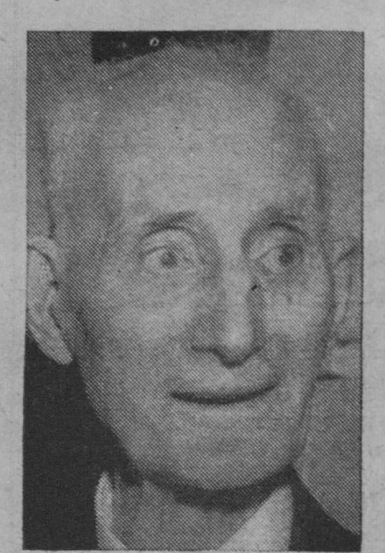


Seventh Annual Tawas River Canoe Race Set for Sunday

Police Get Assist From Resident in Solving Tawas B&E

City and state police had an assist from an observant East Tawas resident last week in solving the Wednesday night burglary of Vic and Zel's Restaurant in Tawas City.

As a result, Arthur L. Atkinson, 17, of Rural Route No. 1, Tawas City, and a 16-year-old East Tawas youth were arrested. Atkinson entered a plea of guilty to breaking and entering in the nighttime when arraigned in justice court and is being held at the county jail under \$500 bond. The 16-year-old, arrested as a delinquent minor, was turned over to his parents.

After being called to the restaurant by the owner, Victor Forcier, who discovered the break-in when he opened for business Thursday morning, Tawas City Police Chief George Ruth and Michigan State Police Trooper Stanley Flis had only a few clues upon which to start an investigation.

Two pairs of footprints were found outside the rear window where the entrance was made. Approximately \$40 in change and bills had been taken from a cash box and register. Nothing else was touched.

The owner gave police the names of two youths as possible suspects. They had been employed there at one time as dishwashers.

An East Tawas resident, on hearing of the break-in, called police Thursday to say he had seen two possible suspects near the restaurant Wednesday night. Driving along Mathews Street on his return to East Tawas, the man saw two youths walking along the street. He recognized the 16-year-old and, as it turned out, the boys were the former dishwashers.

Picked up for questioning, the boys denied they were involved. Later, they changed their stories and admitted the break-in.

Atkinson said that they had planned to break in Friday night, but, when they ran out of spending money, changed their plan and broke in Wednesday after the restaurant closed.

kindly old man. Many honors have been bestowed upon the man, whose life spans numerous historical milestones in the nation's and state's history.

Whittemore had held an annual Peter Cameron day. Good friends would get together and telegrams from the governor and president would be read. The sportsman of the century award was bestowed on Cameron four years ago. He has been made an honorary captain of an airline. He has been on television and appeared at the New York Sports Show twice.

Cameron was honored during the Tawas City Centennial in 1954 and during the Iosco County Centennial celebration in 1957. In the latter, he rode on a horse-drawn wagon during the centennial parade through the Tawas and in the parade at Whittemore.

A resident of Iosco County for a number of years, Cameron made his home with his cousin, Frank Peters, on a farm five miles southwest of Whittemore. He was born June 7, 1852, in Burnside Township in Lapeer County. His mother died when she was 96, his grandmother when 100. He made his home at different times during his long life in Flint, Bay City and other Michigan communities.

His wife, Rosetta, died some 60 years ago.

Camey greeted his visitors for his small birthday party from his bed in the rest home. His lean, six-foot frame has dwindled to some 135 pounds. His mind is just as good as it ever was.

"I've been hunting deer in Michigan ever since I was 13 years old, that would be back in 1865," Camey told his visitors. The last time he trekked off to the woods to stalk deer was four years ago. He did not get a chance to hunt any game though, because shortly after camp was set up he became ill.

He bagged a deer when he was 100 years old on the second day of the season. He does not have too many plans for the future, except he would like to "go home" and do some deer hunting if he is able.

Development of Point is Assured by Commission

Although urging for the immediate start of some work at Tawas Point this summer possibly went for naught, a special committee of Iosco residents returned from Thursday's conservation commission meeting at Higgins Lake with assurance that the property is in line for development as a state park—possibly in 1961.

