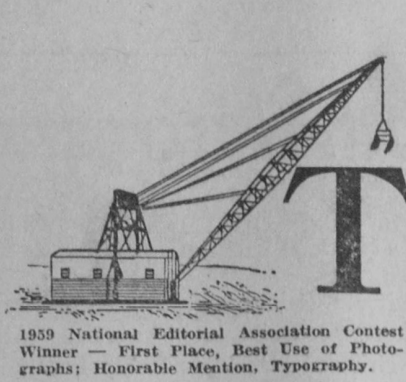

McCREADY WINS IN RACE FOR P. A.

Local Interest Brings Out 2,844 Voters

While the turn-out for Tuesday's primary election was only average in many sections of the state, considerable interest was shown by Iosco County voters. An estimated 2,844 persons entered polling booths in the county's 19 voting precincts. This was 1,414 more votes cast than in the 1958 August primary election. Most interest locally came in the race for prosecuting attorney where William McCready, blind Tawas City attorney, piled up a surprising majority to defeat incumbent Paul Harvey. McCready held margins in 18 of the 20 precincts, defeating Harvey 1,285 to 850 and was elected as the Republican Party's candidate.

'No Objection' to King's SDD License

A controversy of several months standing over issuance of an SDD liquor license to a Tawas City grocery owner has apparently come to an end. At Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council, Clarence King of King's Palace Market was told that if he reapplied for the license, the council could see no reason for denying his application. Council action swung in favor of approving the application after receipt of a letter from the state liquor control commission last week. The council had disapproved Mr. King's first application several months ago, stating that it first wanted an explanation from the commission on why it had taken no action on an application of long standing by Keiser's Drug Store. The liquor control commission outlined its reasons in a letter from Edward F. Maloney, director of the license division. "When the commission's selection of Mr. King was denied by the council," said Mr. Maloney, "the commission did not ask the reasons. We were told the denial was predicated upon the commission's failure to act upon the application of H. J. Keiser. "By way of explanation, you realize, of course, that the responsibility of issuing package licenses by law is the responsibility of the commission. The law commands the commission to use its discretion. There is no provision for local approval or disapproval. However, as a matter of courtesy, the commission has always given local bodies an opportunity to make a recommendation. "In considering applications from your area, the commission was convinced on the basis of separate marketing areas, potential service to the area, off-street parking volume of business, adequacy of facility and other factors, that the location of Mr. King's establishment merited consideration. "We know you realize that the problem before the commission is state-wide overall service and not primarily a question of issuing SDD licenses on the basis of length of time an application has been on file. Where local problems, personalities and personal issues become a factor, we know that they may be resolved (See LICENSE, page 10.)

Proposed Rezoning Met Rejection by East Tawas

By a unanimous vote, the East Tawas Council turned down a request Monday night from Clifford Bennington for the proposed rezoning of several lots on Airport Road in the Tawas Lake area. Bennington had asked the council to change four of his lots from residential to commercial, but this met with objection of several adjacent property owners during the hearing. The adjacent owners felt that if one parcel of property was rezoned to commercial, more requests would follow. That area of Bennington Subdivision is rapidly expanding with new home construction since streets were black-topped. Bennington had wanted to establish his wholesale newspaper and magazine distribution quarters there. At a recent meeting of the council, he was ordered to cease operations of the business in another residential area of the city.

SUSPECT CLEARED

The long arm of the law dipped down into Iosco County Monday to apprehend a hitchhiker in the state-wide investigation of a Mackinac Island murder. A 22-year-old Richmond, Virginia, man, who had been working on the resort island, was apprehended by state police from East Tawas and held at the Iosco County Jail. After questioning the young man for 1 1/2 hours, Detectives Elmer Welling and Everal Miller of Bay City checked his story with Mackinac Island authorities. He was released late Monday night.

