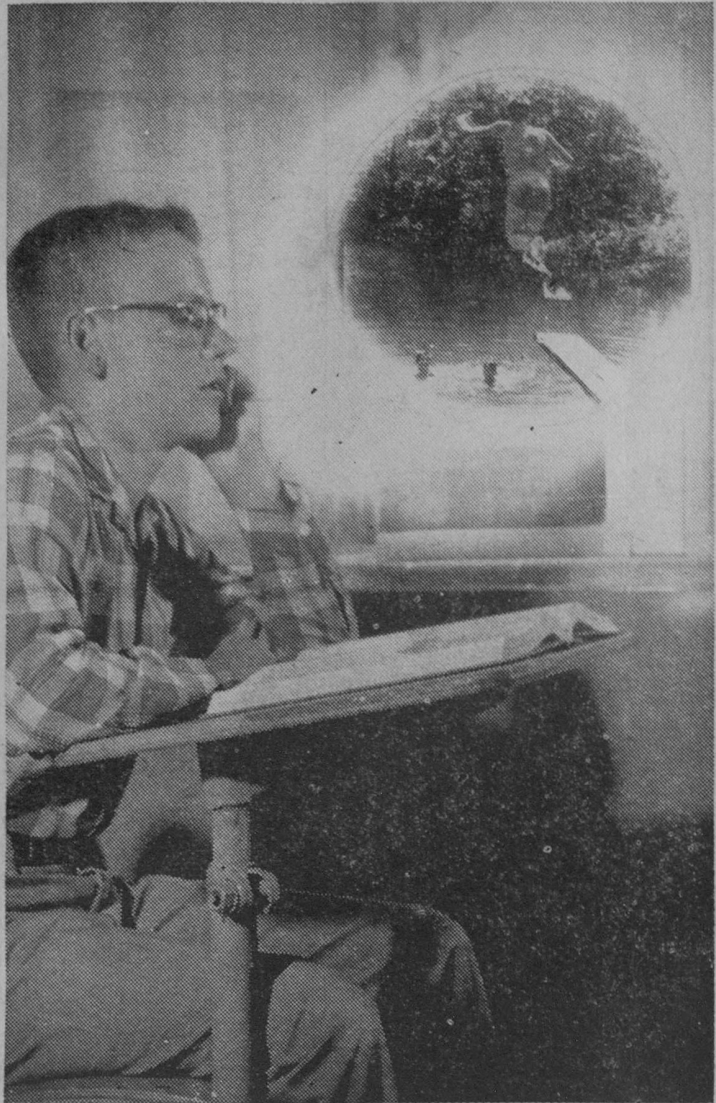

## Tawas School Reports on Bus Route Changes

Bus transportation route changes were announced this week at Tawas Area High School by Supt. Reynold Mick. School officially opens for the fall term Wednesday, September 7.

Bus routes are the same as last year with these exceptions: Bus No. 2 will go south from McArdle Store, picking up Long, Michalski, Fisher, Unkel and Anschuetz, then back to M-55, for Long and Fahsel who will also ride this bus. It will then go north past Reinke and east picking up Stewart, Kobs, Miller, Earl, Prescott, Grabow, Blust, Katterman and Ulman on M-55.

Bus No. 3 picks up Wilber-Baldwin including Krumm, Frye and Pakosz.

Bus No. 4 will pick up students in the Tawas Lake area. Bus No. 6 will pick up along US-23 and those adjacent to the Tawas Beach Road as far as Butterfield's Store.

It will soon be time for back to school for Iosco County youngsters. Area merchants are advertising back-to-school items in this week's Tawas Herald.

Bus No. 7 will pick up along the Townline Road and the adjacent area plus those within the Tawas City limits west of the river.

Bus No. 8 will pick up the same as No. 14 did last year and will take Schreiber, McLean, Phillips, Pinkowski and Proctor on the Monument Road.

Bus No. 14 this year will start with Klish on the Meadow Road and pick up adjacent to the Meadow Road. Those going to the high school from the west and south side of Dead Creek in Tawas City will be picked up at the junction of Fourth Street and Ninth Avenue. All those on US-23 from the Tawas River to Mathews Street will ride on this bus.

