## Wandering Cyclist Stops in Tawas on Long Trip

"You meet more people and see more of the country this way," was the reason given by Bud Blanchar, 28, of Puyallup, Washington, for his unusual mode of transportation when he stopped in Tawas City last week.

Not that peddling a bike is too unusual, but it must be admitted that when one undertakes to ride a two-wheeler around the entire perimeter of the United States, Blanchar's idea of transportation is a little different than that of most tourists.

Blanchar, a licensed aircraft mechanic, left home last May 16, saying he wanted to see some country while he still had the chance.

Since that time, he has peddled his English bike through the States of Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, South Dakota, Minnesota and is now making his way through Michigan.

Leaving Tawas City early Friday morning, Blanchar was headed for Detroit where he will cross over into Canada, then to Niagara Falls, New York City and the eastern seaboard states. By the time it turns cold, he will be traveling through the South.

Although Blanchar's compact traveling equipment contains a sleeping bag, when rain threatens he often spends the night as a lodger in jails, fire houses and police stations. On more than one occasion, he has set up his sleeping bag in an all-night laundry mat.

It was that way Thursday night when Blanchar was a guest of Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell and Isosco County. Had there not been a threat of rain, he probably would have pitched camp in some public park or farmer's field and the story of this visiting adventurer would have gone untold in this area.

Blanchar got the urge to travel sometime last March. He purchased a bike, drew \$350 out of his savings account and took off on his year-long journey. He expects to be back in his native state sometime next spring.

Although stating that he had a 13-mile paper route while a youngster, Blanchar had never peddled more than 100 miles away from home during previous travels.

Strapped to the homemade luggage carrier on his bike is a bed roll, extra set of clothing, cooking utensils, two cameras and other gear. He averages about 50 miles a day peddling his bike, but admits that when some particular point of interest catches his eye, he spends a little extra time there.

It was that way early last week when he visited Mackinac Island. "I goofed off there all day and traveled only 16 miles," he said. He made up for it by peddling 70 miles Wednesday and 80 miles Thursday.

He tread a bear while traveling through Yellowstone National Park, saw numerous antelope while going through Wyoming

and South Dakota and worked one day as a circus roustabout, to name but a few of his adventures.

His biggest headache in Michigan has been mosquitoes. He said he was nearly eaten alive (See CYCLIST, page 10.)

## Plan to Continue Swimming Classes

With July Red Cross swimming lessons almost over, plans are underway for the continuation of some classes and the addition of other classes in August. Lessons are scheduled for August as follows: Tawas City beginners, 1:00 to 2:00 p. m.; intermediate, 2:00 to 3:00 p. m., Monday, Wednesday and Saturday, with adult beginners meeting at 3:00 p. m. on Monday and Wednesday. In East Tawas on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, beginner classes will be at 1:00, intermediate classes at 2:00 and life saving class at 3:00. Adult class for those who have not learned to swim is two days a week in Tawas City and the new life saving class will be at East Tawas on alternate days.

For July lessons, there was a total of 102 beginners and 25 intermediates registered in East Tawas. In Tawas City, there were 155 beginners and 28 intermediates. Although there were 310 students originally registered for July, about 200 will finish the

courses and attend picnics which will mark the close of July lessons in both towns. In East Tawas, the picnic will be at 4:00 Friday, July 29, and in Tawas City on Saturday, July 30.

Registration for August lessons will be held at 2:00 p. m. in Tawas City Monday, August 1, and at 2:00 p. m. Tuesday, August 2, in East Tawas. Students who attend the picnics will be assigned to new classes at that time. All other interested potential swimmers must come on the day of registration to have a swim check and then be assigned to a class. Again, it will be necessary to turn in a medical slip for those who have not already done so.

As a final climax to the summer swimming program, an exciting water carnival is being planned. Everyone will be invited to watch each class perform separately. Every person who has taken lessons may participate with his class, according to Miss Carolyn Evans, instructor.

