TC Businessmen Oppose Minimum Wage Act

Expressing concern over what it termed "the continued encroachment on local affairs by central government," the Tawas City Businessmen's Association has gone on record as opposing extension of the minimum wage act to retail and service industries.

Such action is now being considered by a congressional committee and the local businessmen are writing to Michigan senators and congressmen voicing their disapproval of the proposed action.

According to the proposal, the provisions would bring all retailers, large and small alike, under the minimum wage requirements of the act.

Reasons for their concern were listed as follows:

1. An increase in governmental regulations of business—more snoots!
2. An enforced wage of \$1 per hour or more for the lowest paid employee; other employees would naturally demand higher amounts.
3. Time and one-half for all hours over 40.
4. The necessary elimination from the retail work force of many fine employees who are over a "highest production age" and young folks trying to get started on a life-time career.

"It is getting so that there is nothing sacred to your business any more," said Kenneth Conn, local insurance agent, who is

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Early Morning Blaze Routes Six Youngsters

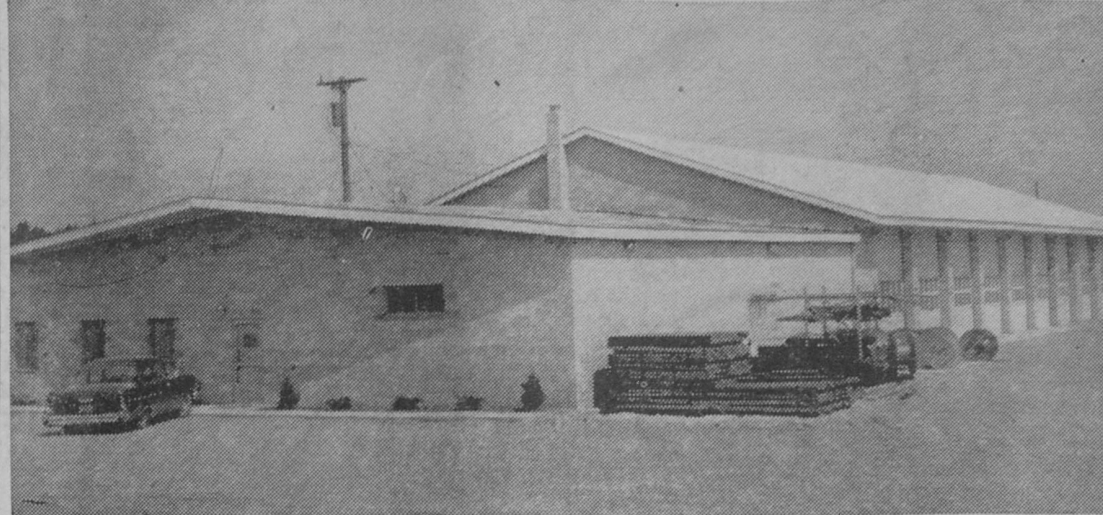
Six children escaped from the smoke-filled two story frame home of Mr. and Mrs. Dwight "Lucky" Gadd, Tawas City, early Monday morning.

Members of the Tawas City Fire Department fought the blaze for about one-half hour before bringing it under control. Flames were confined to a bedroom, but the entire top floor was water and smoke damaged and the bottom floor of the structure was damaged by water.

Fire Chief Fred Musolf said that the fire started in a bed mattress. The fire was discovered about 1:30 o'clock by the 11-year-old son of Mrs. Lillian Brubaker, who lives in the upstairs apartment with her three children. Mrs. Brubaker works at the Midway Drive-In and the youngster notified her while at work that their house was on fire.

Her two other boys, ages nine and 10, made their escape from the building. In the lower apartment, the three children of Mr. and Mrs. Gadd, twin girls aged 15 and a son, six, escaped in their night clothing. At the time, Mr. Gadd was working at Houghton Lake and Mrs. Gadd was working at the Holland Hotel.

A clothing and bedding collection has been started to assist Mrs. Brubaker and her three children, who lost nearly all of their belongings in the fire. The Red Cross is helping with the collection for the family. Anyone interested in helping should call Mrs. Richard Harwood, F.O.R. 2-2324.

