



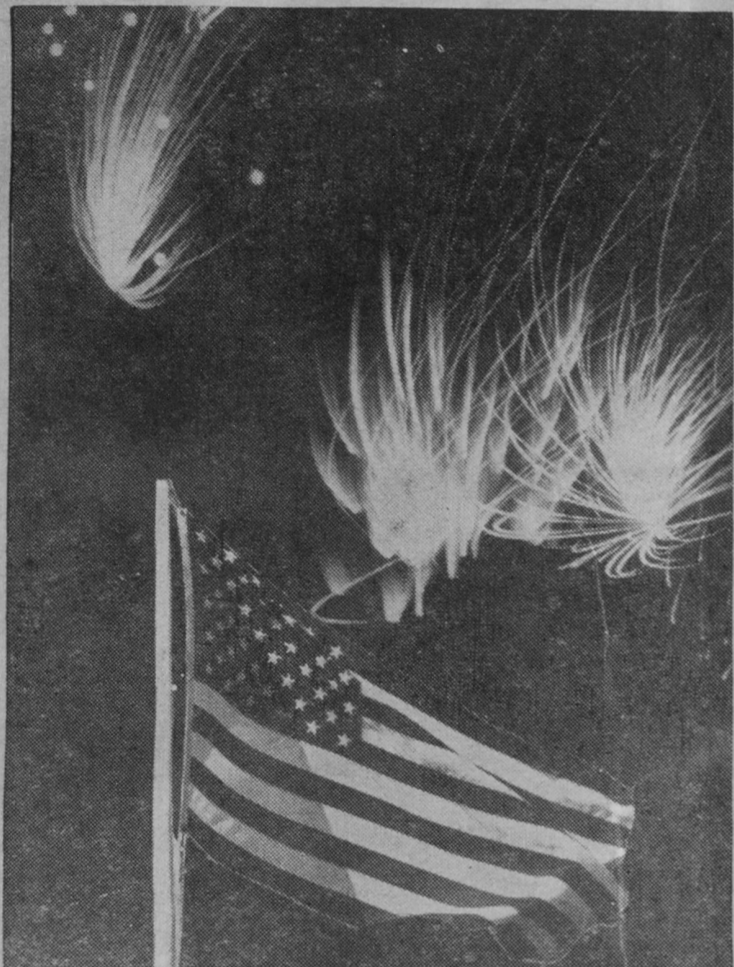
CENTER OF ATTRACTION during Friday's recognition day program at Wurtsmith was the B-52 bomber pictured above. Visitors had the

Thousands Jam County Over July 4th Holiday

Thousands of vacationers jammed into the Iosco County area over the Fourth of July holiday as the annual tourist season opened officially for the summer season.

Although temperatures were in the low 70s over most of the week-end, large numbers of visitors used picnic facilities in the state park at East Tawas and the Tawas City Park.

Boating activity was at a minimum on Tawas Bay because of small craft warnings from the weather bureau.

In spite of heavy traffic on US-23 and M-65, only a few minor property damage auto accidents have been reported by Michigan State Police and Iosco County Sheriff's Department.

From Friday through Sunday, state police at East Tawas counted 64 traffic arrests in this area. Six persons were arrested for possession of fire works. Seven emergency messages were delivered.

"If traffic is any indication, this is the largest holiday crowd that we have ever had in this

area," Undersheriff Leon Putnam said Monday morning. "Everything has gone along smoothly, however." He noted that only four people were jailed over the week-end.

By Friday night, nearly all motels, hotels and other tourist accommodations in this area were displaying "no vacancy" signs, perhaps for the first time this year.

The state park at East Tawas was forced to turn many campers away from the gates after it was filled to capacity Friday morning. Many downstayers stood in line early Saturday morning to grab any vacancies in the park when other campers had reached the time limit for staying there.

The sheriff's department reports that several motor boat operators were cited for reckless operation on Tawas Bay and inland lakes of the county.

Miss Mercer, a member of the National Honor Society, was awarded a \$200 scholarship to Ottawa University, Ottawa, Kansas, where she will study social sciences in preparation for a career she hopes to follow in Christian social service. She enters college in September.

Thousands Attend Program Welcoming SAC to Michigan

SAC—the retaliatory striking force of the United States—roared into Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda, last week on wings of huge jet aircraft and were given a tumultuous welcome by Michigan residents.

Throwing open the main gates of its sprawling 16,000-acre base in eastern Iosco County, the air force's recognition day celebration last Friday was attended by throngs of visitors estimated at upwards of 40,000 persons.

