

New Ordinance Limits Occupancy of Trailer Homes Here

Ordinance No. 152, regulating mobile homes within the city limits, was passed by the Tawas City Council at Monday night's meeting. The full text of the ordinance appears on page 7 of this newspaper.

The ordinance has been much discussed by the council during

recent months. Under the new ordinance, maximum length of time that a trailer may be used for sleeping or living quarters in this city is one year.

The ordinance is designed to allow owners to live in a trailer while in the process of building a

home. Property on which the trailer is located must be owned by the occupant.

Cost of the permit is \$20 for the first three months, allowing \$5 for inspection. The permit may be extended for three additional three-month periods at a cost of \$15 for each period.

Among other things, the ordinance prohibits the overnight parking of a trailer on any street, alley, highway or other public place; prohibits parking of trailers between the established set-back line and the curb, as well as other restrictions for placing of trailers on lots.

A trailer may not be enlarged by the addition of porches, canopies or other similar structures. All trailers must be connected with city water and sewer, where available. No trailer may be parked for occupancy on a lot without provisions for adequate sanitary

facilities. Provisions of the new ordinance do not apply to those trailers already situated in the city which comply with existing ordinances.

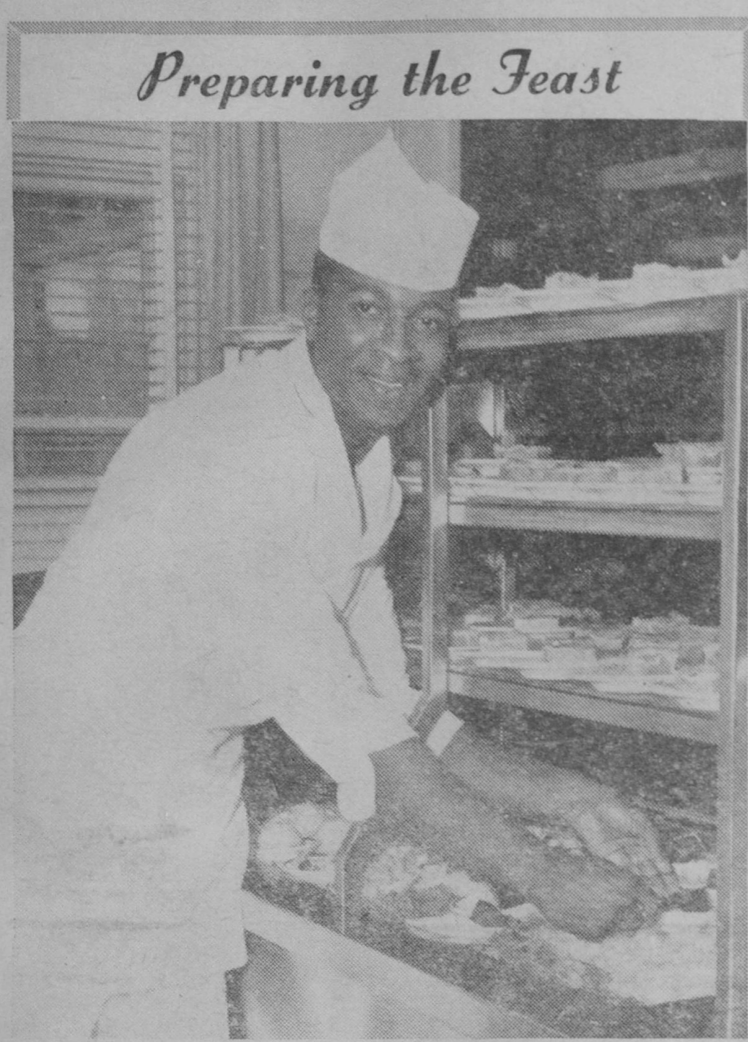
Provisions of the ordinance are to be enforced by Chief of Police George Ruth, who is to inspect

all trailers before a permit is issued. Several weeks ago, the council discussed possibilities of passing an ordinance which would prohibit the use of trailer homes as living quarters.

However, most councilmen were of the opinion that owners

who planned to live in trailers on a temporary basis while constructing homes should be allowed to do so.

It was also learned at that time that such an ordinance could not be made retroactive to include those trailers already situated within the city.

