W-P School Voters KO Proposed Millage Hike

Voters of the Whittemore-Prescott Area School District defeated a proposal Monday to increase operating millage by two mills. With 547 ballots cast, the measure failed by a 382 to 165 vote.

Increased revenue would have been used to provide a lighted athletic field, a large parking lot and paved driveway at the high school.

It would have also supplied funds for one additional teacher to work in both elementary and secondary schools.

The school plays its home football games at Arenac Eastern's lighted field in Twining. The proposed tax levy was expected to provide funds for completion by next fall.

The board of education asked for a tax levy on the years of 1961-62.

Goodfellows to Sell Papers Here Saturday

"No empty stockings this Christmas" is the motto of this year's Goodfellow drive of the Tawas Kiwanis Club. Kiwanis newboys will be on the streets of the Tawas Saturday to sell copies of the 15th annual Goodfellow Edition.

About \$1,000 was collected in last year's drive, reports Dr. E. C. Silverthorn, chairman, and \$900 was used to purchase clothing and Christmas baskets for children, as well as furnishing glasses to needy youngsters throughout the year.

Some of the projects supported by the Kiwanis Club include donations to the March of Dimes, Knot Hole League, annual Kids' Day at Wurtsmith Air Force Base and Boy Scout drive.

Principal project during the year was assisting the landscaping project at Tawas Hospital.

Kiwanis newboys will be wearing new aprons this year when they take to the streets Saturday morning at 9 o'clock. Headquarters for paper sales is at Dr. Silverthorn's office in Tawas City and the Holland Hotel at East Tawas.

G. Myles Again Named to Head Hospital Board

George W. Myles of Tawas City has been re-elected president of the Tawas Hospital Association.

At a recent election of officers, John Watkins of East Tawas was named vice president and Judge H. Read Smith, secretary-treasurer.

Other members of the board of directors are Maynard VanOrnum, Lloyd G. McKay Jr., E. D. Jacques, Elmer Werth, John B. Pitts, Charles A. Pinkerton and Gordon Huck.

Dr. L. A. LaPorte, chief of the medical staff at Tawas Hospital, is an ex officio member.

According to its annual statement, the hospital association had expenditures of \$7,992.34 since April 1959. Most of the money went toward improvement of grounds and landscaping at the hospital.

Additional land was purchased from the City of Tawas City for \$200.

Cash receipts of \$7,113.14 came through \$5,000 from foundations, \$88 from memorials, \$1,830 from individual gifts and a \$195.14 balance.

In addition to cash gifts, several contractors gave credit on their statements which, including the gift of all the top soil by one of the area's large industries, enabled the association to complete such a large portion of the project.

Improvement to the hospital grounds will again be the associations principal project during 1961.

Jury Acquits George Wood of Embezzlement

A one-time pulpwood cutter was acquitted of an embezzlement charge in Iosco County Circuit Court Friday by a jury composed of 10 men and two women.

George Wood, who had been charged with unlawfully driving away an automobile from Orville Leslie and Sons, Incorporated, was found not guilty by the jury.

