

Season Opens Friday—

Braves Hosts to Roscommon Bucks

Tawas Area High School may have some surprises for NEM opponents in the coming basketball season, but the Braves of 1960-61 do not stack up as a contender for the league crown, as they have for the past several years.

Head Coach Bill McIntosh has faced a major rebuilding program this year. Although this is nothing new for a Tawas team or any other school as most coaches will testify, Tawas may not have the "horses" this year.

Although the Braves have four lettermen returning, only one player can be classed as a regular from last season.

The big deficit, however, will be in height. Only one member of the starting five will top the six-foot mark and the Braves will have to depend upon a good passing attack and speed, letting the rebounds fall where they may.

Thus far, the Braves' passing attack has shown progress, but much is still to be desired in order for Tawas to finish the season with 10 or more wins, as hoped by the coach.

Running the attack of this young team will be Herman Rollin at guard, a junior and lone survivor of last June's graduation. At the other guard will be Jim Mick, a sophomore, who moves up from the junior varsity.

At the present time, Ken Murphy, a junior with no previous varsity experience, stacks up as the starting center in the opener here against Roscommon Friday night. Also counted on to see action at this slot is Ken Pitts, a varsity substitute last year, who is presently out of action because of ineligibility and ankle injuries.

Al Moore, a senior who saw action last year as a varsity substitute, and Lewis Werth, a junior who moved up from the JV, will probably draw the starting assignments at the two forward positions.

Cards in First NEM Cage Tilt

Whitemore - Prescott Area Cardinals start their first full season in NEM competition this year. Under the direction of Coach Edward Dudo, the Cards ended their last season as an independent by winning the class C district crown, second since the school was reorganized three years ago.

This year, Coach Dudo faces a rebuilding job with only three returning lettermen. He lost four of his first five of last year and three of his substitutes.

Gone are Dave Goupil, Dennis Fuerst, Jerome Drzewiecki and Ron Aulerich, who formed the nucleus of the squad the past year or more. Also graduating last spring were Mike Soper, Larry Gawne and Russ Redmond, who saw a lot of action.

Rex Gibson, who measures in at about five feet, 10 inches, was the regular to complete the starting five. All of the other regulars were taller than Gibson and W-P may miss its usual height advantage this year unless a newcomer shapes up during the season.

The two other returning lettermen, both seniors, are Bernard Fegan and Ed Mervyn. Both saw action last year and Fegan is the tall man, just topping six feet.

Bill Redmond, a third senior, will be joined by five juniors and two sophomores to complete the squad. The juniors are Ken St. John, Jim Gawne, Ed Myers, Bryan Charters and Keith Hasty. Ron Armstead and Ray Pagel are the two sophomores.

Dudo, whose teams go back further than three years with good records, said that 31 boys have turned out for the junior varsity so W-P should have a bright future.

For the past six seasons, the Cards have been the big threat in northern cage circles. One year they reached the state finals before being stopped.

Bombs, Missiles Not Needed

The American people listened and watched on television while Khrushchev worked to wreck the United Nations General Assembly. This gesture had a deeper meaning than was apparent on the surface. It was intended as a play in the Communist grand strategy of fear—the game of "brainwashing."

The question as to who has the best atomic bombs and missiles is only another move in the same game. Communists are being expert in their application of psychology to the minds of the people of the world.

But where a psychiatrist seeks to repair the damage to a broken mind, the Communists seek to use psychological methods to break the minds of millions of people. They are succeeding.

People become brainwashed with realizing "what hit them" and without knowing that they have been transformed in their own thinking as a part of a prepared plot. But it can be done—simply by applying skillfully the proper rules of scientific psychology.

Who are the victims of brainwashing? Are you one of them? How is it done? What are its methods? Is the American nation its target?

Capture Minds and You Capture Men

Brainwashing is the most powerful weapon in the Communist grand strategy of world conquest. It is a system of propaganda on a colossal scale, ingeniously applied. It is based on a simple assumption that works. If you can influence, mold and capture the attitudes, beliefs and dominant ideas of men, you conquer them. There is no need to take military action.

"With such a weapon," said Lenin, "we shall surround that last bastion of capitalism, the United States. We shall not have to attack. It will surrender—fall like an overripe fruit into our hands."

A brief look at the world map of 1960 sees our nation being surrounded by nation after nation that has "gone over" to Communism.

Brainwashing has bred internal revolution. People have turned against their traditional governments, their religious beliefs and moral standards, their economic systems and have embraced Communism. The USSR now has a base in Cuba—only 90 miles from our borders.
