



Explains Law on Social Security Disability Claims

pletely helpless to qualify for disability benefits under the social security law, Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City district office, stated today, but you must have a disability which, in the words of the law, makes you unable "to engage in any substantial gainful activity.'

A temporary disability that can be expected to improve with medical treatment to the point that you will be able to go back to work, or a partial disabling condition that may force you to give up some types of work but does not prevent you from following a less strenuous occupation, will not qualify a worker for benefits, Mr. Ellifritz added. So, if your disability is either partial in severity or temporary in duration, Mr. Ellifritz conclud ed, do not count on qualifying for disability benefits under the so-
