

TBYC Set to Host International Lightning Class Regatta

More than 500 persons are expected to attend the International Lightning Championship Regatta to be held on Tawas Bay September 3-10, it was announced today by Ralph Meyers, commodore of the Tawas Bay Yacht Club. This figure includes sailors, their families and guests.

Meyers said that the total number of persons attending the races will be swelled by large numbers of spectators, who are already reserving accommodations at local hotels, motels and resorts.

Clarence McMullen, who has charge of reservations, said that 72 Lightning class boats from all over the United States had been

registered as of Tuesday and last minute entries may bring up total registrations to a maximum of 80 boats before the first gun starts qualifying races September 6.

The regatta general chairman, Charles Schreck, feels that all of his committees are functioning properly and he looks forward to a smooth operation in handling this large number of boats and personnel.

Truman Barbier, in charge of measuring, expects to set up sail diagrams on the floor of the community building at East Tawas Wednesday evening (tonight). He and his committee will measure some 160 sails with 15 measurements per sail

for a total of 2,400 measurements.

Measuring boats to qualify in the race will be supervised by William and Marvin Mallon. Thirteen measurements will be made on each boat, including spars, booms, spinnaker poles, etc.

The first big load of parking, measuring and launching will probably be reached Sunday with some of the work being done on Saturday and Monday, said Schreck. All boats will be set for the first race at 9:30 o'clock Tuesday morning.

Vice Commodore Charles Kurtzrock reports that his food committee, consisting of 20 to 30 wives of TBYC members, is set

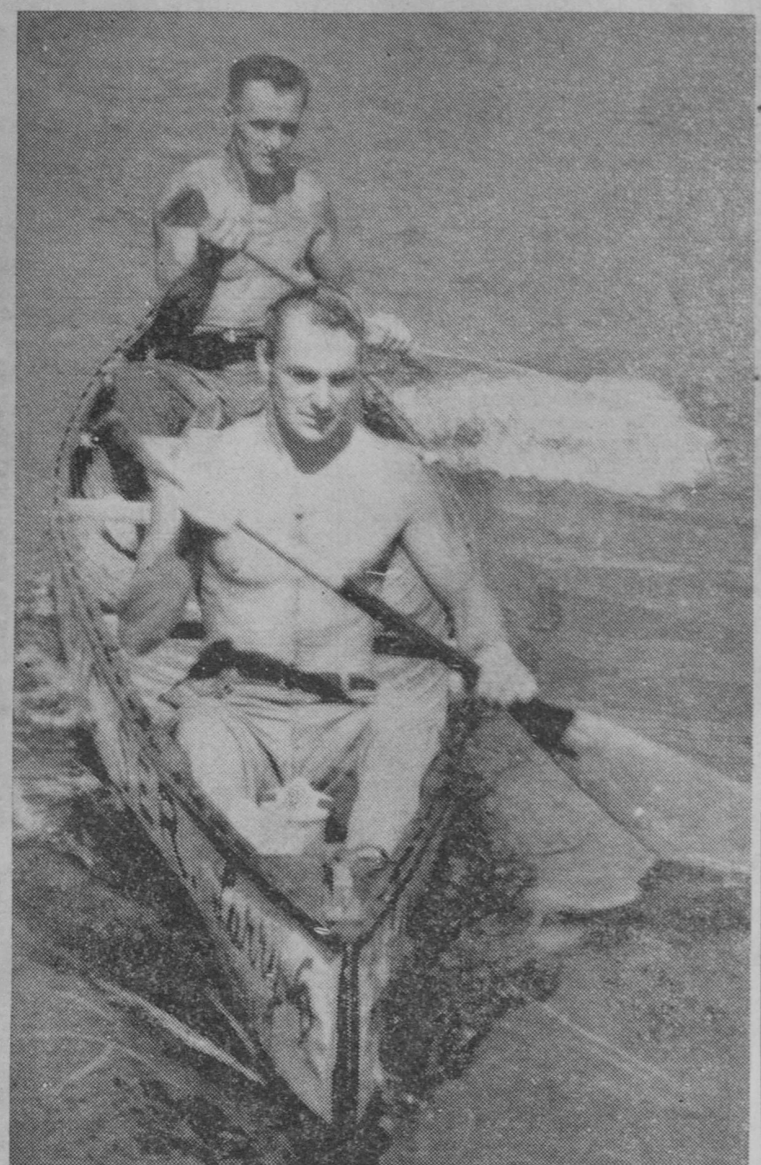
to handle stand-up breakfasts each morning of the race. The big load here will be serving sailors, race committee, officials and guests a quick noon lunch.