Open House Slated for New Consumers Power Building

Consumers Power Company, Tawas branch, will hold open house at its new operation headquarters north of East Tawas on US-23 Saturday and Sunday, June 4-5.

Located in a new concrete block building leased from Floyd Schaaf, East Tawas lumber and building supply dealer, the building is headquarters for area line and tree-trimming crews, supply warehouse and fleet maintenance center.

It houses the offices of Jack Dummell, area line crew foreman, and Clayton Wood, who has charge of all tree-trimming crews. It is also the location for the company's radio dispatcher.

A maintenance garage, under operational contract with Rollie Gackstetter, is located there.

The new building contains 9,500 square feet of floor space and, in addition to other facilities, will house 27 trucks owned by the company. Some 47 employees will be operating out of the building.

Gordon Huck, area manager for Consumers Power Company, states that the company's merchandise sales room, appliance repair and

offices for the engineering staff and farm supervisor will remain at the main office in Tawas City.

In extending an invitation to the public to visit the new operation headquarters, Mr. Huck said that Consumers Power Company, with its 90-man payroll here, is one of the area's largest employers. Its annual payroll amounts to approximately \$440,000.

In addition, Consumers Power Company, with its vast land holdings and six hydroelectric dams on the AuSable River, is one of the area's largest taxpayers.

Equipment displays at the new headquarters in Tawas Center will include new line trucks and heavy pole-setting vehicles valued at more than \$15,000 each.

Other displays will include "hol line" trucks and safety equipment. Visitors will become familiar with services offered by the power company.

The Tawas facilities are part of the Bay City Division of Consumers Power Company, L. A. Vaupre, division manager.

Iosco Highways Were Safe Over Holiday

Iosco County highways escaped serious traffic accidents over the Memorial Day holiday. State police and Iosco Sheriff's Department report a total of 12 minor property damage accidents. Most serious was a four-car collision Monday in Whittmore. No one was injured.

From noon Saturday through midnight Monday, state police at East Tawas made 95 arrests. Although issuing a large number of traffic tickets, the Iosco Sheriff's Department reported that only three persons were lodged in the county jail over the week-end.

All highways in the county saw heavy traffic conditions, particularly Friday night and Saturday. Inland lakes in the county were crowded with fishermen and boating enthusiasts, but the sheriff's department reports only one reckless operation of a motor boat.

Authorization was given to sell two school buses, which will be replaced this fall.

The board approved entering into contract with the state for securing national defense education funds for testing and guidance.

Sportsmen's Club Asks Use of Paper Targets at Range

Paper targets should be used on a rifle range, not bottles, tin cans and other odd assortments of junk. These were the sentiments expressed this week by officials of the Iosco Sportsmen's Club.

Having constructed a new range near the Tawas City dump in Baldwin Township last year, local sportsmen have had to play "junk men" every so often in order to make the range look presentable.

Instead of using regulation paper targets on the racks, many who use the range set up bottles, cans and other articles on the target frames and plink away with their rifles. As a consequence, the range has been re-built twice—large posts have been cut off by rifle slugs and the frames riddled.

After rebuilding the range again this spring, Stanley Rodgers, sportsmen's club president, ad-

monished range users to use regulation targets. "You would think that a person who spends good money on a rifle and other equipment would use common sense on the range," said Rodgers. "We welcome the public to make use of these facilities, but it takes a lot of time, money and effort to provide these facilities. We wish people would use a little more judgment."

Conservation Officer Arthur Leitz said that he had a supply of targets which are available. "It is a rather simple matter to paste stickers over the holes in the paper targets and by doing this, it will prevent the needless destruction of target frames and posts," said Leitz.

Shooting benches, constructed and donated to the sportsmen's club by Frank Block, are located at one end of the range.

and Detroit and Mrs. Ruth Bussineau of Ferndale.

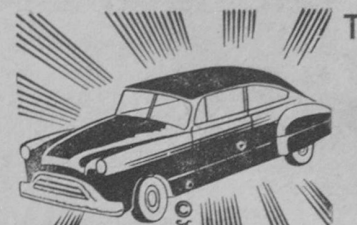
Mrs. Hill was a member of Detroit Chapter No. 116, Order of Eastern Star.

