400 Donors Ambitious Goal of Isosco Blood Bank

At a recent meeting of the Isosco County Red Cross Blood Bank committee, called by Chairman Louis Awalt, plans were made for conducting the first bloodmobile visit to Isosco County.

After the initial visit the new blood bank program will be effective in Isosco County and its service extends to Isosco residents wherever they may be if they place a request through the local Red Cross.

Committee vice chairman and recruiters have been busy contacting people asking for donor pledge cards. These cards will be

used to arrange appointments with the bloodmobile and information will be included on a card containing instructions about what to eat or not to eat in the four-hour period prior to donation. This card will reach the donors about a week in advance of the bloodmobile visit.

Supervisors Withdraw Two Propositions From Election

County Gives Most Officers a Wage Boost

Isosco County Board of Supervisors adopted recommendations of its officers' salary committee Monday giving a salary boost to the county treasurer, clerk, probate judge and register of deeds.

In addition, monthly salaries of clerks and deputies in these offices were also increased.

The county treasurer received an increase from \$4,557 to \$5,012.70. The deputy treasurer's monthly salary was increased from \$250 to \$275. Clerk in this office received a \$20.50 monthly increase over the \$205 salary paid previously.

The county clerk's salary was increased from \$4,620 to \$5,082. Deputy county clerk is to receive \$275 monthly, an increase of \$25. Office clerk is to receive a \$19 monthly increase, from \$190 to \$209.

An increase of \$1,000 was allotted to the probate judge. The salary for this office is now \$6,000. The clerk in that office received a \$20.50 monthly increase. The salary had been \$205.

Salary of the register of deeds was increased from \$4,557 to \$5,012.70, while the clerk in that office is to receive \$275 monthly instead of \$250.

Other increases include: Clerk in the county agricultural agent's office, from \$215 per month to \$236.50; board of education clerk, from \$190 to \$209; county building custodian, from \$3,980 annually to \$4,378.

Only county officers who did not receive increases were the prosecuting attorney (salary of \$4,600), sheriff (\$5,250) and drain commissioner (\$1,200).

Lacked Time to Submit City and Bridge Votes

Two special propositions, which were to have been placed before voters at the November 8 general election, were withdrawn by the Isosco County Board of Supervisors at the conclusion of Tuesday's session.

The first proposition asked for the incorporation of certain areas of Oscoda and AuSable Townships as a city. Only voters of the affected area were eligible to cast a ballot.

The second proposition asked for a one-mill tax increase in the county at large for bridge maintenance.

Action by the board came on recommendation of Prosecuting Attorney Paul Harvey, who was asked to review election laws.

He said that board action was one day short of required time for an election and he doubted if such a vote would stand up in court, if questioned.

Petitions filed with the board by residents of the two townships were two days late, according to Mr. Harvey's findings. The petitions should have been filed 30 days before final action was taken by the board, and in this case, only 28 days elapsed.

Both proposals were submitted to County Clerk George Prescott on September 21 for certification. According to law, it is necessary to submit such proposals to the clerk 49 days prior to the election.

Mr. Harvey recommended that both questions be withdrawn from the November ballot and submit them at a later special election or the general spring election.

Action by the board came to a head after a heated session Tuesday morning. Supervisor Charles Smith of Oscoda Township moved that the board rescind its action on the incorporation vote, with support by Burdge Ashton of AuSable Township.

He said that an attorney for the township officers association had found several discrepancies in election procedure concerning the proposed vote.

Smith said that members of the proposed charter commission were late in filing with the

the ballot, but he objected to causing further expense should this election be declared illegal. County Clerk George Prescott reported that ballots on both the city incorporation question and the bridge maintenance proposal have been printed.

Flint Archer is Isosco's Second Hunting Victim

For the second week in a row, Isosco County has registered an accident involving a bow and arrow deer hunter.

Francis S. Terrill, 32, of Flint was treated at Tawas Hospital for an arrow wound in the right leg, half-way between the ankle and knee.

Investigating police officers said that the Flint man was shot by Stewart J. Salters, 30, of New Haven.

Salters told officers he was stalking a deer and, as he stepped out on a fire trail in Section 2 of Wilber Township, he saw a hunter standing along the trail. He failed to see the second hunter, however.

Salters saw what he thought was a deer and let fly with an arrow. The "deer" turned out to be Terrill, who was evidently bent forward in a crouch as he crossed the trail.

