Council Calls LCC Letter 'Double Talk'

Tawas City Council authorized its clerk and city attorney to write a letter to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission explaining its reasons for denying a package liquor take-out license at King's Palace Market.

The council had denied an application which was ready for processing by the liquor control commission some weeks ago, stating to the commission that its recent action was no reflection on him.

Mr. King told the council Monday night that, in his opinion, such action "black-balled" him as far as the liquor control commission was concerned. Mr. King felt that the area would not have the opportunity to obtain another license.

The store owner and Wilbur C. Roach met with Edward Maloney of the commission in Lansing recently. Roach said that it was his opinion that the commission has the impression that King was "not fit" for the license. "Maloney told us that the council was in a better position to judge character and very rarely do they override such action," said Roach.

Roach said that the commission was processing a backlog of 13,000 applications in the state and was not taking any new ones after a certain date. He said that Mr. King's application happened to be on top of the pile and was processed first.

According to a letter from George J. Burke Jr., business manager for the commission, the council was told that the commission had taken no action on the Keiser application due to the fact it was waiting for the official results of the 1960 federal decennial census figures to determine the need of a license for the Tawas area.

"Mr. King was turned down because he failed to receive either local police or council approval on his application," said Burke. "Licensing is a matter of discretion with the commission and all applications will be considered at the proper time."

Councilman Howard Hatton took issue with the letter, saying it was "double-talk." Other members voiced the same opinion. "When we denied the King application, the council explained its reason . . . all it wants is a written note of action on Keiser's application which had previous council approval," said Hatton.

Tawas City Police Chief George Ruth reported that he had approved Mr. King's application, insofar as his jurisdiction was con-

cerned. Roach said that although the commission had stated that its policies were flexible, the principal reason for no action on Keiser's application was probably due to its nearness to another take-out license.

Mr. King was assured that the council would write a letter to each commissioner stating that its recent action was no reflection on him.

City Buys New Police Car Radio

Because of a recent federal communication commission directive changing users of police radio frequencies to narrow band regulations, Tawas City Council has authorized purchase of a new radio for the city police car.

According to the directive, all changeovers must be made by July 31. The city police car operates on the state police network and all radio traffic originates at East Tawas.

Cost of the new radio is \$537.25, with an \$80 allowance for the old radio. In addition, the council approved purchase of a portable monitor unit at a cost of slightly more than \$100.

Mayor George Tuttle said that the monitor unit would cost about half the amount which was paid last summer to hire an extra man. He pointed out that Police Chief George Ruth could have the monitor at the city hall or at his home and would be available at all times.

Chief Ruth said that he could be contacted by calling the state police post at East Tawas. A call to his residence would also be relayed there for radio transmission.

In other business, Consumers Power Company was asked to make a survey of street lighting in the entire city.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz reported that the street committee was to meet at the Ninth Avenue-US-23 intersection to discuss plans for narrowing the entrance to Ninth Avenue.

It is planned to remove a light pole situated in the center of the entrance and narrow the entrance to 70 feet. At the present time, it is between 170-190 feet wide. Ninth Avenue is to be filled for a distance of approximately 250 feet.

JUDGE LIMITS OSCODA PARK USE

Park Not A Nuisance; But Operation Is

An opinion on the issuance of a permanent injunction limiting the operations of the Oscoda Township Trailer Park was issued Monday by Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

The opinion ordering the injunction to be drafted by attorneys in the case limits the number of trailers that can use the park to 55.

Previously as many as 100 trailers had used the facilities in the park, which resulted in two suits being filed over the park's operation by the Make Oscoda Better organization and a group of private citizens.

A temporary restraining order limiting the number of trailers in the park to 28 remains in effect, Judge Miller said.

Judge Miller ruled Friday that the park was a nuisance and would continue to be a nuisance if operated in the manner it had been.

He said, however, that it was not a nuisance per se, in that it was a trailer park.

All trailer and camping sites are to be clearly marked by dividing fences or markers definitely visible and numbered in accordance with a map of the park and that only one living unit, tent or trailer, occupy one site.

