Wednesday, August 24.

You may have these services performed by your own doctor if you wish. Please bring or send the record of these shots and physical examination to the school.

Al Meade, bus director and supervisor, will be here to explain bus routes, times and procedures. The first day of school for grades one-12 will be September 7. Kindergarten will start one day later on Thursday, September 8.

Mr. Jordan said that it is most urgently requested that student fees be paid at the time of registration. Fees established by the board of education are as follows: Book deposit, \$5; shop, \$5; chemistry and physics, \$1; biology, \$1.70; mechanical drawing, \$2; art, \$3.

Band and chorus fees will be collected by the band director and the choir director.

Former Mill Owner Died Aug. 8 in UP

Charles F. Hamilton, former co-owner of Huron Shore Rustic Company in Tawas City, died Monday, August 8, at Sault Ste. Marie. He was 63 years old.

Born in Keadie, Ontario, Canada, September 9, 1896, he had been active in educational circles in Michigan and helped organize a business college in Port Huron.

He was a former principal of Bay City Central High School, assistant superintendent of schools of that city and city commissioner.

He had also served as superintendent of schools at Deerfield, Charlevoix, Rockford, Coldwater, Johannesburg, Brimley and DeTour. He received his bachelor of arts and master of arts degrees at the University of Michigan.

Hamilton and his partner, Harry Westrich, came to this area in 1942 and established a fence manufacturing firm south of Alabaster. In 1943, the two men purchased the Tanner mill at East Tawas. Later that same year, they purchased the mill and property owned by the late Rudolph Stark on First Street where they established their operations.

Huron Rustic Furniture operated there during the war years, being at one time the Tawas' largest industrial employer, and (See HAMILTON, page 10.)

AuSable is Still A Busy Fishing Port

During the past three or four years, the chub has contributed greatly to the fishing industry at AuSable-Oscoda. Using nylon gill nets, the fishermen have taken large quantities of the silvery fish and find a ready market for their catches.

Operations of the AuSable River is a year-around business. The river is seldom ice-locked and the fishermen lift their chub nets throughout the winter.

Fishermen put in long hours of back-breaking labor, in spite of the modern methods used by today's fleet. Although investment in good fishing equipment has always been an expensive proposition, an outfit today, including a diesel-powered steel boat, costs thousands of dollars.

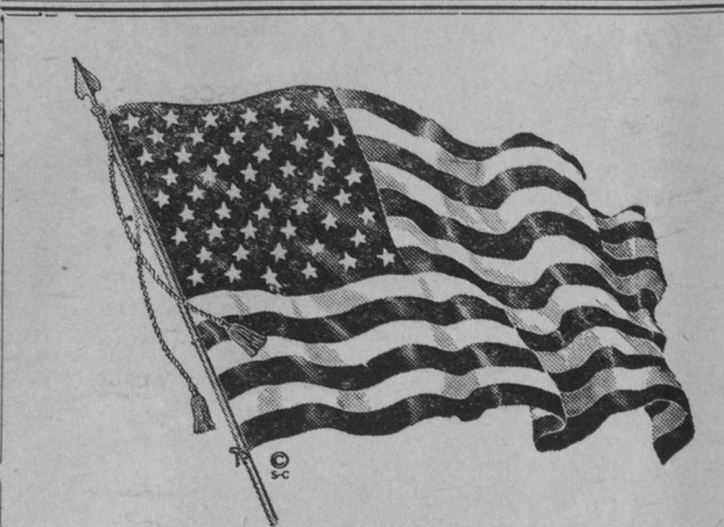

Once I went skiing with some young people. It was such a beautiful day. The trees were heavy with snow. The limbs bent toward the ground.

Lt. Col. LaCombe is Award Winner

Lt. Col. Raymond J. LaCombe, director of personnel for the 4026th Strategic Wing, was presented with the Air Force Commendation Medal during a brief ceremony at a recent wing staff meeting.

The medal was awarded for the outstanding job Colonel LaCombe performed at Channault AFB, Louisiana, in the personnel field. He arrived at Channault in July of 1958. In April of the following year, he was designated as director of personnel for the entire base.

