

Iosco to Put Point Park 'Case' Before Commission Thursday

Iosco County will present its "case" for development of Tawas Point property into a state park at a meeting of the Michigan Conservation Commission Thursday at Higgins Lake.

Although the point property is not in state hands as yet and the legislature has earmarked funds to purchase the property from the federal government, the Iosco County Board of Supervisors has indicated it will relinquish its interest in the property if the state will take concrete steps toward its development.

At a meeting last Friday night, Carl Babcock and Clarence Everett were named co-chairmen of a special committee appointed by the board of supervisors to seek a definite commitment on the property from the department of conservation.

Babcock, veteran sail and power boat enthusiast of this area and a member of the Tawas Harbor Com-

mittee, said that the conservation department must realize that Tawas Point could be turned into one of the finest small craft havens in the state, with ample room for swimming areas, camping and picnicking.

"With approximately 170 acres of suitable area, Tawas Point is unique in that it has frontage on both Lake Huron and Tawas Bay. A natural boat well is located within the property which would require only dredging and a channel opened to the bay. The site holds tremendous possibilities for development," said Babcock.

Mr. Everett, Tawas City member of the board of supervisors, represents that organization on the committee.

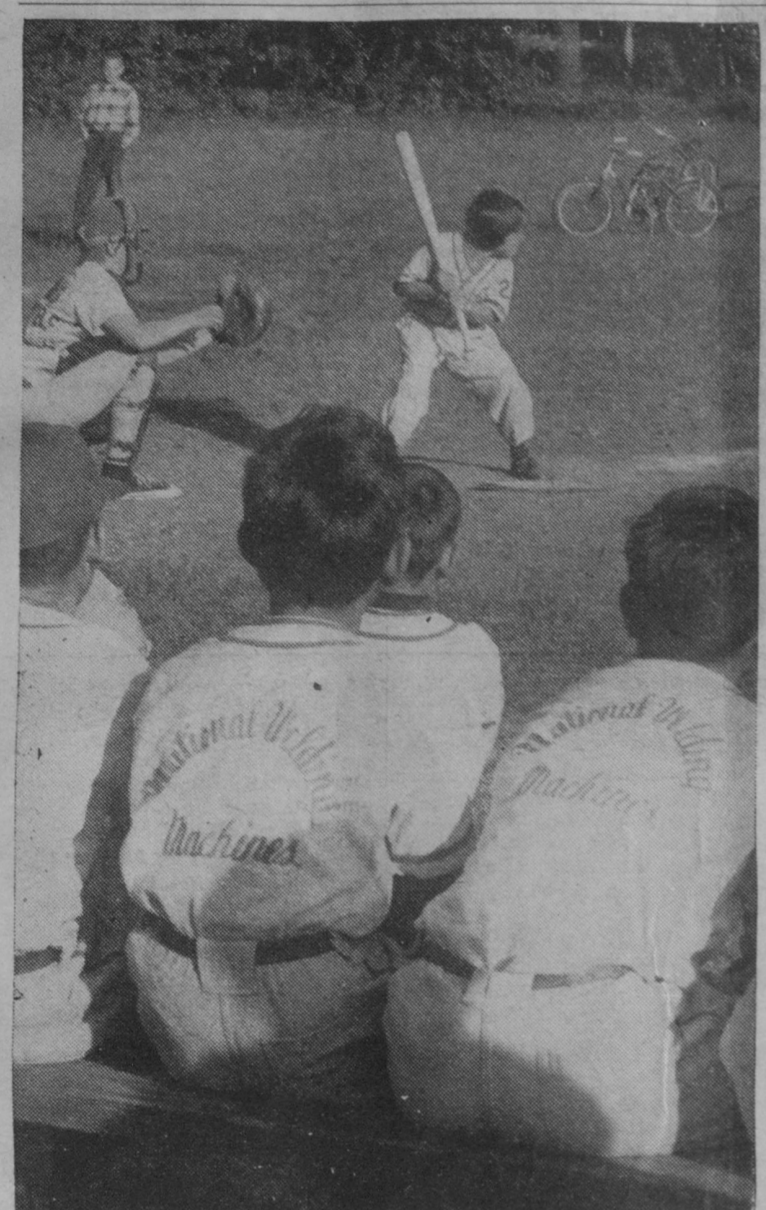
The committee seeks a commitment from the department of conservation for the immediate development of picnic grounds, parking area and improvement to the bathing beach.