Terrill sustained a deep wound in the leg but there were no broken bones.

Sleepy Motorist Rams Police Car

A 63-year-old Pontiac man was ticketed for reckless driving Saturday night after he crashed into a Michigan State Police patrol car parked at the intersection of M-171 and US-23 in Oscoda.

Nicholas Droschine apparently fell asleep and crashed into a car from the East Tawas post which straddled an "island" in the roadway. Officers had signaled the driver to stop and the patrol car's red revolving blinker was operating.

The officers, Troopers James Ever and Carol Harger, were stationed in Oscoda as a blockade point in the area-wide net for two men who had robbed an Atlanta bank Saturday noon.

Ever, who was inside the car, was not injured. Damage to the patrol car was estimated at \$400.

Droschine and two passengers were returning home from a Canadian trip. Officers said that Droschine had been behind the wheel for about 16 hours.

Siegrists Named Isosco 'Farm Family'

The Adolph Siegrist family has been selected as "cooperator of the year" by the Isosco Farm Bureau. Presentation of a certificate to the Siegrists was made last Friday by Lawrence Trevethan, county Farm Bureau president.

This was the first time that such an award was made in Isosco County. Some 274 farm families were eligible and a point system was used to make the final selection.

Activities of the family in Farm Bureau affairs was considered in the selection.

Mr. Siegrist and his wife, Blanche, own and operate an 80-acre farm on Prescott Road, 4 1/2 miles west of Whittemore. They have two children, a son, Larry, seven years old, and daughter, Kay Ann, 10 years old.

Mrs. Siegrist teaches the fifth grade at Whittemore-Prescott Area Schools.

A native of Isosco County, Mr. Siegrist's farm is located adjacent to the 80-acre farm owned by his parents, one of Isosco's pioneer farm families. His father died some years ago and he farms his mother's 80 acres, which gives him 160 acres in production.

Mr. Siegrist specializes in raising beef cattle and owns a mixed herd of 60 feeder cattle. He raises all the grains necessary for his feeders and a substantial amount of acreage is devoted to pasture.

The Siegrists have been active in the Isosco County Farm Bureau organization for several years and are members of the "Wee Farmers" group of Burleigh Township.

They attended the state con-

vention held last fall at Michigan State University, East Lansing, and the national convention held in Chicago last December. The Siegrists have also taken an active part in the Isosco Agricultural Society, sponsor of the annual Isosco County Fair at Hale. They attend the Maple Ridge Presbyterian Church.

The Siegrists are now eligible to become "district farm family," competing with winners in a nine-county area. Winner of this contest will enter state competition and the Michigan winner will receive an all-expense-paid trip to the national convention to be held at Denver, Colorado.

Participating merchants are also holding a Hallowe'en party of fall bargains. Show in Tawas City and get big extra savings during this fall spectacular.

