Tawas Area May Offer Summer Language Class

Supt. Reynold Mick announced this week that Tawas Area Schools may begin this summer to offer a program of instruction in French, Spanish and the beginning of a second year of Latin if a suitable number wish these subjects.

Under the new sequence, it will be possible for a student to obtain two years of foreign language in only one school year rather than in two years as is now the procedure. The undertaking will go along with the school's policy of offering a well-rounded educational program to the students of this community. By taking advantage of this opportunity, students will free themselves to take one additional full-year subject during their high school careers.

The courses will be scheduled as follows: The first year of study during summer and fall of this year and the second year during the spring and summer of 1961. Any student who is unable to avail himself of the opportunity will be able to take the normal sequence starting in September of 1961.

Classes will meet from 8:00 to 10:00 a. m. on week days starting June 13 and continuing through August 5.

The summer portions of the program will be conducted at the student's expense, while no tuition will be charged for that part.

Recreation Project Gets City Finance

East Tawas will spread 19½ mills on city tax rolls during 1961, according to a schedule approved by the council at Monday night's regular meeting. This is one mill less than what was spread in 1960.

The decrease came about through the retirement this year of old general obligation bonds which financed sewer construction. The 19½ mills will bring in \$51,638.93 for city operation.

One-half mill will be set aside for a new city recreation fund. This money will be spent to make improvements at the city's athletic field. Gilbert Barrett, chairman of the Lion's Club committee working with the city on this project, said that improvements planned include the addition of two new tennis courts, resurfacing of the old courts, lighting the courts, construction of shuffleboards, improvements to the two baseball diamonds and construct new toilet facilities.

Other funds are as follows: Contingent, five mills; street, four mills; street lighting, 2½ mills;

which occurs during the regular school year. Fees for the course will be a maximum of \$20, depending on the number of students enrolled. Textbooks for students regularly enrolled at Tawas Area will be furnished by the school.

Richard Ferguson, currently instructing French in the high school, will conduct the French and Latin classes. Ferguson states that the summer program offers tremendous opportunities for accelerated learning because the student can progress at his own speed.

John Alexander, Tawas junior high teacher, will be instructing the Spanish classes. He is currently teaching an adult class in East Tawas on Tuesday evenings.

Ypsilanti Man is Drowning Victim in Whitney Drain

Death of an Ypsilanti man, who was pulled out of the Whitney Drain south of Tawas City, Saturday was ruled as accidental drowning after an autopsy was performed.

The victim, James E. Hesson, had been smelt dipping near the Singing Bridge with his 15-year-old son, Paul, and a friend, Michael McDonald.

Investigating state police officers said that Hesson had left his son in their car and walked toward the mouth of the stream. Witnesses at the scene said that Hesson went under the water twice before being rescued.

Artificial respiration was administered at the scene but the victim was dead on arrival at Marilyn Memorial Hospital, AuGres.

\$75,000 Already Spent— First Months of 1960 Costly in Iosco Road Maintenance

First four months of 1960 have cost the Iosco County Road Commission \$75,000 in maintenance expense. This is double the usual cost of road maintenance based on prior year averages.

John Henry, superintendent of the road commission, attributes this increase to unusually heavy snowfall during January and February and to the most severe spring break-up in several years. In this respect, Iosco County is not an exception. Nearly every county in the Lower Peninsula experienced similar trouble this year.

At this date, only temporary maintenance work has been done on the spring break-up damage and it is estimated that \$60,000 more will need to be spent to repair the present damage.

The road commission has been obliged, as a result of this unusually severe maintenance expense, to review its planned construction. Much of the new road work planned for the summer of 1960 will have to be carried over into 1961.

Present plans still call for completion of the Esmond Road from Hale east 1.75 miles; 0.6 miles on the Indian Lake Road around Sand Lake; one-half mile on the Rose City Road. Later in the fall, it is expected that construction will be started on 2.6 miles more of the South Branch Road.

Licavoli's Vender License Application is Approved

Approval to issue a vender's permit under Tawas City's new ordinance was made to Joseph Licavoli, Bay City, during Monday night's meeting of the city council. Although such a permit does not require council action, Chief of Police George Ruth deemed it proper for the first applicant to appear before the council.

Mr. Licavoli plans to establish a fruit and vegetable stand on property near the M-55-US-23 intersection prior to Memorial Day.

Tawas City's new "peddlers" ordinance regulates operation of such a business and provides for license fees, sets up sanitary requirements under which the business must operate, provides that the operator must post a \$1,000 bond and outlines requirements for general neatness for the stand. Background of the applicant is investigated by Chief Ruth and permits are issued by Clerk Walter Nelson.

In other business, a letter from Clarence J. King, Tawas City grocery store owner, asked that the council reconsider its action of two weeks ago which denied his

application for an SDD license. King presently has an SDM license and has made application with the liquor control commission for a packaged liquor take-out license. No action was taken.