No evening meals are planned at the club, said Kurtzrock. Sailors and their families will eat evening meals at local restaurants.

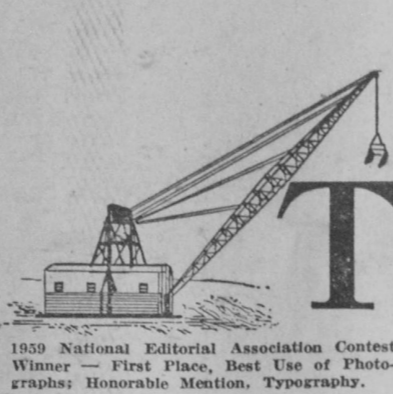
Only planned evening activity at the clubhouse during the regatta will be a German fun night Wednesday, September 7.

Plans for Iosco Blood Bank Outlined at Meet Monday

Seventy-four persons attended a meeting Monday night at Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas, during which plans for Iosco County's soon-to-be organized Red Cross blood bank were outlined.

Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller, chairman of the local chapter of the American Red Cross, announced that the first blood bank unit will be here in mid-October and is to be located in both the Tawas and Oscoda areas.

To be successful, the blood bank must have a minimum of 125 donors for each area. The Iosco unit will try for a total of 180 donors in each, because some will be rejected.

"Ventures of this type require

much help from many people," stated Louis Awalt, chairman of the Iosco blood program.

Sister Evangela, who is in charge of the laboratory at Tawas Hospital, said that during her six years here, there have been 1,764 donors. "Probably twice as many people offered blood, but had to be rejected for some reason," she commented. "The hospital has had to appeal for blood often during emergencies and when such an occurrence happens at night, it is often difficult to obtain donors."

Dr. Joseph Venier of the regional blood center, Lansing, said that the Iosco County unit will be the 23rd in the Lansing center which serves 55 hospitals. During 1959, the center collected 64,000 pints of blood. Most deliveries were made by bus.

A resident of a county served by the blood bank will have service anywhere needed, if someone advises the local chapter of this need.

Blood is very perishable and can be stored only 21 days. Out-dated blood is used for plasma, gamma globulin and fibrinogen.

Age limit for donors is from 18 to 59, with parental consent necessary if the donor is under 21 years of age.

The laboratory or administration charge at Tawas Hospital is to be \$12.50 for each pint. This is the average charge in this blood center area. There is never any charge for the blood furnished by the Red Cross.

A child must be a year old before a mother may give

blood. Most hospitals allow three months for blood replacement.

It is a Red Cross rule to replace blood on a pint-for-pint basis. Some hospitals require two pints to replace the first pint used, but Tawas Hospital will operate on a one-for-one basis.

The attorney general's office ruled that a proposition could not be placed before voters in a primary election. It would be necessary to take such a vote at a general or special election.

The township had received permission from the state liquor control commission to place on the ballot a question of selling liquor by the glass in Reno Township. The proposition was approved, 67-51.

Oscoda-AuSable Petition Supervisors for New City

Petitions asking the incorporation of portions of Oscoda and AuSable Townships as a home rule city are under study of a board of supervisors' committee.

The petitions, bearing about 140 signatures, were turned over to the board last Wednesday by an Oscoda-AuSable committee that has been studying the question for some years.

If the petitions are found valid, voters in the area will vote on whether to incorporate as a home rule city and to choose a charter-study committee of nine persons at the November 8 general election.

The proposed city, which would become Iosco County's largest with 3,202 persons, would

run for six miles along the Lake Huron shoreline from Jordanville subdivision on the north to a mile south of the Johnson Road.

It would extend a mile west of the lake.

Iosco County Prosecutor Paul Harvey and Iosco County Clerk George Prescott are studying the petitions to see if they comply with Michigan statutes.

They are to report back to the supervisors at the September session. Voters would be required to vote on the proposed city charter at a spring election, should incorporation be approved in November.

The state requires a population of 500 persons per square mile for cities.

Annual Canoe Marathon Starts Saturday Night

About 50 canoes from all over the United States and Canada are expected to shove off from Grayingling at 8:30 p. m. Saturday and paddle non-stop to Oscoda in the 14th annual world's canoe championship race on the AuSable River.

