## 2 Building Permits OK'd; Supervisors Ask Pay Hike

Two building applications were approved by the department of public works, it was reported at Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council.

An application by Elmer Burrell for construction of a new home in North Park Acres Subdivision was approved. This was for a 64 by 26 residence on Sunset Drive. Estimated cost was \$12,000.

This was Burrell's second application thus far this year for new construction in North Park Acres. In January, a permit was approved for a new \$15,000 brick and wood dwelling.

The other application approved was for William G. Murray, 109 Oak Street, remodel home with aluminum siding. Estimated cost was \$1,000.

In other business, no action was taken on a requested \$50 salary increase for Tawas City's three supervisors, Clement Stephan, Fred Brabant and Clarence Everett. All salaries of city officers are to be studied by the finance committee for the coming year and a report is to be made at a future meeting.

It was recommended that Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz be instructed to write a letter to Frank Wilkusi to have him remove lumber and logs from First Avenue right-of-way near his mill. This was to facilitate opening an access way to the house adjoining his property.

The council authorized erection of a stop sign on Wheeler Street at the Detroit and Mackinac Railway crossing.

A progress report from Sargent Construction Company was approved for payment of \$19,000. The council approved extension of time on the contract to June 15 in order that landscaping and fences may be constructed at the sewer disposal plant under more favorable weather conditions.

## Funeral Services Today for Former Tawas City Mayor

Alfred M. Boomer, former resident and one time mayor of Tawas City, died Friday, January 29, at Largo, Florida, where he and Mrs. Boomer had been spending the winter. Mr. Boomer had been in poor health for several years. The body was brought to the Moffatt Funeral Home Tuesday where funeral services will be held this afternoon (Wednesday) at 2 o'clock. The Rev. Charles Mercer will officiate. Interment will be in the Tawas City Cemetery where last Masonic rites will be given.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Boomer, Mr. Boomer was born December 12, 1890, at Tawas City. In 1914, he married the former Miss Edna Abbott of Wilber Township. He had been a building contractor at Tawas City until 1942 when he and Mrs. Boomer moved to Midland where he was employed by the Dow Chemical Company. He retired in 1955.

While at Tawas City, Mr. Boomer took an active part in civic affairs and had served on the city council and as mayor. He was a member of the Masonic and Odd Fellow Lodges.

Surviving are his wife; a son, Clifford of Midland; six grandchildren; two brothers, James of Tawas City and Ralph of East Tawas, and five sisters, Mrs. Esther Curtis of Tampa, Florida, Mrs. Edith Williams of St. Petersburg, Florida, Mrs. Azenith Matthews of Miami, Florida, Mrs. Marjorie Gilbow of California and Mrs. Dorothy Kramer of Birmingham.

# ANDERSON COACH STRIKE SETTLED

## Winter Sports Carnival Set for This Week-End

## Some Workers May be Called Back Today

The nearly six-month-old Anderson Coach Company strike came to an end last Friday when a negotiating committee representing members of Local 2539, AFL-CIO, accepted the company's latest wage offer. Acceptance of the order was ratified by a general vote of the workers Sunday afternoon, 66 men voting for acceptance and 10 voted against the proposal.

Anderson Coach Company's latest offer gave the workers a 10-cent-an-hour wage increase, boosting the wages of production workers to an hourly base rate of \$2.05. Maintenance workers and watchmen received a five-cent-an-hour increase.

In addition, workers will receive a five-cent guaranteed bonus based on a minimum of 12 coaches produced per week. This bonus increases as production of coaches increases.

Under the new contract, which will expire June 30, 1961, workers will receive an additional five-cent-an-hour increase on the base rate effective January 1961.

Herbert Hertzler, treasurer of the company and one of its negotiators, said Monday that some workers would probably be called back to work this Wednesday.

"February 1 is the start of the company's new fiscal year and auditors are presently taking the inventory," said Mr. Hertzler. "James Guesel, president of the firm, was out of town on other business matters Monday and is expected to return to East Tawas by the middle of the week.