Prescott and Mielock Receive Margins in Their 'Home' County

Iosco County voters gave Charles T. Prescott, candidate for state senator of the 28th district, a 1,181 to 926 margin over his opponent for the Republican nomination, Lewis T. Hubbs. James P. Mielock of Whittemore out-pollled his four opponents on the Republican ticket for representative in the state legislature, Alpena district. Mielock had 1,131 votes; G. Douglas Taipalus, 417; John L. VanPatton, 350; Lester G. Haken, 70; Walter W. Weinkauff, 68.

INVESTIGATE THEFT OF BOAT FROM BEACH

City and state police are investigating the theft of a 12-foot aluminum boat and 7 1/2-horsepower motor which is believed to have been stolen from a Tawas City residence Sunday. H. J. Mastenbrook of 1135 Bay Drive told officers that he had pulled the boat on shore in front of his cabin the day before and when he checked the next morning, one supreme court justice. Who is Confused?

In case Tawas City and East Tawas voters are still confused about the change in election booths, additional election board members and separation aisles at the two city halls, do not fret—you are not alone. Because of a recent state ruling, Tawas City has had to split the city into two voting precincts. East Tawas was required to establish three precincts. Mayor George Tuttle of Tawas City said Tuesday that under state regulations, each precinct is limited to 800 registered voters. In Tawas City's case, however, the largest total vote cast in recent years was 532.

Under the new ruling, the city hall has been divided into two separate precincts with election board members sitting on each side of the building. The idea of splitting of precincts is to speed up election returns. Most taxpayers are reserving their opinions until after the election in order to see if there is a "speed-up" and if it warrants the added expense.

KNOTHOLE LEAGUE PLAY-OFF SET FOR SUNDAY, AUGUST 7

Play-off for the championship of the Knothole League will be held Sunday, August 7, it was announced today by Deloise Durant. The Braves of the American division have clinched the flag in that division but National division honors are still up for grabs, depending on the outcome of a game last night. The Jets were scheduled to go against the Little Trainers Tuesday night. Should the Jets win, this team would be in a two-way tie with the Indians. A play-off game for National division honors will be held later in the week, if necessary.

Colorful Shriner Caravan to Stop Here

A colorful caravan of Shriners from Elf Khurafah Temple, Saginaw, and other Michigan communities will stop in the Tawas-August 20 while traveling to Alpena for the Besser day summer ceremonies. Arriving at the south city limits at approximately 10:30 a. m., the Shriners will be met by a delegation of local civic officials and members of Masonic organizations here. Accompanying the caravan will be Potentate Harry Ellis of Saginaw, members of his divan and several past potentates. Dale Williams, Davison businessman, who has full charge of the program at Alpena, spent Monday and Tuesday of last week working out details of the caravan's stop here with Vincent Beam Sr. Mr. Beam urges residents of this area to turn out in full force to welcome the caravan. After passing through Tawas City, it will be met by welcoming delegations at East Tawas, Oscoda, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Harrisville and Alpena.

Port Huron Man Drowns in AuSable

The body of a 27-year-old Port Huron man was recovered from the AuSable River in Oscoda Tuesday afternoon, one hour and 15 minutes after a canoe in which he was riding capsized. Drowned was Loren Lee McPherson, a construction worker at nearby Wurtsmith Air Force Base. McPherson's body was found in about six feet of water by the Oscoda-AuSable Volunteer Fire Department's rescue boat. Assisting in the search were state police and Iosco County Sheriff's Department.

PAIR RESCUED

A Detroit couple who were fishing in Tawas Bay Tuesday, Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Haymond, rescued two persons who overturned in their 17-foot sailboat. The Haymonds saw the boat tip over in a heavy breeze and went to the rescue. Investigating officers said that McPherson had been fishing and asked two small boys for a ride in their canoe. One boy got out of the craft to accommodate him. Officers said that the canoe was tipped over by the wake of a speed boat. The boy, as yet unidentified by police, was able to make shore, but McPherson drowned. McPherson is survived by his wife, Sybil, and three children: Joyce Elaine, seven; Lee Ann, three, and Mark Eric, six months.

