Voters Avoid Polls in Spite of Many Contests

Look Returned; Dimmick, Sarki, Hammond Elected

Joseph N. Dimmick, William Look and Leonard Sarki, all of East Tawas, and Harold Hammond of Alabaster Township were elected to the Tawas Area Board of Education in Monday's annual school election.

Although there were races for all four seats on the board of education, voters apparently viewed the elections with complacency as there was only a total of 808 votes cast in the entire district.

Dimmick and Look were elected to four-year terms as trustees, while Sarki and Hammond were elected to three-year terms.

In the five-way race for the two four-year seats, Dimmick upset Hugo J. Keiser, incumbent member of Tawas City, by a three-vote margin, 363-360.

Look, the incumbent from East Tawas, polled the most votes with 413. Mrs. Shirley Killey and Clyde Soper, the other two four-year candidates, polled votes of 162 and 157, respectively.

Hammond was the top vote-getter in the four-year race for the new seats on the board of education. Garnering more votes than any of the nine candidates, Hammond piled up a comfortable margin with 432 in his favor.

Only Trickle of Voters Go to Polls at W-P

Monday's school election in the Whittemore-Prescott Area district saw only a trickle of voters going to the polls. With more than 1,000 registered voters, according to Supt. John Halbert there were only 155 persons who cast ballots.

Two incumbent candidates for three-year terms were returned to their board of education seats. Elected were Earl Daugharty and Everett Smith, who polled 113 and 105 votes, respectively. Walter Provoost, the third candidate, had 52 votes.

In the four-way race for the two new four-year terms, George Erickson and Henry Hasty were the winners. Erickson, a former member of the Whittemore board before reorganization, had 116 votes. Hasty polled 104. Ralph DeGesie and Rudolph Grabner, the other two candidates, had 35 and 26 votes, respectively.

A proposition which asked for the transfer of funds from the Sherman Township School Debt Retirement Fund was approved by voters, 132-18.

Hale Voters Reject Two Proposals; Chrivia Loses

Hale Area School district's annual election matched the hot summer temperature Monday as more than 400 voters turned out to select three new board of education members and to vote on two propositions.

Elected to four-year terms were Lawrence Lake and Dianna E. Lyke, who polled 195 and 166 votes, respectively.

Successful three-year term candidate was Herman Maas, who garnered 212 votes.

Both propositions offered by the board of education were turned down by voters. The first, which asked to raise the present debt limit, failed by a 239-180 margin. The second proposition, which asked for a 3/4 mill levy for one year to finance construction of and equipping a new shop, was turned down by a 220-179 vote.

There was a total of seven persons running for the two four-year terms, among them the incumbent board of education trustee, Dennis E. Chrivia, who had 119 votes in his favor. Madeleine Brindley polled 131 votes, Earl Slosser had 81, Dale Rosenquist totaled 61 and Tony Sherill had 42.

Council to Talk on Re-Plat at Next Meeting

A re-plat of Huron Gardens Subdivision submitted to the Tawas City Council by Mr. and Mrs. Victor Zaharias, owners, has been tabled until the next regular meeting. This action was taken last week.

The owners have submitted a plat with several street changes. The council was advised by City Attorney Jerry Cotter that such a change would require circuit court action.

Cotter said that once a plat was dedicated, such action by the court would be necessary to vacate the old plat.

A full discussion is to be held on the proposed re-plat at the next meeting. Invited to attend the meeting is Elmer J. Burrell, owner of North Park Acres which is located adjacent to Huron Gardens.

Plans for landscaping and improvement at Tawas Hospital were outlined to the council by George W. Myles. He indicated that the hospital's board of directors was interested in obtaining city-owned property near the hospital for future expansion.

New Equipment Speeds Iosco's Road Building Program

Iosco County Road Commission regularly scheduled road construction program. Supt. John Henry said Friday that the spring break-up in 1960 was the worst in 25 years. The break-up and to commence its first four months of 1960 cost

the road commission \$75,000 in maintenance expense. In May, it was estimated that \$60,000 more would be needed to repair damage.