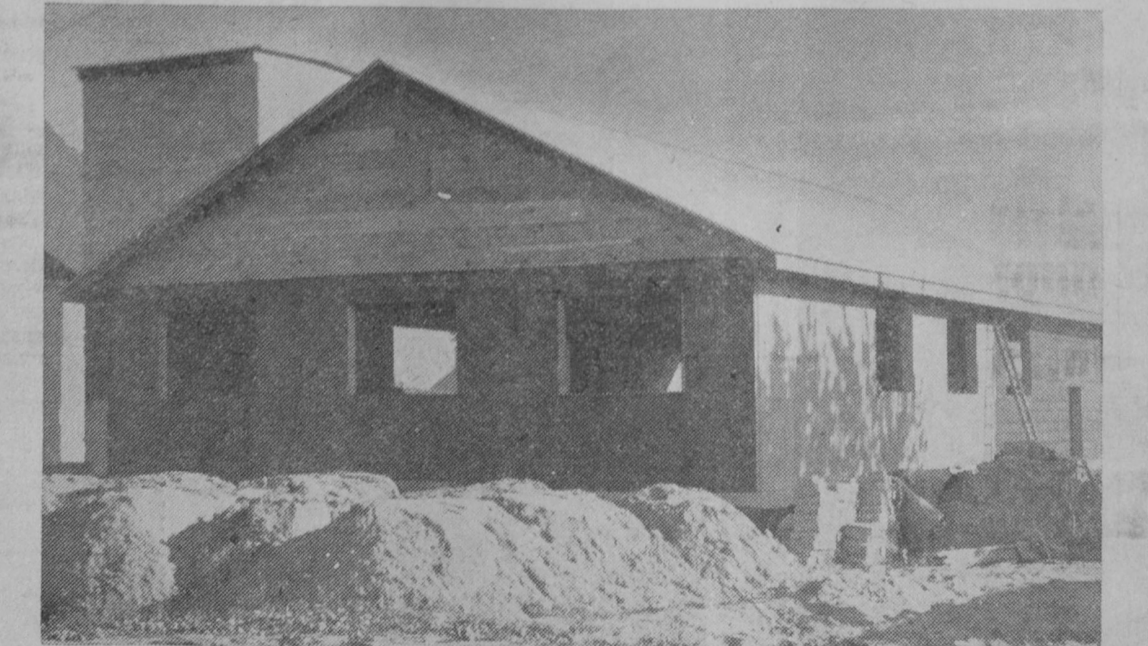

Nuclear 'Birds' Now Under Construction for Air Base

Production of B-52H nuclear bombers for Wurtsmith Air Force Base is under way at the Boeing Airplane Company's plant at Wichita, Kansas.

Company officials said the first of the huge ships, which will become the Strategic Air Command's main striking punch should war break out, will not be completed until late this year or early next year.

The 379th Bomb Group at Wurtsmith will be one of the first SAC units in the nation to receive the sleek, modernized craft, which can wreak havoc on enemy forces in the event of conflict.

A spokesman for Boeing said it takes from three to six months after modern bombers are assembled before the craft make their first flights.

The B-52Hs must go through electronics, preflight, change in position, camouflage and other

steps before they will leave the bomber to carry out its mission.

The bombers also carry electronic counter-measures equipment, enabling crewmen to offer passive or active resistance should the bomber be detected by enemy radar on the ground or in the air.

Although the B-52H will have the same outward appearance of the B-52G, other major changes have been made.

Authorization for Boeing to go ahead with production of the B-52H model was given in September.

The 379th Bomb Group at Wurtsmith is part of the 4026th Strategic Wing of the 40th Air Division of SAC. The 40th has division headquarters at Wurtsmith under the command of Brig. Gen. Harold E. Humfeld.

Giant KC-135 refueling aircraft (similar to commercial 707 jet passenger planes) are now in use at Wurtsmith.

Old Gooney Fading Fast After 25 Years Service

What's happened to the Gooney Bird? The DC-3-C-47 or "Gooney," as it is known, is slowly disappearing. But in an age when every aviation record has been shattered this aerial slow-poke has become a romantic symbol of military-civil aviation.

Equipped with two radial engines, the original DC-3 was introduced in 1936. It was the first passenger ship equipped with auto pilot and heated cabin.

Resembling a gigantic bird-like migration, some 1,200 C-47s once flew four abreast in a column 200 miles long. The occasion was 1943 when allied forces invaded Europe. Gooneys towed gliders

and parachutists to newly taken beachheads. Dubbed "Sky Train" for such ventures, the title never stuck.

More than 10,000 Gooneys had been built when production was stopped in 1946 but parts are still being supplied world-wide. When SAC was created that same year, it had 106 C-47s.

The Berlin airlift started in June 1948 and the ever faithful C-47 formed a lifeline from airbases in Western Germany to Berlin. Two years later, the Gooney was pressed into Korean service, transporting men and equipment.

It was the first plane to land at both the North and South Poles and is still in use today throughout the air force and on many of the nation's commercial airlines.

In mid-September of this year SAC still had 148 C-47s flying regular runs. As an American aerial workhorse for 25 years its familiar chug is fading—but will not be forgotten. (SAC PS).

Gen. Nathan Twining Retires After 43 Years of Service

AFNS—Gen. Nathan F. Twining, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, concluded nearly 43 years of active service September 30 at ceremonies at Bolling AFB, Washington, D. C.

Twining, 62, first donned uniform in 1916 as a member of the Oregon National Guard. Soon after, he entered West Point and became an infantry lieutenant November 1, 1918.

He won his wings in 1924 and began a series of assignments in the United States and Hawaii as a flying instructor and mem-

ber of tactical units. As with most peace-time officers, rank at first came slowly. He was in grade as a first lieutenant 15 years before he was promoted to captain in 1935.

He became a colonel in February 1942, a brigadier general five months later. He has been a four-star general since 1950.