He ruled that certain sites not be used as camping for any tent or trailer and be converted into a green belt of lawn, trees and shrubbery. In one section of the park, the judge ruled that trailers or tents were not to be used and that area maintained as a beach area.

All garbage cans are to be affixed on platforms or chained to posts or trees to prevent them from being knocked over by animals or children at play.

In regard to sanitary facilities, Judge Miller ruled that septic tanks and dry wells are to be installed only under the supervision of local authorities and upon plans previously submitted to the local and state health authorities. Such installations are to have odor-tight and leakage-free connections of the type represented in court exhibits and are to be maintained in place at all times and regularly inspected. He ruled that in no event shall the trailer occupant be permitted to make any installations, dig any dry wells or sink any drains.

All trailers on sites not equipped with septic tanks connected with the park system are to have toilets sealed to prevent use and are to be inspected regularly.

"The park shall be operated only in compliance with all applicable, valid laws, ordinances, rules and regulations and shall procure all necessary licenses and permits from state and local government agencies," ruled Judge Miller.

In his findings, Judge Miller said that a mixed public and private nuisance had existed, does exist and threatens to continue by reason of the manner of the park's operation. He said that the plaintiff and residents generally are injured by reason of a substantial health hazard, annoying odors, frequent overcrowding, off-season storage of trailers, sewerage overflow, remoteness of toilet facilities to certain sites and that there is special injury to plaintiff as a nearby resident on Lake Street.

He said that the park has been the subject of complaints by the state and individuals for some years and that the legal remedies are inadequate.

MOB produced witnesses during the trial who testified that connections between house trailers and septic tanks were faulty in some instances, that septic tanks were not operating properly and, in some cases, that persons who live in the trailer park do not use the sanitary facilities provided.

In reaching his decision Friday, Judge Miller quoted a 1959 statute, applicable for the first time this year, prescribing that regardless of license or inspection, a nuisance or health hazard cannot

Tawases Site of State Convention

Some 75 persons registered yesterday (Tuesday) for the three-day convention of the Michigan Association of County Treasurers. The confab is hosted by Iosco County Treasurer Grace L. Miller with headquarters at the Barnes Hotel.

Members of the association heard an address by D. Hale Brake, president of the Michigan Institute of Local Government, following the opening of business Tuesday morning.

Other first-day speakers were Lynn Munroe, director of the Michigan tax division and A. L. Westol, acting director, of the county audit division, auditor general's department.

Convention-goers are scheduled to hear Charles E. Millar, director of the department of conservation lands division, this morning. Also speaking before the group will be Gerrit N. VanCoevering, director of intangibles and inheritance taxes for the Michigan Department of Revenue.

This afternoon (Wednesday), the conventioners will have the opportunity to tour the Tawas and Iosco County area. A boat trip on the AuSable River Queen has been scheduled, along

with side-trips to the Lumbermen's Monument, Tawas Point and other places of interest.

While a smorgasbord dinner was held Tuesday night at the Barnes Hotel and the luncheon is scheduled there this noon, the annual banquet will be held tonight at the Holland Hotel in East Tawas.

First order of business Thursday morning will be committee reports. Election of officers will precede adjournment of the convention.

This convention is the first of three county officers conventions to be held in the Tawasites this summer. The Michigan Sheriffs' Association will convene here June 26, 27, 28 and 29 and the County Clerks' Association will be here August 16, 17 and 18.

Injured When Stove Explodes at Old Orchard Park

Two persons were injured Sunday when a gasoline camp stove exploded at Old Orchard Park near Oscoda.

Treated at Tawas Hospital were James E. Lovell Jr., 22, of Saginaw and Gary R. Thomas, 2½ years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Thomas.

Lovell sustained first and second degree burns on the right hand. The little boy was given first aid here and transferred to a Saginaw hospital for further treatment for first and second degree burns on the right side of the face.

Lovell had pumped air into the stove and was attempting to generate it. After letting gas run into the generating cup, he attempted to ignite the fuel. He told officers that a fitting on one end of the tank came loose from the pressure and blew off.