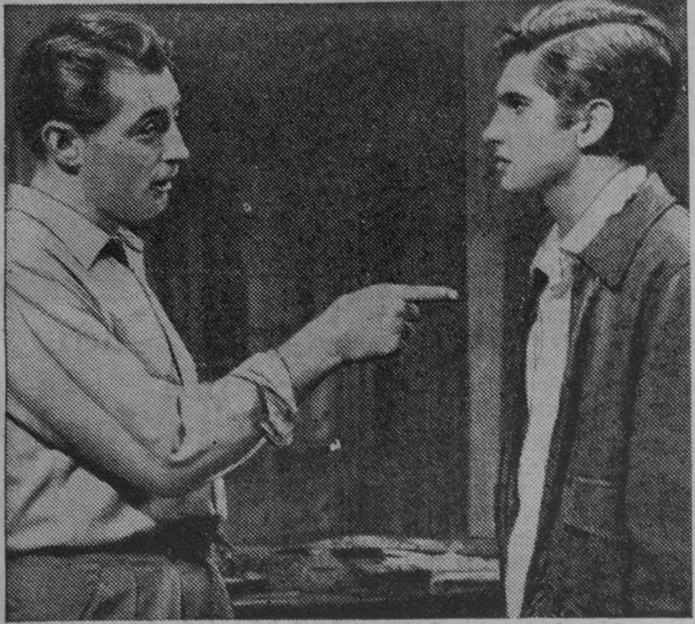

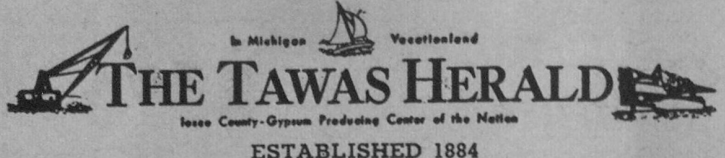

BEGINS 13th YEAR OF SERVICE AMONG MIGRANT WORKERS

Recently, the Roman Catholic Diocese of Saginaw began its 13th annual program for the spiritual care of Mexican migrants. The program, called the Mexican Apostolate, is under the direction of the Rev. Fr. Robert A. Keller of St. Joseph's Church, Saginaw. Ninety-five percent of the Spanish speaking migrants who come to the area are Catholics. They number about 8,000. The workers are divided almost equally into two types: Mexican, nationals in this country on work visas and family units from Texas.

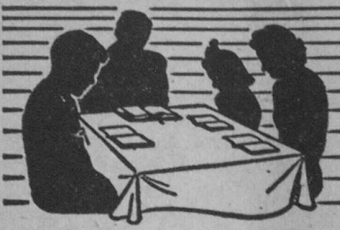
To aid the local pastors and lay groups in caring for the religious needs of these people, eight Spanish speaking priests from Mexico and Latin America have arrived.

Migrant centers are set up in the parishes where the migrants are more heavily concentrated. This year there will be centers in Alma, Alpena, Crosswell, Hemlock, Merrill, Munger, Pigeon, Reese, Saginaw, Sebawing and Standish. Each center is staffed by a Spanish speaking priest and seminarian who are assisted by various lay groups of the parishes.

Mexican Apostolate expenses amount to about \$25,000 annually. Funds are secured by voluntary offerings of the people of the diocese on Easter Sunday.

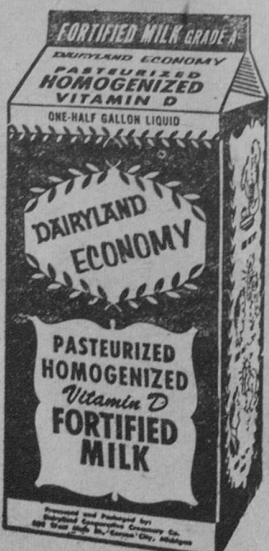

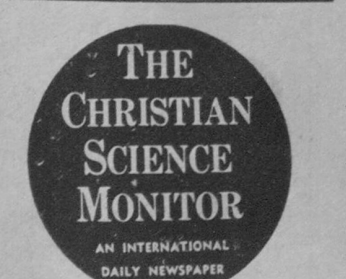

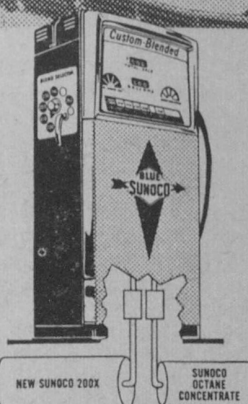

1959 Iosco Highway Accidents Cost \$775,000

The estimated cost of highway accidents and fatalities in Iosco County in 1959 came to \$775,000, according to averages worked out by the National Safety Council.