This assignment encompassed the supervision of personnel activities for two strategic wings, an air refueling squadron, a division headquarters and various tenant organizations—a total of 7,000 military personnel.

When Colonel LaCombe took over his new position, the base had just received a "marginal" rating in the personnel field. Within 13 months, he had improved the personnel situation at Channault to the point where they were given an "outstanding" rating by SAC Headquarters.

It was shortly after this that Colonel LaCombe was transferred to Wurtsmith, arriving here in May of this year.

Colonel LaCombe has been a member of the Air Force since March of 1944 when he left the RAF to join the Eighth Air Force as a B-24 pilot in Europe. He later spent five years flying the North Atlantic in C-54's and C-121's.

He was chief pilot for Atlantic Division MATS, as well as Headquarters MATS, and later became deputy chief of plans for Atlantic Division MATS.

Then came a tour with the UN command in Korea as chief of plans and programming.

His first contact with the personnel field came at Channault, where he distinguished himself by meritorious service, winning the Air Force Commendation Medal.

Bicycle Fatalities on Increase

Bicycle fatalities in Michigan this year are running 63 percent above those in 1959 and accidents involving bicycles have increased from 882 to 902.

Persons injured in bicycle accidents increased from 159 to 168 in rural areas, but decreased from 564 to 561 in urban areas.

Michigan State Safety Commission Chairman James M. Hare points out that Michigan State Police records show that deaths from bicycle-car collisions do not vary much from year to year, but that total accidents involving bicycles do increase.

"During vacation months there are more youngsters riding more miles on roads carrying more cars than other months," Hare said. "This means that the accident-exposure possibilities are increased. Motorists should take extra care when they see youngsters on bicycles and help keep the accident and fatality rate from rising this year."

Expanding Base Exchange Now Managed by Cahill

A new manager took over Wurtsmith's Base Exchange Wednesday morning. He is Frank Cahill, who replaced James F. Weeks as Area Exchange supervisor for the Army and Air Force Exchange Service. Mr. Weeks had been at Wurtsmith since October of 1955.

Mr. Cahill came to Wurtsmith from Fort Meyer, Virginia, where he was exchange manager for two years. He has been with the Army and Air Force Exchange Service for a total of 15 years, 12 of which were spent in Europe, including the countries of Germany, Italy and Greece.

One of the first major improvements in the present facilities will be moving the BX to its new location, a permanent type building situated near the base commissary. Tentative plans call for the completion of this move by the end of next month.

As the volume of sales increases, other improvements will be made. Mr. Cahill hopes to be able to eventually put managers in charge of individual facilities on base, to insure tighter control and more efficient operation.

And as soon as the volume of sales justifies it, the Wurtsmith BX will be made an independent unit. It is presently operating as a satellite under the Selfridge Base Exchange.

Among the new service facilities being planned are: Photo service, watch repair, shoe repair and a beauty parlor.

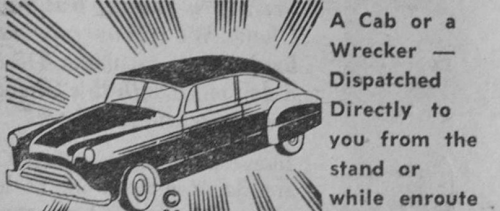

Have Interesting Tour in Japan

Before arriving in Nagoya, Japan, August 3, Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Dawson of Chicago, Illinois, and East Tawas spent two days at Hiroshima. The town has been completely rebuilt since it was bombed during World War II. It is now a very modern city, patterned after Washington, D. C. Many buildings, parks, etc., are dedicated to peace.

Prior to their visit at Hiroshima, the Dawsons enjoyed three days at Misasa Hot Springs, where there are 10 natural hot springs for baths with radium in the town. They visited a shrine built in honor of Madame Marie Curie, discoverer of radium.

While in Hiroshima, they were entertained by the manager of the chamber of commerce and the mayor.

The Dawsons told of an unusual fishing experience at Gifu, Japan, where they went out at night and used cormorant, a sea bird, to catch fish. The birds resemble pelicans and are let out on strings, having a ring around their neck to prevent them from swallowing the fish they catch. A light is kept burning at the front of the boat to attract fish.