Veteran observers believe that this year's event will be one of the best ever with all of the leading contestants in top racing form.

Considered to be the ultimate test of endurance and skill, the grueling grind takes more than 16 hours of continuous paddling. Four of the top teams to enter are Ralph Sawyer of Oscoda and Irvin McGuire of Mikado, Steve Kolonich and Larry Kindell of National City, Edward Wojahn of Tawas City and Sanford McGuire of Mikado, Al and LeRoy Widing of Holly.

Sawyer, who won the race last year while paddling with Jerry Wagner, may prove to be the "dark-horse" this year with his new partner. However, the team drew 21st starting position and will have their work cut out for them.

Kolonich and Kindell drew 12th starting position and, although they were forced to drop out before the finish of last year's race, are figured as the team to beat this year.

Al and LeRoy Widing, who with Kolonich and Kindell, dominated Michigan racing this year, are up among the top contenders and drew fourth starting position.

an canoe teams will be Wojahn and his new partner, Sanford McGuire. This team drew second starting position and have the youth and stamina to make things interesting.

The advance registrations for position drawing last week was considered normal at 23 teams.

Jack Kolka of Bay City and his partner, Bob Mason of Saginaw, drew the coveted first position. Team names were drawn by Bonnie Bourchers, "Miss Grayling," and Susan Flanders, "Miss Oscoda-AuSable."

The race is co-sponsored by the Oscoda-AuSable Volunteer Fire Department and the Crawford County Chamber of Commerce.

Open Airport Bids Sept. 15 at Lansing

Bids for construction of a new Iosco County Airport will be opened September 15 at Lansing, it was announced Monday by Henry Oates, chairman of the aeronautics committee of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors.

Oates said that he had received a grant agreement last Thursday from the federal government. Cost of constructing the new facilities will be financed through federal, state and county funds.

The federal government is to pay approximately 50 percent of the \$31,000 total cost of construction. The remainder will be shared equally by the state and county.

Oates said that in all probability, contracts would be let and the grant agreement executed at the next meeting of the board of supervisors, September 21.

He said that it was very likely that work on the new airport would be commenced this fall.

Last week, the county received a deed for the federal property, located northeast of East Tawas off US-23, from the United States Forest Service. The deed was turned over to Mr. Oates by Ranger Joseph Blake of East Tawas.

Federal property for the airport consists of 221 acres. The county purchased an additional 80 acres about one year ago.

Champion Indian dancers will add to the regular ceremonials, contests and thrills of the evening.

The spectacular "battle dance" and battle of the tribes, fought with fireworks and seen only once by the white man, will be included on Sunday night's performance, the season's final presentation of the ceremonials.

This attraction is presented just west of the Tawasages in Huron National Forest, on a huge wooded island stage. Its lighting effects and beauty, with the colorful Indians of many tribes, in their hour and 45 minutes of music, dances, contests, ceremonials and drama, have already received enthusiastic acclaim from people everywhere.

The 2,000 seat amphitheatre includes a rain shelter and there is lighted free parking.

Pointed Out Responsibilities of Grain Handlers

Grain warehousemen, truckers or other persons who buy wheat from farmers have definite responsibilities in connection with the government marketing quota and price-support programs, according to the Iosco County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

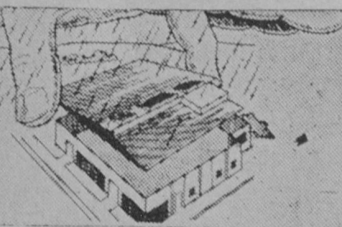
The buyer is liable for the penalty on any wheat purchased

which is not identified as penalty-free. Wheat is normally identified as penalty-free by a marketing card or a marketing certificate. The marketing card—printed in green on white paper for 1960—permits a buyer to purchase without liability all wheat offered by the card owner which was produced on the farm or farms listed on the card. A marketing certificate covers only a stated quantity of wheat which a buyer may purchase from the certificate holder without penalty.

On any wheat not identified as penalty-free, the buyer's responsibility is to collect penalty at the rate of \$1.08 per bushel and remit the money to the ASC office for the county in which the wheat was produced.

All wheat marketing cards have been mailed to producers in Iosco County. Only cards for the 1960 year are to be accepted as evidence of penalty-free wheat by buyers. Cards for prior years are obsolete and are not to be used. If producers have wheat to be marketed which was harvested in prior years, they must obtain a 1960 marketing card from the ASC office in order to have evidence that it is penalty-free wheat.