To cite an example of the extent of this damage, Mr. Henry said that one road in Burleigh Township was brought to grade last fall and topped with a layer of crushed rock. By the time it quit raining, all of the stone had disappeared in the mud.

"We are out of the mud now, but we only have two or three months in which to repair road damage and to complete our regular road construction program," said Mr. Henry.

Roads now under construction or completed include McArdle Road, north and south from M-55; one mile on Keystone Road from M-65; 0.6 miles on the Indian Lake Road around Sand Lake; street construction in AuSable Township; plant mix black top on streets in Oscoda Township, plus various other places in the county.

The commission also plans extensive seal coating of Miner's Grove Corner to AuSable through Wilber and Baldwin Townships. Later in the fall, it is expected that construction will be started on 2.6 miles of the South Branch Road.

The county's limestone quarry, located just south of the county line on US-23, has been working at full tilt to produce enough crushed rock for this construction program. Rock is also stockpiled there during the off season.

cubic yards of crushed rock thus far this year which brings total yardage produced to 225,128 since the new pit was opened January 2, 1954.

Prior to 1954, the county had two pits in Burleigh Township but rock sources there became depleted and the county obtained property for a new quarry in Arenac County. A conservative estimate of the raw rock supply is 25 years and the county recently obtained 10 additional acres adjacent to this property for future use.

During road construction periods, this quarry is operated by six men, under supervision of Edwin Zaharias, foreman. Others working in the quarry and operating the crushing facilities are Edwin Anderson, Gerald Landry, Gale Wojahn, Raymond Cross and James Brown.

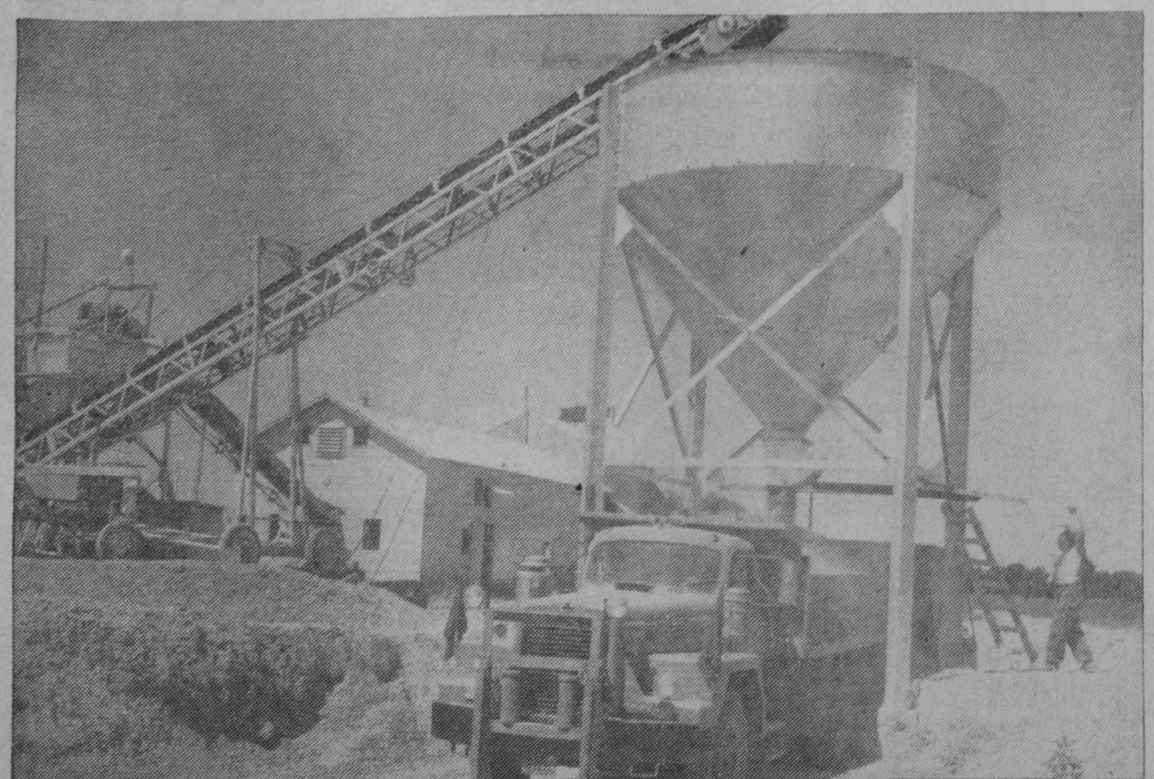
Iosco recently purchased several new pieces of equipment which has speeded up the operation of moving crushed rock from the quarry facilities to road construction sites.