Councilman Earl Davis was appointed by Mayor George Tuttle to serve on the Mayor's Exchange Day Committee of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association.

Two Men Bound Over to Circuit Court on B&E Charge

Two 21-year-old Williamston men entered pleas of guilty to breaking and entering when arraigned before Justice of the Peace William McCready in Tawas City last week and were bound over to circuit court. Bond was set at \$2,500 for each, which was not posted, and they are held at Iosco County Jail.

The two men, Roger Madden and Richard L. Ingersoll, were arrested by Michigan State Police at Lansing. Police had been investigating a breaking and entering complaint at the Williamston school and turned up information on an Iosco County break-in after questioning several juveniles.

State police at East Tawas said that Madden and Ingersoll, along with three juveniles, one boy and two girls, had broken into the Marion Shepler cabin at Indian Lake on April 15. They stayed in the cabin that morning and, after preparing a meal with food stocked in the cabin, stole several items and drove off. Included in the theft was a lantern and a stove.

When information was received from Lansing about the break-in, police investigated and found that the cabin had been entered and food strewn on the floor. Warrants for the arrest of Madden and Ingersoll were authorized by Prosecuting Attorney Paul Harvey.

The two men were returned here Friday to face the break-in charge. The three juveniles involved, who were already in custody, were turned over to probate court authorities of Ingham County.

McIntosh, who coaches junior varsity football, varsity baseball and teaches history, had been given an extension of time to sign a contract for 1960.

A graduate of Alma College, McIntosh, his wife and two children live in Alabaster Township.

Supt. Reynold Mick said this week that five openings remained on the high school faculty. Eight applicants were interviewed at Central Michigan University Friday by Principal Ernest Jordan.

Mick said that it appeared that all elementary positions had been filled. He said that he had received word from three teachers who accepted the positions but, as yet, had not signed contracts and were yet to be approved by the board of education.

Veteran USG Employee—

'50 Years Isn't So Long,' Says Baker

"When you like a job, time goes fast." This was the sentiment expressed Friday by Peter Baker as he took time off from his work at Alabaster to look back on a 50-year career with United States Gypsum Company.

Baker, who was born in Tawas City and started his employ with USG at the age of 16, has been quarry maintenance foreman at Alabaster for many years. His interest in machinery, particularly the type used in stripping and quarrying operations, has earned him a reputation as being an expert in the field.

To gain such a reputation, however, required a great deal more than just "liking equipment"—it took long years of practical experience to accumulate such knowledge. "Pete," as he is known to all, received his first class engineering papers (stationary boiler) when steam shovels were in use at Alabaster—and that was a long time ago.

Baker, now 66 years old, started to work for USG in April 1910. He first went to work in the plaster mill warehouse sorting bags, a job, incidentally, which he had performed the previous summer vacation at 12½ cents an hour. Officially, however, his starting date is 1910.

Later, he transferred to the quarry where his first job was loading buckets on a steam industrial crane. "In those days, a man had to work 3½ years as an apprentice before he could even touch the throttle," said Baker. "My one big ambition was to become an operator and I did a little

studying and finally received my first class engineering papers."

During the ensuing years, Baker has operated just about every piece of equipment at the Alabas-

ter quarry and was chief operator for many years. During his later years, he "broke in" many new employees on heavy equipment.


Baker was recognized for his

talent with heavy equipment and was soon put in the capacity of a "trouble shooter," being directed to straighten out several jobs where production was lagging.

Baker spent two weeks at the Fort Dodge, Iowa, plant during the 1920s where he broke in men for the company's new quarry.

When USG modernized its operation at Alabaster in 1928-29, Baker was on hand to help set up new electrically powered stripping equipment and shovels. By 1929, the over-water tramline was ready

Damages Denied in Plane Crash Suit

Damages in a \$300,000 suit filed on behalf of three former East Tawas men injured in a crash of a four-seat plane at Omaha, Nebraska, municipal airport April 30, 1957, were denied Friday by Chief Federal Judge Theodore Levin.

William H. Johnson, 45, former sales manager of Huron Sales Company, East Tawas, was pilot of the plane which made a crash landing just 12 seconds after an air force B-47 jet bomber made a practice approach over the airport.

Johnson, his passengers, John E. Jensen and Blaine C. Christeson, filed the suit against the government, claiming they were not warned about the danger of the turbulence. Jensen was president of Anderson Coach Company at the time of the crash and

Christeson is presently an executive at the coach company's Logan, Utah, plant.

Judge Levin denied damages, saying that Johnson was flying too low in violation of a city ordinance. But he warned:

"Safety of those using air lanes is not to be sacrificed to traffic expediency. I therefore hold that control tower employees in the exercise of reasonable care do have a duty to take into consideration turbulence hazards when giving clearance to land."

Johnson is a former air force captain who flew in the China, Burma, India theater and has 16 years experience as a professional pilot.

Witnesses to the crash landing paid great tribute to Johnson's skill, saying it was only due to his remarkable ability that the plane did not land on its nose.