"We realize that engineering for overall development of the park will take time, but we want some immediate improvements so that the property can be utilized soon," said Mr. Everett.

A discussion on whether or not to start charging state park admission fees this summer and selection of parks in which they are to be charged, will be discussed at Thursday's commission meeting, which is expected to recommend to the 1960 legislature approved a bill authorizing a \$10,000,000 bond issue for improvement and expansion of state parks and the governor let the bill become law without his signature. Because the law does not become effective until August 17, the department is expected to recommend to the commission that fees be started next year.

East Tawas to Enforce House Trailer Ordinance

Complaints received over the lack of sanitary facilities at several trailer homes in the Tawas Lake area brought a warning from the East Tawas Council Monday night that a city ordinance governing such trailers would be rigidly enforced.

Although it is permissible to locate a trailer home in the city for a 60-day period, it must be provided with approved sanitary facilities.

In other business, City Assessor Deloise Durant was authorized to prepare an assessor's plat of the Tawas Lake area between Oak Grove and Oak Dale Subdivision to eliminate metes and bounds property descriptions.

Rental of the community building to James LaPorte and Robert Donley for Saturday night disc jockey dances was authorized, subject to proper sponsorship. Dances are to be held each week from June 18 through August 27.

Building applications approved included: Mrs. James Smith, new porch steps; Ernest Glenn, new roof dwelling; Mrs. Eunice Lixey, addition to restaurant; Mrs. Fred Kaiser, erect fence; Vernon Eckstein, repairs to Standard Oil station; Thomas Lockard, build dwelling in Oak Dale Subdivision.

Search for Fuel Tanks Dropped from Jet

Searchers from Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda, combed a swampy area at the north end of Tawas Lake Monday for a pair of jet fuel tanks which were jettisoned late Sunday afternoon by the pilot of a F-101 jet fighter interceptor.

Wurtsmith officials said that the plane had experienced mechanical trouble over the Tawas area and had to drop its "belly" tanks. Officials said that no fire resulted from the drop, although both tanks were filled with fuel.

Michigan State Police at East Tawas report that the silver colored tanks each held about 450 gallons of jet fuel.

Two Receive Minor Injuries in Crash

Two passengers in a two-car collision on US-23 in Tawas City Sunday afternoon were treated for minor injuries at Tawas Hospital. They were Hal A. Smith and Charles Clayton.

Dorothy A. Smith, driver of one vehicle, had stopped in the southbound lane while a car ahead made a left hand turn into a restaurant parking lot. Her vehicle was struck from behind by a car driven by Augusta A. Clayton.

River View Plat Gets Final Council Approval

Plat of River View Subdivision, owned by Herman Fahselt, received final approval from the Tawas City Council Monday night.

The 16-lot subdivision is located between First Avenue and the Tawas River, near Huron Gardens and North Park Acres Subdivisions.

Three homes have already been constructed at River View. Tentative approval had been given the subdivision some months ago. Work of platting the property was done by R. J. Cooke, surveyor, East Tawas.

Oscoda Park Suit Set for Trial June 16

A suit filed by an organization called MOB (Make Oscoda Better) against the Oscoda Township Park Commission and Oscoda Township Clerk Roy Trafford will be heard Thursday, June 16, by Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

MOB seeks to prohibit the commission from operating the township property near Lake Huron as a trailer park. During a recent show cause hearing, Judge Miller granted a temporary injunction prohibiting its operation, basing his decision on the health hazard aspect of the case.

During a pre-trial hearing earlier this week, Judge Miller ruled that the possible existence of a health hazard in the park's operation would be the only aspect considered in the case.

MOB's attorney had sought to bring before the court a question of expenditure of funds for park facilities and asked for an accounting by the park commission. It also sought to question authority of the commission for its refusal to recognize a public vote which asked that the park be closed. At the annual township meeting in April, voters favored closing the park by a large majority.

Judge Miller ruled that MOB, as a non-profit, non-tax paying group, does not have the authority to bring any court action other than from a health hazard or nuisance standpoint.

Council Approves Putting Charter Amendment to Vote

Tawas City Council has authorized placing a charter amendment before voters which would remove discrimination against owners of improved property in a special assessment district.