According to James M. Hare, chairman of the Michigan State Safety Commission, the estimated cost of Michigan's 1,469 fatalities and 198,771 recorded accidents came to an appalling \$227,695,000 or nearly a quarter of a billion dollars in 1959.

"The annual report of the Michigan State Police shows that 325 accidents occurred in Iosco County in which five persons were killed and 117 were injured," Hare said.

"In calculating the costs of motor vehicle accidents the safety council takes into consideration medical expense, wage loss, cost of insurance and property damage," Hare said.

"More difficult to calculate is the cost incurred when a wage earner is killed or permanently injured by a hit-run or uninsured motorist," Hare pointed out. "The original hospital or funeral costs can be readily ascertained, but the

Exemptions Named in Law Effecting 4 Percent Use Tax

Public Act No. 119 signed by Gov. G. Mennen Williams April 26 specifically exempts summer camps from the four percent use tax on transient rooms which became effective September 1, 1959. (Tangible personal property sold by summer camps is still subject to sales tax.) Also exempt and not taxable are rooms or accommodations rented for a continuous period of more than one month; rooms or accommodations furnished by hospitals, nursing homes, convalescent homes, mental institutions or other organiza-

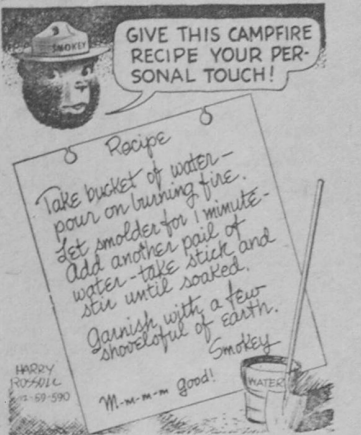
tions dedicated to the care and treatment of the sick under medical supervision. Rooms furnished directly to the federal government are exempt provided an exemption certificate issued by the comptroller general is executed. Rooms furnished to state and/or local governments, however, are taxable. Also taxable are rentals charged to churches, schools or other organizations.

As defined in the act, "hotel" or "motel" means a building or group of buildings in which the public may obtain accommodations for a consideration, including, without limitation, such establishments as inns, motels, tourist homes, tourist houses or courts, lodging houses, rooming houses, nudist camps, apartment hotels, resort lodges and cabins and any other building or group of buildings in which accommodations are available to the public. Persons operating a rental business in any of the above should be registered with the revenue department.

With the tourist season getting into full swing, revenue department examiners have been in-

structed to check all hotels and motels in their assigned territory with particular attention being paid to resort areas. Individuals renting cottages, cabins or rooms may register with the department by writing to the Use Tax Division, Michigan Department of Revenue, Lansing 22, Michigan, or by contacting the department's local representative in their area.

