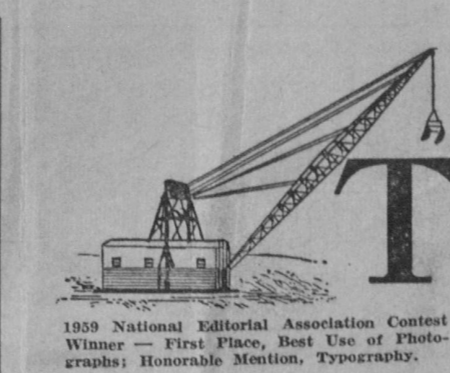

'Horse and Buggy' Laws Go—

Tawas City Adopts New Laws; Repeals Old Ones

Tawas City Council adopted several ordinances Monday night in a long anticipated move to bring city laws up-to-date. They will become effective 30 days from the date of passage and are published in their entirety on page 6 of this newspaper.

Action on the ordinances was authorized by the council several months ago. Former city attorney, Allan C. Miller, started work on the project and presented them to the council for review at its last meeting.

One ordinance, No. 144, makes a clean sweep of some 30 antiquated laws by repealing them entirely. They are hold overs from the days when Tawas City was a village and later ones which were no longer deemed in the public interest.

Written in the precision penmanship of nineteenth century clerks, ordinances which were repealed from the old book included one which controlled the early closing of saloons; another which regulated pool halls and ball (bowling) alleys; one which provided for the punishment of certain crimes and offenses by hard labor, to name a few.

Ordinance No. 138 regulating traffic and the operation of vehicles upon the highways of the city was amended.

Most important, however, was the enactment of several new ordinances. These included: No. 146, relating to the control of grass and noxious weeds; No. 147, littering of streets and other public places; No. 148, juvenile delinquency and matters contribut-

ing thereto (furnishing beer or misrepresentation of age); No. 149, smoke ordinance; No. 150, which provides for the regulation and licensing of peddlers, transient merchants and solicitors.

Much work and study have been made by the council on the last two ordinances and these, along with the noxious weed ordinance, had much to do with the council's general move to up-date city laws.

In other business, plans submitted by Gordon Huck of Consumers Power Company for 10 new street lights were approved by the council. This included installation of 6,000-lumen lights on North Street, Fifth Avenue, Bay Drive and Crocker Boulevard.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz reported that 84.4 percent of the work on the addition to the sewer disposal plant had been completed by Sargent Construction Company.

City Treasurer John Hosbach read his quarterly report, which was approved by the council.

In New Year's Day Ceremony—

Miller Sworn In as New Judge

Before a packed courtroom in the Isosco County Building Friday, Allan C. Miller was sworn in as circuit judge of the 23rd judicial

circuit. Attending were more than 100 of Mr. Miller's friends and relatives.

Circuit Judge Richard Smith of the 18th judicial circuit in Bay City presided at the special court session here New Year's morning. Also taking part in the ceremony were members of the Isosco County Bar Association.

Mr. Miller replaces Judge Herman Dehnke of Harrisville, who retired Thursday after more than 32 years on the bench of this circuit.

The oath of office was administered by Isosco County Clerk George A. Prescott, using a Bible that has been in Miller's family for nearly a century. A German language Bible, it was purchased by his great-grandfather, Leopold Miller, when he was heading a farm in Tawas Township in the 1860s.

After Judge Smith, in his remarks, told those present that honesty, diligence in their work, impartiality, courage and courtesy were the highest attributes a judge can attain, the oath of office was administered. Following a short recess, Judge Miller reconvened the court in order to address a few remarks to the audience.

