

Just mention a picnic and thoughts turn to hamburgers, frankfurters, rolls or buns, potato chips, pickles, baked beans and many other foods that are wonderful indoor-outdoor cookery fare. Deciding the date and time and place may be easy, but planning a menu often requires a bit of ingenuity. At a picnic any food goes!—but unusual twists to old favorites can add to a picnics' success.