Crowds gaped as SAC flexed its muscles and showed off its death-dealing powers in the form of nuclear bombers, jet tankers and missiles.

Jets screamed across the field. Bands played. It was Wurtsmith's biggest day in history.

When gates closed Friday afternoon, tight security measures now wrap this installation. In the future, it will only be open to the

public during armed forces day observances.

The open house was staged to show Northern Michigan residents, many of whom had never been on an air force base, the SAC equipment. Each visitor who came to Wurtsmith gained considerable knowledge of SAC's mission and the deterrent role it plays in maintaining world peace.

At the same time, the first SAC jet unit to be assigned permanent duty in the state, the 820th air refueling squadron from Carswell AFB, Texas, was welcomed to Michigan by the military and civilian populous.

Many top air force officers and state officials were on hand to take part in the program.

The first KC-135 aerial tanker to be used here was formally christened as the City of Oscoda by Susan Flanders, Miss Oscoda-AuSable of 1960. Although her first attempt at smashing a bottle of champagne against the huge plane was a "dud," Miss Flanders' second well-aimed blow was greeted with cheers from dignitaries who were seated in the reviewing stand.

Lt. Gen. John P. McConnell, Second Air Force commander, rededicated this newest SAC base to the task of "peace with honor" and pledged air force support to the people. In his brief address, General McConnell recalled that his instructor during flying school days was Paul V. Wurtsmith, who later became a major general during World War II and for whom this base was named on July 4, 1953.

General McConnell, who stayed at a resort south of Oscoda during his visit here, was

Dies of Injuries Received in 2-Car Collision

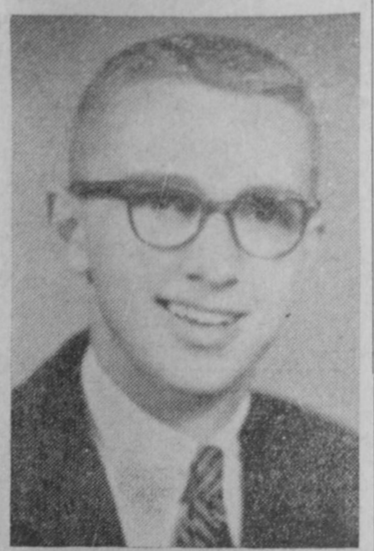
A 51-year-old Clarkston woman, Mrs. Sarah Kintz, died at Tawas Hospital last Thursday from injuries which she received the previous afternoon in a two-car accident at the M-65-M-55 intersection.

Investigating state police officers said that the victim's husband, Clyde Kintz, ran a stop sign at the intersection and rammed into the side of a vehicle being driven by Carl A. Lange Sr. of Whittemore.

Lange, who was traveling north on M-65, told officers that he saw that the other car was not going to stop but he was unable to stop or turn out in time to avoid a collision.

Kintz told officers he did not remember seeing the stop sign or approaching vehicle.

Mrs. Kintz was rushed by ambulance to Tawas Hospital where she succumbed to injuries the next day. Mr. Kintz was also hospitalized.

