School Board States Its Views on Controversy

Concern over a recent news article and discussion by a committee of the Iosco Board of Supervisors over alleged "irregularities" by the county allocation board, with particular reference to Tawas Area School, was expressed Monday night by board of education members.

Following a special meeting at Tawas Area School, attended by Mayor Elmer Werth of East Tawas, Russell A. Rollin and Arden Charters of the Iosco County Tax Allocation Board, the following statement was released by the board of education:

1. "The Tawas Area Board of Education, in examining its records pertaining to the 1960-61 budget, finds that it has complied with all the legal requirements and submitted the budget within the time limit as set by law.
2. "No supplemental budget was presented by the Tawas Area Board of Education.
3. "Only one budget was submitted by the Tawas Area Board

Bad Axe Man Wins Acquittal

After deliberating for about one hour Friday, an Iosco County Circuit Court jury found a 44-year-old Bad Axe man "not guilty" on his appeal of a justice court conviction last spring.

Acquitted of a drunk driving charge before Judge Allan C. Miller was Joseph Ray Stoecker.

He had been charged with driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor March 18 after being arrested in Tawas City by state and city police officers. Stoecker had been found guilty by a justice court jury and appealed the decision to the higher court.

Admitted as evidence in the trial was a muffler from Stoecker's automobile, which was said to have been defective and caused entry of carbon monoxide fumes into the car. The fumes, counsel for the defense maintained, had affected alleged actions of the driver.

State Asks Oscoda to Remove Pier

Removal of an earth-filled pier situated lakeward from the Oscoda Township Park has been requested by George Taack, director of the Michigan Department of Conservation's lands division.

According to a letter received by Iosco Prosecuting Attorney Paul Harvey, existing piling, seal wall and fill are to be removed as soon as possible "and in any event, not later than June 1, 1961," said Taack.

Agreement to the removal was reached at a meeting between the Oscoda Township Park Commission, township board, Assistant Attorney General F. S. Aboud and Taack which was held recently at Lansing.

Construction of the rubble-filled pier was stopped by the state last September. Aboud said the construction was in violation of the submerged lands act of 1955.

Plans submitted with the application for construction permits in November 1959 were denied by the conservation department. In his letter, Taack pointed out that should the park commission and township wish to erect a

causeway to the existing rock-filled crib, application could be filed with the corps of engineers and the department of conservation.

Taack said that such a structure should be built in a manner as to protect the public interest and not impair the quality of the water or beach at the site. When the park commission was ordered to stop construction in September, the department of conservation pointed out that the solid pier construction would be a deterrent to small craft navigation, would probably cause erosion, deposit waste and fill in the lake bottom.

Officials pointed out at that time, however, that modification of the structure to permit free flow of water underneath would result in the removal of objection to the project and that a permit could be granted.

The park commission is to advise the department of conservation of progress on removing the material dumped into the waters of Lake Huron.

An inspection is to be made at the site by the department.

PENLETON SHOP ADDS FLOOR SPACE

An addition of more than 1,500 feet of floor space is now under way at the Pendleton Shop, East Tawas. Joseph O'Connor, owner-manager, said that storage space would be eliminated on the first floor and transferred to the second floor of the building.

When completed, the sales area in the Pendleton Shop will extend from Newman Street to the alley at the rear of the building. There will be a rear entrance facing the city parking lot.

ELECTION DAY CLOSING IN

Record Vote Expected in Iosco Next Tuesday

Iosco County is expected to set an all-time high in the number of votes cast in next Tuesday's general election. Some 6,500 printed ballots have been prepared for the election and registration in the county's only machine equipped precinct, Oscoda Township, numbers 1,000.

In the 1956 presidential election year, 4,385 votes were cast for the Eisenhower-Nixon ticket and 1,600 for Stevenson-Kefauver, for a total of 5,985.

All precincts have reported increases in registration for this election, brought on by a growing population and interest created in national, state and local races.