Plans for Addition in Hands of Board

Proposals for a \$180,000 addition to Hale Area School are in the hands of the board of education.

Recommendations for a five-room addition to the present structure was made by a steering committee appointed to study the community's school problems.

Committee members reported that an overwhelming number of citizens polled in Hale area replied that they wanted to keep their high school, 256-86 in favor.

The committee said that the school would lose its University of Michigan accreditation if a shop, music, science, library-study hall and commercial-home-making rooms are not added.

A drawing of the proposed addition to the school shows the new structure connected to the present building by a 24-foot hall.

The addition also includes a boiler room for the new section, the committee recommending that the new boiler be expanded to heat the old section.

Cost of expanding the new boiler to accommodate both wings would be \$18,000 to \$20,000 additional, but the furnaces in the present unit are old and will need replacing at any time, the committee reported.

The committee also said the present rest room facilities are not large enough. The new section would include additional facilities.

The new building would be 130 by 90 feet, containing a 55 by 40 foot study hall, 32 by 37 foot science room and a 62 by 44 foot general shop room; besides an agricultural-drafting and boiler rooms and new lavatory facilities.

"We need the combination agricultural and drafting room so that we can use the present agricultural room as a classroom for commercial classes as recommended by the University of Michigan, the committee report said.

Study halls for 70-80 students in the school now are being held in a classroom built to accommodate 30 students, the committee pointed out.

A fire extensively damaged a school garage formerly used to house shop classes. It would be too expensive to repair the structure and if it were repaired, the shop facilities would still be inadequate, members said.

Approximate costs for the new wing would be: Architectural, \$100,000; plumbing, heating and sewage, \$38,500; electrical, \$6,000; furnishings, \$13,000; architectural fees, \$10,000; bonding fees, \$1,000; capitalized interest, \$7,500; and contingency (quick sand) \$4,000.

The committee said the millage levy to pay for the addition over an 18-year period would be between 2.2 and 2.5 mills. However, the amount voted on would be 3 1/2 mills for the bond buyers' protection.

"The bond buyers require protection in case of a disaster destroying a large amount of local valuation and/or property, the report said.

The Hale Area School services Plainfield, Hill, Logan, Reno and Grant Townships, besides Hale itself.

The steering committee said its poll showed a 112-0 vote in favor of consolidating with another system. Preferences indicated in the poll, should the system consolidate, were Rose City, Lupton, Goodard, O'Connor, 122; Tawas, 98, and Whittemore-Prescott, 72.

The poll showed 204-51 against a suggestion that the Hale school be closed and students be sent to other systems on a tuition basis.

Enrollment in the Hale school increased by 53 in the past five years, 28 in the past three years.

Schoolboy Hunters Miss Too Many Classes, Says Principal

Should Johnny be allowed to take time off from school to go deer hunting? This question was uppermost in the thoughts of the administration at Tawas Area High School last week.

Although school was closed on opening day (Tuesday) to allow students to get the "hunting bug" out of their systems, empty seats in classrooms during the three remaining days of the week told the old familiar story of deer hunter absenteeism.

However, these students returned to school with signed excuses from their parents.

Principal Ernest Jordan said Friday that 26 percent of the high school boys were absent Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Normally, between three and four percent of the high school enrollment is absent.

Some missed school because of illness, but the principal believes that the majority were out because of deer hunting.

Because of this hunter absenteeism, peculiar only to schools in northern areas of the state at this time of year, Jordan wondered out loud whether or not some new policy should be initiated by the administration.

School was actually at a standstill during the last three days of the week. "Weekly tests could not be given because of the large number of students absent," said Jordan.

"If it is the policy of the school to allow two days per year for hunting, is it fair to continue teaching with less than half of the class in attendance," asked Jordan.

Tawas Area School allows students to take two days off from school during the year for hunting purposes. However, a survey has shown that many boys take two days off for the opening day of pheasant hunting, two days for duck hunting and two days for deer hunting.

"These six days represent one-sixth of the school days in a six-week marking period," said Jordan.

In order to go hunting, the school requires a written note from parents, the applicant's hunting license number and his eligibility slip.

A survey of hunters has shown that 35 percent of the sophomores missing from school had less than a C average, 60 percent of the juniors missing had less than a C average and 50 percent of the seniors had less than a C average.