The child was standing about 15 feet behind Lovell when the stove exploded. He was in line with the flames, which traveled between 20 to 30 feet, and was burned on the right side of the face.

Six Persons Seek Four Seats on W-P Bd. of Education

Six persons have filed petitions as candidates for four vacancies on the Whittemore-Prescott Area Board of Education. The annual school election will be held Monday, July 11.

Filing for three-year terms were the two incumbents, Earl Daugherty and Everett Smith. Third person to file for this vacancy was Walter Provoost.

Three persons have filed for two four-year vacancies, Rudolph Grabner, Ralph DeGesie and Henry Hasty.

A new law this year enlarges the board to seven members. After this year, all succeeding terms will be four years.

Polls at the school will be open July 11 from 10:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m. Whittemore-Prescott is not a registration district and there will be no absentee ballots.

At the annual meeting, voters will be asked to approve transfer of \$713.47 to the school general fund. Since the debt on the Sherman elementary school has been paid, an accumulation of delinquent taxes and interest has occurred.

County to Acquire Federal Property for New Airport

Iosco County received word last week from Congressman Elford Cederberg in Washington, D. C., that the United States Forestry Service has taken final action on turning over federal property in Baldwin Township for use as a county airport.

Mr. Cederberg said in his letter that the deed for the property now goes to the department of justice for final action. "I will contact that agency within the next day or so urging favorable action," he stated.

The county has sought federal property for airport use for the past several years. The land now being made available consists of 120 acres and is located northeast of East Tawas on US-23. The county owns an additional 80 acres adjacent to the federal property.

Henry Oates, chairman of the board of supervisors' aeronautics committee, said Saturday that engineering on the proposed airport was completed about a year ago. Estimated cost for clearing, grading, seeding and constructing one east-west landing strip is \$30,000.

Iosco County has approximately \$8,000 on deposit with the state department of aeronautics. This money, to be used for improving the property, is to be matched by state and federal funds.

"All details have been approved at this end by the board of supervisors," said Mr. Oates. "When we receive the deed to the property we will contact the state and ask for bids on improvements."

Iosco County presently owns an airport in the Tawas Lake area. Although still in use at the present, plans for expanding and enlarging facilities on this site were scrapped several years ago. At one time, the county planned to construct an airport on Monument Road but, after investigation, learned that the proposed site would put it in the flight pattern

of expanded runways of nearby Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

This site was immediately dropped and the county worked with forestry department officials and Mr. Cederberg in obtaining the new site in Baldwin Township.

Peter J. Cameron, 108, Died Last Week

Peter J. Cameron, who observed his 108th birthday two weeks ago, died Monday, June 13, at a rest home near Bay City where he had spent the past month. He had suffered a stroke about a month and a half ago.

Until three years ago, Cameron had resided near Whittemore where he had made his home with his cousin, Frank Peters.

Born June 7, 1852, in Burnside Township, Lapeer County, he had made his home at different times during his long life in Flint, Bay City and other Michigan communities.

Probably Michigan's most noted deer hunter, many honors had been bestowed upon Mr. Cameron. While a resident of Iosco County, Whittemore had honored him with an annual Peter Cameron day.

E. Tawas Allows House Trailers Until Labor Day

Trailer homes parked in East Tawas were given until Labor Day to comply with the city's trailer ordinance, according to action at Monday night's council meeting.

With an eye on the Tawas Lake area, the council said that the ordinance would be rigidly enforced after September 5.

The ordinance provides that trailers may be parked and used in the city for a period of 60 days, if sanitary facilities are available. If not, trailers are prohibited.

Action came to a head at the last meeting when complaints were heard that a number of trailers in the Tawas Lake area did not have adequate sanitary facilities. This drew the immediate investigation of the council and it was recommended that additional time be allowed to those owners whose trailers complied with the sanitary provisions of the ordinance.

In other business, the city at-


torney was instructed to advise Clifford Bennington that he was operating a business in a non-commercial area. Several complaints had been received over the number of trucks unloading magazines at the Bennington residence.