The bird dives for the fish which go down his neck only to the ring. When it has six to eight fish, the fisherman pulls it in and takes the fish. This is a very ancient way of fishing.

The Dawsons also took a trip to Pearl Island where girls dive for oysters. The divers wear only white garments to ward off sharks. While there, Mr. and Mrs. Dawson saw how pearls are planted in oysters. The oysters undergo an operation where a small head is placed inside them to start the pearl growing. It takes three to five years to produce a pearl and two or three pearls can be grown in one oyster.

In Osaka, where there are many canals along which boats can be rented, the Dawsons observed that for security, boat owners keep the renters' shoes until the boat is returned.

Last week, Mr. and Mrs. Dawson had a three-way telephone conversation with their sons, Jerry and Norval, at their homes in Chicago, Illinois, and their daughter, Marilyn, in Texas. At the time of the telephone call, it was 7:00 p. m. Friday in Japan and 6:00 a. m. Thursday in the United States.

The Dawsons are spending three months in Japan and will soon be leaving there on a one month tour of Hong Kong, India and Egypt.

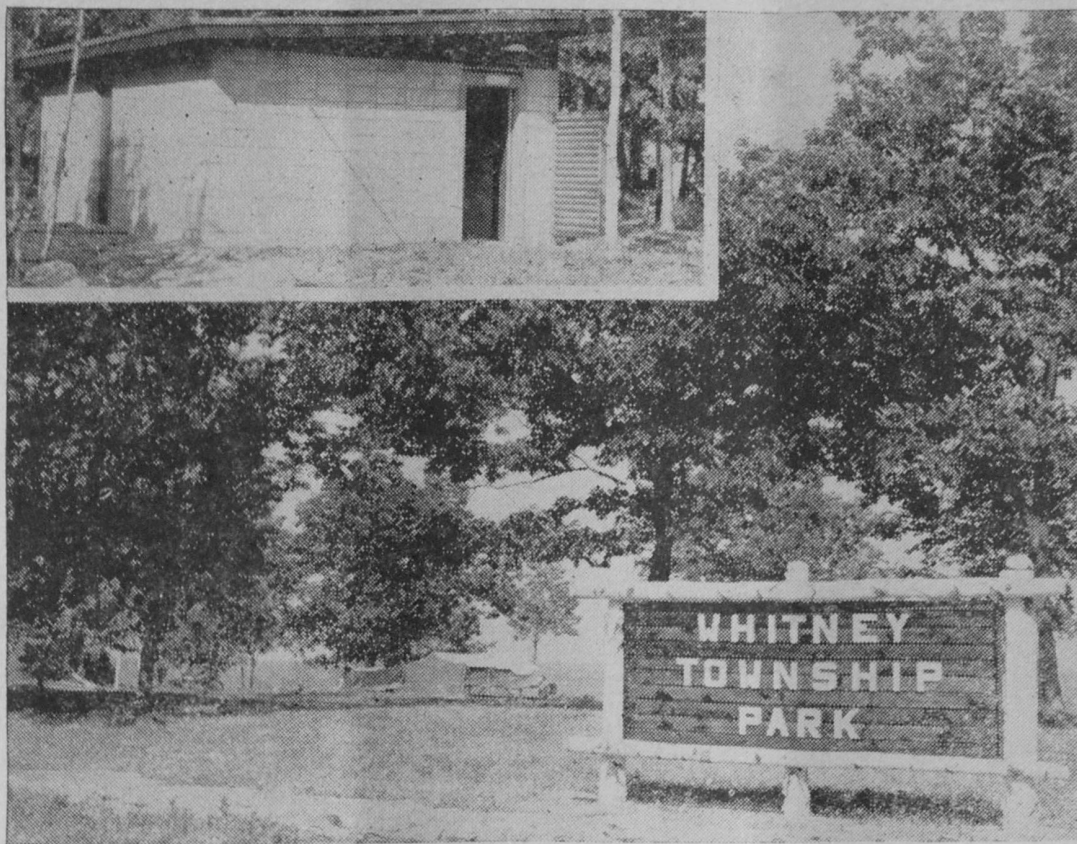

'Mosquitoes as Big as Sparrows,' But He Enjoys Trip

"For supper tonight, we are having arctic grayling baked in clay," writes Vaun C. Rodgers of AuGres, who is fishing in the Canadian Northwest Territory, McKenzie District. He is a retired real estate operator.