Although the move, recommended by the water board at its last meeting, received unanimous approval from the council Monday night, it was learned Tuesday morning that time is too short to place the question before voters in the August 2 primary.

City Attorney Jerry Cotter said that such a proposal needs council action 60 days prior to an election. The date of the primary, August 2, would not fall within that period.

"The charter amendment proposal will be brought up at a later date, perhaps at the November general election," said Mayor George Tuttle.

"By amending the charter, it would remove the discrimination whether property is improved or not. Each property owner would pay his proportionate share of improvement under the special assessment district," said Cotter.

The amendment is to ask for deletion of section five of the fourth class city act which applies to Tawas City. This section provides that when a special assessment district is established, the amount to be levied is limited to 25 percent of the assessed valuation.

This would mean that if such a district were to be established to finance construction of sewer mains or other municipal improvements, owner of a lot with improvements (dwelling) would have to pay more than the owner of a vacant lot. After establishment of a district, the latter could immediately construct a home on his lot and would receive the benefit of the sewer line at a cost lower than his neighbor.

For this reason, Tawas City has never used the special assessment method of financing construction of sewers, water mains, streets or other improvements.

The council plans to use federal aid money, received after voters approved a bond issue to finance an addition to the sewer disposal plant, to establish a revolving fund. Money from this fund would be used to finance new sewer construction and would be repaid to it through establishment of special assessment districts.

Addition to Sewer Plant is Completed

Spicer Engineering Company reported at Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council that this community's new sewer disposal plant is 100 percent completed.

The council approved final payment of \$6,690 to the contractor, B. H. Sargent Construction Company of West Branch.

Total cost of the original contract was \$111,513.03. Extra work authorized by the council was \$1,096.37, bringing the final total to \$112,609.40. Extras not included under the original contract were for insurance, special concrete, storm sewer outlet and laboratory equipment.

Edward A. Gerard Named Supervisor

Edward A. Gerard has been appointed supervisor of Sherman Township to fill the unexpired term of the late Merlin J. Jordan, who died May 29 following a cerebral hemorrhage.

Named to office by the Sherman Township Board, Gerard has been a resident of Sherman Township for the past 12 years. Previously, he had operated a farm near Whitemore.

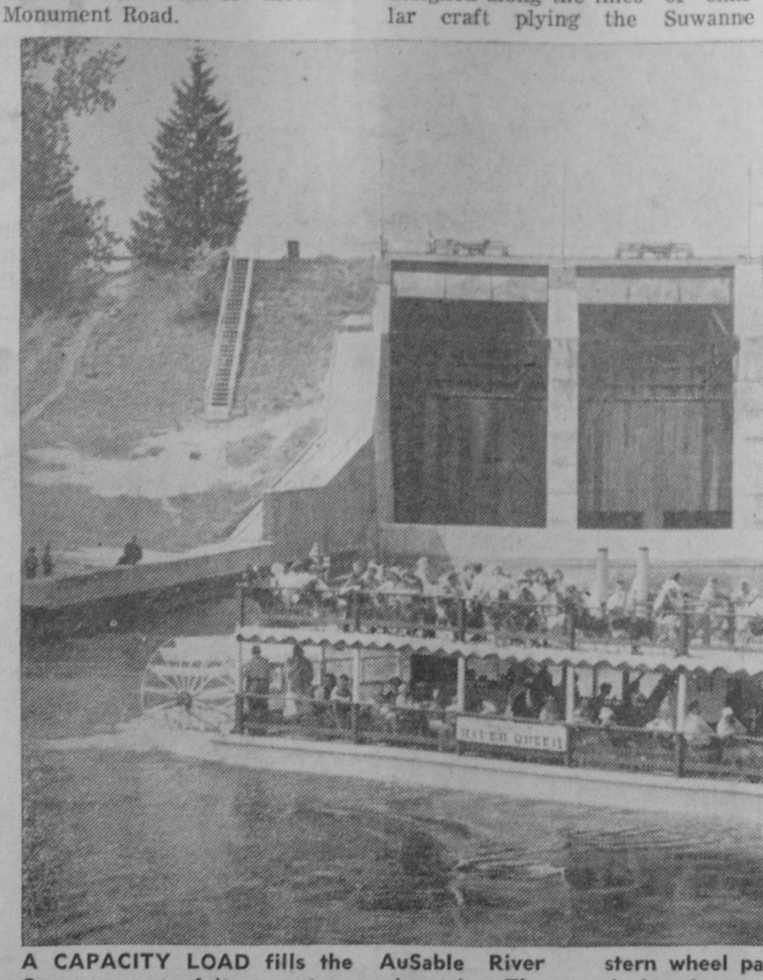
Mr. Gerard will assume his new duties when the Iosco Board of Supervisors meets during its June session today (Wednesday).