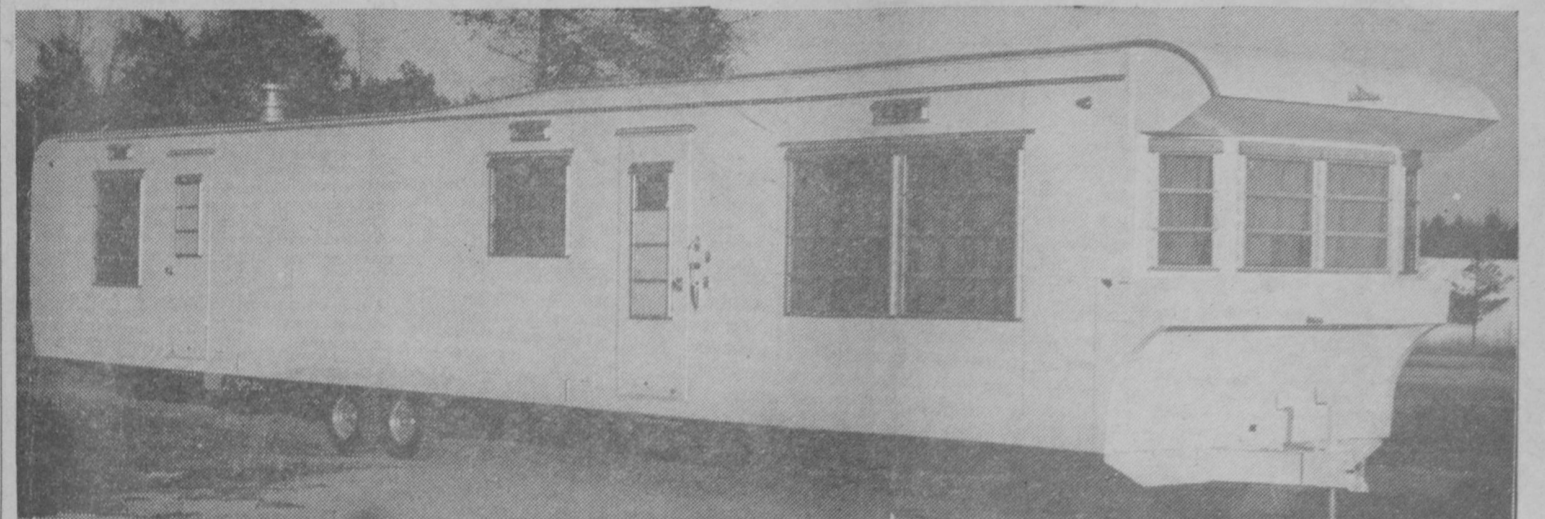
Wood had previously served 30 days in the county jail after pleading guilty to a no account check charge and was placed on two years probation by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

Owners of the Tawas City automobile dealership testified that Wood had driven an automobile away from their establishment before the purchase agreement was completed. He was apprehended in Iowa and returned to this county to face the charge.

Wood testified that he had been drinking the day he was making negotiations to purchase the car. He told the court that after he arrived in Iowa with his wife and children he attempted to telephone the Tawas City automobile dealer.

Many New Innovations Incorporated in 1961 Anderson

New 1961 Andersons Being Readied for National Mobile Home Show

Anderson Coach Company's new 1961 model mobile homes will make their public debut at the Mobile Home Manufacturers Association's national show to be held January 9-14.

The new 1961 Andersons, now being completed at the East Tawas plant, will be one of many mobile homes on display at the Kentucky Exposition Center, Louisville, Kentucky.

Donald Miller, manager of Huron Sales Division, Anderson's national sales outlet, said this week that two models would be shown at the national show. One will be a 50-foot-long swing-bed room model, while the other will be a 55-foot-long two bedroom coach. Both are 10 feet wide.

President James Guest said today that both of these models will incorporate refinements and modifications which Anderson engineers have developed during the past year.

As usual this year, a prototype mobile home was manufactured at the plant in East Tawas. New ideas in design and manufacture were incorporated in this model and eventual restyling develop-

ments in the 1961 Anderson were adopted from this coach.

As can be seen by the photograph which accompanies this article, the major exterior change in the 1961 Anderson is in the redesigned front end.

The new look for 1961 are two windows which are set at an angle to give the coach greater glass area, a roomier effect and allows entry of more light.

Because of the craftsmanship in these mobile homes produced at East Tawas and Logan, Utah, the Anderson is considered to be the "Cadillac" among quality coaches in the mobile home field. Anderson utilized dielectric wood welding in almost all of its components. Bolting glue makes the weld stronger than the wood itself and the company is noted for producing the most rigid mo-

mobile home floor unit in the industry.

Anderson was one of the first manufacturers to recognize the superiority of the pre-named aluminum exterior. Painted on both sides at extremely high temperatures, this exterior resists fading and can be considered a lifetime protection. A choice of several exterior colors, either two-tone or single color are offered.

Three choices of window styles are offered: Thermopane picture windows and awning type opening windows; Miami-type windows; jalousies. All window arrangements are frost free. Starting with the genuine hand-finished plywoods, Anderson decorators have again provided a special look or feel which is not duplicated in any

other mobile home. This is the Anderson look that has become famous in the mobile home industry.