"Actually, these people cannot afford to take time off from school," said Jordan. "Parents should realize this when they are asked to sign excuses in order that their sons might go hunting. It would be better for these students to do their hunting after school or over the week-end."

"I wish we knew the solution to this problem," said the principal. "Perhaps we should require that in order to take time off from school to go hunting, a student would need to have a C average or better."

"We could close down school for two or three days and make up the time at the end of the school year. On the other hand, perhaps we are teaching youngsters the wrong values by allowing them to take time off from school to go hunting."

Their fathers certainly are not allowed to take time off from their places of work without taking a cut in the weekly pay check. Perhaps grades of students who miss school to go hunting should be lowered proportionately," said the principal.

Ore Shipping Season Ends November 29

Shipment of gypsum ore by water from Isosco County is scheduled to close for the season next Tuesday, according to reports from the area's two quarry operators.

National Gypsum Company closed its season Monday of this week with the loading of the ore carrier, Fred W. Manko, at the Fort Gypsum installation south of Tawas City.

The Dow Chemical, a 10,000-ton ore carrier, will close United States Gypsum Company's 1960 shipping season when it loads next Tuesday at Alabaster.

Maynard VanOrnum, works manager for USG at Alabaster, said Monday morning that 1960 was a "normal" season for gypsum production. He said that although there were fewer ships loaded out at the off-shore bin, the carriers handled total tonnage equivalent to recent years.

Higher water in the Great Lakes this year made this possible, said VanOrnum, through loading carriers to capacity. Next Tuesday's ship, bound for Detroit, will be loaded at winter draft, however. Some 9,000 tons of gypsum ore will be shipped.

Airman's Son Died from Burns Friday

Charles David Chambers, 19-month-old son of SSGT and Mrs. Charles W. Chambers, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, died Friday morning shortly after being admitted to Tawas Hospital.

The parents awoke at 6:30 a. m. when they heard the little boy crying. They found him at the bottom of the stairway of their apartment with his clothing on fire.

After first aid was administered, the little boy was rushed to Tawas Hospital.

COMMUNITY CHORUS HAS MORE THAN 40 MEMBERS

Mild Weather Tough on Area 'Red Coats'

Thousands of Michigan deer hunters returned home Sunday—a steady procession of south-bound cars crowded US-23 and M-65 in this area—as another hunting season became history for most nimrods.

For many hunters, the season which started November 15 was a disappointment. The deer kill apparently was below normal in this area, while other returned home with filled licenses.

The 1960 season was marked with mild weather, starting right from opening day when fog and rain cut visibility to almost nil. While non-hunters enjoyed a late "Indian summer" during the remainder of the week, the red coats complained of the lack of good tracking snow.

Some 30 hunters have been wounded in the state since the start of the season. One nimrod was killed by gunfire and seven died of heart attacks.

This area had its share of hunting mishaps. Three persons were wounded by gunfire while one hunter was hospitalized because of a heart attack.

Some down-state hunters will return to this area over the Thanksgiving holiday for a last fling at filling the family larder with venison.

Gunfire Deadly First Two Days

As of Monday of this week, three deer hunters have been wounded by gunfire in Isosco County since opening day last Tuesday.

First shooting victim was August M. Aaron, 45, Freeland, who was wounded in both legs Tuesday morning while hunting on Koking Road, Plainfield Township.

There were two accidental shootings, Wednesday, the second day of the season.

John Seibert of St. Clair Shores was wounded in the shoulder by a rifle slug while hunting 10 miles west of Oscoda off the River Road.

Henry G. Clark of Grosse Ile lost two toes on his right foot when the rifle he was holding muzzle down went off while he was hunting in Wilber Township.

All of the injured were treated at Tawas Hospital.

Contract Let for M-55 Paving Job

Low bids on 11 highway contracts totaled \$5,577,794 at last Wednesday's bid opening by the Michigan State Highway Department.

Included among the contracts was a job for 6.8 miles of asphalt surfacing on M-55 west from US-23 in Tawas City to Chambers Road.

Central Paving Company, West Branch, was low bidder with \$324,212. Completion date is October 31, 1961.

Police Officer Escapes Serious Injury in Crash

George Westcott, Tawas City police officer, received face lacerations Thursday night when the city patrol car rammed the rear end of a truck parked on US-23 opposite the Mid Way Drive-In.