Boy Scouts Seek Adult Help for Camporee

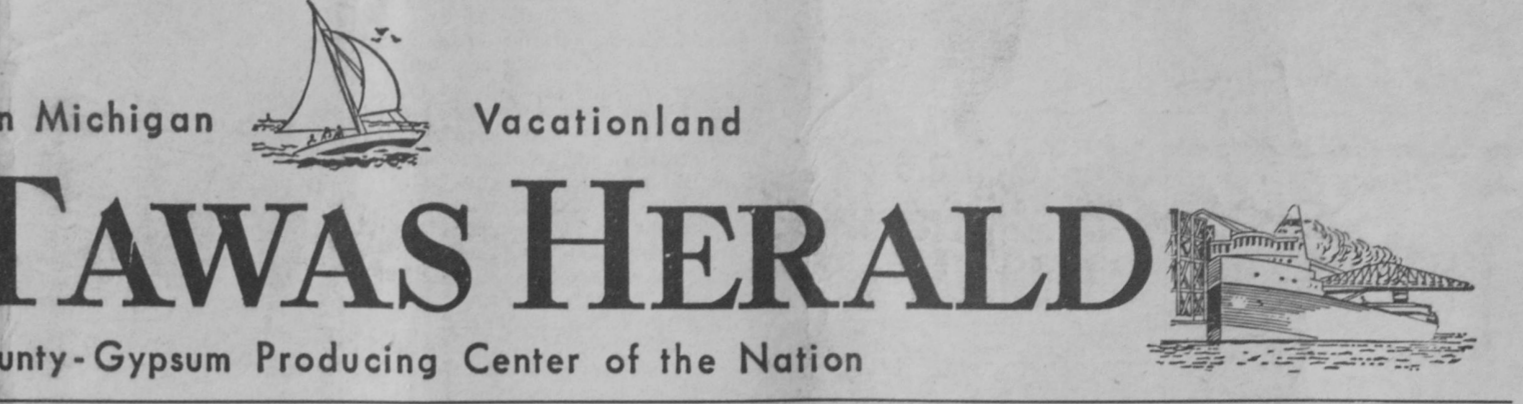

Mr. Businessman: Minors Need Permit to Work

If businessmen are contemplating hiring minors to work, it is required by law that they get permission from the department of labor. Applications for approval of occupation for minors may be secured at the county superintendent of schools office or request by phone to have it mailed.

Upon receiving this application, employers are to fill it out in duplicate and send both copies into the Michigan Department of Labor, Lewis Cass Building, Lansing. One copy will be returned with a serial number stamped on it.

Employers will receive a green form from the superintendent's office which is the offer of employment and request for working permit. This form is filled out by the employer after receiving the occupation number. The minor must take the offer of employment to the superintendent's office or the high school office to get his permit. The employer will then receive the work permit by mail and is required to keep it on file in his place of business.

The combined school and work week of a minor is not to exceed 48 hours in any week. Employers may not hire anyone under 14 years of age. Prohibited hours of employment are from 9:00 p. m. to 7:00 a. m. for 14-15 year olds; 10:00 p. m. to 6:00 a. m. for 16-17 year olds.

IOSCO HAS INCREASE IN REGISTERED VOTERS

The number of registered voters in Iosco County has increased by 177 since 1958. Tallies assembled by the elections division of the Michigan Department of State show 6,749 registrations in 1960 compared with 6,572 two years ago.

According to Secretary of State James M. Hare, there were 34,922 less people registered in Michigan in April of this year than in April 1958. The total for 1960 was 3,454,804 compared with the 1958 total, 3,489,626.