Earlier this month, Anderson announced its new swing-room which provides additional floor space to the living room. It had been tested for more than six months in the field.

The swing-room, which provides more than 35 feet of additional carpeted floor space in the form of an angled bay area on one side of the living room, is hinged at the floor.

Make Plans for Carnival at S. Valley

A committee of three persons was selected Monday night to formulate plans for the annual Silver Valley winter sports carnival to be held February 4-6.

Named by President L. G. McKay Jr. were John Pinter, Robert Donley and O. E. Ostrander. They are to submit a tentative program at next week's meeting.

Included in their study will be the possibility of holding a queen's contest, a winter sports dance and annual fish fry. This year's fish fry will be for both men and women. In previous years, it had been "stag" only.

A work detail will be held at the winter sports park in Huron National Forest this Saturday and Sunday. Those persons who wish to "work out" the cost of a season ticket at the ski area may do so.

Work yet to be completed includes stringing ropes on the expert tows and installing an engine on the beginner's tow. Between 10 and 12 persons were on hand to assist last Saturday and Sunday.

Toboggan slides are to be iced the first week in January. Before this can be done, work must be completed on repairing the bridge over Silver Creek and getting a return slide in shape.

It was announced that the East Detroit Lutheran group will hold its annual caravan to Tawas and Silver Valley on January 29.

Bateson's Petition to be Heard Today by Judge

A hearing on a motion to dissolve and vacate a temporary restraining order against a building contractor at Wurtsmith Air Force Base is to come before Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller this morning (Wednesday).

Attorneys for J. W. Bateson Construction Company, general contractor for construction of Capehart Housing Units at Wurtsmith, stated in their motion that a bill of complaint entered by Catsman Company, Incorporated, contained no allegations of irreparable injury to the subcontractor if such temporary relief was not ordered.

Bateson's motion also stated that the restraining order of the court also imposed excessive injury to them. When the order was signed, Bateson claimed that the delay in closing the government contract was costing them in excess of \$500 a day.

At a show cause hearing on December 2, Judge Miller signed a temporary restraining order against Bateson which stopped them from removing equipment or records from the air force installation in Iosco County.

In lieu of the restraining order, Judge Miller stipulated that Bateson could remove its equipment by depositing a cash bond of \$1,250,000 in a Michigan bank. However, he stated that the restraining order against removal of records would stand, regardless of whether or not the bond was deposited.

Catsman, a subcontractor for Bateson in constructing 618 housing units at Wurtsmith and 475 units at Kincheole Air Force Base in Chippewa County, petitioned the court for the restraining order. The Flint firm charged J. W.

Bateson, J. T. Hubbell, O. A. Fountain and several so-called "dummy" corporations owned by the general contractor, with fraudulently conspiring to obtain subcontracts for the completion of housing units.

Catsman's bill of complaint said that Bateson had obtained subcontracts so low as to threaten subcontractors with imminent insolvency. Its bill stated that a direct consequence of a conspiracy and fraudulent misrepresentation, it had lost \$669,757 on the two contracts.

The Flint firm also charged that Bateson was indebted to them in the amount of \$300,000.

Located West of Whittemore—

Chamabi is North's Largest Beef Operation

"This was nothing but a hill of trees and brush when the project was first started—as far as it is known, it is now probably one of the largest beef cattle operations in Northern Michigan."

Speaking was Richard F. Glancy, engineer and general manager for Chamabi Ranch, Incorporated, who described this fast-growing cattle operation located in Iosco County west of Whittemore.

Glancy, a former Bay Cityan and a graduate of Michigan State University, came to Iosco as company engineer for Straits Aggregate, Incorporated, Tawas City, parent company of Chamabi.

Since last February, more than 500 acres of brush land have been cleared at Chamabi by heavy earth moving equipment. Brush clearing work is to continue throughout the winter and preparing 300 acres for seeding of pasture land will commence next spring. When completed, the ranch will have more than 1,000 acres of pasture.

Chamabi's cattle herd presently consists of 730 Hereford and black Angus feeder calves, plus 110 Angus heifers in its new

brood herd, 111 Herefords in its old brood herd and 11 bulls—nine Herefords and two Angus, all of record performance.