Races for the United States Congress finds Patrick V. McNamara, Democratic incumbent for senator, being opposed by Alvin M. Bentley, Republican. Elford A. Cederberg, Republican incumbent candidate for representative in the 10th Congressional District, is opposed by Daniel E. Reed.

In the state legislature, Charles T. Prescott, Republican incumbent candidate for state senator of the 28th District, is opposed by Martin Blumenthal, Democratic candidate. James P. Mielock, Republican incumbent for state representative of the Alpena District, is opposed by Gerald M. Kendzioriski, Democrat.

In the local political picture, nine Republican incumbents are opposed by five Democratic candidates. Republicans unopposed in this year's election are William H. McCreedy, prosecuting attorney; Grace L. Miller, treasurer; Edward D. Jacques and E. John Moffatt, coroners.

Ivan O'Farrell, incumbent Republican sheriff, is opposed by Kenneth W. Frank, Democrat; George A. Prescott, Republican incumbent for county clerk, is opposed by Olen Herriman, Democrat; Albert H. Buch, Republic

Members of the organization will patrol against trespassers. All violators are to be prosecuted, warn the landowners.

The designated area extends from Love Hall corner four miles south to Sherman's corner and extends about two miles east of this line.

'Forgotten' Men of Presidential Race are Named

Farrell Dobbs, Eric Hass, Lar Daly and Rutherford Decker are forgotten men in the race for president of the United States. These are the little known third party candidates whose names will appear on ballots in the November 8 general election.

For the first time in many years, seven political parties are listed on the general election ballot. In 1936, the only third party on the ticket was the Prohibition Party. Its candidate, Enoch A. Holtwick, polled 6,923 Michigan votes compared to 1,359,898 for Adlai Stevenson and 1,713,647 for Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Besides the Nixon-Lodge and Kennedy-Johnson tickets, the voter will have his choice of Farrell Dobbs and Myra Tanner Weiss on the Socialist Workers ticket, Lar Daly and B. M. Miller on the Tax Cut ticket, Rutherford L. Decker and E. Harold Munn Sr. on the Prohibition ticket; Eric Hass and Georgia Cozzini on the Socialist Labor ticket.

The Independent American Party does not show candidates for president and vice president.

Oscoda Couple Wonders About Origin of Sword

Can anyone shed light on a mysterious sword, owned by an Oscoda couple?

Was the weapon once carried by voyagers who accompanied the canoes of Brule and Nicolet, Marquette and Allouez, or Cadillac and LaSalle—explorers and priests who set the flag of New France in this Great Lakes region?

Or, is it a sword which was once used in the rites of some fraternal lodge of long ago?

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Richards of 409 River Road, owners, rule out the latter possibility because of the circumstances and location under which it was found.

About 50 years ago, Mrs. Richards' father, Chris Laub, constructed a new barn at his farm five miles west of Mikado in Alcona County. While excavating for the foundation on the bank of the North Branch of the Pine River, a team of horses pulling a scoop uncovered the sword.

It was found about six or

seven feet underground and was covered with rust. Leather on the handle was still intact, but after a few days of exposure to the air, the leather disintegrated.

The handle has a carved figure of an eagle or falcon on the butt. Other carvings include, what Mrs. Richards terms, a French fleur-de-lis, a coat of arms and birds, either falcons or eagles.

Mrs. Richards said that her father purchased the property from the original homesteaders of the land, which would probably rule out any possibility that the sword was used in lodge rites. "In fact, much of the land was still 'wild' when my parents obtained the property and there were no buildings located near the site where the sword was found," said Mrs. Richards.

"No bones or any other artifacts were found at the time, but the men with the team of horses could have overlooked such things," said Mr. Richards.

The Richards, married in

1908, moved to Detroit shortly after obtaining the sword from Mr. Laub. "He polished the blade until most of the rust was removed. Part of the blade was broken and he re-sharpened the point."