In 1943, he commanded the 13th Air Force in the South Pacific. Later that year, he moved to Italy as commander of the 15th Air Force, eventually taking command of the Mediterranean Allied Strategic Air Forces in January 1944.

After the war, he returned to the South Pacific to command the 20th Air Force.

General Twining became air force vice chief of staff in 1950, and chief of staff June 30, 1953. On August 16, 1957, he became the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

AWARDED FOR OUTSTANDING WORK IN CHILD WELFARE

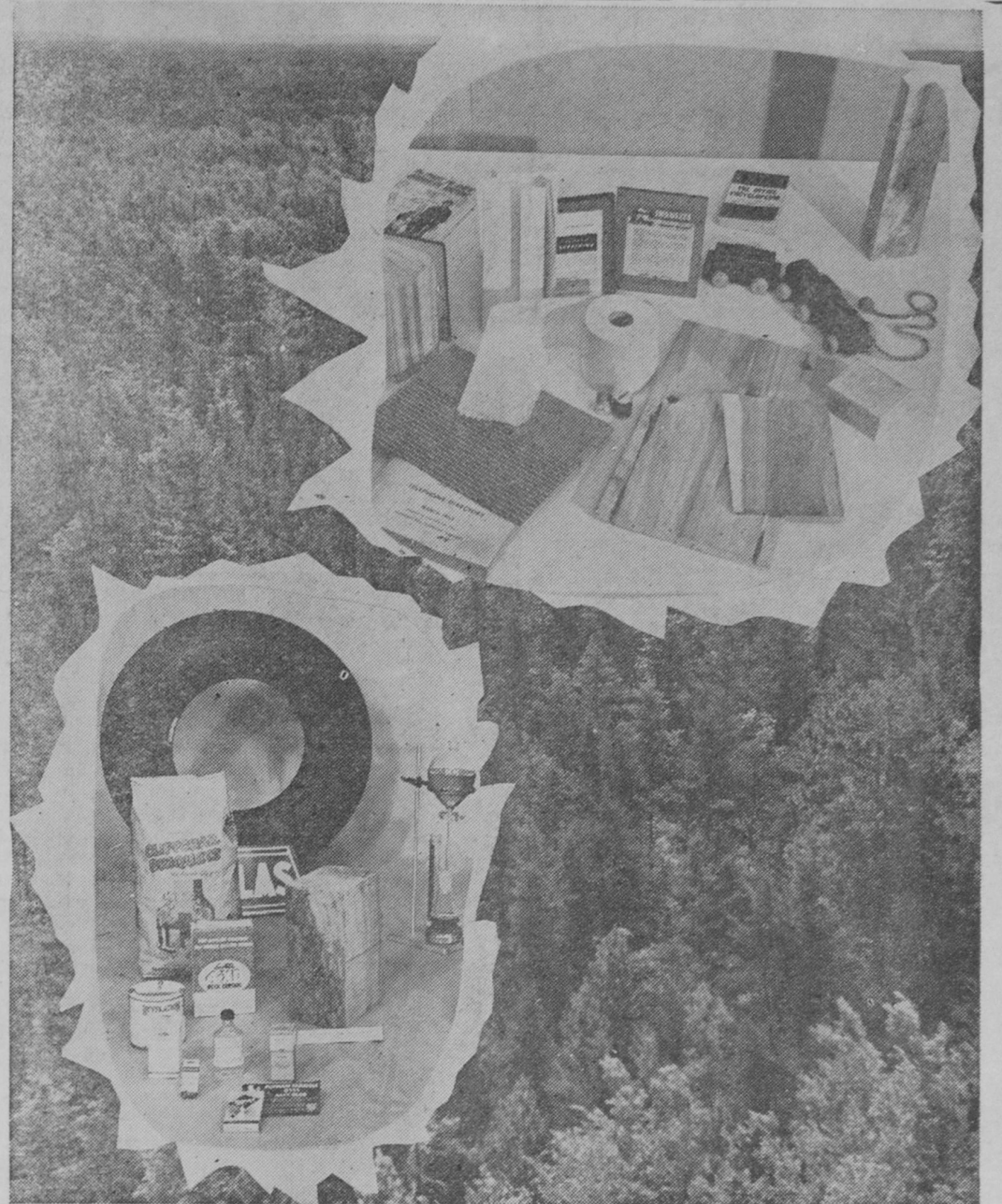

The drive, according to Lieutenant Wissman, is being undertaken as a community project and is the first step toward establishing a blood bank that will provide the residents of this county with a reserve to draw on in case of emergency.