The commission formally voted to defer any attempt at collecting state park fees authorized by the legislature until 1961, principally because it does not have the money to set up means of collecting. The legislature has also authorized a bond issue up to \$10,000,000 for capital outlay improvements.

Money for improvements, such as at Tawas Point, will not be available until next year. Need for improvements and development of the Tawas Point property as a state park were outlined by Carl Babcock and Elmer Werth.

The committee submitted a copy of a resolution from the Iosco County Board of Supervisors surmounting any claim it had on the property. Both the state and county had applied to the General Services Administration for the federal surplus land and one or the other had to step aside in order that the property might be

Steve Kolonich and Larry Kindell of Iosco County will defend their championship title in the seventh annual Tawas River Canoe Race scheduled to be run Sunday, June 19.

The local team has led the field at the finish line in five of the six races and are past champions of the AuSable River Marathon and many other Michigan canoe races. Two races will be held this year. The annual senior race, scheduled to start at 2:00 p. m., will be preceded by a junior race set to get underway at 10:00 a. m.

This will be the first time that a race has been held on the Tawas River for youngsters. Boys and girls 15 years of age or younger will race the regulation course. There will be no entry fee in this division and trophies will be awarded for the first three places.

Contestants in the annual senior race must check in at the Tawas Chamber of Commerce office be-

fore 12 o'clock noon the day of the race. The chamber is sponsoring \$75 for their efforts. Other cash prizes will be \$25 for second place

and \$15 for third. In addition, trophies will be awarded for the first 10 places.

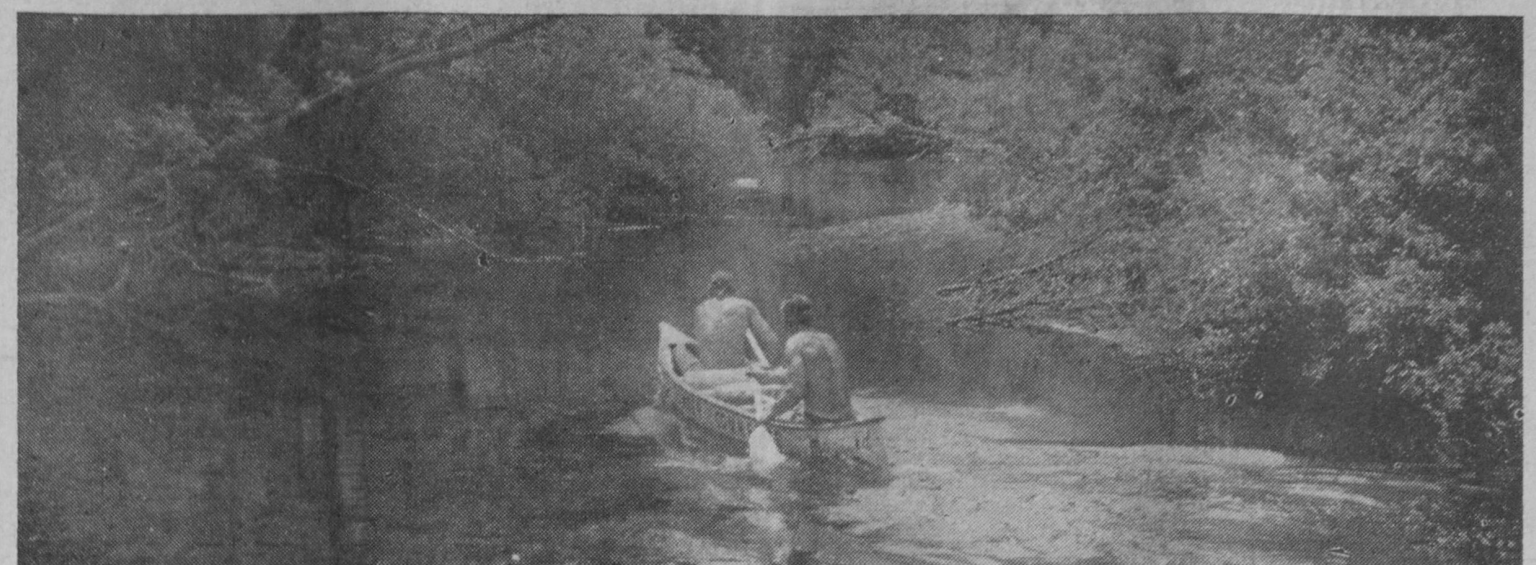
Although having one of the shortest courses of any Michigan canoe race, the Tawas River