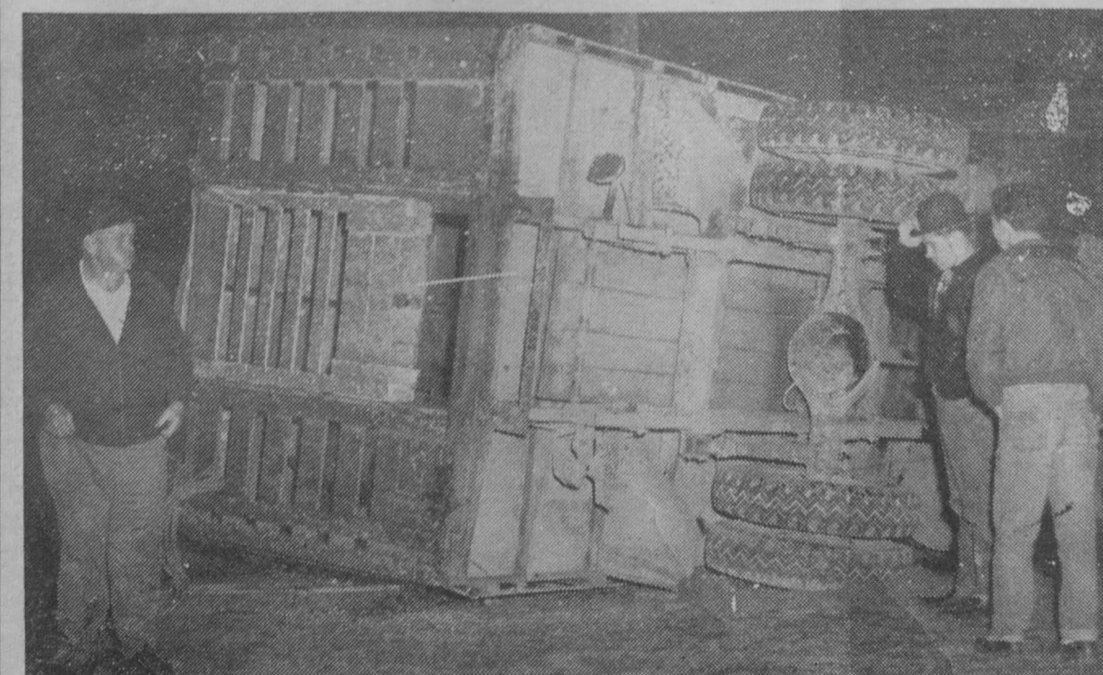
The Richards have often wondered about the history of the weapon, but never placed it in the hands of an expert to establish its identity.

Since moving to Oscoda in 1954, many residents of the community have examined the sword in the Richards home, but the mystery remains.

"There is a possibility that an exploring party was in this area long ago," states Mr. Richards. "Who knows, a voyager may have met with an accident and his sword was buried with him, or it may have been lost."

The history of the Richards' sword probably will remain a mystery until it is examined by an expert. A little investigation may add information to the history of Northeastern Michigan.

Result of a Hallowe'en 'Prank'



DRIVER of this livestock truck, John Kingston of Lincoln, escaped with only minor bruises Monday night when he swerved to avoid hitting a trailer parked on the center lines of US-23 south of the Ninth Street intersection in Tawas City. Kingston spotted the trailer while headed north, swerved to the right and pulled back on the highway. His load of livestock shifted its weight and the truck overturned, crashing into a utility pole. Investigating state police officers said that the trailer had been pushed out on the road by Hallowe'en pranksters. Two large hogs were killed in the crash. Otherwise, Hallowe'en destruction was at a minimum in the Tawas. Besides investigating this case, state and city police officers are seeking to identify persons who splattered several cars with red paint. Michigan Accepts Point Property

Tawas Point State Park is one step closer to reality, according to an announcement by the Michigan Department of Conservation.

Formal acceptance of the Tawas Point property was made by the conservation commission, Charles E. Millar, chief of the lands division, said.

The property, to be used for future state park uses, consists of approximately 175 acres, including adjoining relicted lands (exposed beach) and about 2 1/2 miles of Lake Huron and Tawas Bay frontage.