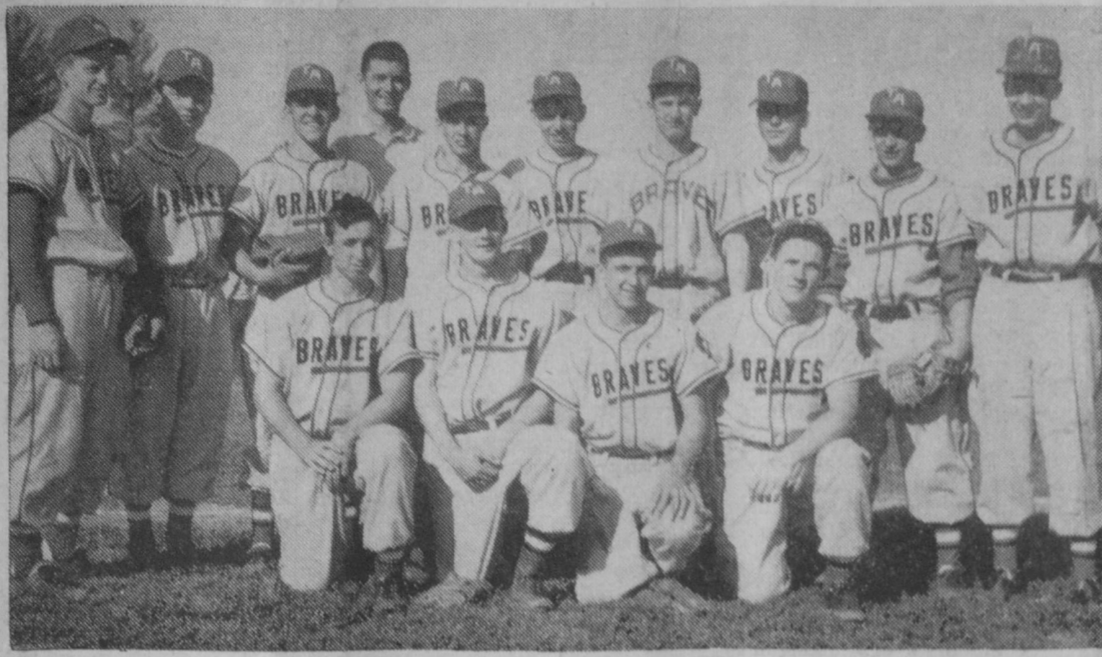

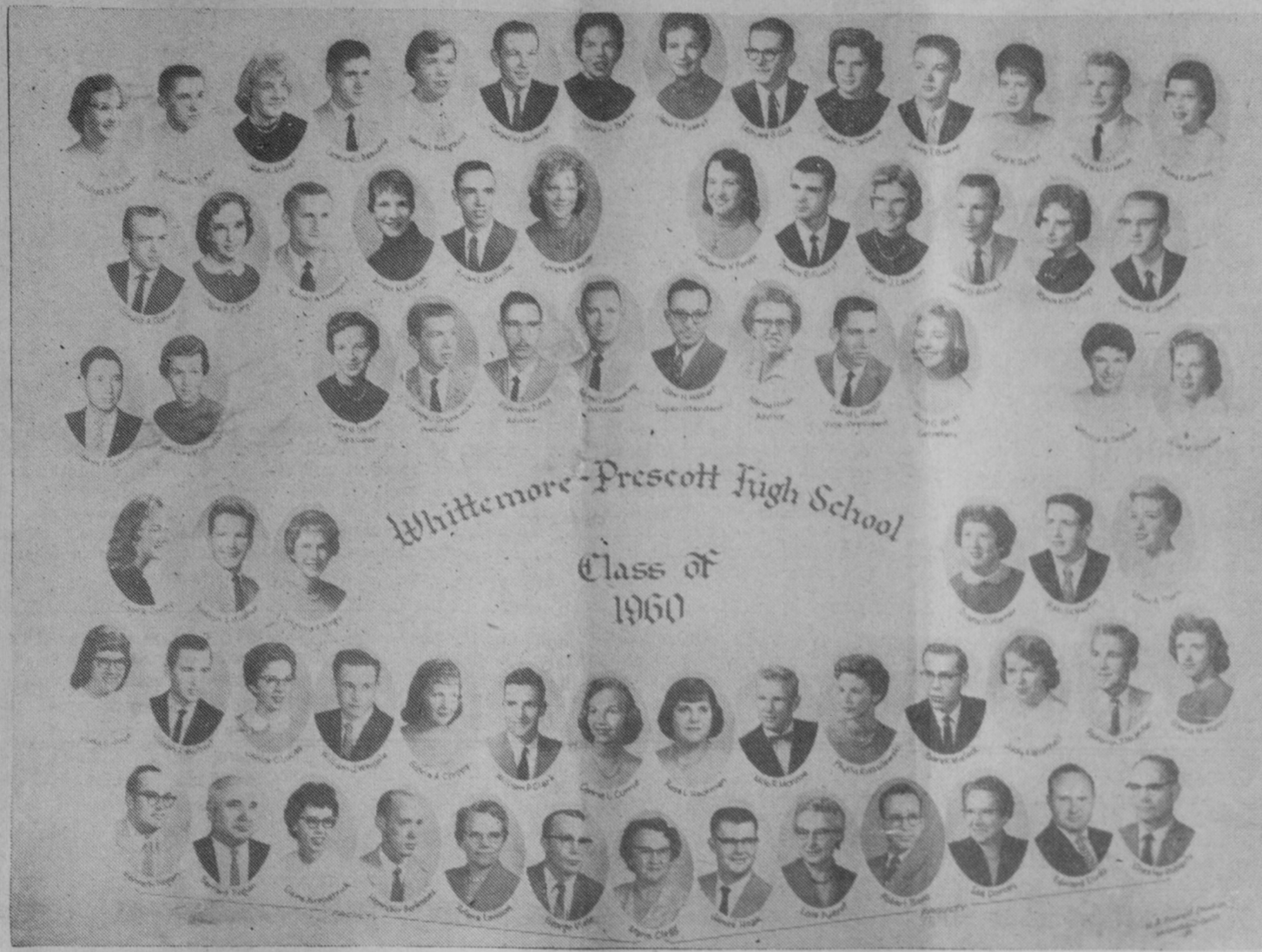

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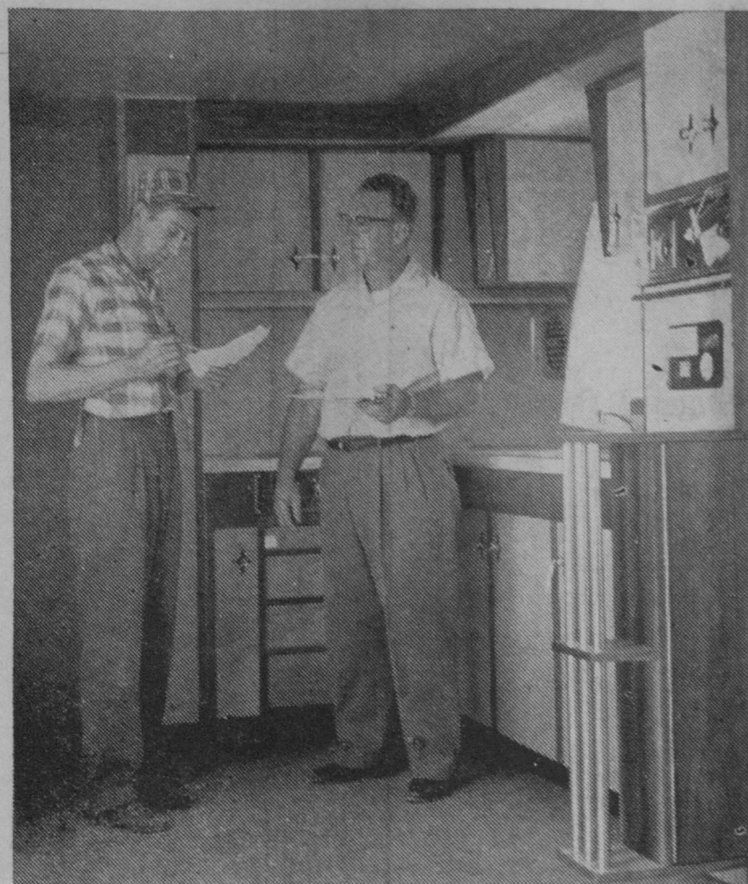

Employment of minors on other than the work described on the application invokes penalties below: Revocation of permits; prosecution under the statute; double compensation in case of injury.