is very interesting for both contestants and spectators. Starting line is located at Cliff's Landing on Tawas Lake. The teams race to a turn-around at Cliff's Landing, then back down the lake to the head of the Tawas River and downstream to the river mouth at the US-23 bridge in Tawas City.

Six bridges are located along the route which offer good "platforms" for spectators and it is easy to follow the progress of the race along most of the route.

The course record was set by Kolonich and Kindell in 1954 with a winning time of 38 minutes, 45 seconds. Last year, the river depth was lower and Kolonich and Kindell finished first in 45 minutes, 15 seconds.

New Law Suit Filed Against Oscoda Park Commission

A new development in the Oscoda Township Park controversy came this week when a second lawsuit was filed in Iosco County Circuit Court. A taxpayers suit asks the court to issue an injunction restraining rental or permitting house trailers at the park.

Filed by W. F. Blake Kutsche, George C. McDonald and Jess E. Skimin as plaintiffs, the suit named the Oscoda Township Park Commission, Oscoda Township, Clerk Roy Trafford and Treasurer George Graham as defendants.

One suit filed against the park commission and Mr. Trafford by an organization called MOB (Make Oscoda Better) is scheduled for trial Thursday before Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

Judge Miller ruled last week that MOB, as a non-profit, non-taxpaying group, did not have the authority to bring any court action other than from a health hazard or nuisance standpoint.

In the new suit, the three taxpayers charge the defendants, jointly and severally, with "misfeasance, malfeasance and non-feasance," asking for an accounting of all funds.

It is charged that \$3,500 had not been accounted for on the commission's annual report; that \$9,000 has been illegally spent in construction and maintenance of the park dock; that the commission is collecting illegal fees and fraudulently receiving excessive and improper mileage for attending park commission meetings.

It is also charged by the three Oscoda men that members of the park commission have contracted for park improvements with its own members, that they have paid

fraudulent and excessive sums for improvements, all without advertising for bids.

Also included on the bill of complaint are charges that the commission has refused to recognize a mandate at the annual meeting April 2 which called for ceasing use of the park for trailer rental.

It is also charged that the defendants "neglect and refuse to enforce provisions of an ordinance adopted April 14 forbidding use of the park for trailers, mobile homes, tents and other permanent or temporary places of abode, and dedicating the park for picnic and recreational use."

SGT. ROTI CONVALESCING AT TAWAS HOSPITAL

Sgt. Frank Roti, commander of the Michigan State Police post at East Tawas, is convalescing at Tawas Hospital. Sgt. Richard Janner of Third District Headquarters, Bay City, has been assigned as temporary post commander. Roti is expected to return to duty in about one month.

August Primary Assured of Many Contests in County

With a flurry of filing nominating petitions in the county clerk's office before Tuesday afternoon's deadline, Iosco County was assured of many contests in the August 2 primary election.

According to records in the clerk's office at 4:00 p. m., there will be five races for county office on the Republican ticket. Six candidates have filed for office on the Democratic ticket.

Seeking renomination are County Clerk Prescott, County Treasurer Grace L. Miller, Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell, Register of Deeds Albert H. Buch and Drain Commis-

sioner E. H. Stickney. Others seeking nomination on the Republican ticket are Walter Bessey for sheriff and Gerald Jordan for county clerk.

One race on the Republican ticket is for prosecuting attorney. Paul Harvey, incumbent, is being opposed by William McCready, Tawas City attorney.