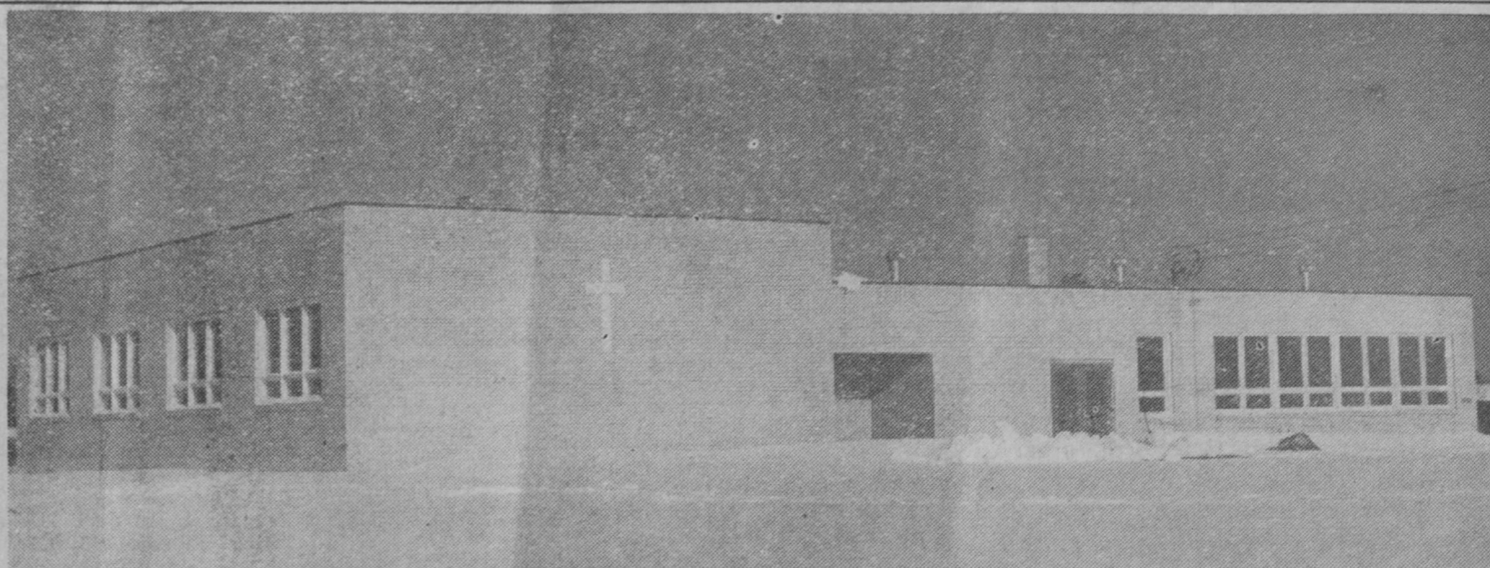
The new judge, who returned to his birthplace in 1958 to seek the post, being successful in the non-partisan election last spring, reviewed his campaign promises and said he would do all within his power to carry them out.

The day was one of particular significance and pride for Judge Miller's wife, Betty, and his mother, Mrs. Grace L. Miller, who has been Isosco County treasurer for 20 years. Both of his parents have held public office in this county. His father, the late Sheriff Charles Miller, was killed in the line of duty in 1934.

Tawas City Church Plans Dedication Program for New Christian Day School

Dedication services for Emanuel Lutheran Church's new Christian day school in Tawas City are to be held Sunday, January 31, it was announced Monday by the Rev. Leonard Newman.

Plans for the dedication program are now being made by Pastor Newman and his committee. It will include a special open house event following the services at which the public is to be invited.

Ground breaking ceremonies for the new school were held last April and work on actual construction of the building was recently completed by Eckstein Construction Company, general

contractor. Finish work on the interior is nearing completion.

Located west of the Tawas City baseball field near the Second Avenue-North Street intersection, the new \$50,000 school contains two large classrooms, an office-conference room, kitchen and a 66 by 33-foot multi-purpose room.

Main entrance of the brick and block structure is located at the east end of the building. Floors are of vinyl tile and ceilings are of fiber glass panels. Corridors in the building have a five-foot-high strip of Vitracon seal on the walls which will facilitate cleaning. This same material is used in restrooms.

which will serve various church functions as well as school activities, has two shuffleboard courts set in the vinyl plastic tile floor. The kitchen adjoins this room with an opening in the wall for serving of food.

New desks have been purchased for one room and the other classroom will be equipped with desks which were recently purchased for the old school building. New desks for teachers have been purchased, in addition to new audio-visual teaching equipment and two new pianos.

Pastor Newman said that school is expected to start in the new building the Monday following dedication ceremonies.

The new structure replaces the old school building located at the

corner of Second Street and Fifth Avenue which was constructed 67 years ago.

Isosco Escapes Traffic Injury Over Holiday

Isosco County escaped serious traffic accidents on its highways over the New Year's holiday. Michigan State Police at East Tawas report only one minor property damage accident and another crash which did not occur on a highway.

The one property damage accident resulted early Friday morning when a south-bound vehicle collided with a car parked in the center of US-23 south of Tawas City.

Driver of the parked car William Gibson, told officers that he had experienced motor trouble and could not move his vehicle. However, police said that the car was parked without its lights on and was struck by Clifford Erickson of Route Two, Tawas City.

The other accident resulted when Joseph E. Brubaker of Wurtsmith Air Force Base attempted to turn around in the driveway of Pion's Service Station at the south city limits. Brubaker's vehicle skidded on some ice and struck a gasoline pump.

'CITIZENS FOR MICHIGAN' MEET TONIGHT AT ALPENA

"Citizens For Michigan" the state-wide organization that is seeking to resolve state problems by citizen action, will hold a mass meeting in Alpena tonight (Wednesday) to build membership and organize local chapter study groups.

The meeting, which is open to all interested citizens of Isosco, Montmorency, Ogemaw, Oscoda, Otsego, Presque Isle, Roscommon, Alcona, Cheboygan and Crawford Counties, will be held at 8 o'clock in the Alpena High School. The 12-county area is one of 14 regions into which the state has been divided by CFM for organizing purposes.