Tawas Boy Runner in 'Junior 500' Push Cart Race

Paul Simons, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Simons Jr. of Tawas City, has been named as a runner in the "Junior 500," a push-cart race which is an all university event, sponsored each spring at Michigan State University by Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity.

The "Junior 500" is patterned after the Indianapolis 500-mile race and this year takes place at 1:30 p. m. May 21.

The carts are of a simpler construction than soap-box derby carts and have handles in back for the runners who supply the power. Five-man relay teams propel the carts around a one-mile circle drive in the center of the campus.

All the living units on campus are eligible for entry and there are 50 teams scheduled to compete this year. The three classes of entry are men's division, women's division and humorous.

The race will be preceded by a colorful parade of 30 coeds riding in separate convertibles. The girls have been chosen by each men's unit entered in the race to represent them as their queen.

16,238 TRAFFIC ARRESTS MADE BY STATE POLICE

Michigan State Police officers made 17,555 arrests in March, of which 16,238 were for traffic violations and 1,317 criminal complaints, according to the department's monthly activities report.

Not included in the totals were the arrests of 406 juvenile traffic offenders and 353 other juveniles for non-traffic offenses and the apprehension of two wayward minors. Officers made 42,753 property

inspections and 4,053 liquor inspections. The identification bureau at the East Lansing headquarters received 11,281 sets of fingerprints. Of these, 6,722 were criminal and 4,559 non-criminal. Forty-six wanted persons were identified.

Of the 1,769 applicants for permits to carry concealed weapons, 171 also were identified with criminal records through fingerprints.



Urges Converting GI Term Insurance to Permanent Basis

Some 145,000 Michigan veterans holding GI term life insurance should consider converting to permanent plans, Gene A. Robens, manager of the Veterans Administration regional office in Detroit, advised today.

Only 90,000 Michigan veterans have thus far converted to permanent insurance, he said.

Premium rates for permanent plans of insurance are higher than those for term policies issued at the same age, but the premium rate on the permanent plan remains the same throughout the lifetime of the policy. The rate on term policies increases every five years.

These increases are small at the younger ages, but get progressively higher at the older ages. As an example, an annual premium on dividend participating term insurance leaps from \$30.78 per \$1,000 insurance at age 60 to \$47 at age 65 and to \$73.16 at age 70.

As the average life expectancy increases and veterans grow older, more and more policyholders will be faced with the rising cost of term insurance if they plan lifetime protection, he added.

'Be Sure Social Security Record is Correct'—Ellifritz

Do you know why the Social Security Administration wants you to be sure your social security account is correct? "Because the right of you and your family to retirement, survivors and disability payments depends on it," answers Paul M. Ellifritz, district manager of the Bay City social security office.

Every year is important, continued Mr. Ellifritz, in building up your future benefits. For example, if you have reached retirement age this year, you will need at least 4 1/2 years of earnings on your account to qualify for benefits. If your retirement age is after June 30, 1960, you will need even more credits. Illustrating this, he said, if you were born in 1906 or later, (a woman born in 1909 or later) you will need 10 years of social security credits to get retirement benefits. He also added that you will need at least five years of social security credits for disability payments.

Mr. Ellifritz pointed out that it is easy to check your social security account to make sure you are getting credit for your earnings each and every year. The checking should be done at least once every three years. He added

that the social security office will furnish you with a special postcard which you can use to request a statement of your earnings. The service of providing you with a record of your earnings is furnished free of charge.

Mr. Ellifritz concluded that all people who contribute toward social security have an obligation to themselves and their families to take the simple precaution of checking their social security records at regular intervals. This obligation applies not only if you work for wages as an employee but also if you work for yourself and report your self-employment income with your annual income tax return.





WITH EMERY

The weatherman predicted a rainy opening day for the 1960 trout season and that about sums it up.

We started the trout season off on the AuSable River below Mio Dam and several hours of spinning in a steady rainfall proved enough for our fishing party.

It started raining about 7:00 a. m. and when we left the area about 1:00 p. m., the situation had not changed, the rain was still coming down. The best part of the trip was our noon meal which was prepared in the open and the menu consisted of stew, baked beans, cake and lots of hot coffee. We talked to several fishing parties between Mio and the McKinley Bridge area with few catches of trout but lots of complaints on the weather and high water.

Stopping in Glennie on the trip back home, we talked to several local fishermen who reported area trout catches were low around town. A couple good catches were reported made on Horseshoe Lake northwest of the village. There was an apparent jam of fishermen on this small trout-stocked lake and standing room along the banks was scarce.

Several good catches were also being reported from the East Branch of the AuGres River above and below the "More Trout" pond

in Grant Township. The largest catches were the steelhead trout that are working upstream to their spawning beds.

After spending a few days and winter evenings planning the opening day trout fishing trip, coming home with empty creels and lots of rain-soaked fishing gear does not seem to bother us too much at all and we will probably see you on one of the streams opening day next year.