New equipment includes two new international diesel trucks with V-bottom Youngs trailers. These combination units are capable of hauling 25 yards of crushed rock at one time, 15 yards in the trailer and 10 in the truck box.

Leonard Gottleber, radio dispatcher and stores clerk at the headquarters building in East Tawas, said that these new tandem units can haul loads which are the equivalent to five of the commission's older trucks.

A new loading hopper was constructed at the crushing plant especially for loading this equipment. The "wagon trains," as they are called by commission drivers, are loaded within a matter of minutes by this conveyer hopper and are speeded to the job site.

Unloading of the crushed rock is a time-saving operation. (See ROADS, page 10.)



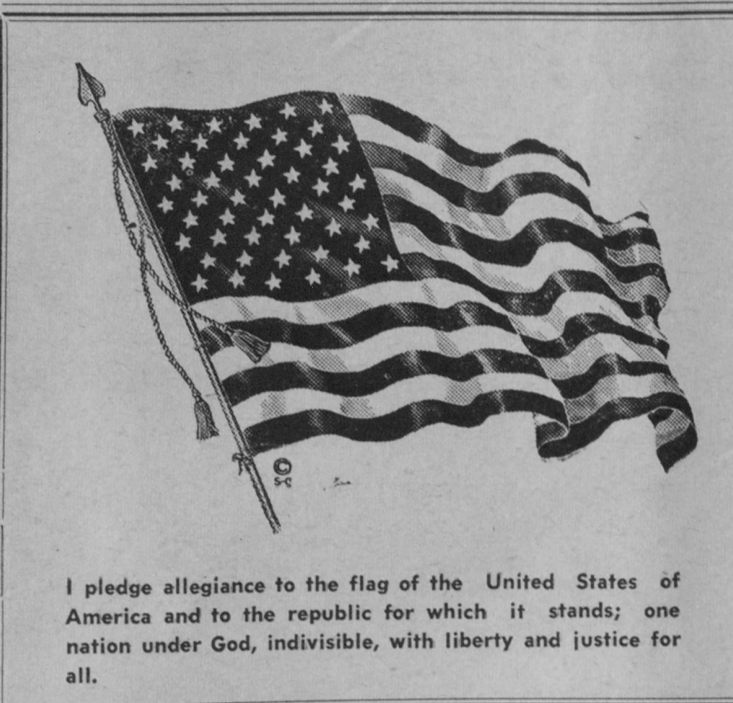
Crushed rock being loaded in quarry . . .

GI Service Connected Awards Are Protected

An award of "service connection" which has been in force for 10 or more years in veteran disability and death cases will be protected under a new law signed by the president.

This was reported today by Gene A. Robens, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office, Detroit, who explained that the new law becomes effective January 1, 1962.

The only exceptions under the law (Public Law 86-501, signed June 10), Robens said, would be cases in which there is a showing that the original grant of service connection by the Veterans Administration was based on fraud or where it is clearly shown from military records that the veteran concerned did not have the required service or lacked the proper character of discharge from service.

"Service connection" is established by the VA when it is found that a veteran's injury or disease was incurred in or aggravated by active service in line of duty during wartime or peacetime service.

Establishment of service connection is necessary before disabled veterans can become eligible for monthly disability compensation payments and also gives wartime veterans priority for admission to VA hospitals, as well as eligibility for certain other benefits.