Supt. of Public Works Paul Roford was instructed to purchase road oil and apply to Smith Street between Franklin and Bennington Streets and any other places where needed.

The city attorney was instructed to prepare an ordinance regulating parking lots and parking of cars on public domain. It was reported that the public easement to Tawas Lake was being blocked by automobiles at various times and prevented its use by fishermen.

The council agreed to repair backstops at the tennis courts and purchase new nets. New gates are to be installed at the athletic field.

Ellifritz Gives Advice to Young Student Workers

Vacation time for some students may mean "work" time for others. When school lets out, young people all over America begin the exciting adventure of looking for their first job.

"You can get started in the right way by having your social security account number card with you when you apply for that job," stated Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City social security office.

Your employer should have it before you begin working. He needs it to properly report the amount of your earnings. If you do not show it to him, you may lose some of your social security protection.

If you have worked before, even part time, you probably had a social security card. In that case, show it to your employer when you get a job.

If you have lost your card, get a duplicate with the identical number that was on your original card. Having more than one number causes confusion and delay when you collect benefits. Remember—one social security number lasts a lifetime.

For further information on social security, you may call on a representative, who will be in East Tawas at the Federal Building Thursday, June 23, at 10:30 a. m.

New Pension Law in Effect July 1

More widows and orphans than veterans are finding increased benefits under the new pension law, Gene A. Robens, manager of the Veterans Administration regional office in Detroit, said today.

With less than two weeks remaining before the July 1 effective date, VA in Michigan has received 3,718 applications from present beneficiaries who want to receive future checks under the new pension program rather than the old.

The new law allows generally higher payments based on the pensioner's need but reduces pensions as the need declines. The old law allows only a fixed payment. Once converted to the new law, a pensioner cannot change back.

Of the 3,718 applications received, 2,220 were from widows and orphans although veterans currently on the pension rolls outnumber widows and orphans more than two to one.

Michigan has 48,467 pensioners at this time, Mr. Robens said. Of these, 32,811 are veterans and 15,656 are widows and orphans.

He summarized the pension picture as follows: More than 10,500 inquiries have been received at the Detroit VA office in the past 4½ months.

Of the 3,718 elections to transfer to the new law, 2,621 have been approved by VA, which first must check each case to see that the election is to the beneficiary's best interest.

An additional 1,900 cases have

been notified by VA that they will receive higher payments if they transfer to the new law. Only 100 have replied.

VA's chief attorney is currently examining the files of 2,000 guardianship cases involving 500 incompetent veterans and 1,500 wards. Changeover to the new law will be recommended where benefits would accrue, Mr. Robens said.

'Biggest Open House Ever' Planned for Wurtsmith

Plans for the "biggest open house ever" for Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda, is being planned for Friday, July 1, to introduce to Northeastern Michigan residents the Strategic Air Command.

Arrival of a flight of KC-135 jet tanker aircraft of the 920th Refuel Squadron, presently based at Carswell AFB, Texas, will highlight the event.

The 920th will become part of Wurtsmith when "The City of Oscoda," piloted by the 920th commander, taxis up to a reviewing stand and is christened by a contingent of military and local dignitaries.

Among visitors will be Lt. Gen. John P. McConnell, second air force commander; Maj. Gen. James C. Jensen, commander of the 30th air division, and staff; Gov. G. Mennen Williams; Cong. Elford Cederberg, and Senators Philip Hart and Patrick McNamara.

Entertainment lined up for the event will include the United States Air Force Drum and Bugle Corps, the Second Air Force Band and other groups of musicians.

On static display will be a huge B-52 Stratobomber, the KC-135, the B-47 medium jet bomber, KC-97 prop-driven refuel tanker,

C-124, in addition to F-101, F-102 and F-106 jet fighter interceptors.

The open house may take on a carnival air with low altitude flights, sentry dog shows and demonstrations of fire fighting equipment and a possible sports car rally on the flight line ramp.

Arrangements are being made to handle 35,000 visitors during

the seven hours the base gates are open.

Visitors will have the opportunity to see this sprawling Strategic Air Command and Air Defense Command base, comprising 16,000 acres. In operation since the early 1920s, today Wurtsmith is a far cry from the grass landing strip for "Jenny" aircraft when it was known as Camp Skeel.