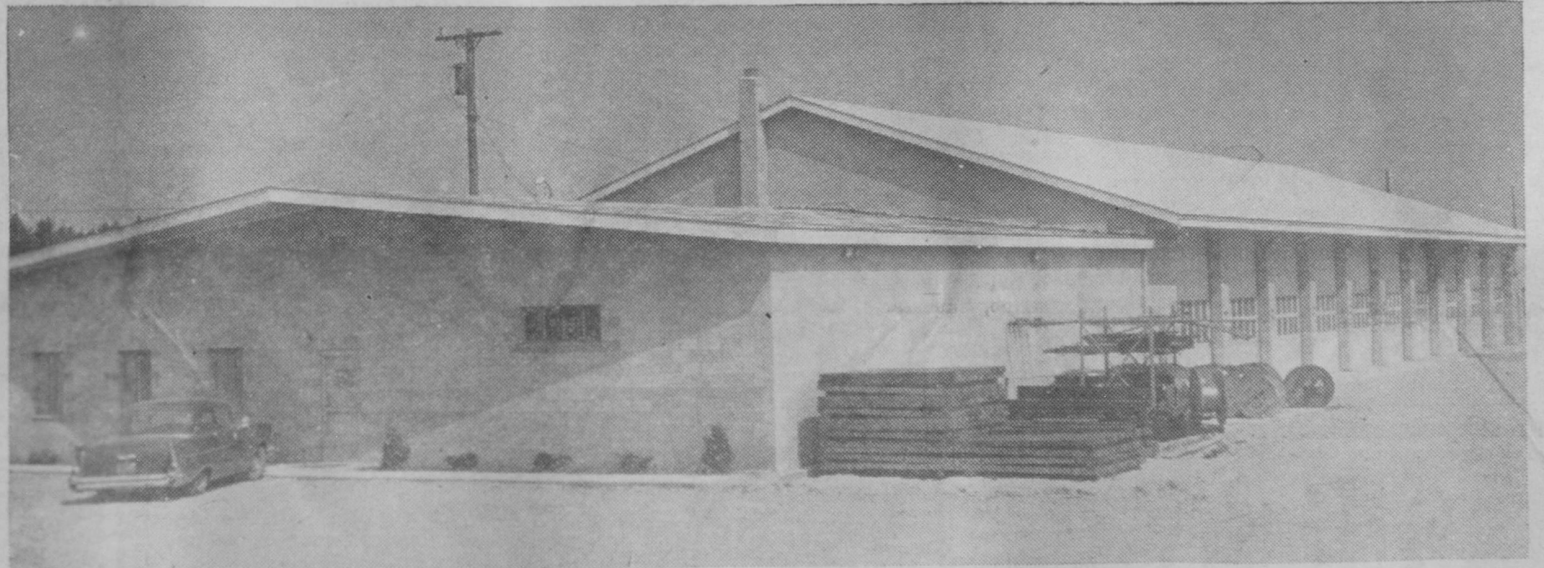

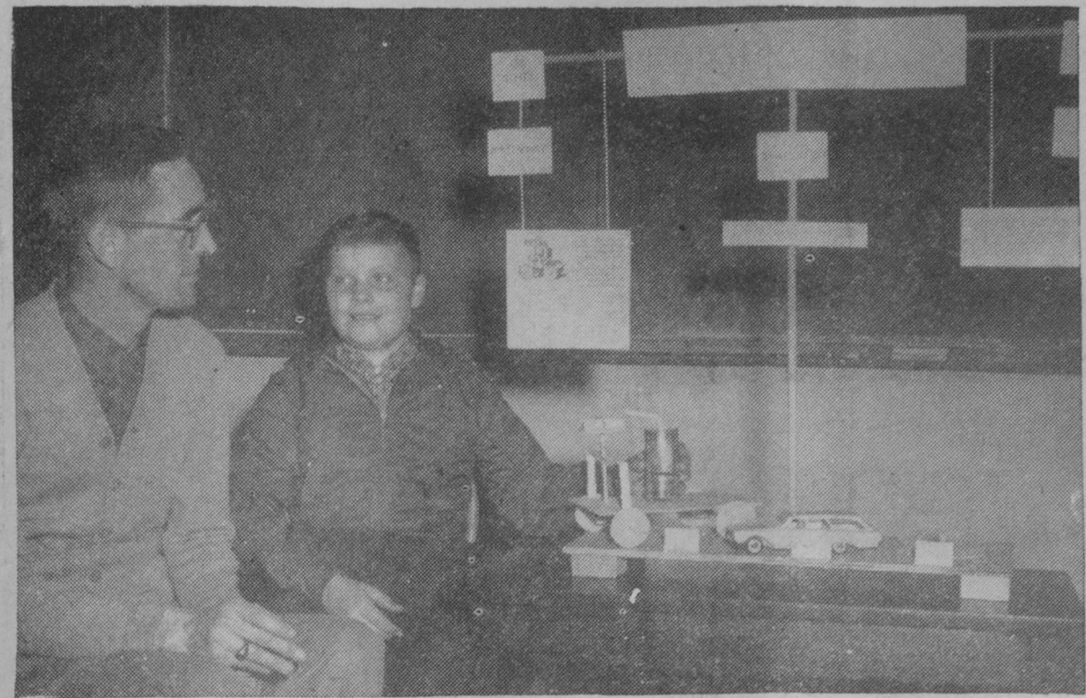

AN INTERESTING semester project turned in by John Coyle, eighth grade general science student at Immaculate Heart of Mary School, is being demonstrated to William Murray, science instructor, above left. The eighth grader spent about 50 hours of work on this project which shows the evolution of the automobile. The exhibit includes a working scale model of a seventeenth century steam-driven "car," a model of a present-day automobile and a model of a possible car of the future. Working in his basement, the youngster used balsam wood to construct