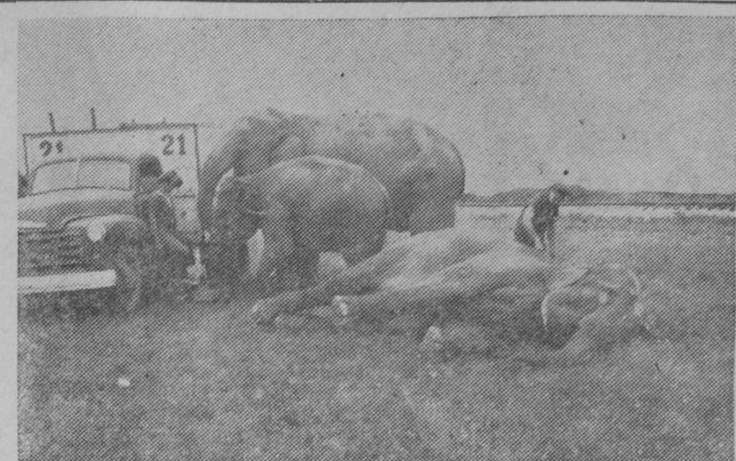

1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
6 rolls cut in half
Melt butter or margarine. Add steaks and cook until lightly browned on both sides. Add catchup, pickles, vinegar, sugar, salt and pepper. Cook, stirring occasionally, 10 minutes. Serve on rolls.

Sausage Pickle Kabob Sandwiches (Makes 4-6 servings)
12 cooked small white onions
1 teaspoon paprika
1/2 pound bologna, cut in 1-inch cubes
1/2 pound brown and serve sausages, cut in thirds
1/2 cup sweet fresh cucumber pickles
4 to 6 small loaves French bread, cut in half lengthwise and buttered
Coat onions with paprika. Arrange onions, bologna, sausages, and pickles on skewers. Grill 3 to 4 inches from source of heat 5 minutes. Turn and grill 5 minutes, or until sausages are browned. Arrange kabobs on bread; remove skewers.

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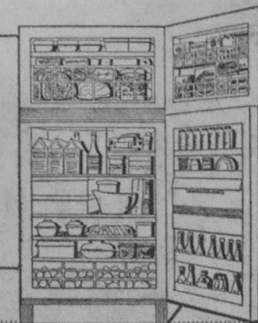

Wool Growers to Get 43.2 Percent Incentive Money

Growers will receive wool incentive payments of \$43.20 for every \$100 they received from the sale of shorn wool during the 1959 marketing year, according to the Isoco County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office. The rate of 43.2 percent, just announced by the department of agriculture, represents the amount needed to bring average wool prices up to the previously announced incentive level of 62 cents per pound under the national wool act. The payment rate on sales of lambs that have never been shorn to compensate for the wool on them will be 75 cents per hundredweight of live animals sold. This payment is designed to discourage unusual shearing of lambs before marketing. Isoco County ASC office began making payments after July 1. Applications for the payments had to be filed by April 30 and covered marketings from April 1, 1959, through March 31, 1960. To determine the wool incen-

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Small Change Made in Wheat Crop Allotments


Official notices of farm allotments for the 1961 wheat crop have been mailed to farmers, according to Claude L. Benson, chairman, Isoco County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. Most of the allotments differ only slightly from 1960 crop allotments, since the national acreage allotment remains at the minimum 55 million acres which has been in effect for the past six years. The farm allotments are based primarily on past wheat production history. All growers who will produce more than 15 acres of wheat as grain in 1961 will be eligible to cast ballots in the July 21 referendum on marketing quotas for the 1961 crop. Growers who will have smaller acreages and those who are taking part in the feed wheat program are not eligible to cast ballots, since the wheat from such farms would not be subject to marketing quota penalties. The referendum will decide important questions for wheat producers and the outcome, naturally, will represent the will of those growers who take the trouble to cast their ballots. If at least two-thirds of the growers who vote approve the quotas, then they will be in effect for the 1961 wheat crop, marketing penalties will apply to the "excess" wheat of growers who do not comply with their farm allotments and price support will be available at not less than 75 percent of parity—the exact level to be announced soon. If more than one-third of the voters oppose the quotas, there will be no quotas or penalties for the 1961 wheat crop and price support will be available at 50 percent of parity, as directed by law. Allotments will remain in effect as a condition of price-support eligibility. Growers who like to make their own decisions should remember that date—Thursday, July 21—and be sure to register their opinions by voting at the local polling place.