To build its feeder herd, Chamabi purchased calves from herds in New Mexico and Virginia, plus 58 head acquired at the recent West Branch auction of the Northeastern Michigan Hereford Calf Association.

Calves which weigh about 400 pounds when they go into the feed lot will come out at a sleek 1,300 pounds or more when ready for market. The feeding program requires from seven to 10 months.

Glancy said that the ranch's feed lot had reached its capacity and that he was now in the process of building the brood herd to meet the feed lot requirements. Chamabi, differing from most other beef operators in this part of the state, has its own brood herd which will produce calves to put in the feed lot.

About 10 acres of land are devoted to the feed lot. A new barn constructed during the past summer, utilizing Osmove-treated lumber, is 330 feet long and 40 feet wide. It is of pole type

construction with a clear span. The barnyard is of concrete to facilitate cleaning.

With a feeding program designed to pack two or more pounds of beef on each calf daily, Chamabi has two 70-foot high silos for storage of corn. The new

silos, each 26 feet in diameter, presently contain about 30,000 bushels of corn. Daily requirements of corn for the feeding program is 4½ tons.

Prof. Hugh Henderson of MSU's animal husbandry department worked with Glancy in de-

veloping the feed lot and feeding program. County Agent Marvin Davenport assisted with preparations for the pasture seeding program while Richard Rose of the United States Soil Conservation Service assisted in planning

EDITORIAL—

JUSTICE --- A Parable

Many years ago in a far off land, there was a remote village called Sawat, in which the people labored diligently in the peaceful pursuits through which they earned a livelihood.

The people were protected by a police force which was skilled in its craft and attended dutifully to keeping peace in the community. Justice was administered in a temple of justice by a judge and occasionally by a jury summoned from normal pursuits to sit in judgment of a neighbor.

And it came to pass that several erring peasants, through drunkenness and thievery, were apprehended by the police and brought to the bar of justice. Juries of their peers were summoned to hear and judge of their wrong-doings.

The jurors, being solemnly advised of their duties and responsibilities by a learned judge, did wilfully turn a deaf ear to law and duty and did shed many tears for the unfortunate, misguided and irresponsible souls of their erring neighbors and did return them to the bosoms of their families or their companions in drink and thievery, as the erring peasants might choose to go.

The news of such goings-on did travel far in the peaceful communes near the village of Sawat and those, whose intentions were larcenous, or whose habits turned to drunkenness and thievery, did find the village exceedingly to their liking; for the police, who were diligent in their pursuit of wickedness, had become discouraged and disheartened.

The temple of justice, where once right had been honored, was now open and empty for it was there that justice had been mocked and ridiculed.

And the peaceful and peace-loving village knew peace no more, for lawlessness flourished and honest men had no defense.

UNIQUE DECORATION

I wish to register a formal complaint in regard to the painting of the Federal Building in East Tawas on a Sunday, namely, December 4, 1960. This is certainly not in keeping with the policy of our federal government as contained in our motto, "In God We Trust," and in the phrase in our pledge of allegiance, "one nation under God."

In addition, it is illegal under the provisions of Michigan Law section 18.851 which reads, "No person shall keep open his shop, warehouse, or workhouse, or shall do any manner of labor . . . on the first day of the week."

We trust that you will take this as a constructive criticism designed to avoid future situations of this nature which are embarrassing to our country.