### Eye Welfare Deficit—

## Board Asks Report on County Offices

A complete financial report is to be made by all county offices at the August session of the Isosco County Board of Supervisors. The report is to include all expenditures to date with a comparison against the 1960 county budget for each office.

It was learned during last week's one-day session that the county's welfare load has again bankrupted the coffers of the department of social welfare.

Supervisors learned that the department of social welfare had expended \$17,137 in direct relief and \$24,369.93 in social welfare. As of July 20, there was a balance of \$162.43 in direct relief and \$42.62 in social welfare.

As an emergency measure, the board appropriated an additional \$1,000 for direct relief and \$1,500 for social welfare out of the general fund.

During recent years, rising welfare costs have been handled through appropriations from the county's emergency fund. However, this fund is nearly depleted.

Mrs. Nyda Bronson, director of the department of social welfare, said this week that the rising costs could be attributed to the large number of older people who ask for assistance. She said that because of the lack of room for these people in convalescent homes, several persons are confined in the hospital.

Mrs. Bronson said that many retired people have moved to Isosco County since 1957, which places a greater burden on the welfare load when they need assistance.

In other business, the board of supervisors turned down a request from County Agent Marvin Davenport for an appropriation of \$100 as expense money to attend the national convention in Miami, Florida. The board said it was willing to underwrite expenses at the state level only.

The board concurred with a resolution passed by another county which asked the conservation department for a two-year suspension on shooting dogs and fawn in Michigan.

Supervisor William White of Reno Township reported that District Health Department No. 2 would soon ask Isosco County for a larger appropriation because of

this county's increased population.

## Chamber Starts Membership Drive With Kick-Off

Sixteen persons attended the membership campaign kick-off breakfast for the Tawas Chamber of Commerce Tuesday morning at Vic and Zel's Restaurant, Tawas City. Chamber President Carlton Merschel named team captains and plans were made for the 1960 drive.

In announcing the start of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce's 1960 membership campaign, Bertha Montgomery, office manager, said Monday that \$2,000 has been allotted for advertising and promotions.

This figure includes a double page ad in the East Michigan Tourist Association's guide book and ad in tourist map; an ad for winter sports, smelt and perch run notices on Michigan Out-of-Doors; ad in Great Lakes Waterway Guide and a keep Michigan green ad.

Other items listed under promotion expenditures include: US-23 Booster Association contribution, Perchville maintenance, Michigan Ice Skating Meet in January, 10,000 resort folders and last minute special advertising.

Maintenance of the information office amounted to \$3,200.

The chamber lists the following outlets for information: 44 AAA information centers, four Michigan State Highway Information Centers; 167 radio and television stations, plus newspapers in a four-state and Canadian area receive weekly correspondence.

The office also assists Silver Valley in its promotions, plus assistance to other local projects and conventions.

Horse racing, exhibits and a huge midway will feature the 19th annual Isosco County Fair which opens today at Hale. The four-day event will run through Saturday.

Exhibits are to be assembled today (Wednesday) from 9:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. and are to be judged Thursday from 9:00 a. m. to 1:00 p. m.

Exhibition center will be located in the county garage. The Michigan State Police Safety-liner will be on display along with various farm equipment dealer displays.

Three days of harness racing will again be a feature attraction of the fair with prize money of \$7,200 being offered to winning drivers. Races will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday afternoons starting at 2 o'clock. Tawas Area High School's marching band will perform in the parade Saturday. Scheduled to start at 12:30 p. m., the parade will line up at the fair grounds and the line of march will be through the Hale business district. The Tawas band will be under the leadership of Drum Major Andrea Proctor.

There will be games and contests for the youngsters Saturday morning.

## Tawas Boat Qualifies for International

One Tawas boat will compete in the world's championship Lightning regatta which will be held on Tawas Bay in September.

The "Trio," skippered by Herbert Cox and Marvin Mallon, with Richard Moss as crew member, was among the top 10 entries out of a fleet of 48 boats which participated in the Michigan District Lightning Regatta.