Westcott, who was alone, stated he glanced over at the restaurant and did not see the parked truck. Damage to the patrol car amounted to about \$500.

Hunter Who Shot Freeland Man Turns Self In to Police

No action was taken against a hunter who walked into the state police post at East Tawas Thursday and admitted he was the man who accidentally shot and wounded a hunter near Hale on Tuesday.

Henry W. Kaphengst, 57, Flint, said he fired at a deer and, when he heard a hunter cry out, he went to investigate.

The wounded hunter, August M. Aaron, 45, Freeland, was shot in both legs and the left leg had to be amputated below the knee at Tawas Hospital.

Aaron found the wounded man, put a tourniquet on his leg and went for help after three other hunters arrived at the scene.

The Flint man said he left the scene to notify a deputy sheriff at Long Lake, but became lost. Unable to locate the officer, he went to Mio and reported the accident. He was told to report the shooting to state police at East Tawas.

Officers said there would be no prosecution due to the lack of physical evidence.

Former Owner of 'Flotel' Murdered

Abraham Siegel, wealthy Detroit scrap dealer and one-time part owner of a floating hotel in Tawas City, was murdered by a holdup man last Tuesday.

Siegel and his secretary, Dolores Pletzing, were found on the floor of Siegel's office in Detroit. Both had been shot in the back of the head after being forced to lie face down on the floor.

Siegel, who conducted a large part of his business by cash, had no money in his wallet when found by investigating officers.

It was theorized the holdup man or men murdered the victims out of fear of identification, or that the murderer was a crazed dope addict who killed in frenzy.

Siegel and Robert L. Rosen were co-owners of the Western States, a former Great Lakes cruise ship which was converted into a hotel and berthed for several years at the Tawas City Park dock.

After the venture failed, the ship was sold for scrap. Before dismantling operations could be completed, the old ship was razed by fire in March of 1959.

Jail Filled With Law-Breaking Hunters

Conservation and law enforcement officers of Isosco County were busy arresting game violators during the past week. Some 10 persons were arrested during the first six days of the season and received jail sentences as well as fines.

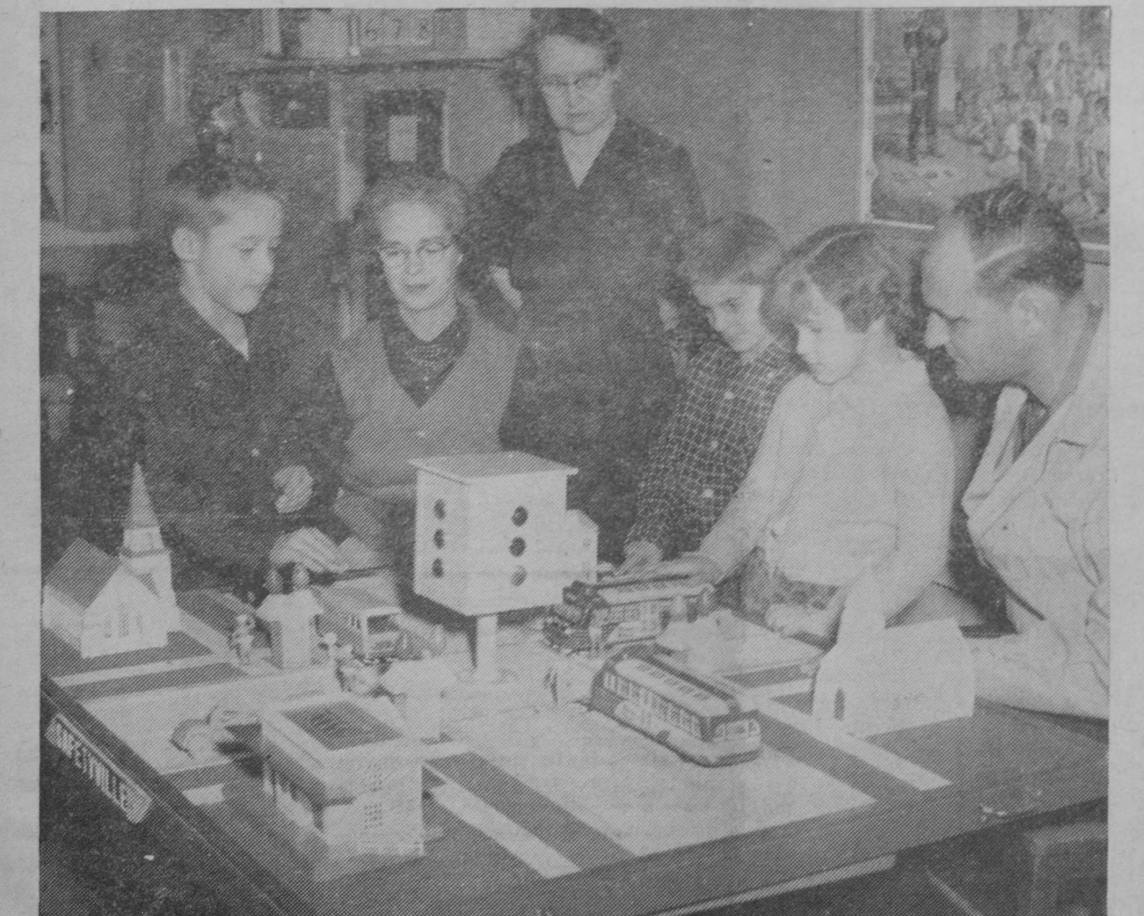
Charges against those arrested ranged from illegal possession of venison to carrying loaded rifles in vehicles, according to records at the Isosco County Sheriff's Department.

