East Tawas to Get Modern City Hall

East Tawas will have a new city hall—to be located on the site of the old one—in spite of the fact that its \$40,000 general obligation bond issue failed by 35 votes last Tuesday.

Work started Monday on razing the old two-story frame building which has served as the home of city government there for more than 70 years.

City officers are being moved to the community building in the state park while the old building is being torn down and the new one constructed.

Matters came to a head last Thursday when the council learned that the bonding proposition failed. Some 514 electors voted in favor of the proposition and there were 401 votes against it.

Making an on-the-spot survey, the council felt that the time had come for drastic action. A new city hall, designed along "modest proportions," is to be constructed without the use of tax money.

This non-tax money is to come through the sale of the city hall building site at the corner of State and Sawyer Streets, disposal of city-owned property in Werth Subdivision, money from parking meters and the \$10,000 to \$12,000 which has been previously set aside in a building fund.

In examining the old building Friday, councilmen and Mayor Werth felt that any funds spent on its repair would be money wasted. "There is an urgent need for vault space to safeguard city records and there is an extreme fire hazard in the old building," said Werth.

After the old structure is razed, a concrete block building is to be erected on the site. It will be large enough to house adequate vault space and city offices. "Citizens will be proud of it and, at a later date, perhaps the building can be enlarged and dressed up with a brick veneer," said Werth.

Location of the proposed city hall has been a thorn in the side of city fathers for a little more than a year. Property was purchased north of the present city hall as a building site but, while the new city hall was still in the planning stage, it was used as a parking lot.

When the council got around to proposing the new building, objections were heard from businessmen about using the parking lot for the city hall. The property is to be sold to the highest bidder December 8.

Fog and Rain Mar Opening of Deer Season ONE HUNTER WOUNDED

Shooter Gives First Aid, But Leaves Victim

One hunter was wounded and another suffered a heart attack on the opening morning of deer hunting season in Iosco County.

In critical condition at Tawas Hospital is August M. Aaron, 45, of Freeland, who was wounded in both legs while hunting on Kokosing Road, Plainfield Township.

Robert Powers, 62, of Oscoda, suffered a heart attack at 8:30 a. m. while hunting in Wilber Township. He was taken to Tawas Hospital where he was listed yesterday afternoon as "out of danger."

Police said that this was the second heart attack that Powers had sustained in the past two months.

Investigating state police officers said that Aaron lost a large amount of blood and required a transfusion. He was rushed to the hospital by ambulance.

Aaron was found unconscious in a heavily wooded area west of Hale. Police are seeking the unknown shooter of the victim, but little hope is held by them for identifying the hunter.

Officers said that the shooter apparently administered first aid by applying a tourniquet to the legs of the wounded man, but then left him lie where he fell.

Police were notified of the shooting at 11:47 a. m. by Ernest Dammann of Saginaw. Aaron was found about 10 minutes after the

shooting by Willard Trinklein of Saginaw.

Officers said Tuesday night that because of the severe wound, one of the victim's legs was amputated at the hospital.

Aaron told officers that a man about 50 years old came up to him after the shooting and applied the tourniquet. He came from the direction in which the shot was fired.

Opening morning of deer hunting season dawned Tuesday under a heavy blanket of fog and rain. Visibility in the hunting area was very limited.

Area merchants reported a bustling business the night before the season opened. Many hardware and mercantile stores remained open for the convenience of out-of-town visitors.

Whitetails Go Into Hiding for 15 Days

The whitetails went into hiding this week as the 1960 deer hunting season opened at 6:00 a. m. Tuesday.

Michigan's army of deerhunters, estimated at a half a million strong, began its annual trek to the north woods over the weekend and traffic here reached its peak Monday morning.

Some 15 days later (November 30 to be exact), the state's deer season will have ended with around 115,000 dead deer and probably a dozen dead hunters.

First hunters to report bagging bucks here Tuesday were Brian Westcott, Jerry Brown and George Biggs of Tawas City and L. Kenneth Davis of Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda.