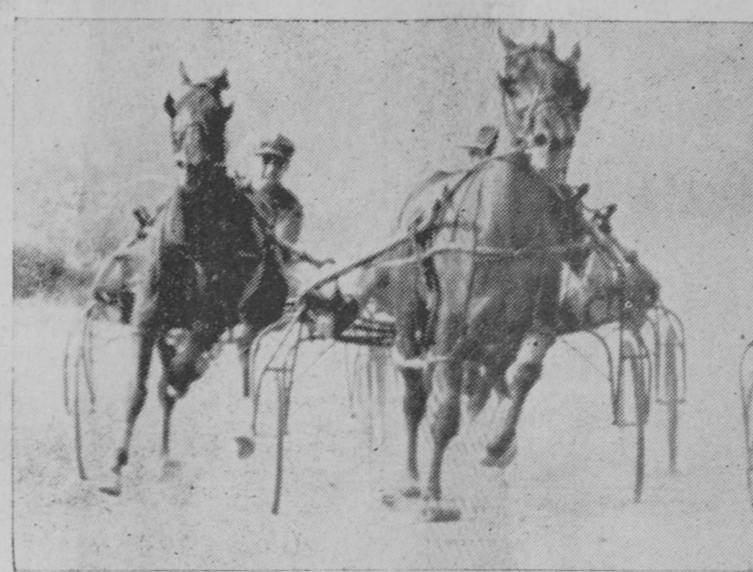
Five races were held at Higgins Lake Friday, Saturday and Sunday to determine the qualifying boats.

Defending his world's championship title in the international race will be Herm Nickels of Lake Penton, a member of Tawas Bay Yacht Club.

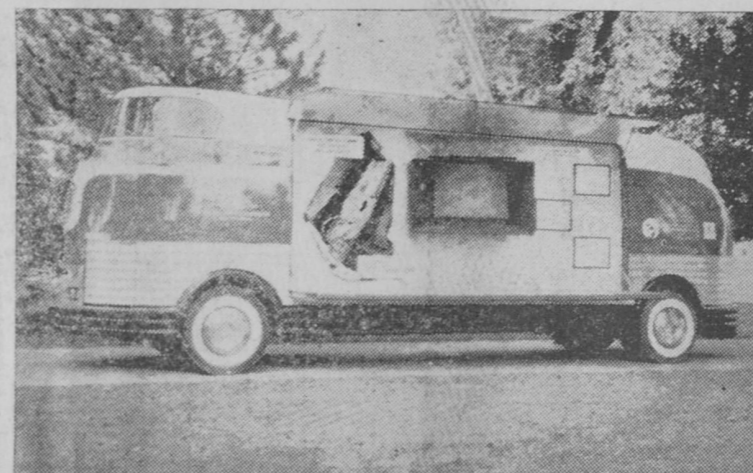
First place in the state meet was annexed by Henry Cavthra of Detroit, who also won the first place crown in the recent Tawas Bay Regatta.

George W. Myles, member of the hospital board, said that the directors are interested in obtaining this property for future expansion purposes of Tawas Hospital.

The pumping station has not been in use since Tawas City began purchasing its municipal water supply from the new East Tawas water filtration plant.

Myles also asked the water board to make a study of present sewer rates to determine if an adjustment could be made in favor of industrial users.

A cross section of present sewer revenues is to be studied and examples of new commercial and industrial rates are to be considered in order to determine if expenses will allow adjustments or changes.

The board approved a request from Elmer Burrell for extension of water and sewer mains on Tim Court in North Park Acres Subdivision. About 250 feet of mains are to be constructed which will serve seven lots. Under city regulations, this project is to be financed by the subdivider.

The board also authorized obtaining engineering on the balance of this subdivision plat.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz was authorized to obtain engineering and materials for construction of water mains on Nanette Street in Elms Garden Subdivision. This action was at the request of Arnold Bronson.