the steam car. It contains a steam boiler fashioned from a tin can. As steam escapes under pressure from the boiler, it pushes against a windmill attached to a vertical shaft causing the rear axle to revolve. The car of the future is a wooden disc to which is attached a rubber balloon. Demonstrating the principle of the British Hovercraft, compressed air is released through vents in the base of the disc. As a result, the entire machine rests on a cushion of air and can be propelled through vents at the rear of the model.—Tawas Herald Photo.

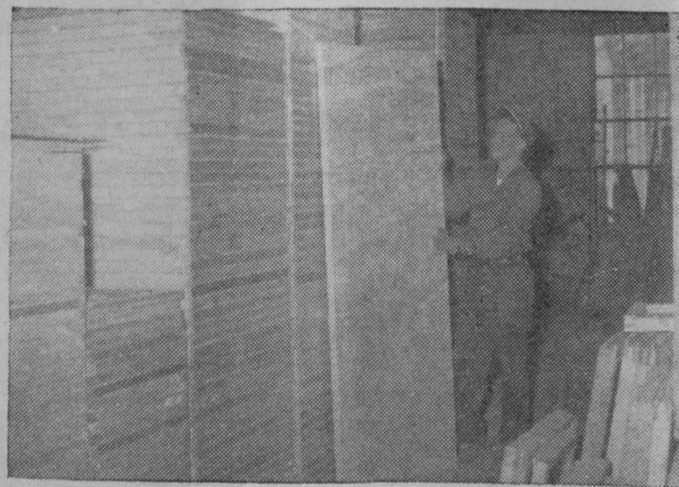
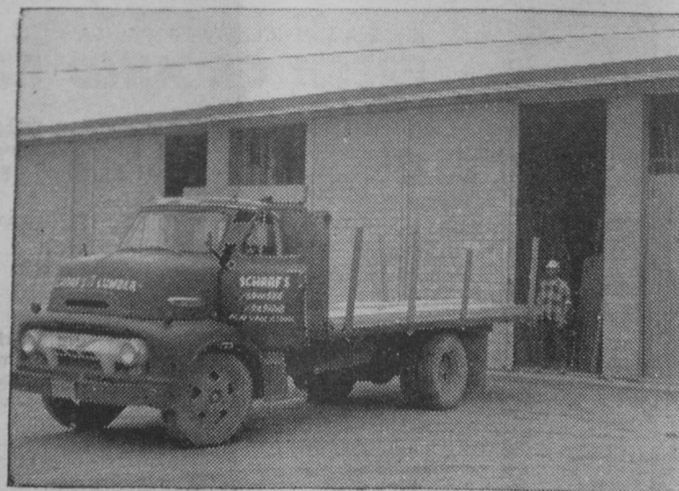