Reports from hunters and conservation department officers state that hunting in this area was about the same as last year. Deer were not as plentiful as in previous years.

Some 44,000 antlerless deer are expected to be taken in designated areas around the state this year, including Iosco County.

About 92,000 any deer permits were issued by the state this year. Permits may be legally used only in the area for which the individual permit was issued and only by the person whose name is on it.

A big upswing in violations last year led to a doubling of the enforcement personnel this year by utilizing conservation department employees from fish, game, parks and forestry divisions. Extra manpower has freed conservation officers from many sideline chores which stem from the arrival of large numbers of hunters in the deer areas.

All schools of Iosco County were closed Tuesday in order that students and teachers could have time off to go deer hunting.

He said that roller skating would continue there but a new feature will be the addition of record dances for teen-agers. He said that parties for young church groups were to be encouraged.

The Rollerdrome will be managed by Gary Davison, 20-year-old son of the new owners, along with Mrs. Davison. Mr. Davison will continue his employment with Fisher Body.

The Davisons have two other children, Norman, 17, who is to enroll at Tawas Area High School, and Hazel, age nine.

McIntosh's present 12-man squad lists eight juniors, three seniors and one sophomore. At Alcona Community School—

Schoolboys Construct House

For years, many high school industrial arts classes have turned out an endless assortment of end tables, foot stools, boot-jacks and other small articles—the type of bric-a-brac that usually ends on the trash heap, once it is taken home.

Not so this year at Alcona Community Schools, located five miles west of Harrisville.

Shop students here are building a modern 26 by 33-foot three-bedroom home, complete with bathroom, a kitchen equipped with such conveniences as a built-in oven and a full basement.

Located about 500 yards east of the school on M-72, some 25 boys in James Chandler's 11th and 12th grade industrial arts class are working on the project. Assisting is Harris Stevens, power mechanics instructor at the school.

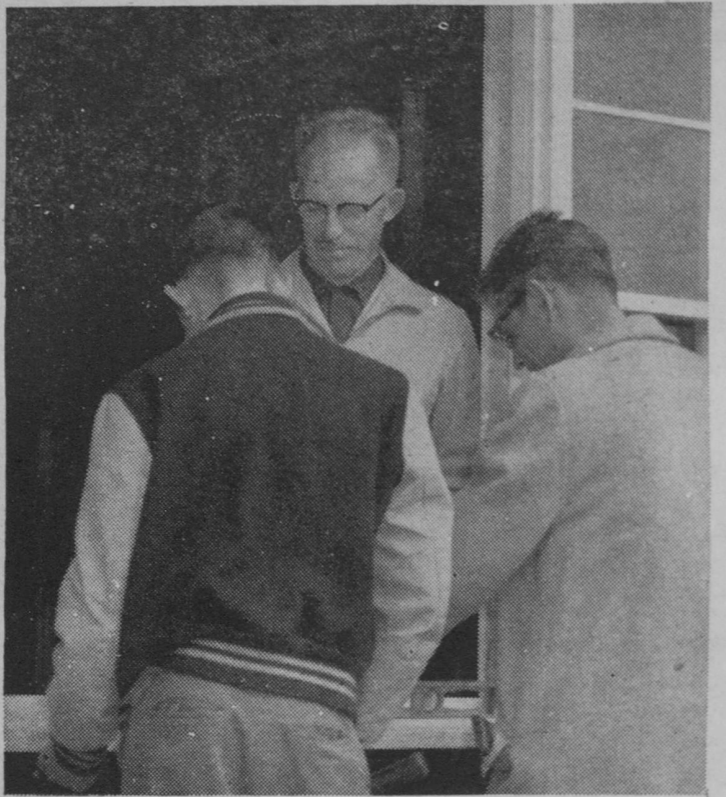
Only one other school in Michigan has such a program and that is a large high school in the Detroit area. "Interest in our school's industrial arts program has increased nearly 100 percent since this project became a part of the instruction," said Principal Russell Conway.