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

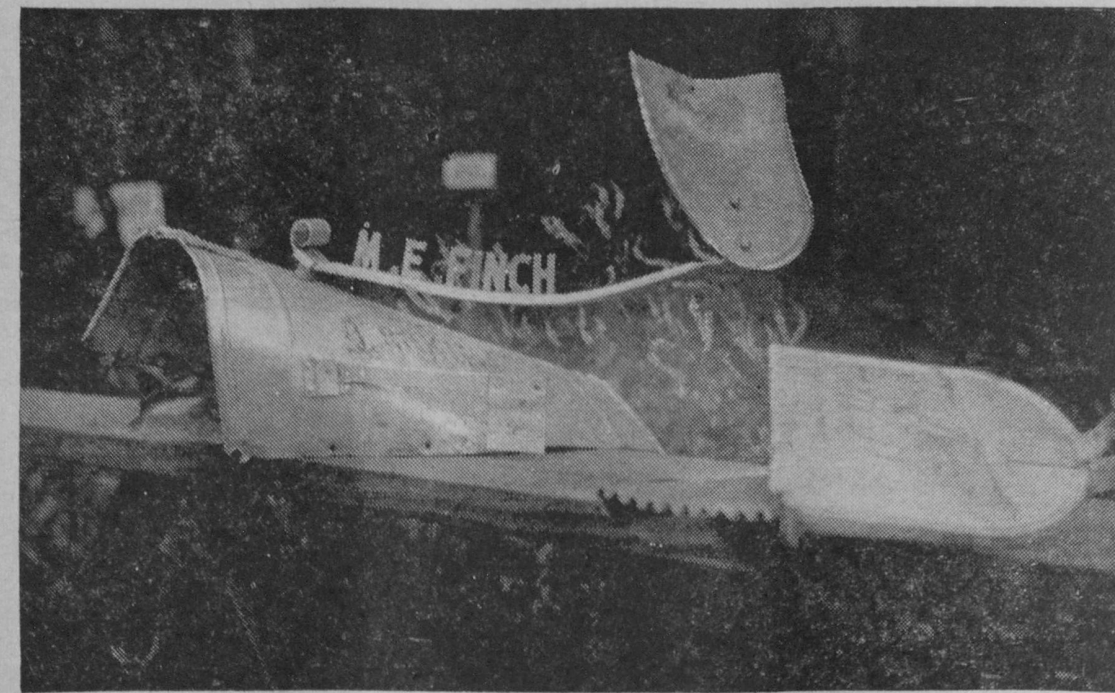

The drivers, Allen Anschutz and Kenneth Alstrom, "track-up" the dump boxes of their trucks and open the gates on the V-bottom trailers once they reach the construction site and the rock is spread in an even layer on the roads in one operation.

The county has also made good use of its radio dispatching equipment. From the transmitter station at the county road commission headquarters, Superintendent Henry has direct contact with the cars of three foremen, the engineer and seven pieces of equipment, plus radio contact with the quarry.

Cars radio-equipped include those of Foremen Rudolph Anderson, Frank Gallagher and Richard Brindley; Engineer Rodney Meade, and Mr. Henry. Two trucks and two graders are radio-equipped at Tawas, while Whittemore, Hale and Oscoda each has one unit so equipped.

Outdoors WITH EMERY

Blueberries are beginning to ripen in the woods and are ready for picking to be used in pies and puddings. The mosquito situation is still in the annoying stage in the woods and all berry pickers are urged to prepare themselves with some means of insect repellent before venturing after the berries.

Another suggestion is that anyone attempting to pick berries should familiarize themselves with the vicinity before starting into the woods. It is very easy to get twisted around while wandering about picking berries. The best thing to do if you do get lost, do not panic and start wandering again before thinking about the situation of being lost. It will help to carry a compass unless you stay within sight of a landmark or the car and be sure to tell someone where you will be picking and the approximate time you expect to return.

Where did the walleyes come from that are being caught in the Tawas River? During the last several weeks, a few youngsters around Tawas have been catching small walleyed pike while fishing for perch in the river.

The walleyes probably came out of Lake Huron and the deeper water. With some fairly good catches of walleyes by commercial fishermen near the Charity Islands in the last several years could be that the walleyes are increasing and will provide more fishing pleasure in the future.