Union workers at Anderson Coach Company walked off their jobs August 4 of last year in a dispute over wages. They had been working under terms of the old contract which had expired.

Originally, the workers had asked for a 30-cent-an-hour wage increase when they went on strike and asked for elimination of the incentive bonus system.

Since that time, numerous negotiating sessions were held between the company and the union, with state and federal mediators sitting in on the talks, but no headway was made until last month. A week ago Tuesday night the union members voted to accept all proposals under the new contract with the exception of the one on wages.

The break in the strike came last Friday when the company submitted its latest proposal.

With no coaches available to its sales organization, Huron Sales Company, for nearly six months, Mr. Hertzler said that only time would tell whether production would resume to normalcy. He said that the company had a backlog of orders, but he did not indicate how long this would keep the local plant in production.

## Former Tawas Cityan is Food Service Mgr. at Greenfield Village

The appointment of Lyle D. Hughes as food services manager for Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village was announced today by Dr. Donald A. Shelley, executive director. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Hughes of Tawas City.

Hughes' new duties will consist of supervision of the eight food service units for visitors in the museum and village and of the overnight dormitory facilities which last year accommodated more than 12,500 students.

A resident of Dearborn the last two years, Hughes formerly owned and managed a restaurant there. Prior to this, he served as food manager at two major hospitals in Rochester, Minnesota, and as assistant manager of a hotel there.

Hughes, 33, is a native of Tawas City and attended local schools. He served two years as an air force sergeant during World War II and is a 1950 graduate of Michigan State University's department of hotel, restaurant and institutional administration.

He is a member of the Michigan Restaurant Association and the Dearborn Junior Chamber of Commerce.

He lives at 20615 West Outer Drive, Dearborn, with his wife, Jean, and two children.

## Emphasis on Activities at Silver Valley

All facilities are expected to be in perfect operation this week-end for the 23rd annual Silver Valley winter sports carnival, February 5-7. Ski slopes and tows are in top shape, along with the twin-steel toboggan runs.

Also open to winter sports enthusiasts are two warming shelters in which Tawas City and East Tawas American Legion Posts operate food concessions. A ski shop, operated by the winter sports committee, is located in the ski area.

Ski races, tobogganing, ice skating, horse and cutter rides and ice boating will be among the features of this yearly event. Differing from past years, the 1960 carnival will devote most of its activities to the confines of the winter sports park in Huron National Forest.

Selection of a winter sports queen and banquet have been discontinued this year in order that all efforts might be devoted to actual winter sports activities. However, two winter sports fish fries will be held Friday night to kick off the carnival.

The 12th annual stag fish fry, sponsored this year by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, will be held at the Holland Hotel. A fish fry will also be held at the Barnes Hotel, at which couples are invited to attend.

Saturday's activities will include skiing and tobogganing at Silver Valley, as well as ice boat races on Tawas Bay. Committee Chairman L. G. (Ladd) McKay Jr. said that arrangements have been made with Bay City and Midland ice boat enthusiasts to hold races on Saturday and Sunday at the waterways commission dock.

Bob Reynolds, popular Detroit radio broadcaster, will make his annual sportscast from the Holland Hotel Saturday night over WJR. Participating in the winter sports carnival here has been an annual event for Reynolds for a number of years.

Sunday's activities will feature ski races at Silver Valley. There will be downhill and slalom events open to two divisions: Junior, for youngsters up to the 11th grade in high school, and senior division, which includes high school seniors and older.

There will be three trophies this year, one each for the fastest time in downhill and slalom and the third for the fastest combination time in both events. Names of winners will be announced.

## First Annual Speed Skating Meet in Tawas Marred by Thaw-Rough Ice

In spite of mild weather conditions which wrecked an eight-lap track set up on Tawas Bay, the first annual Tawas Speed Skating Championships came to a successful conclusion Sunday afternoon. Officials of the state speed skating association had high praise for Chairman William Grebe and his committee for their part in the races.

A warm spell ruined one oval track which had been set up on the ice of Tawas Bay and another was quickly cleared. The improvised track had more or less three straightaways, three turns and a choppy skating surface but the races were run regardless of these handicaps.