Alcona shop students are doing all the construction work on the house, including the laying of concrete blocks, carpentry work, plumbing, installation of heating equipment and wiring. Only outside help came in the excavation for the basement.

Plans for the house were drawn by Chandler, who has been head of the industrial arts department at Alcona for the past 10 years. The basement excavation was made last spring and actual work on the structure began this fall.

Friday concluded the eighth week of the project and, with only three hours of work a day, the building has been completely framed in. Only three school days were missed on account of unfavorable weather.

Now that the building has been enclosed, industrial arts students will spend six hours a week in the classroom learning the theory of construction and will spend nine hours a week on practical work.

"We don't expect to make expert carpenters out of these youngsters, but we are trying to help them find their own interests," said Chandler. "So many times, youngsters just waste their time in shop classes and learn very little—this project teaches them how to make use of their classroom training and the boys have shown great enthusiasm."

Once the project got under way in September, many residents of the community have offered their assistance. Of particular help were Ted Krutlin, local automobile dealer, and Otis Goodwin, insurance agent, who furnished the property on which the house is located, lent their financial assistance and advice on construction.

Others who have lent much val-

uable assistance were Henry Gunderson, Benjamin Champagne, president of the board of education, and Herman Dehnke, former circuit judge. Several area building supply dealers have assisted by furnishing material to the school at a discount.

When the boys complete their project, including landscaping, this new, modern home will be offered for sale by Mr. Goodwin. Any money remaining after payment for materials and the building lot will be returned to the school.

"We are not building this house with the idea of making a profit, but rather for the experience and training such a program can give the boys," said Chandler. "What they have learned in this practical work will be very valuable to them in later years."

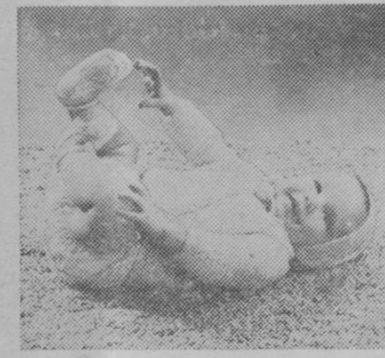

WORKERS UNDER 50 YEARS ELIGIBLE FOR DISABILITY BENEFITS

About 125,000 disabled workers under age 50 and their families are now eligible for social security disability insurance benefits, according to Paul M. Ellifritz, district manager of the Bay City Social Security Office. Before recent changes in the law, only people between 50 and 65 could receive disability payments. Mr. Ellifritz said. People under 50 years of age could have their earnings records frozen, but could not collect benefits. Mr. Ellifritz said today that most persons under 50 who had had their social security records frozen had been contacted by his office and steps had been taken to start the payment of their benefits.

If you have had your social security record frozen, but have not yet received a letter asking you to get in touch with your social security office, you should do so as soon as possible. If you are severely disabled and worked under social security for at least five of the 10 years before you became disabled, you should also contact the office if you have not done so. Disability insurance benefits may be payable to you.

OASI-1960-1, a new leaflet explaining the recent changes in the Social Security Act, is available at the Bay City office. Write for this pamphlet.

A representative of the Social Security Administration will be in Tawas City at the Iosco County Building Friday, November 25, at 10:30 a. m. to take claims for benefits or furnish information.