Hunters will be able to train dogs in the fields again after July 15 between sunrise and sunset. No firearms other than a pistol or revolver with blank cartridges may be used while training dogs in this manner.

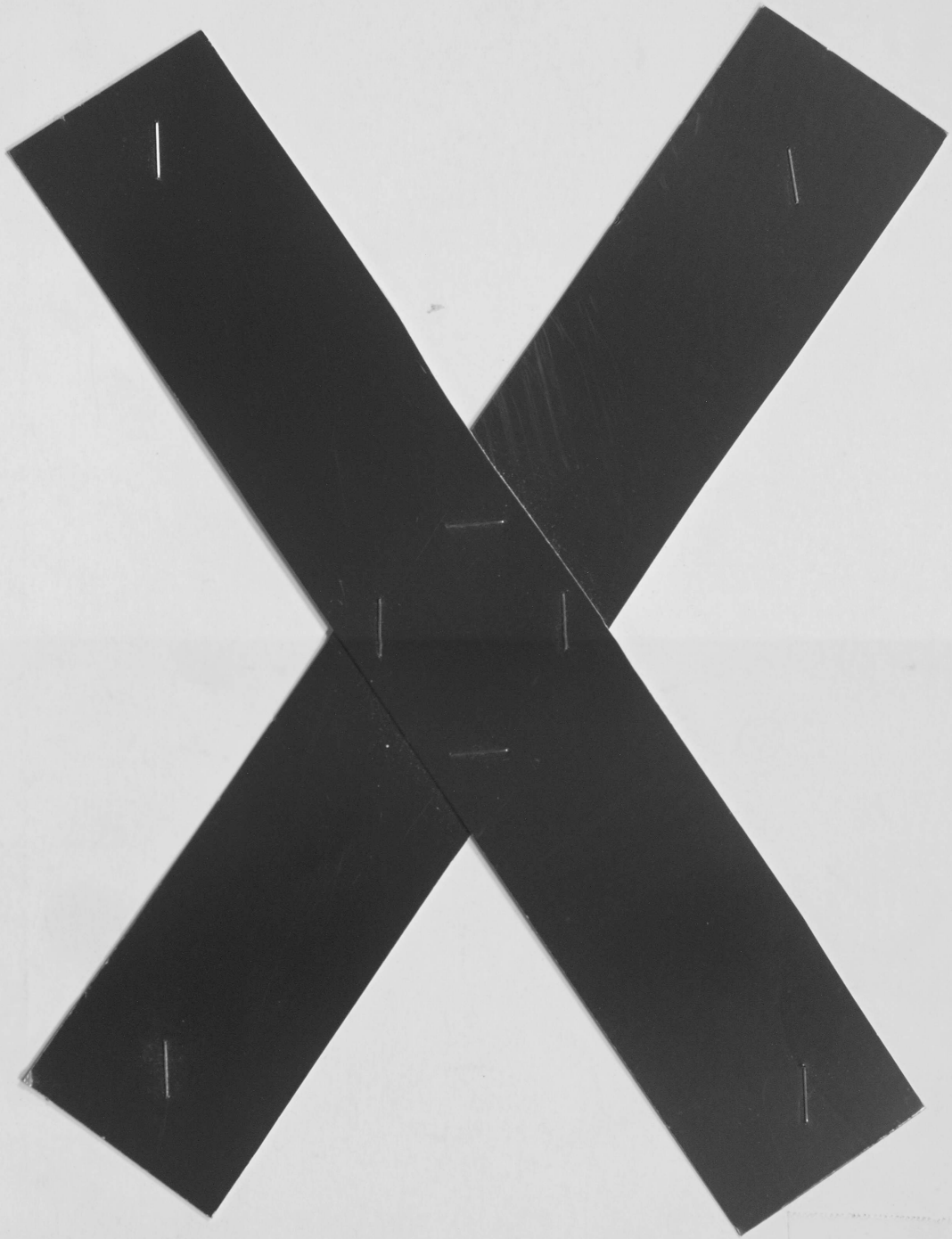