1,900,000 Children Added to Traffic Flow

Reopening of schools for the fall term will bring nearly 1,900,000 Michigan children into the weekday traffic flow and increased vigilance by motorists to avoid involving them in accidents is urged by Michigan State Police. About one-tenth will be going to school for the first time.

More than 11,000 children under 15 have been killed and injured in each of the last five years in traffic accidents in Michigan, state police figures show.

Last year 85 were killed and 3,464 injured, accounting for 32 percent of the 299 deaths and 57 percent of the 6,160 injured in pedestrian accidents. In addition, 18 bicyclists were killed and 1,562 injured in the same age group.

Because nearly half a million children will be riding rural school buses, motorists are reminded that the two-way stop law requires extra caution to avert mishaps involving the buses and the children getting on or off them, as well as other vehicles affected by the slowing and stopping of buses.

Last year five persons, three of them children, were killed and 239 persons injured in 562 rural school bus and related accidents.

Drivers overtaking or meeting rural school buses must stop when the bus stops to take on or discharge passengers. Vehicle traffic may resume motion when the bus proceeds or on signal from its driver or when the flashing red stop lights on the bus are turned off. In addition, even though the red flasher lights are not operating but the bus stops, other vehicles must stop also.

State police point out that the bus stop law increases the chances for accidents, particularly rear-end collisions, between vehicles slowing and stopping in the traffic stream in compliance with the law.

Rules Changed on Farm Housing Loan Eligibility

Under a recent change in the eligibility requirements for farm housing loans, a farmer who owns a farm that will annually produce for sale or home use at least \$400 worth of commodities may, if he meets other eligibility requirements, be able to obtain a farm housing loan.

Previously, according to Lowell F. Schaeffer, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor for Iosco County, an applicant had to own a farm that would produce a substantial amount of the operator's income.

Farm housing loans are made by the Farmers Home Administration and are used to construct and repair needed farm houses and farm service buildings. Other eligibility requirements for farm housing loans remain unchanged. These requirements are that the applicant lacks the resources needed to obtain credit elsewhere, be a citizen of the United States and have sufficient income from farm and other sources to pay farm operating and family living expenses and meet payment, when due on his debts.

In addition to farm housing loans, the Farmers Home Administration also makes loans for most any other farm purpose to qualified applicants.

Applications for this type of credit may be made at the county office of the Farmers Home Administration located at 216 North Main Street, Standish.

Brownie Service Project Presented to Tawas Hospital

Brownie Troop No. 1365 of Cadillac School, Detroit, presented Tawas Hospital with its service projects made during the winter months. The gifts, a large stuffed teddy bear, a box of suckers decorated in the troop colors and a box of corner book marks, were accepted for the hospital by Sister M. Evangelina.

The presentation was made by Cheryl Suzanne Langley of Detroit, who is vacationing with her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Newell of East Tawas. Cheryl is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. W. Langley of Detroit, who spend their summers here.

The troop, which is composed of seven, eight and nine-year-olds, worked all winter on the projects. They made the teddy bear and book marks and wrapped the suckers especially for the hospital.

Special Parking Permits Issued to Disabled Veterans

Each year the Michigan Department of State issues more than 300 special parking stickers to honorably discharged veterans with service-connected disabilities.

Under this Michigan law, veterans who "possess material incapacity for ambulation" are issued serially numbered certificates for the personal use of the handicapped person.

According to Secretary of State James M. Hare, this car sticker permits special parking privileges throughout Michigan. Among the few exceptions in the act is that which prohibits parking in fire lanes or on main thoroughfares where there is heavy morning and afternoon traffic. Misuse of this privilege by persons other than those to whom the sticker is issued is a misdemeanor.

In 1957, this veteran's law was amended to accommodate non-veterans who were incapacitated for ambulation.

Qualified veterans and other disabled persons may write to the special license section of the Michigan Department of State for information and application forms.

Wild Jet Sends Air Crew Into Gulf of Mexico

Two members of the 445th Fighter-Interceptor Squadron successfully ejected from their F-101B Voodoo after it became uncontrollable in flight Wednesday afternoon, August 17.

The aircraft and crew were part of a group that had been deployed to Tyndall AFB, Florida, for weapons firing training.

While participating in a training mission, 1Lt. James M. Glenn, pilot, and Capt. Manfred R. Groves, Radar Intercept officer, found themselves in trouble when their plane became uncontrollable. After deciding it was impossible to recover, they ejected safely over the Gulf of Mexico about 50 miles southeast of Tyndall which is located near Panama City, Florida.