There will be a three-way race for the two coroner spots on the Republican ticket. Incumbents filing were E. John Moffatt and E. D. Jacques. Alvin Forshee has also filed.

Democrats filing are Olen Heriman, who seeks the nomination for county clerk; Clarence Oates, a candidate for register of deeds, and Kenneth Frank for sheriff.

Tuesday's filing deadline saw a total of four persons seeking the vacancy on the county road commission, one Republican and three Democrats. This spring the board of supervisors returned the selection of road commissioners to the people. Prior to that members had been appointed.

The Republican candidate is W. D. Nunn, who had been the appointee and now seeks election. Democrats filing are Dale Adrian, Richard Killmaster and Joseph Reinke.

Another candidate to file was H. Read Smith for judge of probate on the non-partisan ticket. He is the incumbent.

Numbered tickets are available at stores throughout the county. These tickets are to be given away free of charge.

"The two holders of the winning tickets must be present in order to receive the bicycles," said Proctor. "If not, tickets will be drawn until someone wins."

First of Three County Officers Conventions—

Treasurers to Convene Here

The first of three county officers conventions scheduled to convene in the Tawas this summer will start next Tuesday. Meeting here for three days will be the Michigan Association of County Treasurers.

With headquarters at the Barnes Hotel in Tawas City, the convention is to be hosted by Iosco County Treasurer Grace L. Miller. Some 125 persons are expected to attend.

Following registration at the Barnes at 9:00 a. m. Tuesday, the confab will open with a business meeting. D. Hale Brake, president of the Michigan Institute of Local Government, will be the speaker.

Other speakers Tuesday include Lynn Munroe, director of the Michigan tax division and A. L. Westol, acting director of the county audit division, auditor gen-

eral's department. Committee meetings will conclude Tuesday's business.

A smorgasbord will be held at the Barnes Hotel Tuesday evening. Charles E. Millar, director of the department of conservation's lands division, will speak before the group Wednesday morning.

Gerrit N. VanCoevinger, director of intangibles and inheritance taxes for the Michigan Department of Revenue, will speak on "Safe Deposit Boxes."

Following a luncheon, members will have the afternoon to visit various points of interest in the area. A boat trip on the AuSable River Queen has been scheduled, along with visits to the Lumbermen's Monument, Tawas Point and other spots.

The annual banquet will be held at the Holland Hotel, East Tawas,

Wednesday evening.

First order of business Thursday morning will be committee reports. Election of officers will precede adjournment of the convention.

Officers of the association are: Laurence D. Parker, president, Ingham County; Willis Moore, first vice president, Lenawee County; Bertil Agnoli, second vice president, Marquette County; Paul Vitek Jr., secretary-treasurer, Muskegon County.

Other county officers conventions to be held in the Tawas during the summer include the Michigan Sheriffs' Association, to be hosted by Iosco County Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell, June 26, 27, 28 and 29, and County Clerks' Association, Iosco County Clerk George A. Prescott as host, August 16, 17 and 18.

Supervisors Hear Both Sides of Deer Problem

State control versus local control of Michigan's deer herd was the principal discussion at last week's session of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors.

Supervisors heard two speakers during the day and presented some of their own ideas during a general discussion.

On hand to present the Michigan Department of Conservation's program of deer management was John Byelich, district game supervisor. The other speaker was John L. VanPatten, a candidate for state representative, who has been critical of department policy in regard to deer control.

In presenting the department's program, Byelich said that the deer herd for this six-county area (Crawford, Oscoda, Alcona, Roscommon, Ogemaw, Iosco) is estimated at 100,000. By July, this will be increased by 60,000 with the new crop of fawns.

The department supervisor said that the district had browse

enough to handle about 100,000 deer. The department's program is to harvest about 35,000 deer annually during the regular deer season. The remainder are either harvested during the any deer season, die of starvation, are killed by poachers and autos or die of natural causes.

He defended the department's any-deer season, saying that control of the deer herd was necessary in order to keep it under control. Byelich pointed out that without control of deer other than legal bucks, the herd would soon grow to such proportion that it would eat itself out of browse.