Much Activity at North Park Acres

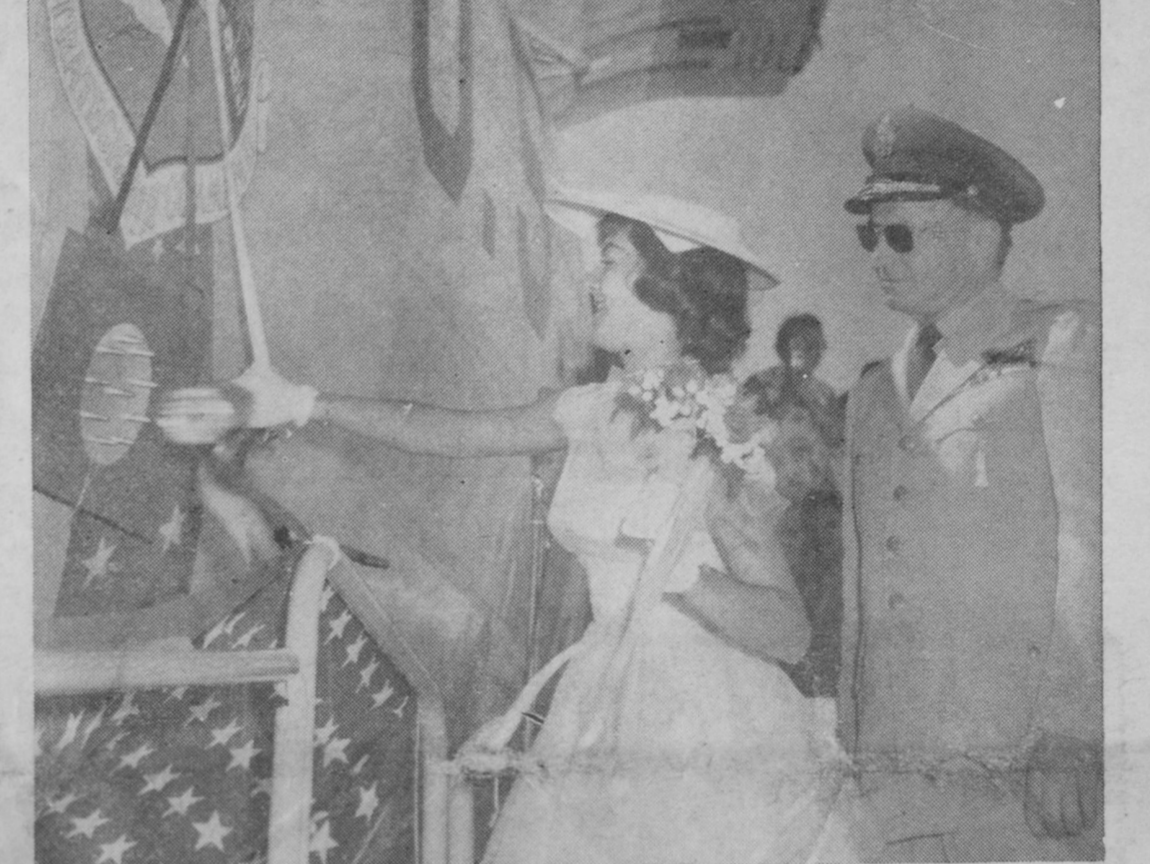
In the short span of only three years, nine new homes have been constructed in North Park Acres Subdivision located south of M-55 off First Avenue in Tawas City.

Elections July 11 to Name Board of Education Trustees

School electors of Iosco County will go to the polls Monday, July 11, to name four trustees to each of the four boards of education in the county.

Annual elections are being held at Tawas Area, Whittemore-Prescott Area, Hale Area and Oscoda Area Schools, who will guide school affairs for the next several years.

The polls of election will open at 7:00 a. m. and close at 8:00 p. m. Only persons registered as electors in the city or township in which they reside are eligible to vote in the Tawas Area District.

At Tawas Area, there are nine candidates who seek four seats as trustees on the board of education.

Incumbents seeking to be re-elected to four-year terms are William Look Sr. and Hugo J. Keiser. Candidates opposing them on the ballot are Joseph Dimmick, Clyde Soper and Mrs. Shirley Killey.

Four persons seek two positions as three-year trustees. They

are Donald Deering, Harold Hammond, Edward Sterling and Leonard Sarki.

Whittemore-Prescott Area voters will also have a full ballot from which to choose persons who will guide school affairs for the next several years.

Earl Daugharty and Everett Smith, incumbents, seek re-election to three-year terms. Walter Provoast is the other candidate for one of these two seats.

Candidates for four-year terms are Rudolph Grabner, Ralph Gesie and Henry Hasty.

Whittemore - Prescott Area voters will also decide on one proposition asked by the board of education. The proposition asks: "Since all bonds have been paid on the Sherman Township School and since there is no further need of a Sherman Township School Debt Retirement Fund, shall the board of educa-

tion transfer such money as has accumulated in said debt retirement fund to the general fund of Whittemore-Prescott Area School?"

PAGING PICNIC PLANNERS

Just mention a picnic and thoughts turn to hamburgers, frankfurters, rolls or buns, potato chips, pickles, baked beans and many other foods that are wonderful indoor-outdoor cookery fare. Deciding the date and time and place may be easy, but planning a menu often requires a bit of ingenuity. At a picnic any food goes!—but unusual twists to old favorites can add to a picnic's success.

Menus for the Choosing
Hamburgers, buns, barbecued potato chips, corn-on-the-cob or squaw corn (cooked, frozen or canned whole kernel corn seasoned with chopped pimiento and green pepper), cole slaw, fresh fruit, cupcakes and coffee.