Conveyed to the state under Public Law 616, 80th Congress, the property was purchased for \$29,250, which represents 50 percent of the appraised fair market value of the land.

During the 1960 session of the state legislature, this sum was appropriated from the state's general fund for purchase of the federal property.

Millar said that the purchase price has been forwarded to the General Services Administration and it is expected that conveyance of the property to Michigan will be completed in the near future.

Highway Dept. Returns Petitions to Alabaster

Reclassification of Turtle and Benson Roads in Alabaster Township is a matter of local jurisdiction, according to a letter from the Michigan State Highway Department.

Alabaster Township had requested that the two roads be changed to primary status in order that improvements could be made, but, according to a letter from Paul J. Marek of the state highway department, all changes must be initiated by the county road commission.

Supervisor Henry Oates said last week that petitions signed by Alabaster residents had been sent to Lansing in order to clarify the status of the road.

In his letter to Oates, Marek said that Alabaster Township's communication would be forwarded to the Iosco Road Commission "and if they care to submit sufficient justification, this office will again consider this request for reclassification."

Marek said that traffic volume was only one of the factors used for consideration of primary status. "Primary roads are essentially those which form an integrated arterial network that tends to affect the overall economy of the entire county," he stated. "Local roads carry traffic of a local nature and benefit only a small area adjacent to the road."

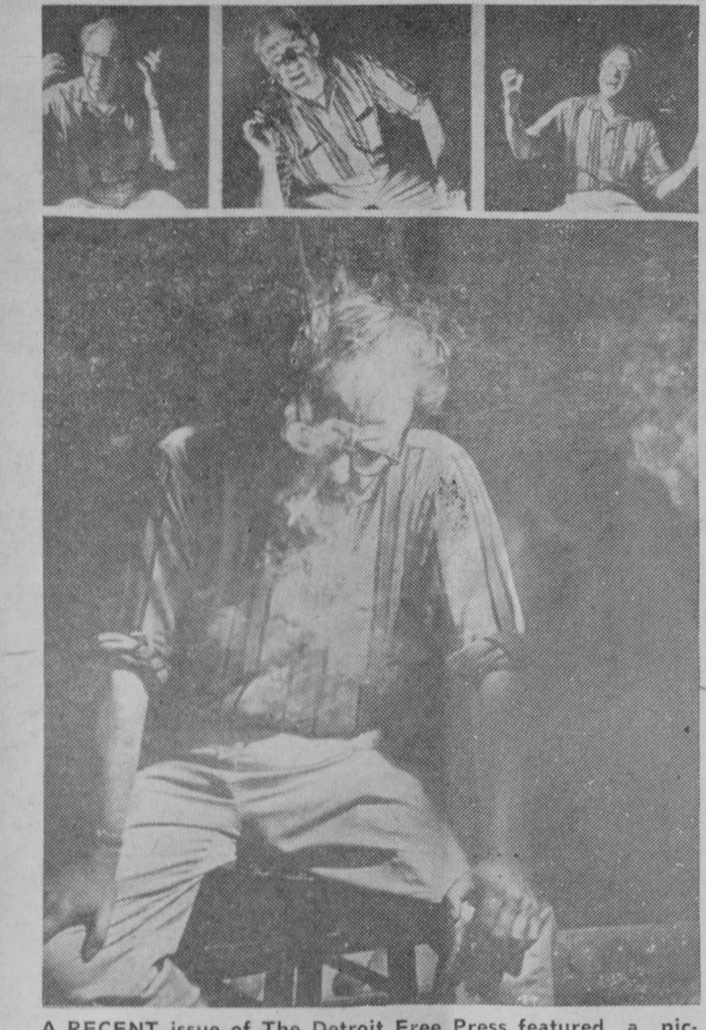

Notify Office of Your Change of Address, Says Ellifritz

Statistics show that one in four families in the United States changes residence during the course of a year. According to Paul M. Ellifritz, district social security manager, unfortunately, some people do not notify us when they do change their address. Consequently, that all important monthly social security check often does not catch up with them for quite awhile.