The mobile unit being used in the drive will be at the Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas, on Thursday, October 20. On Friday, October 21, it will be at the Wurtsmith Service Club and will be open from 9:00 a. m. to 3:00 p. m. to receive residents of Oscoda-AuSable and Wurtsmith, who wish to donate blood.

The Officers' Wives Club and NCO Wives Club and residents of Oscoda will furnish volunteer help while the mobile unit is in the area. Light refreshments will be served to all blood donors.

Col. John H. Kunkel, 4026th Strategic Wing commander, has announced that military personnel who donate blood will be given time off after donating. The goal for the base has been set at 200 pints. No flying personnel will be permitted to give blood.

'Skybolt' is Most Mobile Weapon System

AFNS—What could be a more mobile strategic weapon system—more maneuverable and fast-moving—than a strategic bomber armed with long-range ballistic missiles?

The GAM-87A Skybolt, the air force's air-launched ballistic missile will provide this capability. The Skybolt ALBM will be a two-stage solid propellant missile capable of hypersonic speeds and ranges of 1,000 miles. Tests of prototypes of this weapon have already proved that it can be launched from aircraft of both subsonic and supersonic speeds. It is programmed to enter the force in 1964.

"Weapons such as the Skybolt," says Gen. Thomas D. White, air force chief of staff, "would give our bomber force an added punch and would, in fact, provide our country with the most mobile striking force ever achieved."

At present, the air-breathing Hound Dog GAM-77 air-to-surface missile with a range of 500 miles is mounted in pairs in a number of SAC B-52G heavy bombers to provide great versatility in striking military targets.

To the Voters of Iosco County

The Board of Supervisors has placed a proposal on the November ballot that the taxpayers of Iosco County give one mill of local property taxes for the building of bridges on our road system. This follows a recommendation made by the Road Commission. On numerous occasions this Commission has presented to the Board of Supervisors the needs of our roads and it now welcomes this opportunity to present the facts to the voters, who themselves must make the final decision on an adequate road system in our county.

The County road system consists of some 822 miles of primary and local roads with 34 bridges over 20 feet in length on the rural roads. It takes a department of 38 people with between 30 and 35 pieces of heavy equipment, trucks, graders, power shovels and similar equipment to take care of this system. Our budget exceeds \$400,000 per year and is financed almost entirely from the car license and gasoline taxes, which are returned from the State.

In the past the Road Commission has spent approximately 50% of its total income on the construction of primary and local roads in this county. According to published records, our county in 1958 had the highest record for percentage of income spent for new road construction of any county in the State. In spite of this, it has been impossible to keep pace with the needs for new roads—and especially bridges—which are among the most expensive parts of the road system.

Of the 34 bridges on our rural road system only two have been found to be up to present road standards.

Many were built more than 40 years ago and are totally inadequate and even dangerous for present-day traffic. The River Road bridge in Oscoda, the one most needing replacement, has been closed to all traffic other than passenger cars and empty pick-ups; the Whittemore Road bridge over the AuGres River is dangerously narrow and the approach down a steep hill multiplies the danger to present traffic. The Rollway Road bridge at the bottom of the Thompson Farm hill is a wooded structure 12½ feet wide—dangerous and inadequate by every standard of present-day roads. These are only examples. In a later report we will try to present estimated costs on these and a number of other badly needed structures.

These bridges are of the utmost importance to every part of our county. School buses, milk trucks, industrial and commercial carriers are all placing increasingly heavy burdens on all our roads, and Iosco County's principal industry—resort business—also relies heavily on an adequate road system. The proposal made by the Board of Supervisors, if adopted, will be a big step forward in providing for these traffic needs.

It is not for your Road Commission to determine how far nor how fast your road modernization program should be carried out. We are grateful that the Board of Supervisors has had the confidence in us to offer to the voters at large our recommendation that additional funds be provided to move faster. We promise to the people of this county that whatever funds they commit to our custody, we shall spend carefully and prudently for the best and most effective road system that this money can buy.

Will Introduce Distance Dialing In Area Soon

SSgt Smyth to Organize Local Hams

SSgt Rothwell C. Smyth of Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda, has been selected to set up an organization of Iosco County amateur radio operators prepared to furnish emergency communications in time of disaster.

Smyth's assignment, which carries the title of emergency coordinator, is to band together the local ham radio operators into a closely knit group that will provide this area with an emergency communications system.