Bus No. 15 will pick up Alabaster and those living on roads other than US-23 in the Alabaster vicinity; it will then start a pick up at Port Gypsum, taking Redlawsk, Bronson and Klinger within the city limits.

Bus No. 16 has the same route as last year until it comes to the Henlock Baptist Church and M-55. On M-55, the bus picks up all pupils for the next two miles with the exception of Grabow and Blust.

Bus No. 17 picks up all Whittemore-Prescott students.

## Prosecutor Considers Action Against Would-be Abductors

Iosco Prosecuting Attorney Paul Harvey said Tuesday that he was still considering issuing a warrant against two men who tried to seize Genesee County Prosecutor Jerome F. O'Rourke from his cottage near East Tawas last Wednesday.

"The matter of procedure in this case is to study the language of the law and will require more 'homework,'" said Harvey.

The Iosco prosecutor said that he had conversed with O'Rourke by telephone Monday night. He indicated that unless there was grounds for a felony warrant to be issued against the two men, no action would be taken.

O'Rourke was pulled from his cottage by John N. Bogart, an unemployed salesman, and Matthew Buder, Flint attorney.

O'Rourke told state police at East Tawas that his yells for help and his wife's screams drove off the men, both of whom are awaiting trial on charges brought by O'Rourke that they unlawfully solicited law business.

A hearing on a petition by Bogart before Grand Blanc Justice

Erwin Ross to have O'Rourke and his assistant arrested for illegal use of police records has been adjourned until August 30.

The pair asked for O'Rourke's arrest in connection with an embezzlement charge brought against Bogart that had been previously dropped.

O'Rourke said the fracas at his cottage broke out about 5:30 a. m. Wednesday when he arose to attend the hearing on the charges brought by Bogart and Buder.

He said the two men pounded loudly on the screen door, pulled it open and dragged him toward a convertible when they were frightened off by his and his wife's screams.

Sgt. R. H. Janner, commander of the Michigan State Police post at East Tawas, said that Buder and Bogart came to the post and advised that they had made a citizens arrest on O'Rourke. They directed police to take the Flint man into custody and deliver him to a justice of the peace at Clio.

Janner advised Buder that he would not take O'Rourke into custody due to the fact that he had not committed a felony which was of public knowledge and to the best of police knowledge, O'Rourke had not committed a felony in the presence of Buder.

Both men have admitted they entered the cottage and forcibly took O'Rourke out to their car. Police said that the attempt of a citizens arrest by the two men was apparently well-rehearsed. They did not lay a hand on Mrs. O'Rourke or her children, even though she attempted to help her husband.

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## Water Carnival Plans Told by Red Cross

Participants in the summer swimming and lifesaving instruction program sponsored locally by the American Red Cross will take part in a season-end water carnival scheduled for Saturday, August 27.

To be held at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock at East Tawas starting at 2:00 p. m., some 175 Tawas youngsters are expected to participate, states Miss Carolyn Evans, instructor.

Red Cross lifesaving certificates are to be presented to those youngsters who qualified. All others who participated in the two-month program are to receive certificates to show the skills they learned.

Making the presentations will be Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller, chairman of the local chapter, and Miss Evans.

The program will feature demonstrations in lifesaving techniques and swimming by the various classes, as well as a skin diving demonstration.

"The program will give parents the opportunity to see just what has been accomplished this summer," said Miss Evans.

The lifesaving and swimming program, which started in July, was held at the Tawas City Park and East Tawas State Park. Three days per week were spent at each training site. In addition, an adult class was held in Tawas City and an advanced class in East Tawas.

The regular program concluded in early August, but it was decided to hold intermediate and beginners classes throughout the month.

## Two Exchange Students Enroll at Tawas School

Two of the three foreign exchange students who will attend Tawas Area High School during the 1960-61 school year enrolled in the 12th grade Monday. A third foreign exchange student is scheduled to arrive here later this week.

Enrolling Monday were Hannelore Stirnemann of Berlin, West Germany, and Pirikko Hyvarinen of Oulu, Finland.

Miss Stirnemann, 18, arrived by plane in the United States August 15 and was met at the Detroit Metropolitan Airport by her exchange parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herman Moehring of East Tawas.