There is one simple solution to this problem—namely—notify social security when you move! Mr. Ellifritz says, "Even better, send your notification in beforehand, if possible. And do not forget—put your social security number on it. In all things pertaining to social security, your number is all important. Many of the voluminous records of social security are recorded primarily by social security number. If you remember that millions of people are receiving a regular monthly check and they usually need them on time, you realize that we cannot get your check to you if you are not at the same place you were when the last check came—unless you have told us as far ahead of time as possible." Mr. Ellifritz explained.

The proper way to do so is on the postcard form which each person received when he first signed up for his benefits. Possibly this card may have been misplaced, but the local social security office has one for the asking. It does not take more than a minute or two to complete and sign. If you are getting social security benefits, see to it that social security is the first to know about your expected change of address. A representative of the Social Security Administration will be in East Tawas at the Federal Building Thursday, November 10, at 10:30 a. m. to take claims for benefits or furnish information.

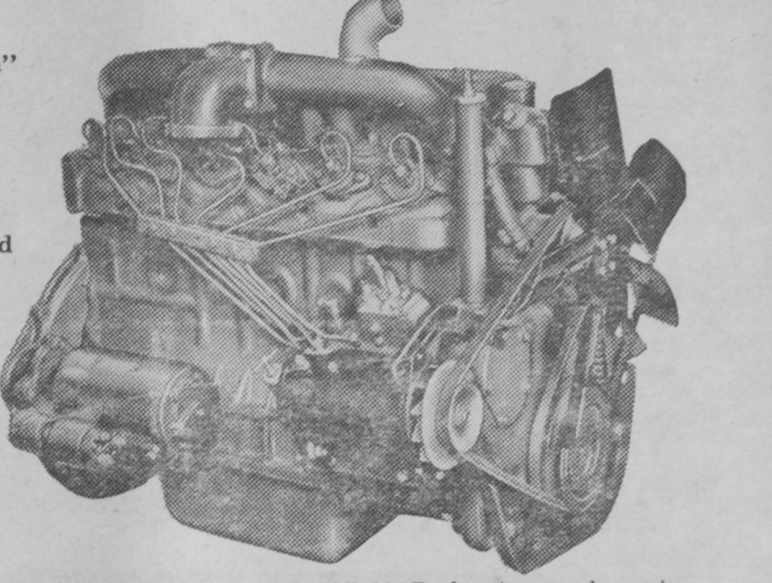

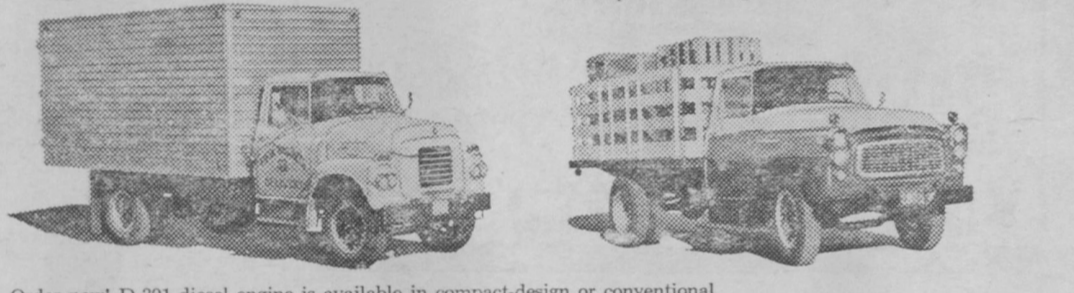

Upset-Minded Braves Give Gladwin a Scrap

Behind the hard charging of Tackle Bud St. James and his mates, the Tawas Area Braves came within a whisker of pulling off one of the biggest upsets this year in the Northeastern Michigan Conference.

For almost four quarters last Friday night, the Braves defense was nearly invincible and Tawas held a 6-0 edge over the Gladwin Flying Gs going into the final period.