His appointment was made by F. E. Handy, communications manager of the American Radio Relay League, national association of radio amateurs.

The sergeant has been assigned to Wurtsmith for 3 1/2 years and has been a ham radio operator for the past 23 years.

Would Limit Driver Training to Secondary Schools

Responsibility for teaching driver education to young drivers should be limited to Michigan's secondary schools, insists the Michigan Driver and Safety Education Association, a state organization of high school driver education teachers. At the same time, requirements for teacher certification in driver education should be substantially raised, the teachers say.

A recent opinion of the attorney general states that present law permits private driving schools to offer a course qualifying those under 18 years of age to apply for a driver's license.

The present high school driver education course, as determined by the department of public instruction, calls for a minimum of 30 hours of classroom instruction and six hours behind-the-wheel training.

"The teachers believe that the quality of this minimum training must be improved by raising certification requirements and that private driving schools operated on a fee basis cannot do the job," states Richard Stock, director of driving education at Tawas Area School.

The MDSEA, at its meeting two weeks ago, passed two resolutions defining the teachers' stand. Mr. Stock attended the meeting.

The first calls for an amendment to the present driver education law which would limit driver education certifying courses for those under 18 years to the secondary schools of the state.

The second resolution is a recommendation to the department of public instruction calling for an annual increase in teacher certification requirements for driver education.

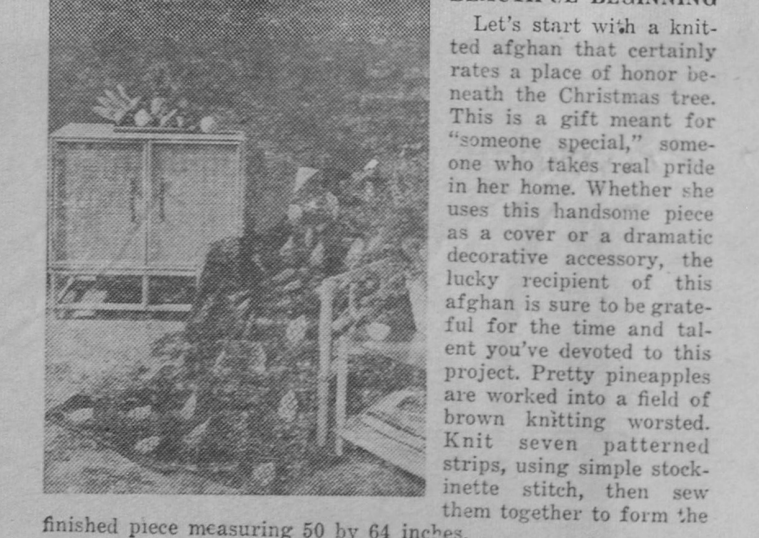

New Farm Loan Regulations Now in Effect

Farmers who have regular off-farm employment, if otherwise eligible, may obtain farm operating and development loans from the Farmers Home Administration under the recently revised regulations of the agency.

Lowell F. Schaeffer, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor for Arenac, Bay and Iosco Counties, said the new regulation was made effective October 1. Previously, except in rural development counties, a farmer had to spend most of his time farming in order to qualify for a loan.

Experience gained in rural development counties has shown that many farmers who are regularly employed off the farm can profitably use the Farmers Home Administration's credit facilities to increase the farm portions of their total incomes. The regulation, which had limited credit assistance to farmers who spend most of their time farming, prevented some from obtaining the maximum income from their farms and from taking advantage of opportunities for industrial and other off-farm employment.

Other eligibility requirements remain unchanged.

The Farmers Home Administration office serving Arenac, Bay and Iosco Counties is located at 216 North Main Street, Standish. The agency also supplies credit for farm housing and soil and water conservation.

Lixey broke the ice shortly after the half started when he rammed 12 yards around end for the TD. His second score came on a 28-yard spring around end.

