### EDITORIAL-

If local discontent and outright bitterness over Michigan's any-deer policy is an indication of the attitude of hunters in other areas of the state, the conservation department will soon be up to its ears in letters protesting the "indiscriminate slaughter of doe and fawn."

In talks with many veteran hunters of this area, this comment has been heard over and over again: Where are the deer? And most hunters answer their own question by pinning the blame on the any-deer kill of previous years.

Even sportsmen who have supported the department's policy of fitting the deer herd to the available food supply are now beginning to say that the any-deer policy should not have been continued this year.

Reason for this, it was pointed out, was because of the impact of the severe winter of 1958-59 on the fawn crop that following spring. Hunters also point a finger at what appears to be increased "poaching" on the deer herd and increasing numbers of deer being killed on highways.

But the big gripe seems to be centered around the issuing of 44,500 special permits to kill doe and fawn. One sportsman said that many hunters with special permits used to pass up shooting a doe in favor of bagging a buck. They claim that this is not the case in 1960.

A new aspect was pointed out by one hunter, who said that because of the publicity given to the over-population of deer and lack of adequate feed, many hunters have turned to shooting doe with no intent of ever tagging them. Some hunters think they are doing the state a favor by doing this, apparently thinking that it will relieve the overpopulation of the deer herd.

The conservation department blames the apparent low kill on fog and drenching rains which greeted the redcoats city Saturday. during the opening week, plus the problem of the lack of snow, which left deer free to roam and were widely scattered over their range.

This may or may not be the case, but it will be difficult to convince a hunter, who returned home empty-handed,

As for Iosco County, the deer herd has diminished to its lowest point in years, if reports received here are accurate. Granted, there may be a few areas here where deer may starve this winter, but, on the whole, most hunters believe that this area can support a much larger deer population than that which will remain after this season.

In any event, the 1960 season will have added fuel to the fire of those who oppose the any-deer policy of the state -right or wrong.
