9,424 Vehicle Licenses Issued in Iosco County

Annual motor registration figures issued this week by James M. Hare, secretary of state, showed that 9,424 motor vehicles of all types were registered in Iosco County on which \$176,378.39 in taxes were collected. These included 6,597 passenger cars and 1,226 trucks and commercial vehicles.

Total receipts for all motor vehicle activities, but not including gas and diesel fuel collections, totaled \$71,593,087.02 in 1959, a \$3,608,057.82 increase over 1958's \$67,985,029.20.

According to Mr. Hare, income from drivers' licenses jumped from \$2,194,518.12 in 1958 to \$3,093,730.88. Chauffeurs license receipts rose from \$494,376.25 in 1958 to \$549,085.03 in 1959.

"The 11 percent increase in the number of title transactions reflected improved automobile sales during 1959, when 545,393 were issued compared to 1958's 490,739," Hare said.

The number of title transfers exceeded one million, the highest number ever handled since the department started issuing these transfers in 1922.

A time when all of us could meet, because of other activities everyone has, was solved by choosing the hours of 6:30 p. m. to 8:30 p. m.

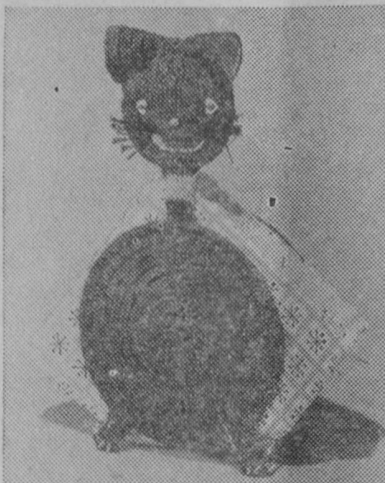

Michigan's beaver and otter trapping seasons will open March 20 in six lower peninsula areas and April 1 in four areas above the Straits. Regulations will be essentially the same as last year when trappers harvested 15,646 beavers and 836 otters. Season lengths and bag limits will again be regulated on an area basis to allow for differences in beaver and otter numbers throughout the state. This flexible system has been instrumental in raising fur beaver harvests without hurting breeding stock in recent years. It also is designed to protect forestry, agricultural and fish values where necessary.

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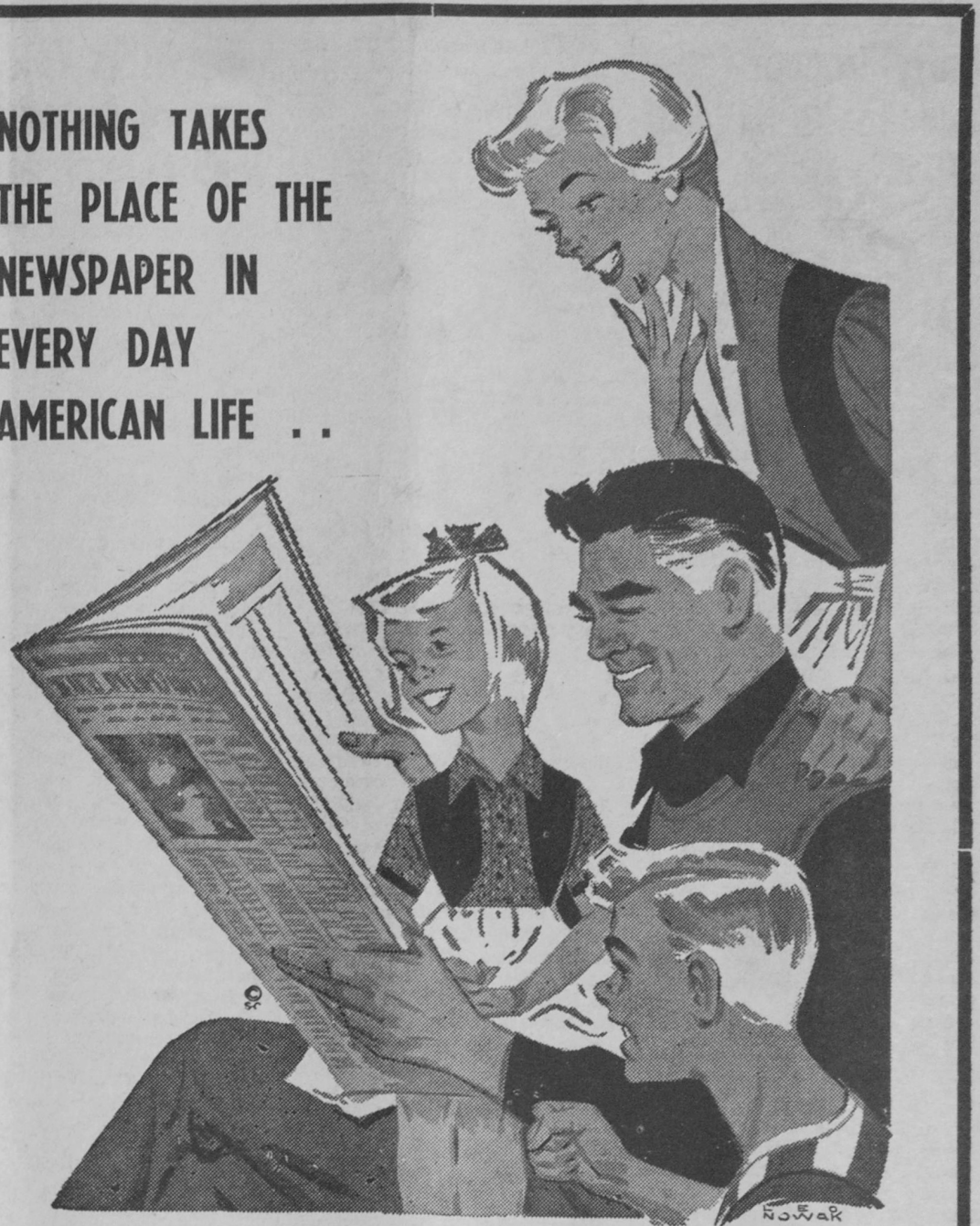