## 'Dynamite' Turns Out to be Radio Batteries

A group of youngsters from Camp Nissokone YMCA camp near Oscoda found what they believed to be a quantity of dynamite in a ravine near the Seven Mile Fire Tower last week. On investigation, Trooper James Ewer and Conservation Officer Jack LaPear learned that the "sticks" were radio batteries.

The officers said that there was a similarity between the batteries and dynamite, had a person never seen explosives before. The old batteries had been used in the fire tower's radio transmitter.

## Ballot to Have Many Races in County - State

Probably the liveliest campaign in recent Isosco County history has been taking place during recent weeks as candidates for the two major parties seek nomination for the November general election.

Contests at local and state levels on both sides of Michigan's "two-faced" ballot will feature the August 2 primary election.

Because of the large number of candidates on both sides, increased interest is expected to be generated by voters in this year's primary.

Polls will open at 7:00 a. m. and close at 8:00 p. m. at the various voting precincts. Two years ago, there were only 1,400 persons voting. Next Tuesday's vote should be much heavier.

While many voters will be going to the polls because of county races, they will find races for 28th district state senator and for representative in the state legislature for the Alpena district, as well as other top state posts.

Names of 43 candidates appear on the ballot, 26 on the Republican side and 17 on the Democratic side.

There are several contests at local level on the Republican ticket.

At the top of the local Republican ticket, incumbent Prosecuting Attorney Paul Harvey is opposed by William McCready; incumbent Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell is opposed by Walter Bessey; incumbent County Clerk George A. Prescott is opposed by Gerald L. Jordan.

Unopposed on the Republican ticket are Grace L. Miller, treasurer; Albert H. Buch, register of deeds; E. H. Stickeney, drain commissioner; W. D. Nunn, road commissioner.

There is a three-way race for county coroner. Edward D. Jacques and E. John Moffatt, incumbents, are opposed by Alvin G. Forstee.

On the Democratic side of the local ballot, Kenneth W. Frank seeks the nomination as sheriff; Olen Herriman is a candidate for county clerk; Clarence Oates is a candidate for the office of register of deeds, and Joseph Reinke is running for drain commissioner. Dale L. Adrain and Richard Killmaster are candidates for county road commissioner.

There are no Democratic candidates for prosecuting attorney, county treasurer or county coroner.

In area Republican politics, Charles T. Prescott, veteran senator of the 28th district, is opposed by Lewis T. Hubbs.

Five candidates are running for the seat in the legislature now held by James P. Mielock of the Alpena district. Other candidates besides Mr. Mielock are Lester G. Haken, G. Douglas Taipalus, John L. VanPatten and Walter W. Weinkauf.

Paul D. Bagwell is the lone Republican candidate for governor. Edward Hutchinson and Clarence A. Reid are candidates for lieutenant governor. Alvin M. Bentley and Donald S. Leonard are candidates for United States senator. Elford A. Cederberg, incumbent, is unopposed for 10th district congressman.