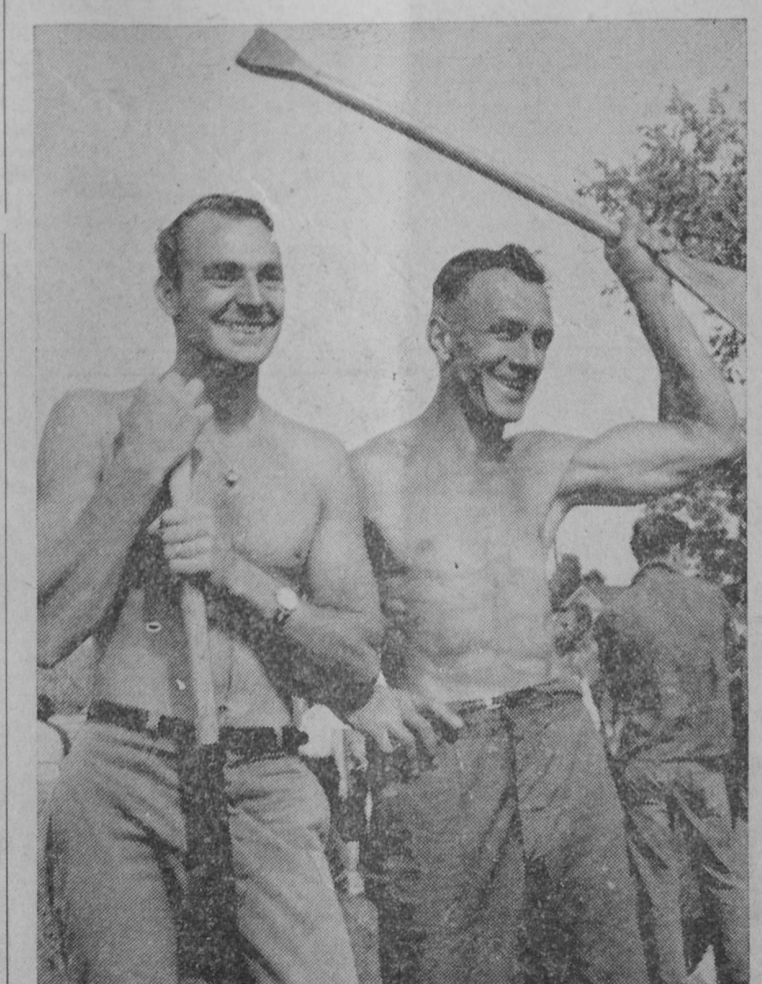
Kolonich and Kindell Victors in AuSable Warm-Up Race

With only two Michigan canoe races remaining before the annual AuSable River marathon September 3-4, Steve Kolonich and Larry Kindell of National City were singled out as the team to beat for world's championship honors next month. The Iosco County team annexed its fifth win of the season Sunday, finishing first out of a field of 26 canoes which participated in a warm-up race from Five Channels Dam to Oscoda.

The race was sponsored by the Michigan Canoe Racing Association and the Oscoda-AuSable Volunteer Fire Department. Eugene Hopper, association president, was race chairman. Susan Flanders, Miss Oscoda-AuSable of 1960, officiated at the start of the race. Canoe teams left Five Channels Dam at 15-second intervals. Starting in sixth position, the winners completed the 50-mile course in three hours, one minute and five seconds. Other winners were: Edward Wojahn and Sanford McGuire of Mikado, second; Ralph Sawyer of Oscoda and Irving McGuire of Mikado, third; Al and LeRoy Widing of Holly, fourth; Jack Koch and Robert Mason, Bay City, fifth.

The second place team of Wojahn and McGuire finished five minutes behind the winners in three hours, six minutes and 50 seconds. The third place team finished two minutes, 22 seconds later, followed by the Widing Brothers in three hours, nine minutes and six seconds. Sawyer, who won the 240-mile marathon in 1959 while paddling with Jerry Wagner, served notice Sunday that he and his new partner were not to be counted out in the world's championship race in September. Sawyer and McGuire worked their way up from the 26th starting position and have shown great progress during work-outs in recent weeks.