"We don't have a deer problem—we have a people problem," asserted Byelich.

VanPatten said that the number of any-deer licenses should be set by boards of supervisors. Sold by the county on a first come, first serve basis, it was his opinion that this plan would reduce starvation, (See DISCUSS DEER, page 10.)

Herman Levi Wins Second Vail Award from Michigan Bell

Herman Levi of East Tawas, who is exchange repairman at Oscoda for Michigan Bell Telephone Company, is to receive his second Vail medal for the part he played in the dramatic rescue of a man last winter.

Receiving the coveted silver medal, Michigan Bell's second highest award for meritorious service, Levi will also receive \$1,000 in cash.

It was a cold night last December when Levi and an airman from Wurtsmith Air Force Base, A-1c Mark Blodgett, rescued a man who threatened to jump from the East Tawas water tower.

The man had been talked down from atop the dome by Blodgett, but had become frightened and refused to come any further. Levi suggested that the police open the garage where the company line truck is stored so he could get body belts and rope to lower the man to the ground.

This was done. Levi and the airman climbed the tower, rigged a pulley arrangement on the tank and fastened one end of the line to the limp man. The other end of the line was held by men on ground.

The man was revived and he was talked into climbing onto Levi's shoulders. The two then made the descent down the ladder. At every ladder brace (about 15 feet apart) Levi had to unfasten his passenger's safety

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Marketing Referendum Set for Thursday, July 21

Chairman Charles Davis of the Michigan Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, East Lansing, recently announced that the annual marketing quota referendum for wheat growers will be held July 21 as the first step in the wheat program for 1961 required by present law.

The purpose of the referendum is to determine whether or not wheat growers wish to market their 1961-crop wheat under a marketing quota system. Quotas have been proclaimed by the secretary of agriculture, as required whenever the wheat supply is more than 20 percent above normal. They will take effect if approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum.

The secretary also announced that the minimum national average support price for 1961 wheat will be made known before the referendum on the basis of the latest available supply information. Based on the present wheat supply and the present law, the legal minimum wheat support for 1961 would be 75 percent of parity, the same percentage as this year.

In proclaiming quotas for 1961, the secretary established the national acreage allotment at the minimum of 55 million acres permitted by law. Of this 958,637 acres were allotted to Michigan, from which local wheat farmers will receive individual farm allotments before voting in the referendum.

If marketing quotas take effect, a grower who complies with his allotment will be entitled to market his total 1961 wheat crop without penalty and will be eligible for price support at the full rate. A grower who exceeds his acreage allotment will be ineligible for price support and will

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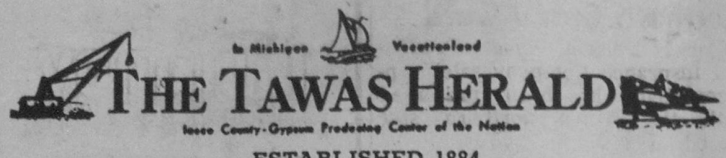

best lift since 1956. On the trout that were checked in the lift over the dam, there was a noted drop in the number of lamprey scars on the trout.

With starvation, firearm wounds and other causes, an estimated 37,250 deer have perished in the Upper and Lower Peninsulas between mid-November and late spring, findings of the conservation department's recently-completed deer survey indicates. This estimated deer loss is approximately 18,000 more deer than the previous year.

Findings of the survey are used along with other data collected throughout the year by the department to help determine special seasons, areas and kill quotas for the fall deer hunting.

A 16-page folder listing campsites in state parks, forests and county parks is free and available from the conservation department publication office and through the Michigan Tourist Council in Lansing. I suggest that if you are planning a camping trip within the state this summer, this pocket size guide on campsites will be a great help in selecting the next place to pitch a tent.