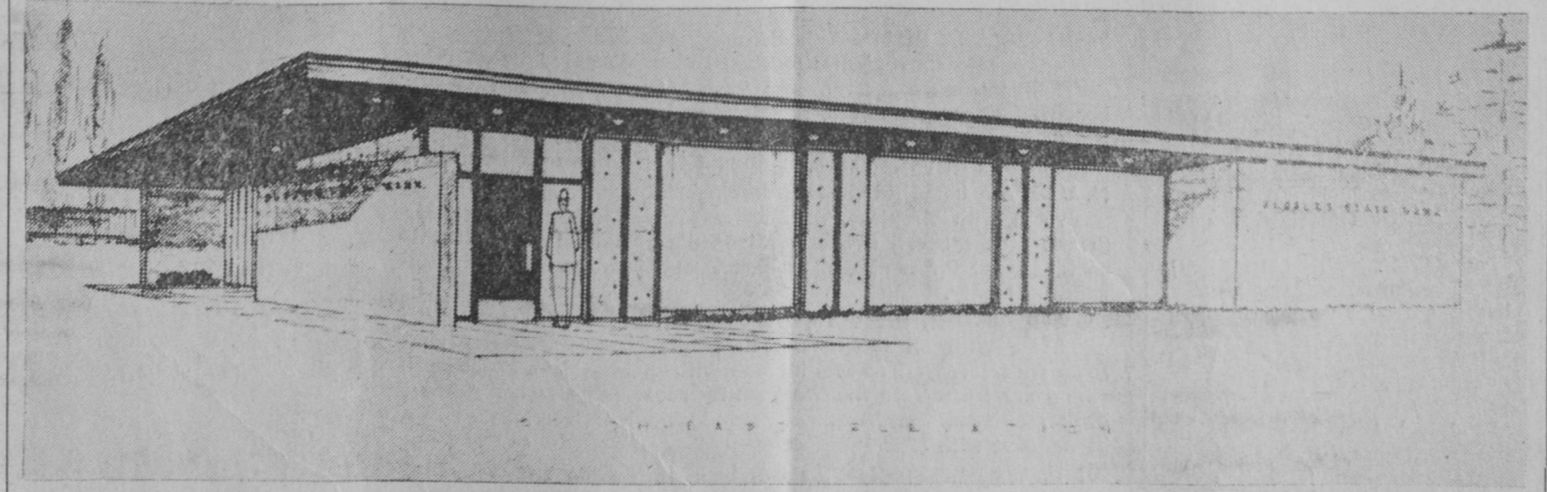
Martin Blumenthal seeks the Democratic nomination as state senator of the 28th district. Gerald M. Kendzioriski seeks the nomination to represent the Alpena district in the state legislature.

Three candidates seek the Democratic nomination as governor. They are Edward Connor, James M. Hare and John B. Swainson. Four candidates are listed for lieutenant governor: William J. Coughlin, George H. Dougherty, T. John Lesinski and Richard F. VanderVeem.

Patrick V. McNamara is unopposed in his bid for United States senator as is Daniel E. Reed for 10th district congressman.

## Start Construction on Branch Bank

O. S. Rose Builders, Incorporated, has been awarded a contract to construct the new Tawas City branch office of Peoples State Bank of East Tawas.

Announcement of the Tawas City firm's successful low bid was made July 20 by G. N. Shattuck, vice president and cashier. Mr. Shattuck said that construction is to start immediately on the 69 by 42 modernistic structure. Completion date is set

for January 1.

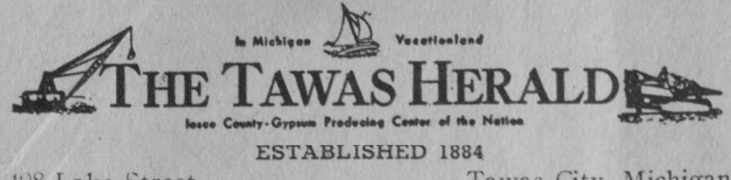
Construction on the building was to have started last spring, but, due to a delay in receiving final plans from the architect, the bid letting was necessarily delayed.

Two buildings on the bank property have been removed and the contractor is now in the process of bringing in equipment and materials.

The new building, which is to be located on US-23 west of The Tawas Herald office will be of brick construction with a sloping roof, overhanging 12 feet on the west side to allow for future expansion.

The structure will contain a 36 by 14-foot lobby, manager's office, large work area, a 13 by 10-foot vault, a room for safety deposit boxes, an eight by 10-foot office, two coupon booths, four room and two restrooms.

An 11 by 11-foot vestibule is to be located at the southwest corner of the building. A night depository will be located at the southeast corner of the building. The bank owns six lots, three facing US-23 and three facing Court Street to the north. The new structure is to be located in the center of lots facing US-23, with parking room for approximately 26 cars.