Kolonich and Kindell, winners of the 1958 marathon, have won five races this year, including events on the Shiawassee, Tawas, Rifle and Grand Rivers, in addition to Sunday's win. The Widing Brothers have won races at Ossineke, Petoskey and Greenville. Michigan canoeists will race next Sunday at Caseville and the following Sunday at Ludington.

Council Approves Sale of Surplus Well Site

Approval was given by the Tawas City Council Monday night to enter into negotiations with the board of directors of Tawas Hospital for property which was recently declared surplus by the city water department. The property was purchased by the city in the early 1940s from Joseph Barkman as the site for its water pumping station. Since that time, the well has been discontinued as this city purchases its water supply from East Tawas. George W. Myles, who represented the hospital board at the meeting, said that the old well site was the only property available for future expansion of hospital facilities. He said that the immediate use of the property would be for parking facilities and a small park for patients and personnel. The city purchased the 400 by 300 foot piece of land for \$200

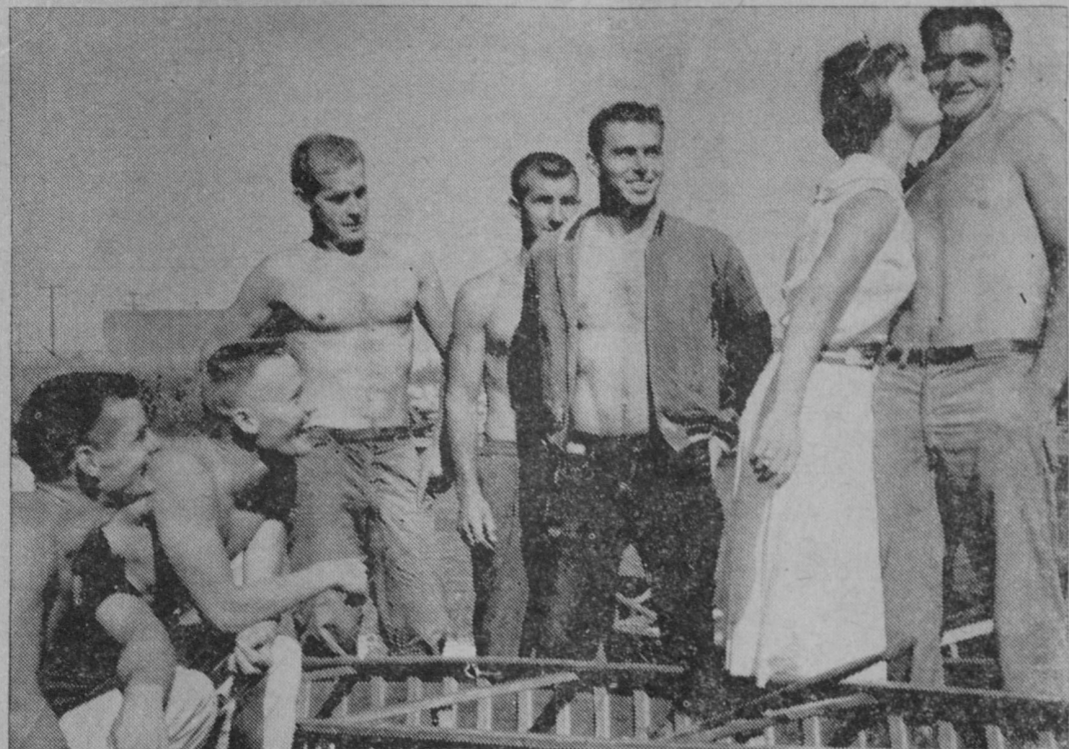
and the hospital board has offered the same figure. The council authorized Mayor George Tuttle and Clerk Walter Nelson to enter into negotiation with the hospital board. In other business, Edward Laskey of Lake Street complained that a neighbor had constructed a building too close to his lot line and that the eaves of the structure projected over his property. City Attorney Jerry Cotter advised that this was a dispute between property owners over a boundary line and the only remedy was circuit court action by the complainant. He said that the city did not have jurisdiction over the matter. The council adopted an amendment to ordinance No. 146 which requires that owners must cut weeds on property within 200 feet of a dwelling. Collector Ask Wage Increase