Miss Hyvarinen, 17, arrived here last Saturday and was met at Detroit by her American family, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Harwood.

Coming later in the week is Andrea Kunau of Cologne, West Germany, who will live with the William Lee Browns, also of East Tawas.

The girls are taking part in the Youth for Understanding Teen-Age Exchange Program, sponsored by the Michigan Council of Churches.

Although the girls will be entering their senior year here, each has completed 13 years of schooling.

In addition to their studies here, the exchange students are to take an active part in social life at school and in the community to gain a better understanding of the American people.

During their year-long stay here, they will present programs before various church and civic groups to acquaint Americans with life in their native lands.

Still getting acquainted with her family and the community after the excitement of the plane trip to the United States, Miss Stirnemann said Monday that she welcomes the opportunity to live in a small community. She said that the Moehrings were apprehensive about the change from a large city like Berlin, but that she has found the area "very interesting."

"It is a nice change for me—the people here really seem to know each other," she said. She has found much enjoyment swimming in Tawas Bay,

which she says is much cleaner than the water or shore in lakes around Berlin.

She noted with interest that an American flag was displayed in church and favored the custom of the pastor shaking hands with the congregation following church services.

Miss Stirnemann attended Bertha von Suttner School in Berlin. She has studied four languages, her favorite being English. She plans to attend Berlin Free University on her return.

Miss Hyvarinen, who was still tired Monday after her long plane ride, has been active in many school groups in her native Finland. She has studied English six years and looks forward to further study of the language here.

She has a fair reading, writing and speaking ability in the Swedish and French languages and, in school, studied three other languages in addition to her native tongue.

Hannelore's father is a Berlin businessman. Pirikko's father is a government employee.

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## Whittemore-Prescott Opens September 6

Whittemore-Prescott Area Schools announce the opening of school on Tuesday, September 6. The opening day session will be for a half day with school starting at 8:55 a. m. and ending at noon. Teachers meetings will be held Friday, September 2, from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon.

Students who attended Whittemore-Prescott schools last year do not need to register before opening day. New students should register with the principal of the school they will attend. Principals will be in their offices from 9:00 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. from Monday, August 29, through Friday, September 2, except when teachers meetings are in progress.

Kindergarten students will start on Wednesday, September 7. The legislature this year enacted a new law requiring that every child entering school prove by his doctor's signature that he has been vaccinated for the common childhood diseases, give authority for vaccination by county health officials or sign an objection to vaccination on religious grounds. Forms are available for this purpose from Sylvester Wojcicki, Prescott Elementary School principal, or Mrs. Jennie Valley, principal of Whittemore and Sherman Elementary Schools.

Dieckle Leu of Malvern, Iowa, will teach fifth and sixth graders. He attended Concordia Teachers College, Seward, Nebraska. Principal Donald Sebald will instruct the seventh and eighth grades.

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## Four Hale Youths Injured Saturday in M-65 Crash

Four Hale youths were rushed to Tawas Hospital Saturday night where they were treated for injuries received in a one-car accident on M-65, about five miles north of that western Iosco County community.

Seriously injured in the crash were Wilfred Holzheuer, 16; Robert Schaefer, 17; Richard Schaefer, 18; and Roland F. Boughner, 18.

Holzheuer, driver of the car, lost control of the vehicle and skidded to the left shoulder. The car rolled over several times, coming to a stop 183 feet from the point where it left the road.

On questioning the youths at the hospital, police learned that the vehicle was traveling between 70 and 80 miles an hour.

Police said that Boughner was the most seriously injured. He sustained back injuries.

The driver is to appear before Probate Judge H. Read Smith.

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## DR. CARL ARTHUR ANDERSON

Dr. Carl Arthur Anderson, known here as Arthur Anderson, formerly of East Tawas, died recently at Moline, Illinois, Lutheran hospital. Funeral services were held at the First Lutheran Church, Moline, on Thursday, August 11. The body was moved from the Esterdahl Chapel to lie in state before the service. Burial was in Riverside Cemetery.

Dr. Anderson was professor of Old Testament language and literature at Augustana Seminary for 29 years. More than 1,000 of the 1,300 pastors of the Augustana Lutheran Church received their Old Testament study under him. He was registrar of the seminary for many years. He was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity at St. Peter, Minnesota, in 1949 in recognition of the contribution he had made in the field of Old Testament study.