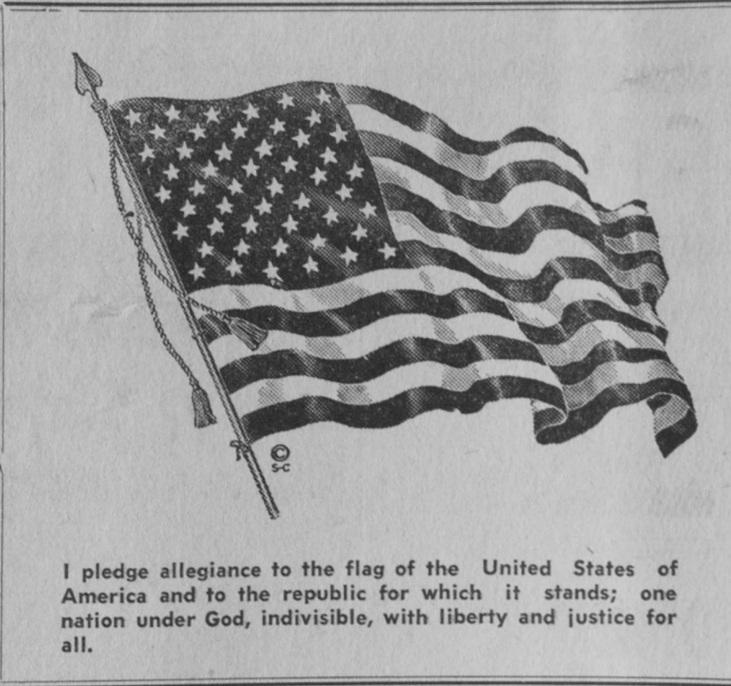

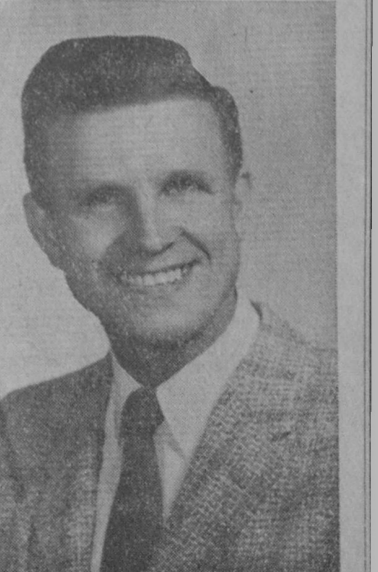

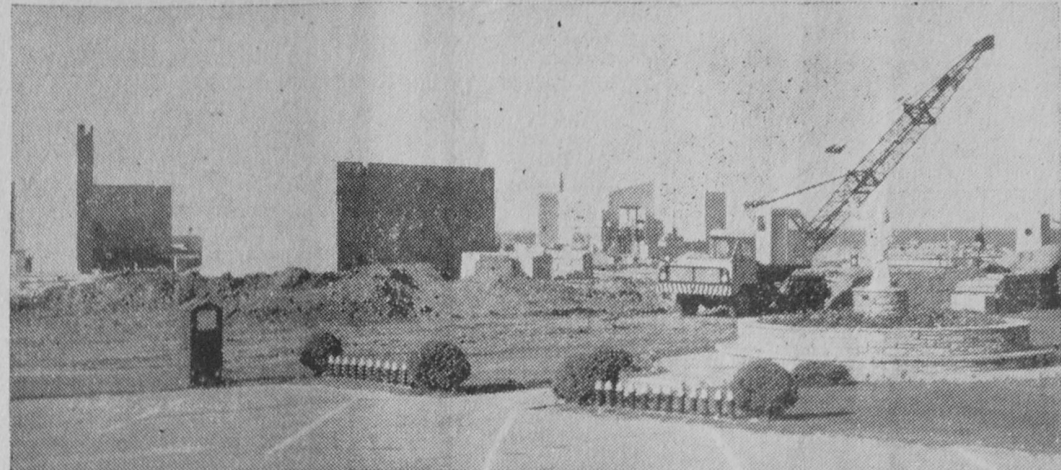

## Standish Man Appointed FHA Committeeman

Appointment of Casmere Jurek as a member of the Farmers Home Administration area committee was announced this week by Lowell F. Schaeffer, the agency's county supervisor, serving Arenac, Iosco and Bay Counties.