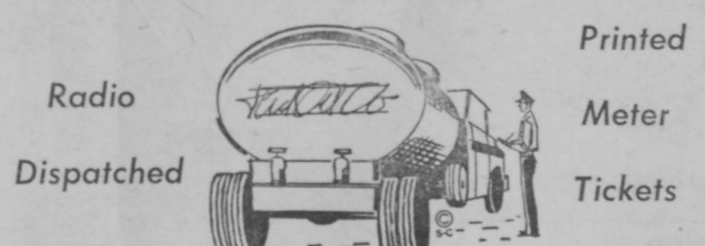

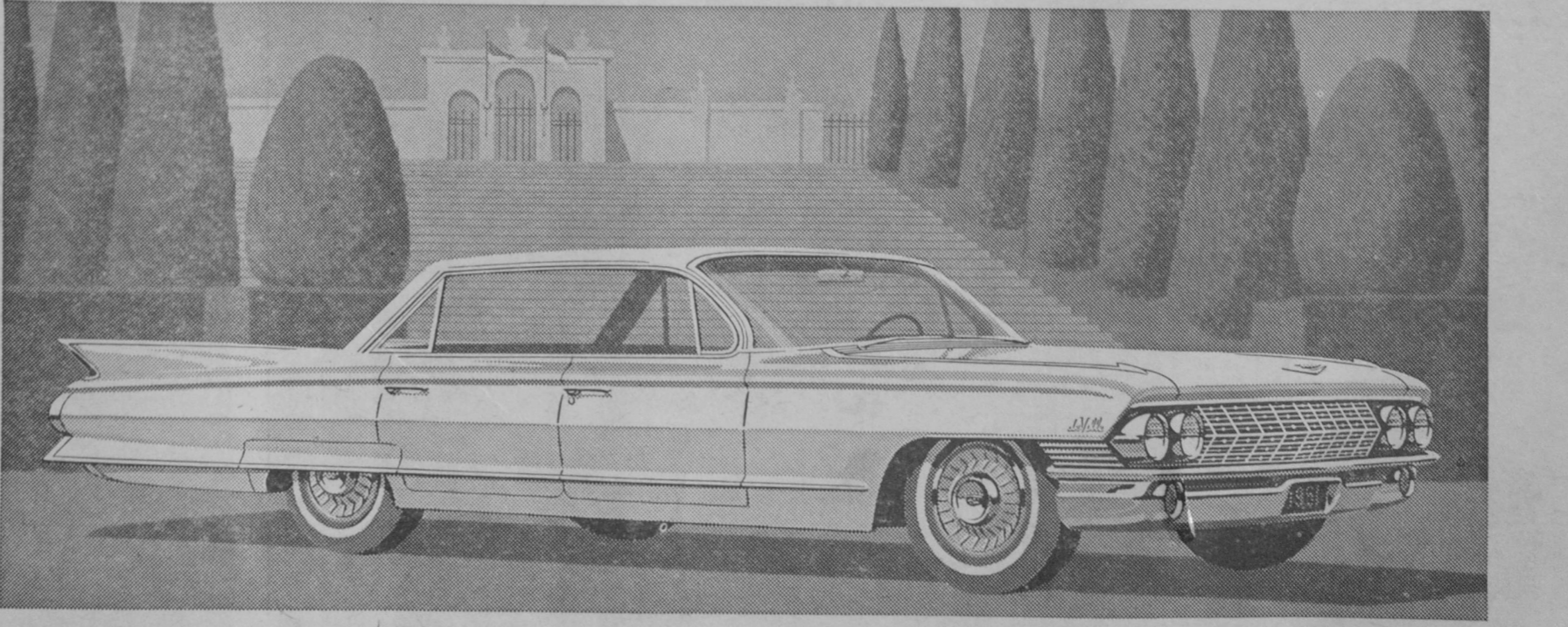

Consumers to Feel New Sales Tax Bite Beginning Jan. 1

Michigan consumers will feel the bite of a new sales tax increase beginning New Year's Day. As yet, Michigan retailers have not reached an agreement on how to collect the four percent tax, but it appears as though consumers will start paying the first penny of tax when the purchase price reaches 13 cents. Under the current three percent tax merchants start collecting the first penny of tax on a 17-cent purchase. A second penny is paid on a purchase of 50 cents and a third penny is added at 84 cents. This bracketing has been established by retailers and is not included in the current law. No attempt was made by the state legislature to establish new brackets. Representatives of major retail associations of Michigan met in Lansing last week to discuss a new bracket system. A final meeting will be held next week. The sales tax actually is levied on the retailers, who in turn are allowed to pass it on to the customer. It is up to the retailer to decide at what point he adds each penny of tax. Five or six different bracket systems are presently being used in the state. The retail associations hope to come up with a uniform system, so that both the retailers and the public will understand it. Purchases completed, although not necessarily paid for, prior to January 1 will not be taxed at a higher rate.