City Plans Study of Garbage Pick-Up

Tawas City Council is to study the possibility of increasing the salary paid the city's new garbage collector, James Quarters, and to set up new rules governing such collection. Mr. Quarters appeared before the board Monday night and requested that some adjustment be made because of the heavy volume during summer months. Present salary for collections is \$75 a week, the collector to furnish his own truck and fuel. Since taking over the job, Quarters said that he has found that many people are not complying with regulations which call for light trash to be placed in garbage cans. Considerable discussion took place among the six councilmen

and Mayor George Tuttle in regard to whether all trash should be picked up by the city. Mr. Quarters is to make his recommendations to the council at its next meeting. A possible raise in his salary is also to be discussed at that time. Supt. Reginald Bublitz reminded residents of the city that garbage collection days were as follows: The area east of Tawas River along with Lake Street and Bay Drive will be serviced Monday; everything west of the river will be picked up Tuesday. Home owners are requested to put garbage cans on curbs along the street the night before such collection is made.

Two 920th Aircrews in Combat Competition

Wurtsmith's 920th Air Refueling Squadron has two air crews taking part in a three-week simulated exercise that will theoretically destroy the cities of Hastings, Nebraska, and Little Rock, Arkansas.

Aircraft from 23 wings within the Second Air Force are participating in this exercise, which is now in its third week. The purpose of the exercise is to select the two most proficient crews in B-52 heavy and B-47 medium jet bombers and KC-97 and KC-135 aerial tankers.

Trying to capture the KC-135 honors for the 920th are the following two crews: Capt. M. N. Seagraves, pilot; Lt. R. A. Hahn, co-pilot; Capt. H. J. Sechler, navigator, and MSgt R. J. Darrow, boom operator. Capt. W. W. Schmidt, pilot; Maj. R. E. Duke, co-pilot; 1-Lt. C. E. Cooper, navigator, and TSgt L. H. Mengle, boom operator.

The winners selected from this competition will represent Second Air Force in the Twelfth Annual Strategic Air Command Combat Competition scheduled at Bergstrom Air Force Base, Austin, Texas, from September 12 through 16.

This is the first time in the 12-year history of the competitions that SAC's major subordinate commands in the States—Second, Eighth and 15th Air Forces—have conducted elimination competitions to determine who will be in the running for the title of "best in SAC."

During the Second Air Force eliminations, in which the 920th is taking part, the cities of Little Rock and Hastings will be bombed repeatedly during the next three weeks, but not one blade of grass will be disturbed, for not a single bomb will be dropped.

Only a few airmen assigned to the Radar Bomb Scoring Detachment within these cities will know when the aircraft scores a "hit."

Radar Bomb Scoring (RBS) detachments and SAC aircraft have been making "runs" against such areas for a number of years without having carried a single bomb.

This feat is accomplished through the use of a combination of radio and radar contact between aircraft and the RBS site. This electronic technique actually permits the scoring of the bombing effectiveness with pinpoint accuracy.

Radar bomb scoring permits crews to receive realistic training in the use of radar bombing against industrial targets within their actual environment.

Navigator - bombardiers receive practice in recognizing cities, factories, buildings and other structures as they appear as images on their radar scopes, just as they would appear at the operational altitudes were these aircraft flying on a real mission sortie against an enemy target.

Through a "lock-on" device, the RBS radars hold the image of the on-coming bomber on their radar scopes, tracking it automatically on a plotting board. Just before the simulated release of the bomb, the aircraft transmits a tone. The aircraft then indicates its point of simulated bomb release by stopping the tracking mechanism to stop. And that is it.