Hamburgers, buns, kidney bean salad, relishes (celery, carrot sticks, olives, radishes), chocolate brownies, iced tea or lemonade.

Frankfurters, rolls, baked beans, corn sticks, sliced tomatoes, cucumber and onions, cookies, etc.

Frankfurters, rolls, potato chips, mixed green salad, coconut cake, coffee.

Hamburgers to Your Liking
Hamburger fans are usually content with hamburgers, buns, onions, mustard and catchup. But three unusually easy-to-prepare, easy-to-eat versions of this combination are Hidden Treasure Hamburgers, Onion Burgers and Cheese Center Hamburgers.

To make 6 Hidden Treasure Hamburgers, you'll need 1 1/2 pounds ground beef, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 3/4 teaspoon pepper, 6 thin slices of medium-sized onions and 6 teaspoons pickle relish. Combine ground beef, salt and pepper and shape into 12 thin patties. Place 1 slice of onion and 1 teaspoon pickle relish on each of six patties. Cover each with another patty and press edges together to seal. Grill slowly on both sides until browned.

For 6 Onion Burgers: Brown 1 1/2 cups chopped onion in 2 tablespoons butter or margarine. Add 2 teaspoons prepared horseradish, 2 teaspoons prepared

mustard and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Combine 1 1/2 pounds ground beef, 1 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Shape seasoned ground beef into 12 thin patties, spread onion mixture over 6, top each with another patty and press edges together. Grill slowly on both sides until browned.

Cheese Center Hamburgers are prepared with the same ground beef mixture and shaped into 12 patties as Hidden Treasure Hamburgers and Onion Burgers.

Then a tablespoon of grated cheddar cheese and 1 teaspoon prepared mustard is placed on each of six patties. Another patty is placed on top and edges are pressed together and grilled slowly on both sides until browned.

Frankfurters with a Flair
It is difficult to compete with the tantalizing flavor of frankfurters and pickle relish or frankfurters and catchup or mustard on a bun, but the homemaker looking for new ways to serve this meat favorite will no doubt delight in serving Sweet-Sour Frankfurters or Hawaiian Frankfurter Kabobs.

The Sweet Sour Frankfurters are prepared as follows, allowing 1 pound frankfurters for 4 servings: Dissolve 1 bouillon cube in 1/2 cup boiling water. Mix 5 teaspoons cornstarch and 1/2 cup cold water. Combine bouillon and cornstarch mixture, add 2 tablespoons chopped pimiento, 1 tablespoon chopped dill pickle, 1/2 cup vinegar, 1 tablespoon brown sugar and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Cook, stirring constantly until thickened. Serve the sauce on grilled frankfurters.

To prepare Hawaiian Frankfurter Kabobs, allow 1 pound frankfurters, 1 can (13 1/2 ounces) pineapple chunks and 8 slices bacon for 4 servings. Cut frankfurters into thirds. Drain pineapple. Thread meat, pineapple and bacon on 8 skewers, weaving bacon in between. Allow 4 frankfurter pieces, 3 pineapple chunks and 1 slice bacon for each. Grill Kabobs until bacon is lightly browned. To serve, slide meat and pineapple off skewer onto frankfurter rolls.