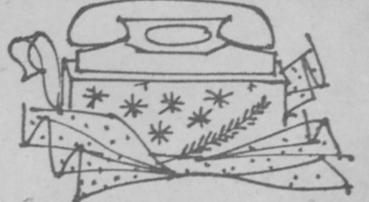

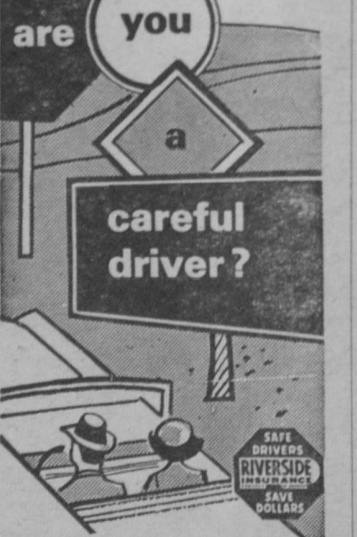

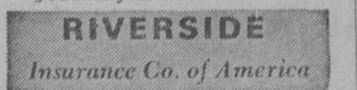

TREE SAFETY TIPS

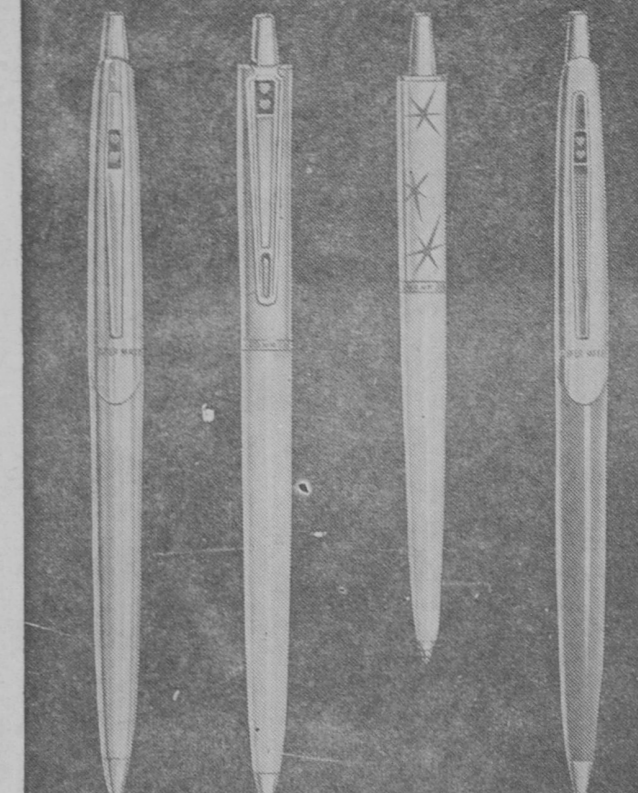

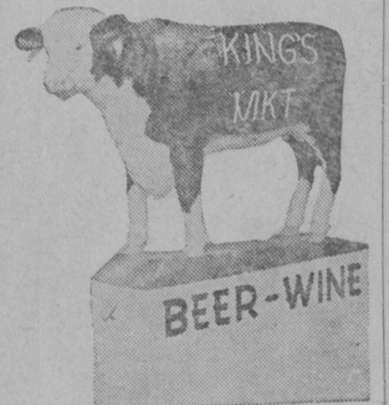

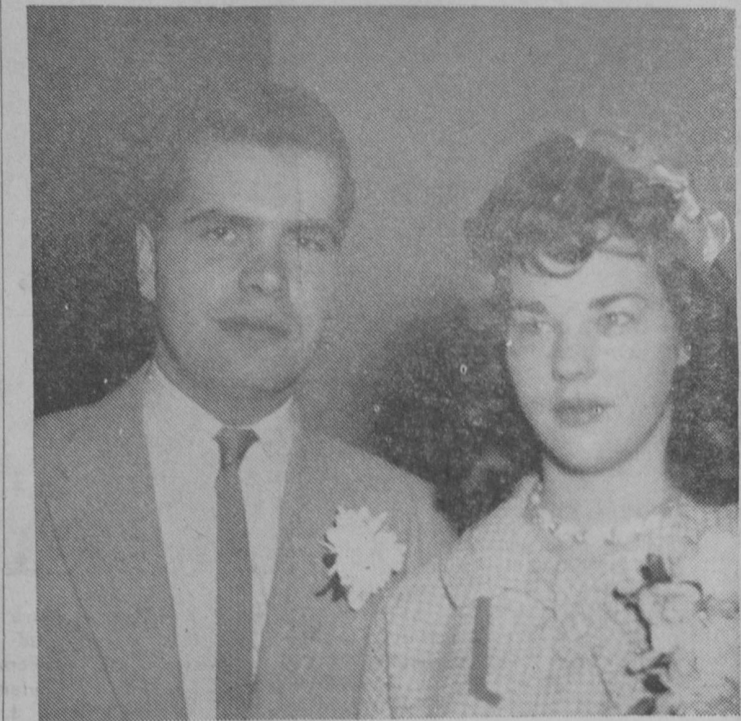

The third quarter proved to be the undoing of the Eagles as Suminski was benched with four fouls and did not see action again until the fourth quarter. The Cardinal offense took good advantage of his absence by hitting for 17 points while holding the Eagles to eight.

With Suminski back in the game for fourth quarter action, the Eagles took on new life and Suminski's jump shot put the visitors ahead, 51-50, with three minutes, 20 seconds to go.