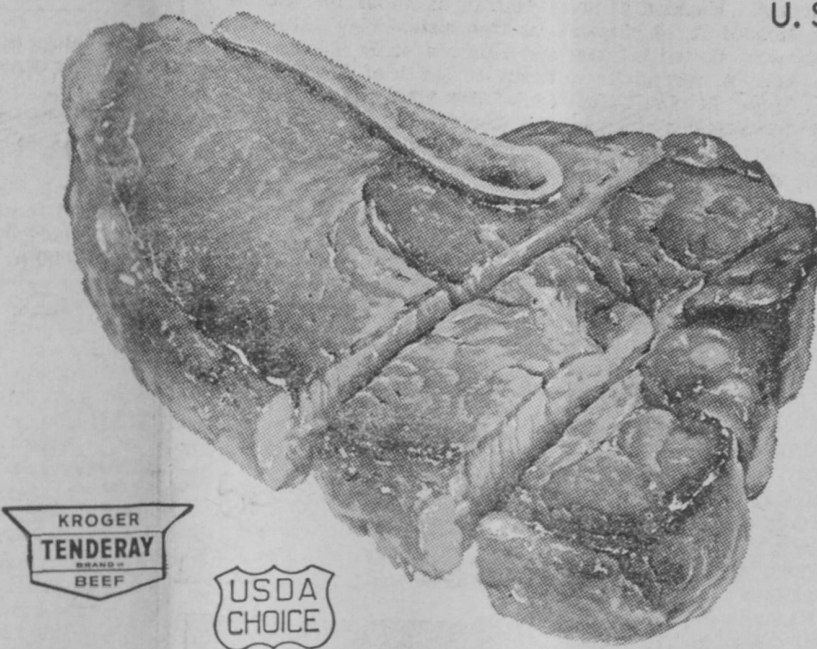

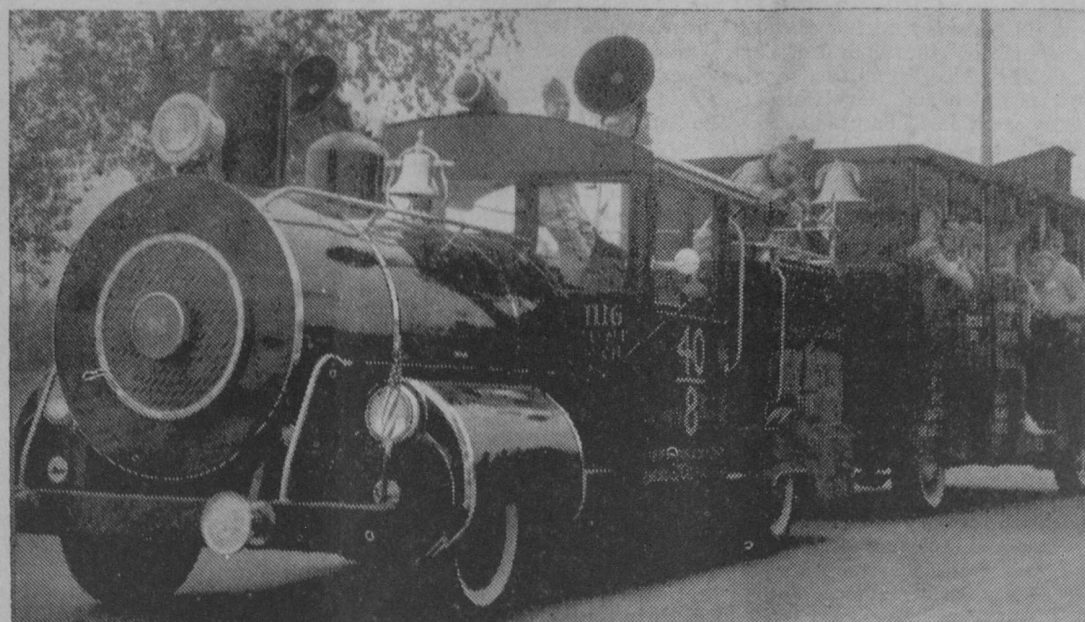

Hemlock Gives Fireworks Warning

Giant sparklers, one of the most hazardous devices appearing in Michigan, are singled out in a warning on illegal fireworks to merchants and residents by the fire marshal division of Michigan State Police.