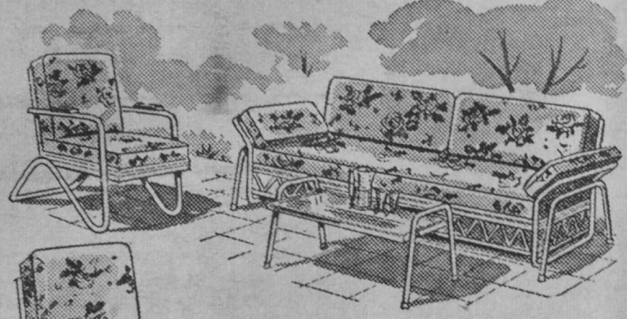

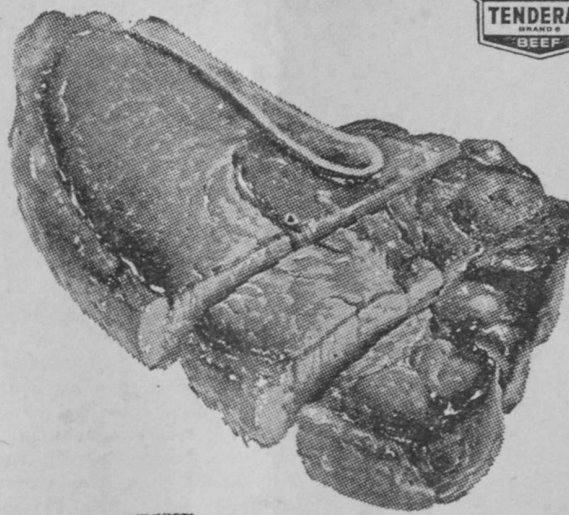

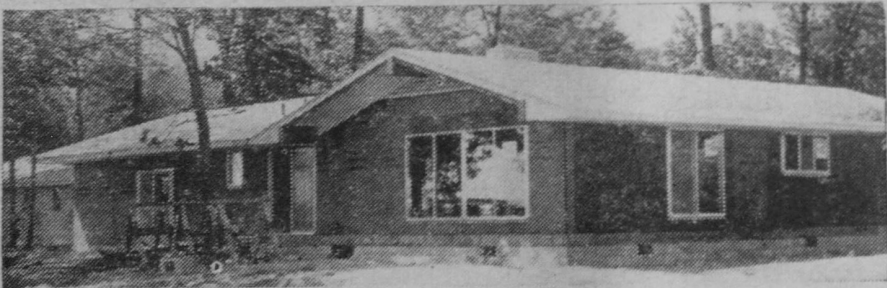

History of Aerial Refueling

A Strategic Air Command B-50 Superfortress, the Lucky Lady II, became the first aircraft to fly nonstop around the world in March 1949. In January 1957, three SAC B-52 Stratofortresses, flying at twice the speed of the Lucky Lady, circled the earth nonstop in 45 hours, 19 minutes.

These pioneering flights, and SAC's present ability to strike its force nonstop against any target in the world, were made possible by aerial refueling.

The concept of air-to-air refueling was first proved practicable in 1923 when two United States Air Service pilots transferred 25 gallons of fuel in mid-air. Six years later, Major Carl Spaatz and Capt. Ira Eaker, now retired general officers of the air force, used in-flight refueling to keep their trimotored Question Mark in the air over 150 hours.

But it remained for SAC to bring the aerial refueling technique to its present state of development. SAC's global mission required that its aircraft be able to perform extremely long-range nonstop flights—an impossible requirement unless the aircraft could be refueled in flight.

Development of existing air refueling techniques began. By the end of 1948 two refueling squadrons, using converted B-29 and B-50 bombers as tanker planes, had developed an aerial refueling capability. For the first time in air force history bombardment aircraft on organized missions were being refueled in mid-air to extend their range.

The next year the Lucky Lady's global flight dramatized the military importance of aerial refueling. SAC's B-29s and B-50s, through in-flight refueling, could be used as intercontinental bombers to supplement the long-range B-36. Six refueling squadrons were in operation by the end of the year.

Development of an aerial refueling capability within the command was accelerated in the summer of 1951. In October the first six jet B-47 medium bomber was delivered to SAC. Three months before, SAC had received its

Bread Suggestions Given for Iosco Fair Contestants

When today's homemaker steps into her kitchen, starts her oven going and then proceeds to make up a batch of fresh homemade yeast bread, she is probably doing it for one specific reason—she wants to enter the bread baking competition at her local fair.

At the Iosco County Fair July 27-30, to be held at Hale, fair officials will soon be busy judging these yeast breads—checking carefully for such things as tenderness of crust, symmetry of shape, lightness, fineness and uniformity of crumb, flavor.

Last year saw an increase of bread baking entries at most fairs across the country. One big incentive was a new fair bread baking awards program undertaken by Standard Brands, Incorporated, makers of Fleischmann's Yeast. Recognizing that America's fairs have long played an important role in keeping alive traditional cooking skills, a best of show yeast baking award premium was offered to fairs to be a special part of premium lists. Women (and even a number of men and boys) responded by entering many varieties of fragrant, tasty yeast breads, rolls and sweet breads.

Iosco County Fair is striving this year to increase the number of yeast bread entries, too.

These two prize-winning breads came from different parts of the country, representing just two of the many prize-winning breads. German coffee bread (prize winner at the Kansas State Fair) recipe is from Mrs. Anna M. Sherwood and Graham yeast rolls from Mrs. L. M. Monts of South Carolina, winner at the South Carolina State Fair.