This lead was to be short-lived, however, as Center Ray Pagel dropped in a key bucket.

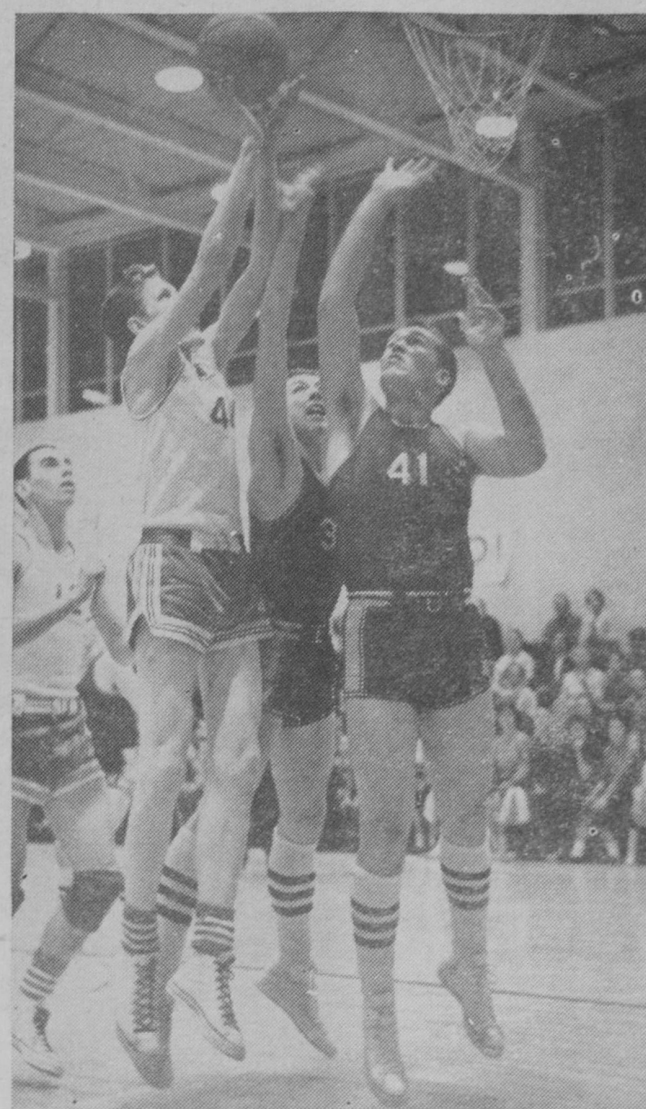
On a one-and-one foul, Ed Myers made good on both shots from the charity lane and Rex Gibson converted a costly technical foul called against the Eagles.

Although Suminski topped both teams with 27 points, the outstanding player on the court for the night was Armstead. He led his Cardinal mates with 24 points and roamed the floor with good passing and defense work.

Two other W-P players hit in double figures. Gibson totaled 12 points while Ed Mervyn had 11. Humerickhouse was second high for the losers with 14 points.