Dr. Anderson was born at East Tawas October 27, 1894, son of the late Severin M. and Anna Marie Anderson, and made East Tawas his home until he began his ministry and teaching.

He graduated from East Tawas High School in 1913 and from Augustana College in 1917. He entered Augustana Seminary then spent two years at University of Wisconsin, receiving his master degree in 1920. He was ordained in 1922 at Augustana Seminary. He did post graduate work at the University of Chicago.

He served as pastor in Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada, for two years; in Altona, Manitoba, seven years; served on the executive board, and as vice president of the Canadian Conference. He returned to Augustana Seminary, serving 29 years as professor.

He married Miss Ruth Brissman June 5, 1923, at Moline. She survives him. He also leaves one son, the Rev. Earl L. Anderson of Lake Stevens, Washington; one daughter, Mrs. Elmer Cople of Lindsay, Kansas, and four grandchildren.

Dr. Anderson made many trips to East Tawas and filled the pulpit when he made his visits here. He gave the first gift to the building fund of the new Grace Lutheran Church.

## Penn State Awards Marlin Musolf Jr. Doctor Degree

Martin Musolf Jr., a former Tawas City resident, has earned a Ph.D. degree at Pennsylvania State University, University Park, Pennsylvania. On August 12, he received one of 49 doctorates conferred among the 600 degrees handed out by Eric A. Walker, president of the university.

Musolf secured his bachelor of science degree from Michigan State University, East Lansing, in 1952 and earned a fellowship to Penn State from Dow Corning Company, Midland, where he is employed.

## Prepare for Labor Day Traffic Fatality Threat

Labor Day week-end, the third worst holiday period for traffic deaths in Michigan, will find the Michigan State Police, aided by the National Guard, again operating increased patrols.

Seventeen were killed in 15 fatal accidents over the week-end a year ago. The average for the 78-hour period in the last seven years is one death every three hours and 40 minutes.

"Law enforcement officers will do all they can to prevent accidents in the heavy traffic of this last holiday week-end of the summer," Commissioner Joseph A. Childs said, "but it's every motorist's responsibility to keep out of trouble by driving carefully and defensively."

State police patrols will be lengthened to 10 hours and pass days canceled, with all available personnel being used on either desk or patrol duty from noon Friday, September 2, through midnight Monday, September 5.

Patrol emphasis will be on high accident and heavy traffic volume areas, shifting as changing conditions warrant.

There will be 104 National Guard members assisting the state police on patrol or point control and another 96 will aid sheriff departments and one city police department.

## Water Accidents Claim 122 Lives During Year

With Michigan water accidents having already claimed the lives of 122 persons and injured 152 this year, the Michigan State Police are urging vigilant safety practices in water activities which are expected to continue at a high level through Labor Day week-end.

There were 279 accidents reported to the state police through August 16 with 117 listed as fatal mishaps, 98 personal injury and 64 property damage only.

Ninety of the accidents, killing 32 and injuring 53, occurred in the three-week period ending August 16.

Included in the 122 fatalities

were 33 swimmers or waders, 18 boat operators, 18 boat passengers, seven children who wandered away from their parents and into water, four skin divers, two water skiers and 40 who died from miscellaneous causes.

Special boating hazards to avoid include overloading, reckless or negligent operation, overpowering the craft with too big a motor and failing to get to shore in time when bad weather threatens.

Swimmers are cautioned against unfamiliar waters, overexertion and swimming alone.

The Michigan Conservation Department announced that duck hunters will have the same seasons and general bag limits as in 1959. Hunters will not be allowed to shoot canvasbacks and heads this season because their wintering population was the lowest showing on record. The heavy loss of brood stocks in the Detroit River from pollution was also a determining factor for the closed season on redhead and canvasback ducks for this year.

The duck season will begin on October 7 with a daily bag limit of four and a limit of eight. Shooting hours will be lengthened, starting at one-half hour before sunrise to sunset excepting Wildfowl and Sebawaing Bays where hunting is illegal after 4:00 p. m. The season opener will begin at noon on the first day and all hunters are cautioned to check their migratory laws before the season opener. The 40-day duck season will close on November 15, but geese may be taken until December 15.