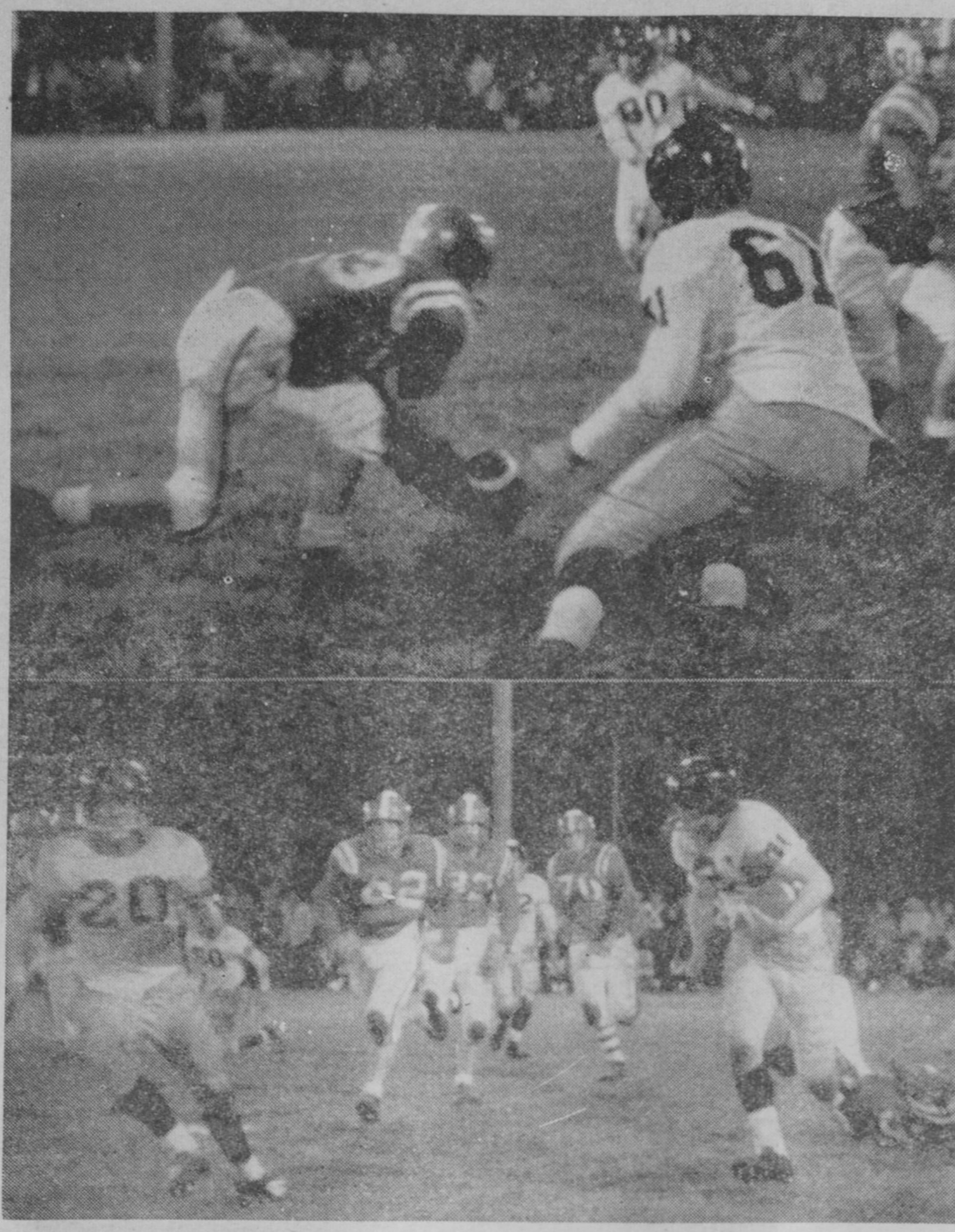

Tawas Braves Downed by Hard Charging Panthers

Tawas Area was no match Friday night for Standish-Sterling Central's hard-running halfbacks, Roger LaClair and Dan Kiomento, and their hard-blocking teammates as the Arenac County team dealt the Braves their fourth straight loss, 19-6.

The Braves, a team which looked good two weeks in a row in spite of losing, definitely were not "up" for this clash. Gone was the "let's stop West Branch spirit" of two weeks ago and, without it, the Braves were beaten rather soundly, although the final score would not indicate it.

Both teams suffered from a bad case of "fumbleitis," one by Tawas coming at a crucial point in the second quarter when the field was open for a TD which could have broken the game open.

The Panthers had their bad breaks, too, the most severe being a beautiful 45-yard TD run by Kiomento in the second quarter which was nullified by a holding penalty.

The game was a particularly bruising one for the Braves, as Standish - Sterling apparently snapped out of its early season doldrums and showed excellent blocking and tackling.