The Little Cards won their second game of the season by trimming the Arenac Eastern JV, 56-23. Bailey topped Whittemore-Prescott scoring with 15 points while Hollenbeck's eight points were high for the losers.

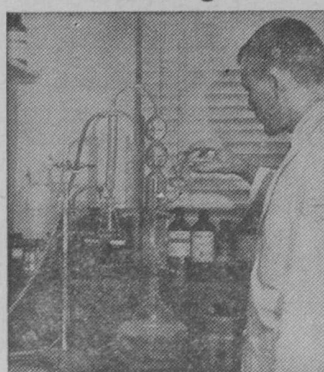
New Enlistees Allowed 15-Day Holiday Leave

Says Suggestion is Basic Tool Of Communism

(Third in a series of five articles by Don Kinsey, Michigan Farm Bureau representative.)

Emotionally - Charged Suggestion

The basic tool is suggestion—powerful forms of suggestion, backed by skill in argument, appealing to the known attitudes and values of the people.

Under what conditions are people most suggestible? There are a number of mental states in which this happens:

1. A suggested action is more likely to occur when it is reinforced by known and established beliefs, attitudes or ideas. So—appeal to the morals, the sentiments or the prejudices of the people. Tie your ideas positively to these known elements. Twist them to suit your purposes.

2. Create confusion of thought. A confused person seeks a way out of his confusion.

3. People also seek a way of escape from the tensions of fear and worry. This makes them suggestible. Offer the way out.

4. Reduce their ability to criticize. A person is suggestible only when he is not capable of critical thought—when he cannot counter the suggestion with opposing facts or arguments. Immaturity, lack of proper information or lack of training and experience in critical thinking can all create a favorable climate for suggestion.

5. Fatigue, drowsiness, day-dreaming—even a state of wishful thinking heightens suggestibility. Find the key to the wish and you have a powerful tool.

6. Social pressure by the group strongly and positively reinforces a suggested idea for acceptance.

7. An idea can be "pounded in" by constant repetition, reinforced by appeal to the person's wants, hopes, desires, fears, etc.

"Use such tools properly—as your strategy dictates—and you can control the masses of the world," said the Communist psychologists.

Making "Bombs" From American Values

For the United States, Communist psychologists catalogued the effective "triggers" to attitudes, beliefs and popular reaction. In any society certain words and actions have powerful values as triggers to thought and action. These word-action triggers have emotionally-charged impact. Sometimes they are positively charged (faiths, sentiments), sometimes negatively charged (prejudices, hatreds, etc.).

Pick most any American. He has been raised with values and beliefs akin to Christianity. He has established ideas of truth, justice, fairness, brotherhood, peace, democracy, right and wrong—the list to almost endless.

Twist these ideas to fit your arguments. Trigger his own attitudes to work against his thought systems. Drive a wedge of thought and crack the foundations of his traditional ideals and moral standards. Pick the younger generations who are less firmly set in the standards of the old society—the youth, the students. They are more excitable and impressionable.

There you have it in a nutshell—the key to the Communist weapon—mass brainwashing for the people of the world and the Americans of today and tomorrow. Americans of 1976 are only 200 years from the Declaration of Independence. Our freedom and our greatness may be of short duration.

Northeastern Michigan has been recognized for years as a potentially good area for beef cattle production and the Prescott family pioneered beef ranching in Eastern Ogemaw County.

The county agent said that a recent survey of farm land in Iosco County indicated that the area now encompassing the Chamabi Ranch would be perfect for pasture and hay crops. He said that cost of land in this area was much lower than in higher populated downstate areas.

"The recent trend has been toward large beef cattle operations in this area, such as this new one," said Davenport. "Certain acres are being taken out of production and there will be fewer farms, while new land is being cleared."

Two years ago, Iosco County had only 900 cows in its beef brood herd. Today, it is estimated that there are more than 1,300 beef cows.

Not only has opening of this new ranch created additional employment here through men needed in its clearing operations, but area farmers have promise of obtaining a market outlet for locally grown corn, hay, grains and

straw. Corn being fed at present was purchased at Linwood, Pinconning and Standish.