It was not until late in the final quarter that the conference leaders began to roll and finally pushed two touchdowns across to edge Tawas Area, 12-6.

The Braves took a 6-0 lead in the first quarter when Fullback Ed Collier rolled 29 yards on an off-tackle slant which caught the Gladwin defense completely by surprise. The try for extra point failed and Tawas had a lead which it did not relinquish until mid-way in the final quarter.

Gladwin's Doug Redman, a sure bet for all-conference halfback, was stopped time after time by the Braves throughout the game, but the speedster finally broke loose in the fourth to score two touchdowns.

The tying score, coming shortly after a 58-yard TD jaunt by Collier was nullified because of a penalty, saw Redman break through for a 43-yard touchdown run. The PAT was blocked.

Kicking off to the Braves, Gladwin gained possession of the ball on a strategic on-side kick which set up the winning touchdown. Tawas was penalized 15 yards and in six plays, the Flying Gs scored the winning touchdown with Redman sweeping end for two yards. The PAT was blocked.

The Braves, a sophomore-studded team which has been destined to be the "bride" instead of the "bride" all season, caught all the bouquets again for their fine play and gained a moral victory, although the Flying Gs marched down the aisle with the elusive victory.

Tawas Area's defense hampered and pounded a highly touted Gladwin running game into the ground and it was not until a minute before the first half ended that the Flying Gs came up with their initial first down of the night.

Gladwin, still leaders of the NEM Conference with an undefeated record, was figured to beat the Braves by several touch-

downs. Despite their one win, five loss record going into the game, the Braves were impressive in several games this season, particularly against Pinconning and West Branch.

Head Coach Herb Escott and his assistant, Steve Sventko, had their charges fired up for this game. Tawas pulled out all stops by gambling on a new offense and changed its defensive alignment to cope with a powerful Gladwin line.

That the changes instituted by the coaching staff worked is clearly shown by the game's statistics. Gladwin, which had scored 100 points against its two previous opponents and was rated ninth in the state among class B schools, was held to 120 yards rushing. Gladwin picked up only eight first downs during the game. Of the 120 yards gained, 75 were picked up in two plays in the last quarter, one going for a touchdown.

On the other hand, Tawas gained a total of 276 yards, 258 by rushing and 18 by passing. The Braves had 15 first downs.

The Braves were again plagued by mistakes, fumbles and penalties which seem to happen at the wrong time. Along with the 58-yard TD play by Collier which was nullified, a costly fumble on the Gladwin eight-yard line cost Tawas a possible touchdown before the end of the first half.

Caught up in the excitement of the game, Tawas Area's coaching staff drew a penalty at a crucial point in the fourth quarter. When Gladwin tried its on-side kick, it appeared to Escott and Sventko that a Gladwin player touched the ball before it had rolled 10 yards. Sventko, vigorously protesting that there should be a conference between the three officials on the call, drew a 15-yard penalty.

Coach Gilbert's Gladwin squad, one of the most powerful units ever assembled in the NEM, was not without its share of bad breaks during the game and possibly suffered from a slight case of overconfidence at the beginning.