Mr. Jurek owns and operates a 390-acre dairy farm near Standish, where he resides with his wife and three children. He is a lifelong resident of that community and was appointed to serve on the committee because of his experience in farming, his knowledge of the farms and farmers in the area.

Two other members make up the three-member committee which works with the county supervisor to see that the best possible use is made of the agency's farm credit service program consistent with local farmers' needs.

The other two members are Thomas Logan of Standish and DeVere Burch of Bentley. Mr. Logan will serve as chairman during the next fiscal year.

The committee determines the eligibility of individual applicants for all types of loans. It also reviews borrowers' progress and aids the county supervisor in adapting the agency's loan policies to conditions faced by farmers in this area.

The Farmers Home Administration makes annual or intermediate term loans to farmers who need adequate funds to buy equipment and livestock and longer term loans to build or repair houses and other essential farm buildings and to purchase or improve land suitable for family-type farm operations. It also advances credit to farmers or their non-profit associations to establish and carry out approved soil and water conservation practices.

## New Law Extends Vets Guaranteed Loan Program

World War II veterans have two more years in which to obtain Veterans Administration-guaranteed home, farm and business loans as the result of a bill signed into law July 14 by Pres. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Under the same law, both World War II and Korean Conflict veterans can continue to apply for direct loans from the federal government if they live in designated rural areas where GI loans are not obtainable from the local lending institutions.

The new law authorizes treasury department advances of 150 million dollars in each of the next two years of this direct loan extension program. New expiration date for the guaranteed loan program for World War II veterans and for the direct loan program for both World War II and Korean veterans is July 25, 1962. The prior deadline for both programs was July 25.

Since it was started in June 1944, the GI loan program has guaranteed more than five million loans to World War II veterans, totaling approximately 41 billion dollars and to 775,000 Korean veterans, amounting to nearly nine billion dollars.

Since direct loans were first authorized in July 1950, the VA has made 165,000 direct loans totaling 1.03 billion dollars in rural areas and small towns where veterans could not secure loans from local lending facilities.

While both World War II and Korean veterans may now apply for direct loans through July 25, 1962, Korean veterans may continue to seek VA-guaranteed loans through January 31, 1965, through previous legislation.

The GI loan interest rate of 5 1/2 percent remains unchanged by the new law.

The new law also will require that earnest money deposits veterans make be placed in trust accounts so that they will be safeguarded in case the builder becomes insolvent.

Another provision will allow the VA to guarantee a loan so long as the application is received prior to the new terminal date. Formerly, the law provided VA had one year in which to issue its evidence of guaranty.

This amendment will allow the guaranty of loans submitted before the terminal date when because of title problems, delays in construction or other reasons the loan cannot be completed within one year.

