

Champion Skaters Here This Week for Big Meet

Final preparations are now being made for the Tawas Area Speed Skating Championship meet to be held January 30-31 at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock, East Tawas. Host for the event will be the Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

Several members of the newly organized Tawas Skating Club show a great potential for future skating champions and will take part for the first time in any competitive racing. Coach William Grebe reports that with continued freezing temperatures, ice conditions should be exceptionally good.

The free admission event is expected to attract between 150 to 200 skaters from all parts of Michigan to compete in 95 ice events. The chamber of commerce will present trophies to all top division winners and ribbons to the second, third and fourth place division winners.

In addition to the regular race schedule, a trophy will be offered by the Barnes Hotel to the winner of the state barrel jumping contest which will cap off Saturday's events. Expected to participate is Terry Browne, a Detroit fireman and veteran in Michigan speed skating circles, and Wallie Renshaw of Saginaw, also a veteran skater and 1958 state indoor speed skating champion.

Browne has been barrel jumping for several years and won the state title in 1958 at Midland by leaping 24 feet and 15 barrels. In national competition in upstate New York, he won second in 1958 and placed fourth January 9 of this year. This is Renshaw's first year for barrel jumping but he promises to be a great competitor as he placed seventh in the 1960 national contest.

A trophy will also be awarded by the Holland Hotel to the winner of a three-mile cross country race which will climax Sunday's events. All senior men (A and B) and intermediate boys may par-

ticipate. This is the first time for a race of this type and the skaters are looking forward to it with great anticipation.

The skating meet is scheduled to begin Saturday at 1:00 p. m. with a grand march of all the skaters and a flag raising ceremony. Sunday's events will start at 12:30 p. m. The public is invited without charge.

Last Night's Game—

HL Bobcats Scalp 'em Our Braves, 49-47, To Hold League Lead

Tawas Area Braves, seeking a slice of the "choice bacon" in NEM standings, found themselves on the wrong end of the scalping knife last night (Tuesday) when they lost a cliff-hanger to the Houghton Lake Bobcats, 49-47.

The Bobcats, with a 9-1 record, now hold most of the marbles in the conference standings and Tawas, along with other NEM schools, will have a tough time dislodging them from the top rung. However, the Braves are still in the running and the February 26 re-match between these two teams at Tawas should be a lulu.

Tuesday night's game on the winner's home floor was a see-saw battle all the way, the lead changing hands on at least five occasions. After the first quarter, the point spread between the two teams did not vary more than four or five points.

Houghton Lake fashioned an early lead in the first quarter, holding a 13-7 margin at the whistle. The Braves bounded back in the second stanza, however, scoring 14 points to hold a 21-20 lead at intermission.

The fireworks started in the third quarter when Tawas roared off with 18 points to the Bobcats' 14, but Houghton Lake came from

Ceremony Held Thursday—

Judge's Portrait Hung in Courtroom

A framed photographic portrait has taken its place on the walls of Circuit Judge Herman Dehnke, who retired at the end of 1959,

has taken its place on the walls of the courtroom in the Isosco County Building. During ceremonies last Thursday, the portrait was hung by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller and Glenn Long,

chairman of the Isosco County Board of Supervisors.

The judge's portrait joins those of eight other circuit judges who served Isosco County since 1860. Funds for restoring the pictures was furnished by the Isosco Centennial Committee in 1958 and are the work of Harvey Watson, East Tawas commercial photographer.

"There is very little we can say or do to add to the luster of a man who has brought so much credit to himself and to his circuit," commented Judge Miller. "In addition to serving the 23rd, Judge Dehnke has held court in all but 45 of Michigan's 83 counties."

Saying that the portraits appeared on the walls of the courtroom in chronological order, Judge Miller pointed out that Dehnke's 32-year service to the circuit had equaled the combined tenure of seven of his eight predecessors.

Portraits of circuit judges include those of: J. Birney, 1860-1865; J. G. Sutherland, 1866-1870; T. C. Grier, 1871; S. M. Green, 1872-1876; J. B. Tuttle, 1877-1887; William H. Simpson, 1888-1899; Main J. Conine, 1900-1914; Albert Widdis, 1914-1927; Herman Dehnke, 1927-1959.

Supervisors Take Action—

Isosco Seeks Status of Point Property

Isosco County is seeking information on the exact status of the Tawas Point property which was recently declared surplus by the federal government and is now in the hands of General Services, the government's property disposal agency.