Reports of unlawful and dangerous fireworks being stocked up by merchants prompted the caution by Captain Glenroy Walker, chief of the division at East Lansing headquarters.

Risks of arrest and personal injury confront those who involve themselves in the sale, possession or use of illegal fireworks. Violation of the law is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of \$100 or 90 days in jail, or both.

Virtually all fireworks are illegal in Michigan, regardless of type and size, except that qualified organizations, upon proper application for the issue of a permit, can possess and exhibit fireworks for public display, Walker said.

Legal only for individual use are the caps for cap pistols and the small sparklers containing not more than .0125 of a pound of burning elements. The oversize sparklers burn fiercely, are unpredictable and constitute a definite fire and injury danger.

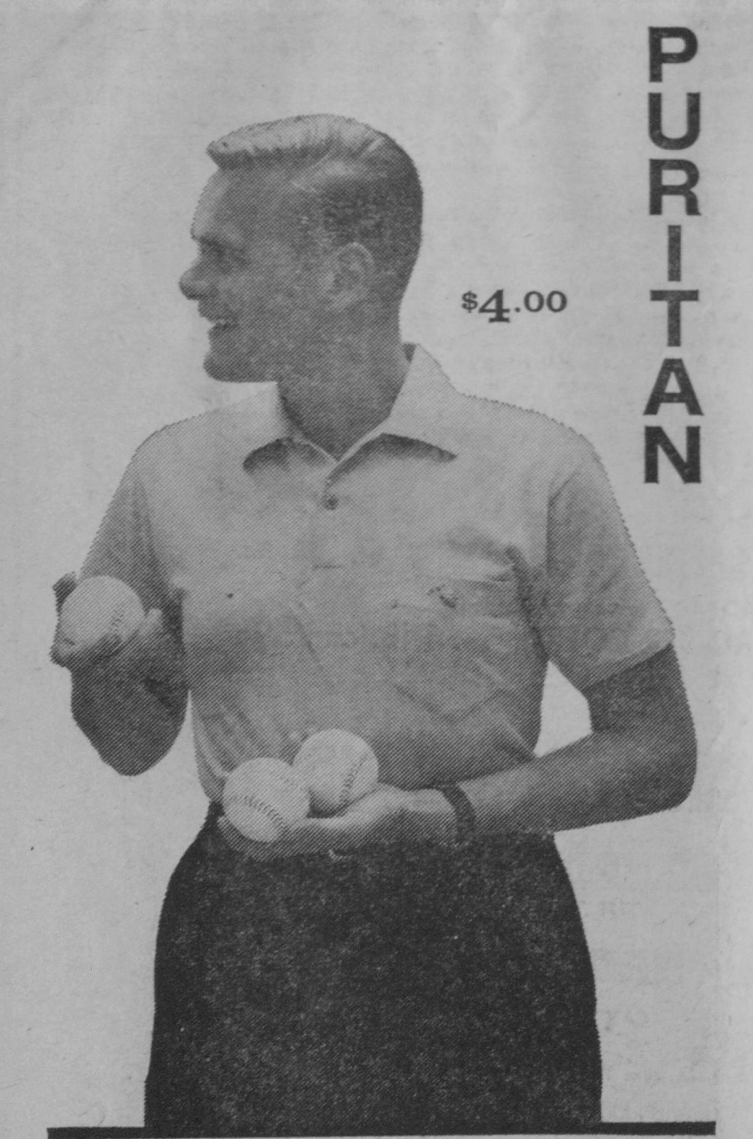