Thursday afternoon some Tawas businessmen will leave from Tawas Bay Yacht Club at 2:00 p. m. on several boats to spend an afternoon of fishing for perch. This is the first fishing trip planned by the organization and from all indications the perch should be rather scarce after this group starts offering choice minnows to lure the perch into a hooking position. James Dillon and Hugo Keiser, committeemen, are working out arrangements for the Tawas City Businessmen's Association. All businessmen planning to attend should bring a life jacket. The organization will provide bait and refreshments.

Users of Michigan State Parks will need a daily 50 cent or annual \$2 sticker on their windshield before they enter 54 of the 61 administered state parks starting January 1, 1961. The stickers will probably be handled by hunting and fishing dealers, park gate houses and from vending machines located at the park entrances. There is a possibility that the daily stickers will be sold only at the park gate houses and vending machines.

Deer hunters applying for 1960 "any deer" permits will be able to pick up the forms from license dealers after September 1 and have until midnight, October 10, to mail their applications. No postmarks after that time will be accepted by the conservation department. The card, which is used in the application, has been changed to aid in law enforcement but the steps in applying for an "any deer" permit is the same as last year.

## 2nd River Queen Planned

Someday soon another traditionally southern paddlewheel boat may be sailing across the North's AuSable River.

Howard Brubaker of Oscoda, skipper and owner of the AuSable River Queen, revealed that plans are in the works for the construction of an AuSable River Queen II.

Brubaker, whose only southern link lies in the fact that he was born and raised in Kalamazoo, said he hopes to start work on the new craft this fall.

"It took us three years to design and build the first one," the 49-year-old captain noted.

The new ship, when it is completed, will be larger than the one now operating out of nearby Five Channels Dam.

The current craft, which has proved to be a hit with tourists, is 17 by 60 feet, two-decked, has an eight by 12-foot paddlewheel, is powered by a 150-horsepower marine engine and can carry 100 passengers.

It went into service July 1 of last year. The ship was constructed in Tawas City and Alabaster with the top deck being added when it arrived at Five Channels Dam.

Before, Brubaker took tourists on river trips in a 30-foot excursion boat that carried 24 passengers. He operated the smaller craft for six years.

"They (the tourists) enjoyed the trip," Brubaker said. "Our business has been built up by word of mouth."

New docks for the paddlewheels, a parking area and improvements in the AuSable River Queen I are also being planned by Brubaker.

Brubaker has installed a public address system, a snack bar

and made other improvements in the craft this year and is planning to install cushioned seats soon.

Another factor leading Brubaker into building the southern paddlewheel, the only one in operation in Northern Michigan, was the fact the craft draws only nine to 10 inches of water.

The new ship will have a glassed-in enclosure. River Queen I is entirely open and does not sail during inclement weather.

The trip, covering about 19 miles from Five Channels to Cooke Dams, takes about two hours. During July and August three trips a day are made.

In May and June, the craft makes two trips a day, as it will after Labor Day until the October color tour.

Passengers on the River Queen have an opportunity of seeing wildlife in their natural habitat, Brubaker said. Trees overhang the river as the craft plies down the winding waterway.

Beaver, otter, deer and American eagles can be seen during the trip. Spawning and feeding grounds of bass and pike are passed.

On the downstream trip, Brubaker outlines the history of the river and points out places of interest. Accordion music by Willard DeMott helps while away the time in nature's backyard during the return voyage.

Brubaker built River Queen I with Herbert Cholger of Tawas City and Melvin Brown of Alabaster. He said they will help in constructing No. 2.

Brubaker, who came to Oscoda 16 years ago and bought a home and 10 cottages, also operates a 55-foot fishing boat from the mouth of the AuSable River into Lake Huron.



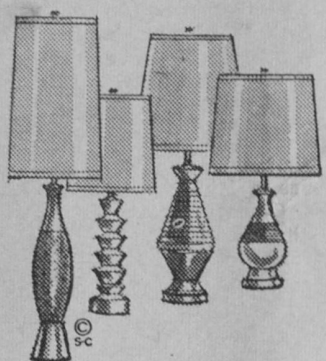