Action was taken by the Isosco County Board of Supervisors last Thursday after Mayor Elmer Werth of East Tawas stated that it was his opinion that the property would not be held much longer by that agency.

The property in question contains approximately 130-140 acres of land, exclusive of the light-house, foghorn and other coast guard installations, which is desirable for park and recreation use.

Werth stated that the Michigan Conservation Department had attempted to trade state-owned land for this property but had recently learned that General Services requires a cash settlement.

"If the county decides to make a bid for this property, it should take into consideration the cost of improvement as a park. This matter has gone beyond the talking stage, something must be done now," said Werth. "One of these days General Services will say the property is for sale and the county should be in line to take action."

Last Monday, the federal government declared this property, which consists of some 132 acres of vacant land on Tawas Point, to be surplus. Under Public Law 616 of the 80th congress, this land is made available for park and recreational purposes at 50 percent of its market value to any public agency which may be authorized to acquire it.

Last year at its October session, the board of supervisors declared its interest in acquiring this property. The department of conservation of the State of Michigan has also indicated a similar interest.

"Since the negotiation for the purpose of acquiring this land is non-competitive as between the county and the department of conservation, the General Services Administration, which has the administrative responsibility for disposing of this land, has asked the county and state officials to resolve between themselves which agency should be given preference. To date, no answer has been received from Lansing with respect to this matter," said Mr. Harvey.

No Settlement Yet—





Emanuel Church to Dedicate \$63,000 Christian Day School

When doors of a beautiful new school building in Tawas City are unlocked during ceremonies Sunday afternoon, a long-time dream of Pastor Leonard Newman and his congregation will have seen fulfillment.

Emanuel Lutheran Church will hold a dedication program for its new \$63,000 Christian day school located on North Street starting at 3 o'clock. An invitation is extended to everyone in the com-

munity to attend an open house following the service at 6 o'clock.

Dedication day will actually start with regular Sunday morning worship services at the church on Second Street. The Rev. Emil Kasichke, a native of Tawas City and presently pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church in Bay City, will deliver the sermon.

Following door unlocking and ribbon cutting ceremonies at 3:00 p. m., a service of dedication will be held in the new building. The dedication sermon will be given by the Rev. G. L. Press of Wayne, president of the Michigan District of the Wisconsin Synod.

During ground breaking ceremonies for the new building last April, Pastor Newman commented that this was the first building project started, and now completed, by this generation of the congregation. The last previous project was construction of the church parsonage.

Architect of the new school building was Leslie E. Cavanaugh of East Tawas. General contractor was Eckstein Construction Company of Tawas City.

In addition to the general contractor, other local firms working on the building included St. James Electric, Wojahn Floor Coverings and Frank's Plumbing and Heating.

The new building, located west of the Tawas City baseball field near the Second Avenue-North Street intersection, contains two large classrooms, an office-conference room, kitchen and a 66 by 33-foot multi-purpose room.

Main entrance of the brick and block structure is located at the east end of the building. Floors are of vinyl tile and ceilings are of fiber glass panels. Corridors in the building have a five-foot-high strip of Vitracon seal on the walls which will facilitate cleaning. This same material is used in rest rooms.

The large multi-purpose room, which will serve various church functions as well as school activities, has two shuffleboard courts set in the vinyl plastic tile floor. The kitchen adjoins this room with an opening in the wall for serving of food.

New desks have been purchased for one classroom and the other classroom will be equipped with desks which were recently purchased for the old building. New desks for teachers have been purchased, in addition to new audio-visual teaching equipment and two new pianos.

School youngsters will attend classes in the new building for the first time next Monday.

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



Tawas Boy Picked For Tau Beta Pi





Farm Events

Farmers, another year has passed and it is just about income tax filing time again. To find out when your income tax return is due, answer the following two questions:

Is at least two-thirds of your gross income from farming?

Does your taxable year begin on January 1?

If the answer to both of these questions is yes, you have two choices: (1) File your return and pay the tax by February 15, or (2) file an estimate of the tax due and pay it by January 15, and then wait until April 15 to file the tax return itself. Of course, those filing an estimate have already done so but it means that they have to file their final return by April 15.

So, if you have filed the estimate and paid the tax by January 15, you have an additional three months to file your income tax return. If not, both the tax return and tax are due February 15.

I recently sent to folks who had requested a farmers' tax guide a 1960 edition of the guide. If any one is interested in receiving a copy, contact my office in the Federal Building, East Tawas.

Several letters have been received during the past month in regards to a test for penicillin residue in milk and if various methods of treatment will cause antibiotics to be present in the milk.

