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Michigan students may now aply for the annual selective servcollege qualification test which has been scheduled for April 28, it has been announced by Col. Arthur A. Holmes, state lirector of selective service. The test will be conducted at

22 schools and colleges in Michigan. Test scores are used by local poards in considering students for deferment from induction for

study as graduate or undergraduhere to help with the many te students. problems inherent in time of In urging eligible students to

take the test, Colonel Holmes declared, "The test is for the student's benefit as well as for the nation's good. A local board should have full information about a student in order to classify him, including his class standing and a score on this test. A high test score may compensate for occasional low class stand-

The purpose of student deferments is to give promising students an opportunity to prepare themselves for careers in the national interest. For those students who hesitate to take the test because a deferment extends liability, the director declared, "No registrant can remain out of service beyond the current age for induction at about 23 years with an exemption or a deferment which extends liability."

Scientific and professional enineering organizations are also urging students preparing for careers in these fields to take the est. Test scores are considered particularly important when local boards are considering whether students should be deferred for graduate study.

Application forms for the 1960 qualification test are now available at the nearest draft board office. The local draft board office is located in the Federal Building, East Tawas. Applications must be postmarked not later than midnight, April 7. Instructional materials are issued by local boards with the application forms.



Michigan's beaver and otter trapping seasons will open March 20 in six lower peninsula areas and April 1 in four areas above the Straits. Regulations will be essentially the same as last year when trappers harvested 15.646 beavers and 836 otters. Season lengths and bag limits will again be regulated on an area basis to allow for differences in beaver and otter numbers throughout the state. Mr. Krueger called attention to the fact that the nation this week is observing National Wildlife Week and that conservationists, schools and other groups are focusing public attention on the problem of keeping wildlife numbers up as natural wildlife habitat goes down. Since most wildlife is a farm "crop," farmers are very much "on the spot" in any public observance of this kind.