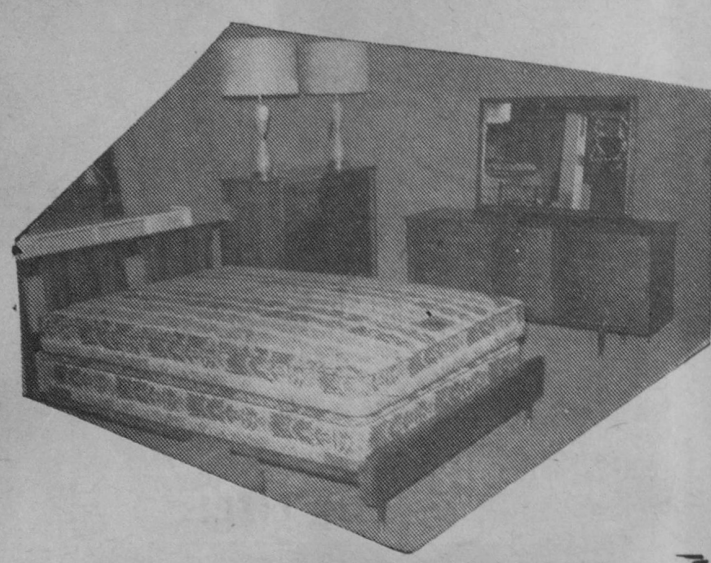

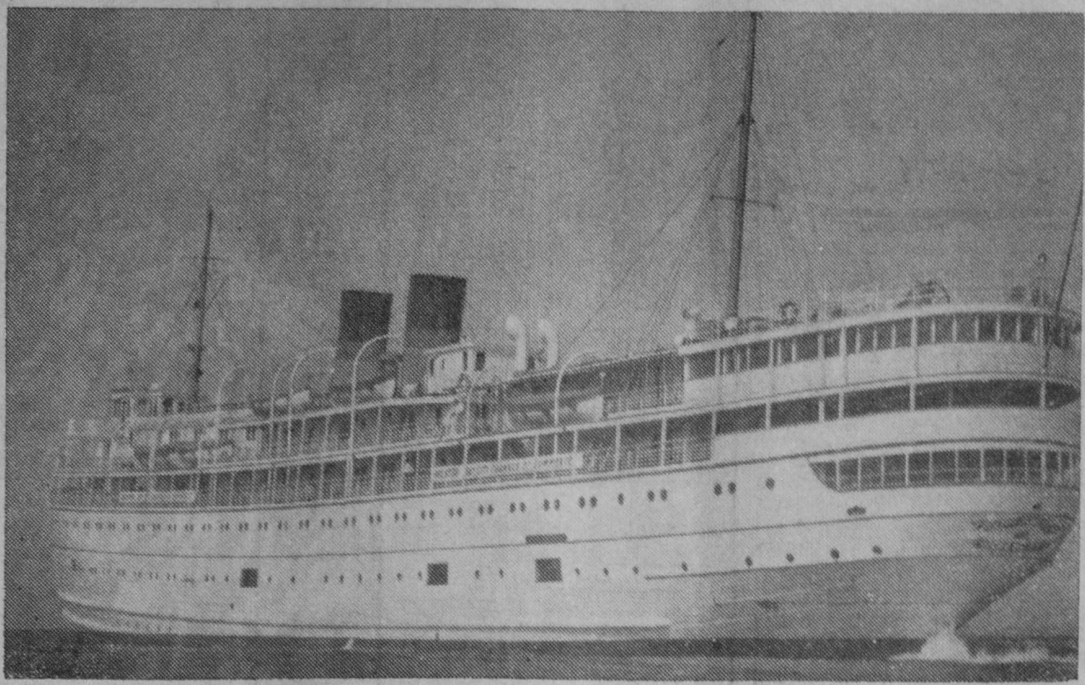

(Continued from page 1.) there would be less violations and produce and harvest more deer. His plan is to sell the special licenses for \$10, half of which would be retained in the county to provide winter feed for deer. Licenses would be valid in only one county.

"A lot of things are involved in this deer question and you could find an argument anywhere," said Supervisor Clarence Everett of Tawas City. "I guess I stand alone insofar as the board is concerned, but I personally favor the conservation department's program." Thanking the conservation department game supervisor and VanPatten for appearing before the board, Chairman Glenn Long said there was a considerable difference of opinion about deer control. "The board realizes that the department of conservation will make the final decision on what program it follows, but we ask that there will be no wholesale slaughter of doe," he said.