With a current membership of nearly 2,000 from more than 200 Michigan communities, the group seeks maximum enrollment of all citizens "willing to participate objectively as individuals in the identification and study of state-wide problems and the presentation of recommendations for their solution," states District Chairman Jesse H. Besser, president of the Besser Company at Alpena.

Balanced Budget

County Treasurer Grace Miller reported Tuesday afternoon that, on closing Isosco's books for 1959, the county ended up with a credit balance of \$605.61 in its general fund.

Mrs. Miller said that Isosco represented a check for \$1,972 representing the refund on drivers licenses which had been paid due from the state since April.

"This check, along with other receipts, balanced our budget as anticipated by the board of supervisors and Isosco County ended 1959 in the black," said the county treasurer.

TC Fire Department Had 22 Calls in 1959

Tawas City Fire Department answered 22 fire calls during the past 12 months, according to a report made Monday by Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz. There were two false alarms.

Most serious fires during 1959 were as follows: Considerable damage was done to the Robert Rollin residence, Fourth Street, on January 23; the department answered two calls at the SS Western States, one on March 19 and the other on March 29.

On May 12, a fire swept the city dump in Baldwin Township; the Hemlock Beauty Shop on M-55 was damaged July 13 by water and smoke; a garage was destroyed at the John St. James residence July 17; a garage was destroyed at the Dwight Gadd residence, Spruce Street, on October 28.

Firemen's roll call for the 22 fire calls, including the two false alarms, amounted to \$1,214.50. No accurate estimate of damage resulting from the fires was available.

Three Conventions Set for Tawas in 1960

A year-end report of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce last week revealed that Tawas has been selected as the site for three conventions in 1960, along with an event of national and international significance.

Mrs. Bertha Montgomery, chamber office manager, said Monday that there is a possibility that two or three more conventions would be lined up for the year.

Conventions already scheduled this year include those of the Michigan Sheriffs Association, Michigan County Clerks Association and board of directors of the Michigan United Conservation Clubs.

Judge Dehnke Makes Last Entry in Journal

At the close of proceedings on December 31, retiring Circuit Judge Herman Dehnke made the following statement to be entered in the journal:

"In connection with the retirement of the present occupant of this bench from judicial service, it is fitting that due recognition and thanks be extended to those who have given their talents and services in assisting the court in the discharge of its responsibilities during the past 32 years.

"To recognize all of them as individuals or even as groups would be impossible. Among those who as members of the board of supervisors part in providing the

properly equipped courtrooms and other necessary facilities and assistants; and all other county and municipal officials whose assistance the court has had occasion from time to time to invoke.

"Because of the nature of their functions, the services rendered by the court clerks and their deputies, by the court stenographers, and by the probation officer and friend of the court, are especially important in enabling the court to operate with reasonable dispatch and efficiency. No court has ever had a more cooperative

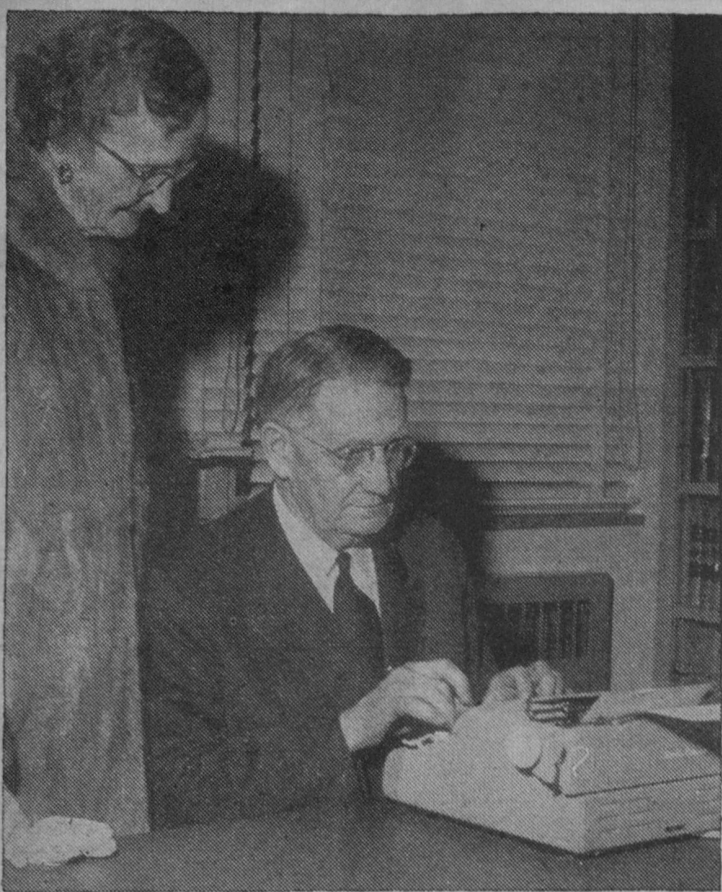