Junior Braves Down Gladwin; Still Undefeated

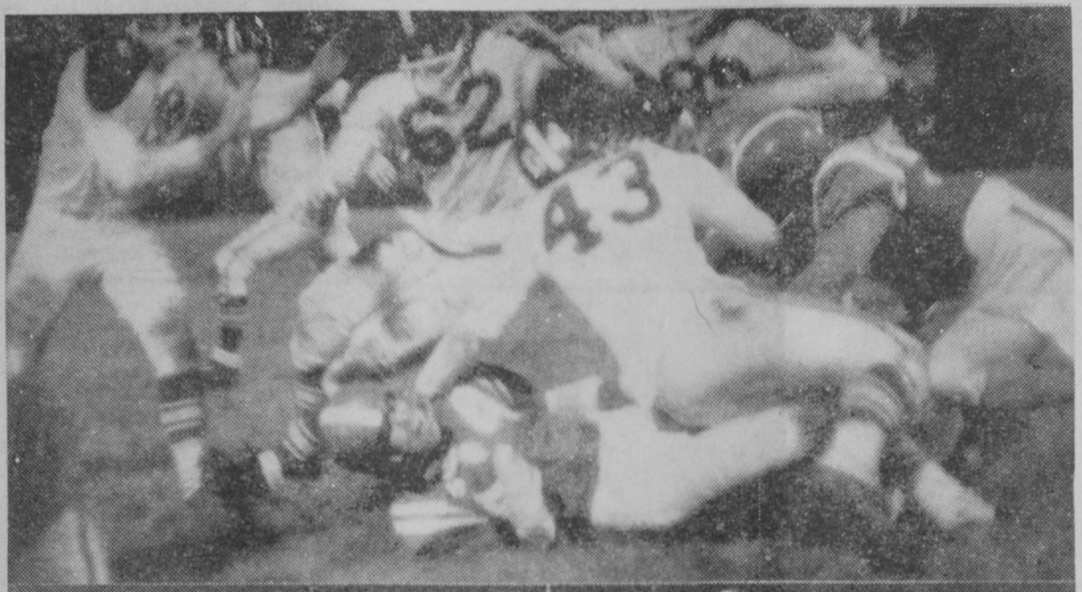

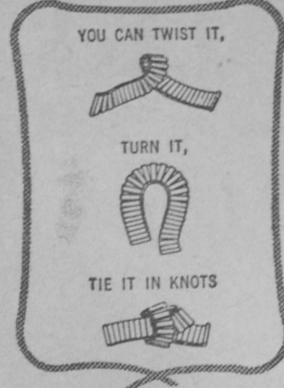

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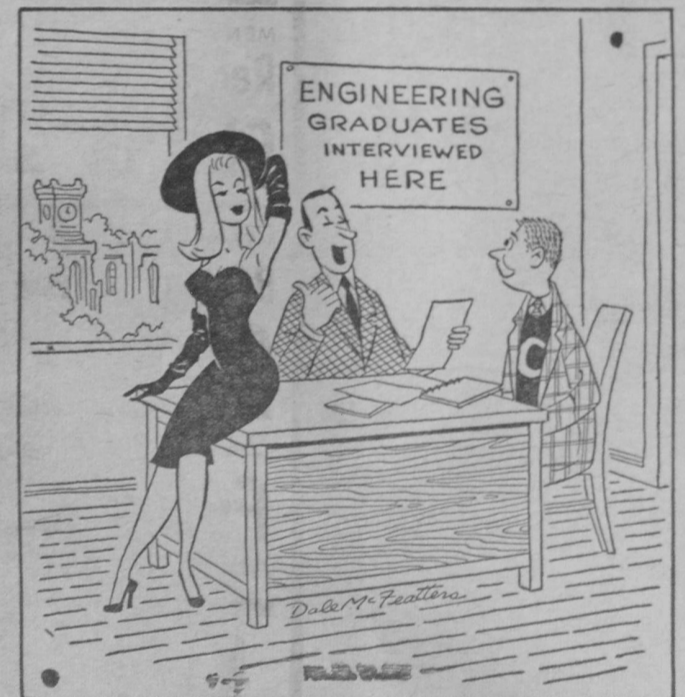

I have reviewed the several statutes with respect to the voting on the special question at the coming November election and I find the following:

With respect to the municipal incorporation:

The petition was received by the board of supervisors August 24, and acted upon by the board of supervisors on September 21. It would appear that this action was subject to two possible objections:

1. The statute requires that such a petition shall be filed 30 days before final action upon it, and in this case only 28 days elapsed.

2. The revised election law (1958) requires any special questions to be voted on at a general election shall be certified to the clerk at least 49 days prior to the election. The board action in this case was only 48 days prior to the election, and for this reason, it is highly doubtful that any vote so taken would stand up in court if questioned.