There follows a system of standardized computations based on the aircraft's ground speed, heading and altitude, wind conditions, bombfall characteristics and other data, that permits the accurate computation of the particular bombing action.

While the bombers are being scored by RCS, the tankers are being rated by another set of criteria. Before the takeoff the tanker crew is told to meet a bomber at a certain geographical location, to hook up at a precise time and to transfer a certain amount of fuel. As an example of the precision expected, hookups must be accomplished within a tenth of a second of the prescribed time to obtain maximum points. The length of time required to hookup is also scored. These annual competitions with-

Federal Employees Will Find Hikes in Current Paychecks

Over one and a half million federal employees, including 95 from Wurtsmith Air Force Base, will draw fatter paychecks this year. The increase is the result of congressional action early in July which overrode President Eisenhower's veto of a pay-hike measure.

The pay boosts vary from \$225 in grade one to \$1,235 in the top grade of 17. Grade 18 jumped a flat \$1,000 to \$18,500, the classified pay ceiling.

A new plan of insurance for National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) policyholders has passed both houses of congress and awaits final action on a senate amendment when congress reconvenes in August.

The plan is modified life insurance which provides a level premium throughout the life of the insured. However, the face value of the policy will automatically be reduced by 50 percent at the time of the insured's 65th birthday.

The face value of any extended term insurance in force under the modified life policy would also be reduced by 50 percent at the time of the 65th birthday. Policyholders may retain the insurance otherwise lost at age 65 by paying premiums for age 65 without medical examination. The amendment tacked on by the senate permits issuance of NSLI to persons eligible to apply between October 8, 1940, and December 31, 1956. It would require application to be submitted in writing within a year after January 1, 1961, with proof of good health at the time of application.

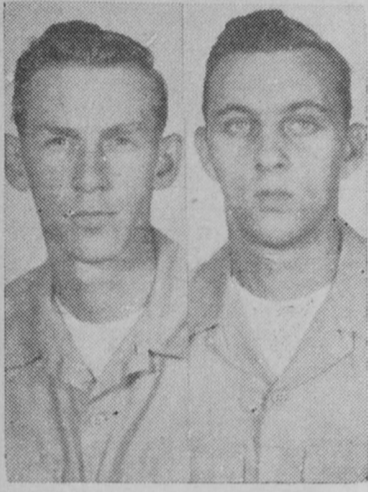

Two Airmen Save Lives of Eight

Two members of the 379th Civil Engineering Squadron have been credited by the Bay City sheriff's office with saving the lives of eight persons in a boating mishap at Bay City's Wenona Beach Saturday, July 16.

Alc Everette White and A3C Kenneth F. Burda, both of the base fire department, were attending a band concert at Wenona Beach when they heard

calls for help from the water. Eight persons were aboard a 14-foot outboard which submerged as it entered the Wenona Beach marina and dropped the group of young men and women into about 12 feet of water.

Without hesitation, White and Burda jumped into the water fully clothed and aided the struggling boat occupants to the dock that edges the marina. Deputy Sheriff Ford Davidson of the Bay City sheriff's office, said that the quick action displayed by the two airmen saved the lives of all eight persons.

The boat was swamped when its 25 horsepower motor was cut and the stern settled below the surface of the water. Deputy Davidson said the group had only two life preservers aboard the craft.

Don Blumbo of Bay City assisted Burda and White in the rescue operation.

After all eight were safely on the dock, the two airmen assisted beach officials in raising the submerged craft from the boat channel.

Check Your Social Security Account Says Ellifritz

It may be time once again to check on your social security account, according to Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City district office of the Social Security Administration.

Mr. Ellifritz advised that most people now reaching age 65 need 4 1/2 years of earnings on their account. (A man born in 1906 or later or a woman born in 1909 or later will need at least 10 years in the system). For disability, you need at least five years.

The social security office will furnish a self-addressed card. Within a few days, a statement of earnings will be sent from the headquarters at Baltimore, Maryland.