In a letter addressed to H. E. Friedman and George Myles, Bert Johnson and "other friends of the Tawas," Rodgers writes that he has had to call off a trip to Alaska because of dust and bad roads. He is 110 miles from the Hay River, northwest of the Great Slave Lake.

He writes that members of his caravan are catching lake trout, arctic grayling, northern pike and salmon by the dozens. "Mosquitoes are as big as sparrows, but everyone is enjoying the trip," writes Rodgers.

"Our supplies and gasoline will last until about August 1. We have moose meat, venison, fish and ducks to eat. We saw the Royal Canadian Mounted Police today and they said not to kill anything we could not use. I guess we have everything we need.

"The country here is like it was in Michigan 200 years ago. I hope to come up here again next year.

"Two Montana men lost their tent and supplies to a marauding bear last night and we have been helping them. The bear also knocked out one window in our trailer and demolished everything outside.

"The 'Mounties' gave us a high powered rifle to use the next time we see the bear—it weighs about 700 pounds and our .22 caliber revolvers would never stop one."

He writes that the weather is turning cold now and he hopes to fly to the arctic soon. "I wish I could send you some of the arctic grayling," he concluded.

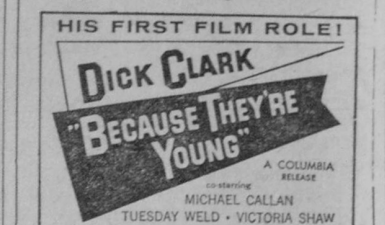
'HI' PIERCE FINDS AN EARLY VISITOR

Wurtsmith Air Force Base. At present, the railroad company has not been included in plans for transporting the fuel to the air base. He asked that the council support the railroad in its efforts to secure a share of this transportation.

White said that some 8,000 truck loads of fuel would be transported annually from the terminal to the air base. This would mean 16,000 round trips on the main highway and could cause a traffic problem.

A delegation of residents attended the meeting and asked that some action be taken to improve traffic conditions at the intersection of First Street and US-23.

Arnold Hosbach, spokesman, said that it was dangerous to enter US-23 from First Street when trucks are parked in front of Lowery Auto Parts.

John Skinner, manager of the firm, was present and said that he had an unloading problem but was willing to cooperate in any way possible.

The council is to designate one or two parking places on the west side of First Street as an unloading zone for the firm.

The Rev. O. James Crews requested permission to construct a directional sign on city property at the M-55-US-23 intersection. To be located on the lake side of US-23, the sign would direct traffic to the Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials. The council indicated that it would allow joint use by the ceremonials and Silver Valley winter sports, if property is available and the sign is approved.

per boat, there are more than 68 persons who make their living through commercial fishing in the AuSable-Oscoda area.

Fishing today is not without other problems. A controversy has arisen with resort owners in that area over the placement of nets near shore. Although, legally, the fishermen have the right to set nets in any water except Tawas Bay, a gentlemen's agreement was reached recently where they are to observe a nine-foot depth minimum. This is for the safety of small boats and water skiers.

Objections have also been heard about the influx of out-of-state boats in this area. Some years ago, commercial fishermen were limited to operate within a certain radius of their established home port, but this law has been changed. Today, Great Lakes waters are open to everyone—all an out-of-state fisherman need do is to purchase a non-resident license.

Times have changed—new methods are used, fish are found in smaller quantities and a different variety of fish are being taken. But, Isoco County's "first" industry remains—hard-working men still go down to the shores of Lake Huron to make their living with nets, just as they did before the white pine became "king" and then disappeared.

Examinations are to be given at the school, starting at 9:30 a. m., by Dr. Earl Hasty, director of the district health department.

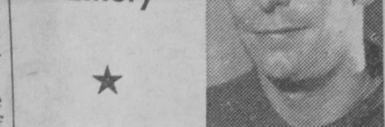
Varsity candidates are to receive their uniforms the following day.