It is, therefore, my recommendation that the resolution of the board adopted on September 21 be rescinded and that the question be submitted to a later election.

Special Millage Proposal:
The same objection as mentioned above with respect to the 49 day limit for certifying the question to the clerk would apply to the special millage proposal adopted by the board on September 21. It would, therefore, be my recommendation that this question also be withdrawn from the November ballot and if the board deems it desirable that it be submitted at a later special election.

Sgt. Roti Warns Motorists to Use Unusual Vigilance

With November and December averaging a fifth of the annual Michigan traffic deaths, Sgt. Frank Roti of the East Tawas State Police Post is warning motorists and pedestrians to be unusually vigilant in these hazardous months.

The toll for last November and December was 299 or 20 percent of the 1959 total, the same as the 33-year average computed since traffic records were begun.

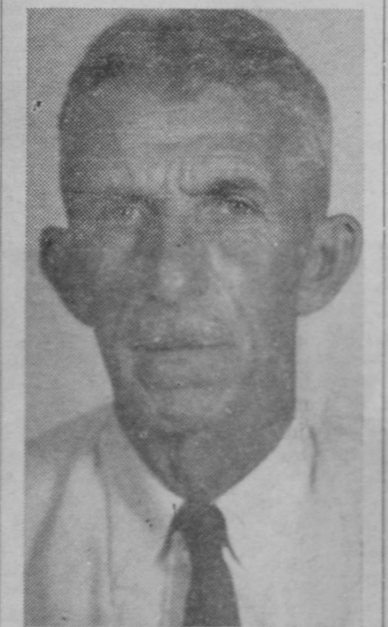
More hours of darkness due to shorter days mean more driving and walking is done in reduced visibility. Sergeant Roti pointed out. Frequent unfavorable weather and road conditions increase the hazards. In addition, holiday shopping adds to the volume of pedestrian and vehicle traffic in these two months.

"More alert driving and walking can cut down this year end toll," Sergeant Roti emphasized. "To increase their safety, motorists and pedestrians must work at it every day. You can't take safety for granted."

Sergeant Roti offered these safety tips:

To drivers: Because traffic hazards increase in November and December, increase your alertness. Take it easy after dark and in bad weather. Increase your caution at hills, curves or intersections—there may be ice or snow. Obey the traffic laws and signs and watch out for the motorist or pedestrian who may not. Safe driving can prevent accidents.

To pedestrians: Be especially alert for the added walking hazards of the season. Don't block your vision with packages or other objects. Walk only where drivers expect you, but be on guard for the motorist who may be inattentive or careless. Be extra cautious at night and in bad weather. Remember, careful walking can keep you unharmed so always take your best steps in traffic.

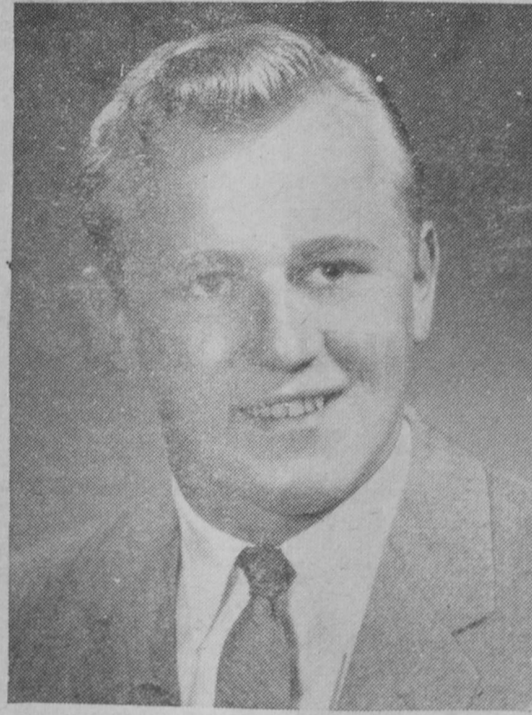