Water Accidents Claim 35 Lives in Michigan

With 64 water accidents claiming 35 lives and injuring 28 so far this year, Michigan State Police are urging extra care as the water sports season gets into full stride.

Of the accidents, 33 were fatalities, 17 involved personal injury and 14 were property damage only. The information is based on reports received through June 9.

The 35 persons drowned included eight boat operators, five boat passengers, one swimmer or wader, one skin diver, four children who strayed from their par-

ents and into water, five suicides and five who fell through ice, four into rivers, one from a bridge and one from a dredge.

Water sports activity is expected to begin reaching its peak in the three-day July 4 week-end and the state police urge vigilant attention to safety precautions.

Under state law, all water accidents involving death, injury or property damage in excess of \$50 must be reported to enforcement agencies which in turn send this information to the state police.



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

1,189 Registered Trailers Listed In Iosco County

Of the 323,995 trailers registered in Michigan, 1,189 are listed as being in Iosco County, according to records of the Michigan Department of State.

James M. Hare, secretary of state, pointed out that registrations of both light and heavy trailers are increasing at a much greater rate than are passenger vehicles.

"There are a good deal more than twice as many trailers on the road today as there were 20 years ago," Hare said. "In the case of heavy trailers, this may be an indication of the increased use of motor transport over rail by many shippers and in the growing popularity among many motorists of using light trailers for hauling camping, cottage and suburban supplies."

Trailer registration fees collected through the first four months of 1960 were almost a half million dollars above those of the same period in 1959.

Hare predicted that the use of personal trailers would continue to rise during the next decade.

"Many of Michigan's hundreds of thousands of new watercraft owners are going to tire of exploring their own lake and get the urge to put their boats on trailers in search of new adventure in other Michigan waters," Hare said.

"The growing number of boat launching sites on the Great Lakes and on smaller lakes seems to make this trend inevitable."

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

Attorneys for the defendants contended that the court had no authority over the operation of the trailer park if it received a license to operate from state authorities.

Testimony of two state officials indicated that an acceptable application had been received from the township for operation of the trailer park and a permit was now ready for issuing. It is customary to operate on the previous year's license until it is either revoked or a new one given, although Judge Miller had issued an injunction restraining its operation earlier this month.

Testifying before the court were LaRue L. Miller, sanitary engineer for the health department, and John J. Cousins, who examines, approves plans and issues all permits for such trailer park operation in the state.

Cousens and Albert Renwick, inspector for the district health department, had inspected the Park June 2.

J. Russell Hughes, counsel for MOB, had introduced several pictures in court as evidence that there were several septic tanks in the trailer park which had faulty connections.

Dr. W. F. Blake Kutsche, who lives near the park, testified Friday that oil drums set in the ground and used as septic tanks for house trailers had faulty connections in some instances.

It was the opinion of Dr. Kutsche that in instances where a gap existed at the connection between the pipe running from a house trailer and the septic tank, a health hazard could exist.

The court heard testimony from 14 defense witnesses during the trial, all owners of trailers who spend week-ends at the park during the summer months. They all testified that operation of the trailer park was very satisfactory and that they had not noted the existence of any health hazards. Many stated that they moved their trailers to the Oscoda park due to the fact that most state parks do not have sanitary facilities for individual trailers.

Judge Miller pointed out that the injunction will not be to bar a trailer camp. "It will be a police measure for the future in operation of a trailer camp, setting up limitations and restrictions so that when and where violations are found to occur they can be brought in for show cause order."

In a new lawsuit, brought by Dr. Kutsche, George C. McDonald and Jess E. Skimin, the park commission and other defendants are charged with "misfeasance, malfeasance and non-feasance," and an accounting of funds is asked.

In a sense, the decision by Judge Miller means that the township park commission has cleared

the first hurdle in court litigation centered over the township trailer park. However, the future operation of the park will depend greatly upon the commission's ability to abide by the terms and conditions prescribed by Judge Miller.