According to Mr. Ellifritz, it is advisable for workers and self-employed people to check their account every three years. This makes it possible to correct any record which might not be complete. Your future benefit payments will be based on earnings credited to your account.

Forest Fire Threat Increases During Late Summer

Teeming with thousands of vacationers and dried by summer's sun and winds, lands in Northern Michigan face increased forest fire dangers during the weeks ahead.

This is the time of year when a carelessly-tossed cigarette, unattended campfire or the slightest spark can send a fire raging through acres of precious recreational, wildlife and wood-producing lands.

Forest fires destroyed nearly \$13,700 worth of private and public lands in Michigan during July and August of 1959. More than one-quarter of their total dollar damage for the year. Approximately 950 acres burned during this two-month period, again more than one-quarter of the state's 1959 acreage losses.

Through the week ending July 17, Michigan's forest fire record was 930 acres below the 1959 figure for the same period. Acreage wise, 1959 was the state's second best year in forest fire control.

IOSCO RESIDENTS PURCHASE \$148,974 IN BONDS

Combined purchases of series E and H United States savings bonds by residents of Iosco County totaled \$148,974 in the first six months of this year. It was announced today by John E. Hosbach, volunteer chairman of the county savings bonds committee. This compared with \$133,532 in the January-June 1959 period and represented achievement of 45.8 percent of the year's treasury-assigned sales goal of \$325,000.

According to Delmar V. Cote, state director for the United States Savings Bonds Division, purchases of the two popular series for the state as a whole amounted to 23.4 million dollars in June. This was an increase of 14.5 percent over June 1959.

Cote said the June record had been exceeded in only two other months since July 1958. In March 1960, savings bonds purchases in the state were \$24,754,000 and in January 1959 E and H bond buying totaled \$23,467,000.

The state bond director reported that statewide savings bonds purchases for the year through June 30 were 135 million dollars, up 7.1 percent over a year ago. E bond buying accounted for \$122,097,000 of the total and H bond purchases for the remaining \$12,936,000.

Cote said improved bond sales reflected the cooperation of a number of the state's major employers who answered the treasury's appeal to conduct person-to-person canvasses of their wage and salary earners early this year to encourage increased participation in the payroll savings plan. He pointed out the improved terms of savings bonds which now pay 3 1/2 percent when held to maturity also had made E's and H's more popular with investors.

Disabled Veterans Eligible For Additional Compensation

Veterans with severe service-connected disabilities who have more than three children are now eligible for additional compensation.

C. W. Nixon, acting manager of the Veterans Administration regional office in Detroit, said today that a new law has been signed by the president and is now in effect. The prior law did not authorize payment for more than three children.

The additional compensation will range from \$12 monthly for each child after the first three, where the veteran is totally disabled. It will range downward to \$6 where the veteran's disability is evaluated at 50 percent. Between the two extremes, proportionate amounts will be paid.

Veterans with less than 50 percent disability receive no additional compensation for a wife, parent or children, Mr. Nixon said.

The term children includes all sons and daughters, real or legally adopted, under age 18 and unmarried.

Section 1 shall be amended by addition to provide as follows:

Section 1. No person occupying any premises, and no person owning any occupied premises, within two hundred (200) feet of a dwelling, shall permit or maintain on any such premises any growth of weeds, grass or other rank vegetation to a greater height than twelve (12) inches on the average, or any accumulation of dead weeds, grass or brush. No such occupant or owner shall cause, suffer or allow poisonous plants, or plants detrimental to health, to grow on any premises in such manner that any part of such ivy, rag weed, or other poisonous or harmful weed shall extend upon, overhang or border any public place, or allow seed, pollen or other poisonous particles or emanations therefrom to be carried through the air into any public place.

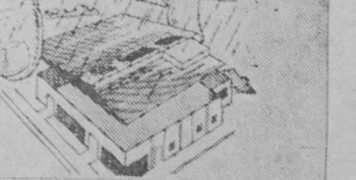