The only injuries sustained were rather severe bruises. After inflating and boarding their emergency life rafts, they were picked up within a matter of minutes by rescue helicopters from Tyndall.

Lieutenant Glenn and Captain Groves were flown back to Wurtsmith after being released from the hospital at Tyndall.

One of the first activities on their agenda upon return to duty was to throw a party to express their personal appreciation to A1C Burl D. Wagoner and A3C Frank M. Dorrion of the 4026th Field Maintenance Squadron Parachute Shop. These are the two

men who packed the chutes that brought Lieutenant Glenn and Captain Groves safely to earth after they ejected.

Both Glenn and Groves are married and live in the Oscoda area with their families.

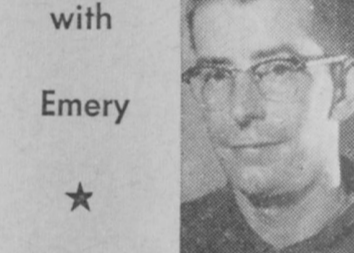

Paul Beyer of Tawas City reports very nice catches of good size bass taken while wading and using spinning tackle along the shoreline of Lake Huron between Alabaster and White Stone Point area. The bass have been in very shallow water among the large rocks in search of minnows. The best baits at this time are spoons and night crawlers.

Pike fishing in Tawas Bay has been gradually picking up and every evening there are several boats trolling for the "northerners" in the vicinity of the coast guard boathouse and channel buoys.

About the time the fall hunting seasons draw near, there is always a lot of talk and criticism on youngsters with guns and gun safety in general. If you have a youngster about to take up hunting as a sport and means of recreation, it will be wise to spend many hours of teaching him the basic fundamentals of a gun prior to his first venture into the fields during the small game seasons. The "beginner" should know and realize the capabilities of the gun and how severe its misuse. The slightest human error can cause personal injury or a fatal accident. The beginner could also attend a small-arms training class or school, if they are available, as this would give him the chance for guidance and instructions in the use of small-arms on indoor ranges and field conditions.

Pheasant production rose 14 percent above last year in the Lower Peninsula according to the summer's mail carrier survey between July 25 and August 6. The counts are reliable guides in previewing Michigan's pheasant kill and reveal that brood production was up 25 percent from last year in the Thumb area, 23 percent in Western Michigan, 20 percent in the central part of Michigan and only nine percent in Southern Michigan. In the southwestern part of the state, it dropped 13 percent. The ring-neck production also dropped 40 percent in Gladwin, Ooscota, Lake, Nowaygo and Oocana Counties. However, these five counties normally only represent about two percent of the state's total pheasant population.

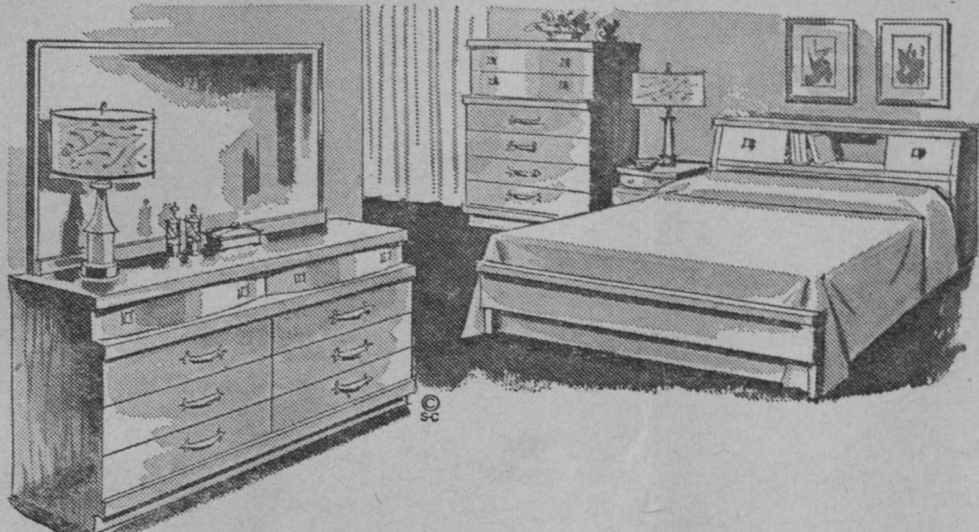