Large crowds of spectators jammed the ice at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock in East Tawas on Saturday and Sunday. Grebe said Monday that all officials were happy about the meet, especially with the enthusiasm shown by local spectators.

Approximately 165 skaters competed in the races during the two days. Missing, however, were some of the state's top skaters who were competing in the national outdoor championships at St. Paul, Minnesota.

Three local skaters won places in the final standings: Brian Hekmer of East Tawas won fourth place in the junior boys division, Richard Grebe of Tawas City won second place in juvenile boys and Mary Roach of Tawas City won fifth place in pony girls. All are members of the newly organized Tawas Speed Skating Club.

Special events during the two-day meet were barrel jumping and a cross-country race, the latter being the only event of its kind held this year in Michigan.

Perry Browne of Wolverine Skating Club, Detroit, won the barrel jumping

contest Saturday while Wally Renshaw of Saginaw won first place in the cross-country event for senior men and intermediate boys on Sunday.

Saturday's racing events were filmed by Howard Shelley of Michigan Outdoors television program and the races are to be a feature of Thursday night's program. Ron Gamble of Greenbush will fill in on the program for the vacationing Mort Neff.

The skaters will convene again next week-end for the Michigan outdoor championships in Alpena.

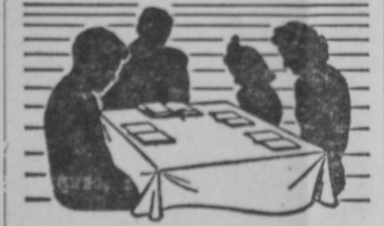
**CHRISTIAN SCIENCE**

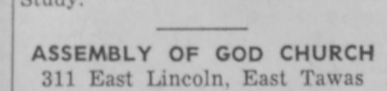

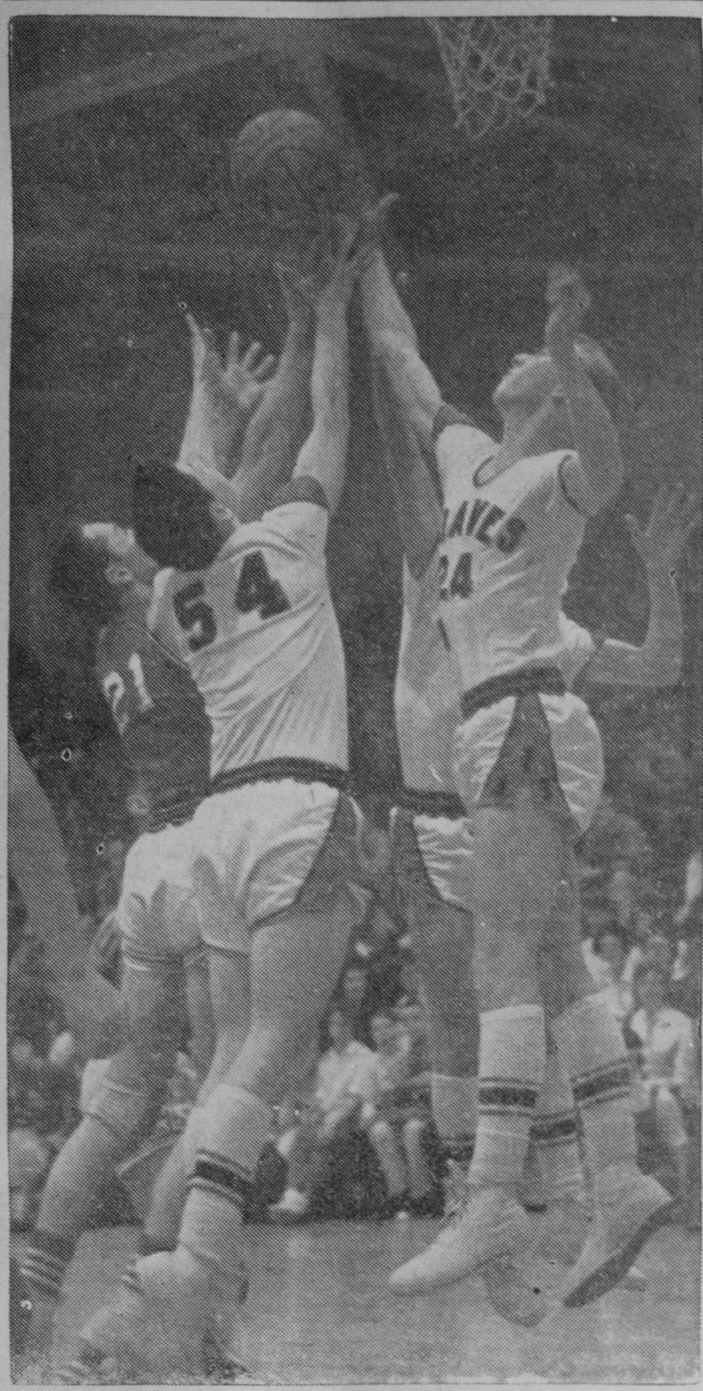

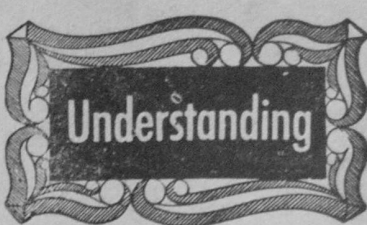

### SAMUEL POWELL

Death of an 89-year-old Sand Lake man, whose body was found on the front porch of his cottage by a neighbor, was ruled as a victim of a heart attack.

Dead is Samuel Powell, well-known resident of Grant Township who had been given the honorary title of "mayor and chief of police" of Sand Lake.