GERMAN COFFEE BREAD

- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 1/2 cup (1 stick) margarine or butter
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 packages Fleischmann's yeast, active dry or compressed
- 1/4 cup warm (not hot) water
- 2 large or 3 small eggs
- 6 cups sifted flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- Scald milk. Stir in margarine, sugar and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Dissolve yeast in water. Add milk mixture, eggs and flour. Mix to soft dough. Knead lightly on floured surface until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl, grease top of dough, cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down into six equal parts. Roll each into seven by 12 inch rectangle. Brush with soft margarine. Combine sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg. Sprinkle over dough. Roll each piece up tightly. Braid three strips together on baking sheet. Repeat with remaining strips. Brush with soft margarine and sprinkle with sugar. Let rise until double. Bake at 350 degrees Fahrenheit for 30 minutes. When cool, decorate with icing. Yield: 20 braids.

GRAHAM YEAST ROLLS

- 2-3 cup milk
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons shortening
- 1/4 cup warm (not hot) water (lukewarm for compressed yeast)
- 1 package or cake of Fleischmann's yeast, active dry or compressed
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 1 1/2 cups sifted, enriched white flour
- 1 1/2 cups sifted whole wheat flour
- Scald milk. Stir in sugar, salt and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Measure water into mixing bowl. Sprinkle or crumble in yeast; stir until dissolved. Add lukewarm milk mixture and egg. Combine whole wheat and white flour. Add about half the flour. Beat until smooth. Stir in remaining flour to make a soft dough. Turn dough out on a slightly floured board. Knead until smooth and satiny, about five minutes. Form into smooth ball. Place in greased bowl. Grease top of dough. Cover and let rise in warm place, free from drafts, until doubled in bulk. Punch down. Shape into ball. Let rest 10 minutes. Shape into rolls. Bake at 400 degrees Fahrenheit for 15 minutes. Yield: 10-12 Rolls.

Sheriff's Deputies Handle Two Unusual Incidents

Civil Service Seeks Fire Fighters in District of Columbia

Approximately 100 fire fighters are needed, the United States Civil Service Commission announced today, to fill vacancies in the District of Columbia fire department. The jobs pay starting salaries of \$4,800 a year.

To qualify for these jobs, applicants must pass a written test and be in excellent physical condition. They must be between the ages of 21 and 29, be at least five feet, eight inches tall, and weigh at least 145 pounds. While they are employed as firemen, they must reside within a 17-mile radius of the United States Capitol.

Employment with the District of Columbia fire department offers many advantages. Fire fighters work five days a week; earn annual leave up to 26 days a year, depending on length of government service, and 30 days of sick leave a year with pay (unlimited if injured in the line of duty). They receive free medical and surgical care, their uniforms are furnished and they are eligible for inexpensive group life insurance and health benefits.

Full information and application forms may be obtained from many post offices or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. Applications will be accepted by the commission until further notice.

Coroner Moffatt ruled that death was due to a heart attack.

schedule because of the bumper-to-bumper traffic in M-171 and US-23. From that time until the program ended at 5 o'clock, there was a steady flow of traffic onto the base.

More people were congregated in this area than at any time in history and many persons arrived too late to witness the actual program. There was much to see, however, as the air force went all out in its welcome, without a doubt the largest open house program ever held here.

Main attraction of the recognition day celebration was a giant Boeing B-52 Stratofortress. Other aircraft on display were four jet KC-135 aerial tankers, KC-97 propeller driven tanker, C-124 transport, F-101B supersonic Voodoo and F-106 supersonic Delta Dart fighter-interceptors.

Featured entertainment included the United States Air Force Drum and Bugle Corps, which lived up to its billing as "the most spectacular drum and bugle corps in the world." This unit thrilled the crowd with its intricate marching routine and exceptional musical ability.

Other top notch entertainment included the "Top Hats," newest element of the USAF Band which has thrilled audiences in command performances all over the world, and the "Four Saints," a vocal, instrumental and comedy quartet. Also on hand for the big celebration was the Second Air Force Band.

Members of the 445th fighter interceptor squadron stationed here provided an aerial demonstration for the program. Several formation passes and maximum performance climbs in F-101B Voodoes fascinated the audience, as did a take-off of one of the KC-135 jet tankers. A sentry dog demonstration opened the afternoon program.

A \$50,000,000 program to develop Wurtsmith as a SAC base has been underway for three years. The airfield is used by SAC as part of its plan to disperse its forces.

After a squadron of B-52s is based at Wurtsmith next year, a total of 4,700 officers and airmen will be stationed at Wurtsmith and with their families the Oscoda area will be swelled by some 10,000 persons.