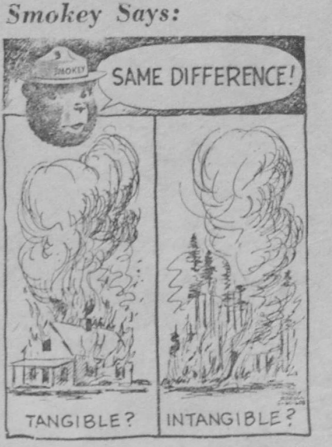

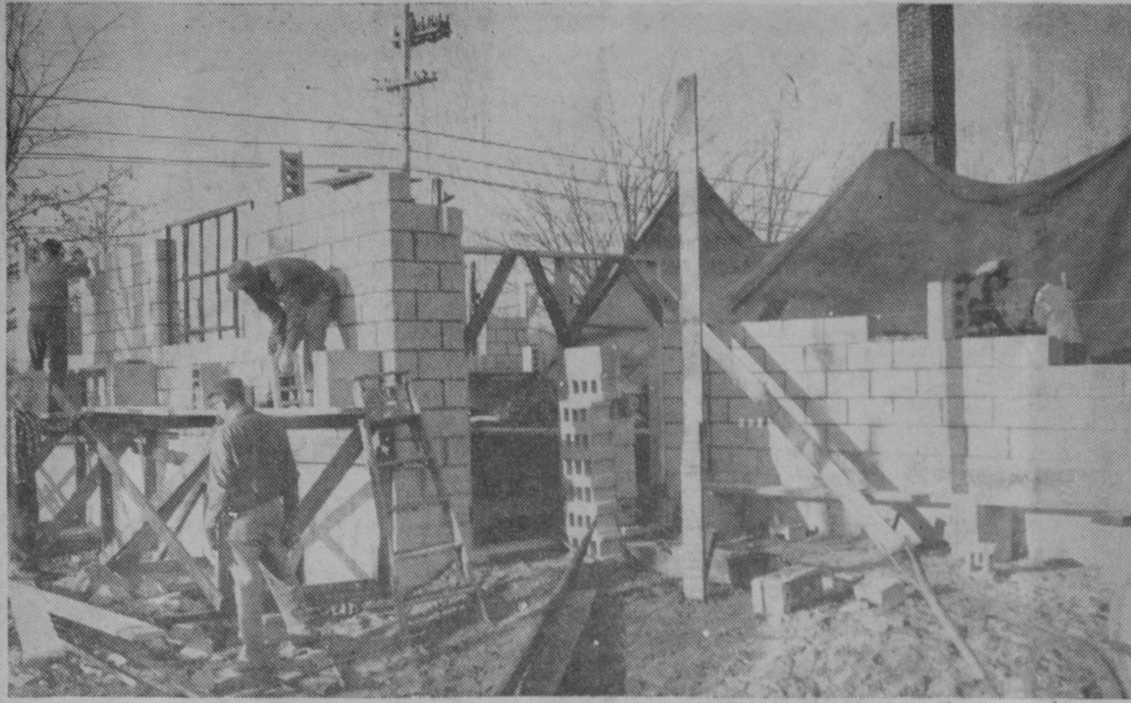

Michigan Bell Telephone Company announced this week that the telephone number of all of its customers will get a new look sometime within the next five years. The new style telephone number will consist of seven numerals instead of the two-letter, five-numeral type of telephone number in use today, the company said. For example, a number such as KLondike 5-2368 would become 555-2368. The new system, the company said, technically will not change anyone's telephone number. It will simply express it in a different form. In the KLondike example, Michigan Bell explained, the letters K and L are in the same dial slot as the numeral 5. The change to the new system will start on a progressive basis in most communities beginning next April 1. In several communities, however, the conversion to the new telephone numbering system will be made simultaneously when their service is converted from manual to dial operation within the next year. Conversion to the new system, known as All Number Calling (ANC), has been necessitated because Michigan Bell and other Bell System companies throughout the country are running out of the present type of telephone numbers. Besides providing additional telephone numbers needed to serve a growing population, ANC also has significant customer advantages, Michigan Bell said. The company explained that ANC will simplify dialing since most people find it easier to locate numerals than letters on the dial. It also will eliminate the confusion between the letter "O" and the zero, and between the letter "I" and the numeral 1. ANC also will eliminate mis-

dialing through the misspelling or misunderstanding of exchange names. As a general rule in communities where the change to ANC will be made on a progressive basis, telephone numbers will be switched to all numerals whenever a customer's service request requires a change in the telephone directory coupled with a visit to the customer's home or office. This would happen, for example, when a customer gets service for the first time, when his present number is changed for some reason, or when a customer moves to a new location. Michigan Bell estimates that 20 percent of the telephones in the company's territory will be converted to ANC during the first year of the program.