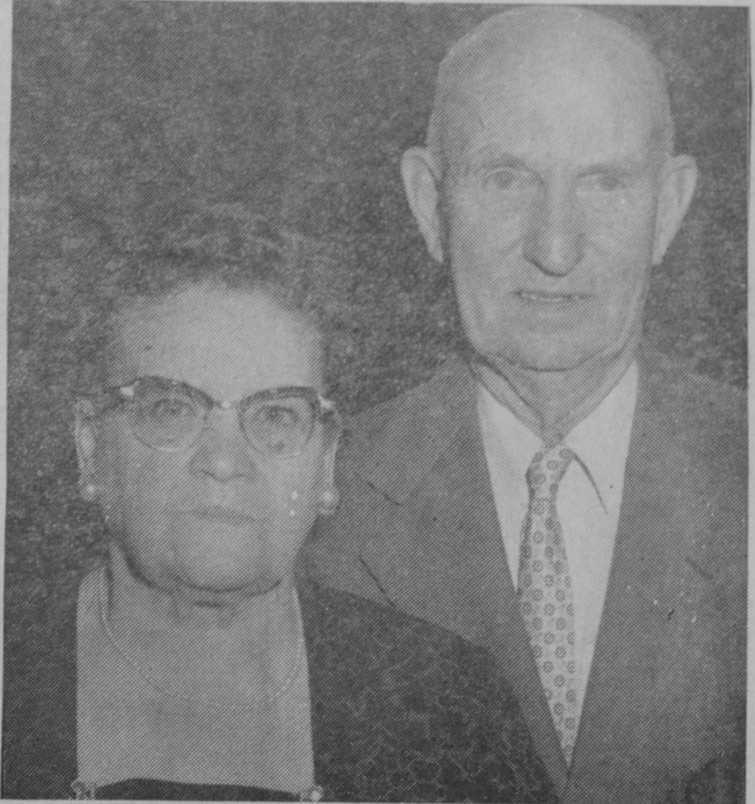

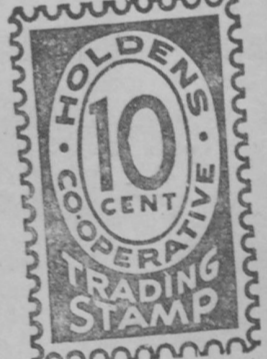

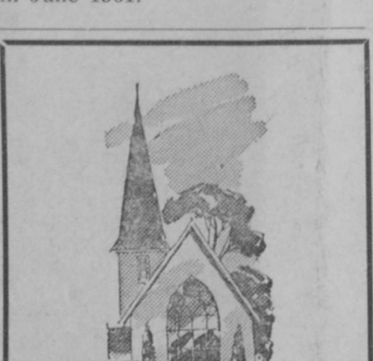
Zion Church Will Begin Advent Services Nov. 30