The deceased came to Iosco County about 28 years ago. He retired from the carpentry trade after building several summer cottages in that area. He was living alone at the time of death.

Powell's body was found by Clyde Gallent of Sand Lake, who told investigating officers he decided to check when Powell had not been seen for several days. Coroner E. D. Jacques said that he had been dead about 2 1/2 days.

Powell was born August 15, 1870, in Armada. He is survived by one son and three daughters; also, one brother, Eugene Powell of Route One, Tawas City, and a sister, Mrs. Nellie Foster of Pontiac.

Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at Jacques Funeral Home. Interment was at Cass City. Officiating at the service was the Rev. Ralph Edwards.

### State Police Post at East Tawas Had Active Year

A total of 2,105 arrests were made during 1959 by state police officers from the East Tawas post, reports Sgt. Frank Roti, commander. This figure represents an increase of 48 over the preceding year.

Included in the total arrests were 1,694 for traffic, 208 for other patrol arrests and 203 for complaint arrests.

During 7,925 car hours on patrol, state police officers at East Tawas logged 167,978 miles. The post received 1,794 complaints, plus 217 from other posts. Officers assisted 1,000 motorists, investigated 1,322 cars, made 2,816 property inspections, 1,317 liquor inspections, gave 5,390 verbal warnings.

Total man hours during the year was 34,430. The 13 men assigned to the post averaged 10.1 hours on daily duty.

"The board is not opposed to the state's getting the land but there will be opposition if the state acquires the land and then does not develop it," he said.

Werth continued, "As it shapes up now, we are going to ask Rep. James Mielock to introduce a bill into the legislature for purchase of the property by the state. In this way, perhaps we can see just how much the people of Michigan are interested in developing the property for recreational use."

### ARTHUR J. THOMAS

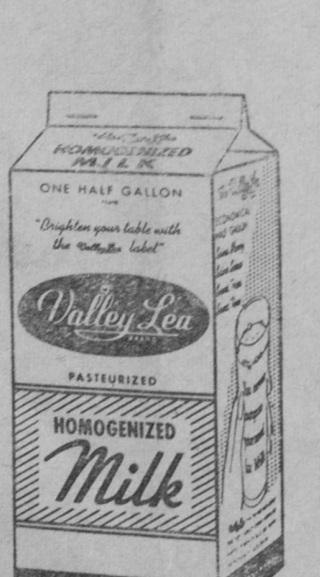