In regard to the test, many plants and milk receiving stations have adopted a routine test which will periodically be made on all producer milk supplies. It is simple to perform but requires about six hours time before results can be read. The test involves the use of sterile agar media in which a culture of the bacteria is mixed at the time a plate is purified. Sterile discs are dipped in the milk sample, placed on the agar and time allowed to observe if the bacteria growth is inhibited around the disc. A clear area around the disc indicates the

presence of antibiotic substances. To prove whether or not the substance is penicillin, the test is repeated on the suspected samples, using penase treated discs. The absence of a clear zone around the penase disc is indicative of penicillin; a clear zone shows some other antibiotic substance responsible. Other questions that are frequently asked: If one quarter is treated, is it necessary to withhold milk from all four quarters? The law in brief states that milk must be from healthy cows, therefore if a cow is treated for mastitis in one quarter, the entire milk from that cow should be withheld. The same is true if treatment is administered in any other way. Results of about a thousand tests on producer milk supplies in Michigan look encouraging and would indicate that producers are conscientious about withholding milk from treated cows. As more of the milk plants perform the test, we will have a better picture of the situation. All plants and receiving stations are being urged to run the test and determine which producers are offenders—that will reduce jeopardy of the dairy markets.

By DOROTHY SCOTT County Extension Agent

Extension groups are studying, tasting and trying casserole cookery at group meetings this month. Chances are their families will be sampling one or more of the variety of recipes given in the take home folder. Here are a couple of reminders:

Give the casserole a warm-up period—if you take a prepared casserole from the refrigerator and plan to bake it with a biscuit or pastry topping. Let the food reach room temperature, then add the topping and bake; otherwise, the crust will be done before the food begins to heat.

Casseroles should be bubbling when they come from the oven. They are often made of planned-overs as well as left-overs, so it is important that the mixtures be thoroughly cooked and not just warmed—for safety's sake. The casserole is cooked when the contents bubble through the surface of the topping—at the center as well as at the sides.

Up-to-date homes—inside and out—is a program topic for Thursday, February 4, of Farmers' Week at Michigan State University. Ladies—and men, too—are invited to visit the agricultural engineering building at 10:00 a. m. You will see and hear about new appliances and new equipment for controlling heat, ventilation, dust and moisture in the home.

You will also hear about the new experimental home being built on campus. Byron Radcliffe of the forest products department will explain the new ideas used in building the house—from new-type paints and floor materials to plastic water pipes to wall and roof panels.

This is one program designed to interest both men and women, both urban and rural residents.

Other programs of special interest to women are planned for Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, February 2, 3 and 4, of Farmers' Week. All programs are free to the public. Further information is available at the Cooperative Extension Service office, Federal Building, East Tawas.

freezing rolls, even for the short time of 24 hours. A recent study showed that rolls bought or baked for use the next day can be kept fresher in the freezer than at room temperature.

For the freezing experiments, cinnamon and dinner rolls were wrapped in cellophane soon after they were baked and cooled, to prevent moisture loss. They were then frozen and stored at zero degrees Fahrenheit for 24 hours.

After defrosting, the rolls had lost only about half as much freshness as rolls stored at room temperature, taste panelists agreed. Some of the rolls were kept in frozen storage for two months without serious loss of freshness.

When defrosting, it is best to keep rolls covered to prevent them from losing too much moisture, the study showed. Defrosting the rolls, particularly cinnamon rolls, in a place that is somewhat warmer than room temperature also helps to maintain freshness.

National Gypsum Company Sets New Safety Record

National Gypsum Company reported today it set new safety records last year to make 1959 the safest year in the company's history.

President Fred A. Manske said the number of injuries per million manhours requiring medical attention dropped to 3.2 in 1959 from 9.1 in 1958. Disabling injuries were down to 5.1 per million manhours last year from 6.7 in 1958.

Both rates are records, he disclosed. Mr. Manske said that despite an eight percent manhour increase last year in 37 National Gypsum plants, mines and quarries, the company injury rate was reduced 15 percent.

He said that the Fort Dodge plant has operated more than a million and a half manhours since its last disabling injury and noted that the Matteson plant has never had a disabling injury in its more than one million man-hour history.

William Brown, president of Wenonah chapter, was featured speaker following dinner. Walter Shorkey of Bay City showed slides of his trips to Yellowstone National Park.

Marvin Mallon, president of the board of directors, reported an increase of 48 members during the past year for a total of 81 percent employee membership.