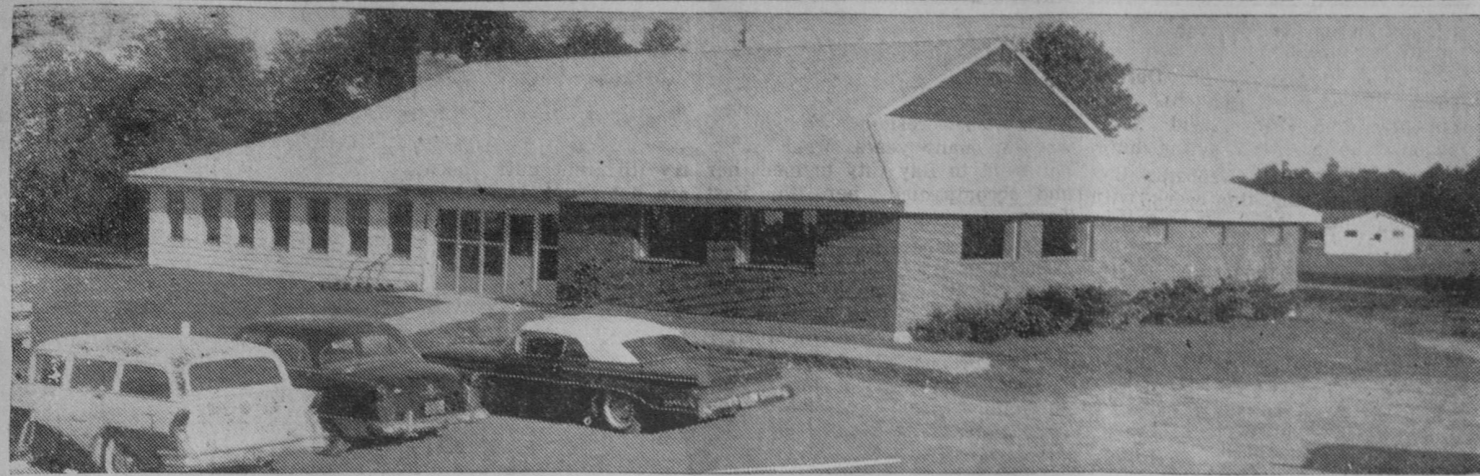

A 29-year-old Bridgeport man, Edward F. Pine, became Isosco County's fifth traffic fatality of 1960 early last Saturday morning.

Pine was dead on arrival at Tawas Hospital after sustaining fatal injuries in a crash 1.2 miles north of East Tawas on US-23. Investigating state police officers said that Pine, headed north, apparently lost control of his car after it had run off the right side of the road. The car swerved across to the left side of the road, rolled through a ditch and ended on its wheels in the driveway of Tawas Drive-In Theatre. Pine's body was found pinned under the wheels of his car. He died of a skull fracture.

# Local Road Finance Rests on County, Says Commission

Responsibility for financing improvements of local roads rests directly on county supervisors, according to a report read to the Isosco County Board of Supervisors during its one-day session last week. The county road commission reported that "the issue of local roads is a lost cause without local participation." It cited the fact that township participation in road construction was down this year. According to the report, it was not the intent of the legislature that the motor vehicle highway fund should finance all highway needs and this, it was said, was particularly true of local roads. Quoting from Act 163 of Public Acts of 1953, the report stated, "It shall be the duty of the board of supervisors to raise a sufficient tax to keep any county roads or bridges already built in reasonable repair and in condition reasonably safe and fit for public travel." Money allotted to county road commission for the maintenance and improvement of county local road systems represents the total responsibility of the state for local county road support. Additional funds required for the support of any county local road systems are to be supplied from other money returned to the state under the provisions of the constitution or from funds that can be raised by taxation in the townships or counties for road purposes within the limitations of the constitution and statutes of the state. "People feel that the county road commission is not moving fast enough on improvement of local roads," said the report. "Critics of the commission must realize that not only is it impossible for it to build every road in the county to trunkline standards, but the law clearly limits the amount of highway funds which can be spent." Under current statutes, money distributed from the motor vehicle highway fund may be expended for construction purposes on county local roads only to the extent matched by money from other sources. The law prohibits any county road commission from expending more than 25 percent of the total funds the county receives from the motor vehicle fund for local roads.

Delia Noel Owens, former resident of East Tawas for many years, died at Detroit Sunday, July 17. Funeral services were held Wednesday morning at St. Mary's Redford Catholic Church. Burial was at Detroit. The former Delia Noel, she was born at East Tawas August 2, 1880, and was 80 years of age. She was the daughter of the late Alfred and Eliza Noel. She was married at East Tawas to William Owens. After marriage, she moved to Wisconsin and later to Missouri, moving from there to Detroit. Surviving are one daughter, Mona, and two grandchildren. Her husband, a brother, Alfred, and sister, Blanche Wraether, preceded her in death. Mrs. John Scriber of East Tawas is a cousin of Mrs. Owens and Mrs. Alfred Noel, a sister-in-law.
