Not that peddling a bike is too unusual, but it must be admitted that when one undertakes to ride a two-wheeler around the entire perimeter of the United States, Blanchar's idea of transportation is a little different than that of most tourists.

Blanchar, a licensed aircraft mechanic, left home last May 16, saving he wanted to see some country while he still had the chance.

Since that time, he has peddled his English bike through the States of Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, South Dakota, Minnesota and is now making his way through Michigan.

Leaving Tawas City early Frimorning, Blanchar was headed for Detroit where he will cross over into Canada, then to Niagara Falls, New York City and the eastern seaboard states. By the time it turns cold, he will be traveling through the South.

Although Blanchar's compact traveling equipment contains a sleeping bag, when rain threatens he often spends the night as a lodger in jails, fire houses and police stations. On more than one occasion, he has set up his sleeping bag in an all-night laundry-



ing recent weeks as candidates for the two major parties seek nomination for the November general election.

Contests at local and state lev els on both sides of Michigan's "two-faced" ballot will feature the August 2 primary election. Because of the large number of candidates on both slates, increased interest is expected to be generated by voters in this year's

Polls will open at 7:00 a.m. and close at 8:00 p. m. at the various voting precincts. Two years ago, there were only 1,400 persons voting. Next Tuesday's vote should be much heavier.

While many voters will be go ing to the polls because of county races, they will find races for 28th district state senator and for representative in the state legislature for the Alpena district, as well as other top state posts.

Names of 43 candidates appear on the ballot, 26 on the Republican side and 17 on the Democrat-

ions call for a drop in special season kill from nearly 47,000 antlerless deer last year to approximately 44,500 this fall. Any deer" take would dip from 2.5 to 2.4 per square mile. To obtain this kill quota, 92,700 special permits would be issued as com pared to the 97,000 permits that were issued for the 1959 season Strong public opinion figured prominently in the game divi sion's tentative kill quota. Field investigations indicate that 102, 000 antlerless deer could be harvested without harming the ogical make-up of the herd. The game men also estimate the fawn crop this year will roughly replace some 204,000 deer taken out of the woods since last November from hunting, starvation, illegal kill and all other reasons.

This is the time of year when a carelessly tossed cigarette, unattended campfire or the slightest spark can send a fire raging through acres of precious recreational, wildlife and wood-producing lands.