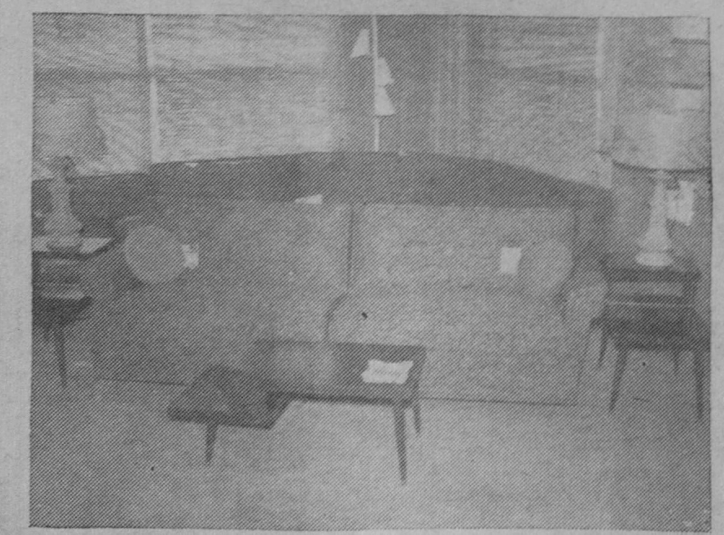

Disability May Change Social Security Status

If you have a severe and long-lasting disability which prevents you from engaging in any substantial gainful activity, you may be eligible for protection under the disability provisions of the social security act.

Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City social security district office, stated today. Under these disability provisions, you may be eligible for a monthly disability benefit if you are age 50 to 65 or if you are under age 50, you may have your social security record frozen to protect your own and your family's future benefit rights.

In order to qualify for either the freeze or disability insurance benefits, you must have worked at least five out of the last 10 years under social security. The work does not have to be continuous but it must be within the 10-year period before you became disabled.

If you think you may qualify for a disability benefit or a disability freeze, you should contact your social security office or a representative, who will be in East Tawas at the Federal Building Thursday, June 9, at 10:30 a. m.

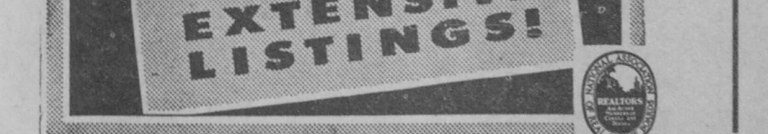

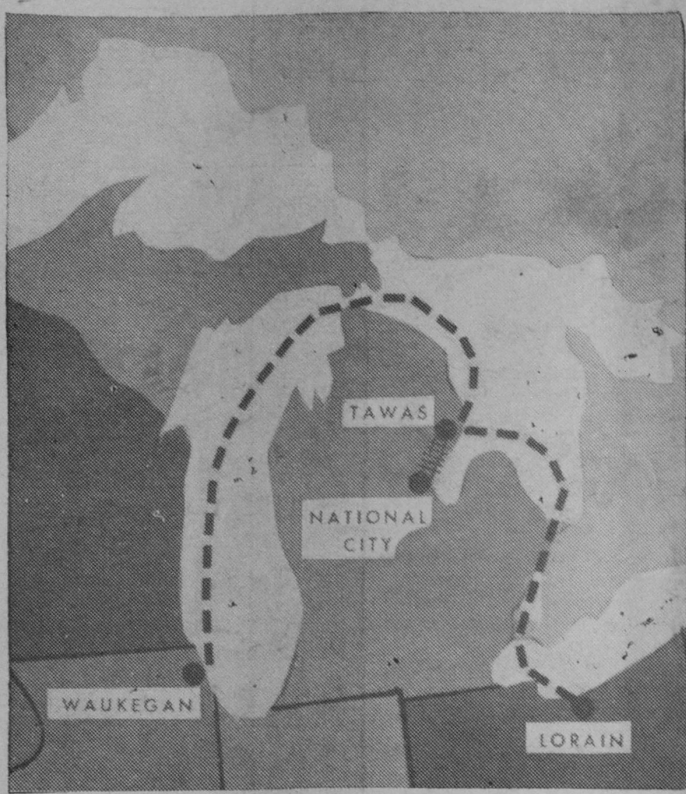

NATIONAL GYPSUM COMPANY'S new 25 million dollar Great Lakes production network will be completed with ceremonies at Lorain, Ohio, June 8. Key to the mining and manufacturing network is the 100 million ton gypsum deposit discovered by National Gypsum geologists near Tawas in 1954. The mineral is mined there and shipped by rail to storage and dock facilities on Tawas Bay. From there, bulk cargo vessels carry the raw gypsum to the company's Waukegan, Illinois, plant on Lake Michigan, and to its Lorain, Ohio, plant on Lake Erie. The gypsum also is shipped by rail to the company's plant at National City. The three plants can produce enough gypsum wallboard, lath and plaster for 100,000 new homes a year.
