In speaking of his moments of of litigation were different than he had anticipated.

"I expected the problems to be primarly with the containment of the 'warfare' between rival attorneys," he said. "That does occur, but the problem of the court arises more frequently from the opposite situation.'

Quoting Federal Judge John Feikens, who said "There is need for intelligent conflict in the trial of lawsuits," Judge Miller said that this need had been evident in his first year's experience.

"My problem has primarily involved where to intervene in a trial to balance what, at that time, seems an unequal battle. 'Hands off' is the repeated admonition passed on by veteran judges. This is extremely difficult," he commented.

"Our system, however, has at its very foundation the element of competition between attorneys (See JUDGE, page 8.)