As a result of this bruising

play, Coach Herb Escott's sparse squad may have lost the services of several key players for this Friday night's homecoming game against Houghton Lake.

One TA player who is definitely out for the remainder of the season is junior halfback, Herman Rollin, who has been an offensive standout this season. He sustained an injured shoulder.

The game got off to a rather bad start when, after gaining two first downs, Standish-Sterling fumbled on the Tawas 28 and the Braves recovered.

This first break was short-lived for Tawas, however, as the Braves fumbled on the second play from scrimmage and the Panthers had the ball on the Tawas 25.

After an incomplete pass, LaClair and Koelsch teamed up to move the ball to the 13-yard line and a first down in three plays.

This was all S-S Quarterback Tom Schaeffer needed as he passed to Tom LaClair in the end zone for the first TD of the game. LaClair's leaping catch was a beauty and, after brother Roger dived over the goal line for the PAT the Panthers had a 7-0 lead.

Tawas could get nowhere after receiving and Collier's punt was blocked by the Panthers. After three plays, Tawas recovered a Panther fumble as the quarter ended.

Tawas started to move when Quarterback Don Humphrey hit End John Sass with a 26-yard pass on the 50-yard line. In two plays, Tawas had a first down. The next play found Fullback Ed Collier breaking through the S-S defense with clear sailing to the goal line. He slipped on the turf and the ball squirted out of his

hands, the Panthers recovering. No sooner had Standish-Sterling taken over the ball when a fumble gave possession back to Tawas.

The Braves were finally stalled on the 25 and the Panthers took over the ball.

In the next series of downs for Standish - Sterling, Kiomento's fine TD run was called back because of a penalty and the Panther drive stalled.

Tawas had the ball for one play and fumbled on the 21-yard line of the Panthers. This set up the winners' second touchdown of the night. LaClair picked up a first down to the S-S 32 and, in three pass plays, Schaeffer hit Kiomento with an aerial on the 21-yard line of Tawas and the speedster picked up good blocking and scored without a hand touching him. The PAT attempt was not good and the half ended with Standish-Sterling holding a 13-0 lead.

After a scoreless third quarter, Tackle Bud St. James intercepted a Panther pass and rambled 40 yards to Tawas Area's only touchdown of the night. The kick was blocked and the score read Standish - Sterling, 13; Tawas Area, 6.

What looked to be a good break for Tawas hopes was quickly smothered by Kiomento, who broke loose on a 45-yard touchdown jaunt only a few minutes later. The PAT attempt was no good.

Tawas had the ball for six plays and moved to the S-S 30, with Humphrey completing two out of four passes thrown. The last was intercepted by the Panthers and the game ended with winners' in possession of the ball.

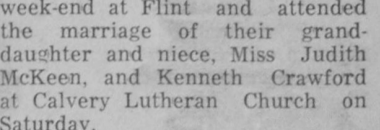

Tawas Point Property Purchase for State Park Almost Certain

According to a report from the Michigan Department of Conservation, purchase of federal prop-

erty on Tawas Point for a new state park is almost certain to be approved by the conservation commission at Higgins Lake Thursday.

The 1960 legislature appropriated specific funds for this purchase and negotiations with involved federal agencies for purchase of the park site have been under way for more than a year.

This property, totaling approximately 140 acres, was declared surplus by the federal government last year and it was turned over to the General Services Administration for disposal.

The United States Coast Guard, however, will continue its jurisdiction over certain portions of the federal reservation. Not included in the park site will be the Tawas Point lighthouse, the coast guard boat house, fog signal and coast guard station.

Because land has relicited (beach exposed) since original

surveys were taken, additional acreage has been added for the proposed park site. The area has one mile of sand beach on Lake Huron and 8,000 feet of frontage on Tawas Bay.

The conservation department's parks division in recommending the purchase for \$29,950, said this was half of the appraised value.

Working with the conservation department in promoting the site for a public park was a special committee appointed by the Iosco County Board of Supervisors.

(Continued from page 1.) applications is an October 14 deadline of applying for filled bottomlands. After this date, the department may add a 25 percent charge to the conveyance price of filled submerged lands.

The penalty, authorized by a 1958 amendment to the Submerged Lands Act, is optional and will not be exercised in 1960 due to the growing number of applications filing into the department's Lansing office. The department has already received 34 applications which must be processed for commission action in November.

The state supreme court's recent decision on the National Gypsum case is expected to bring in a large number of applications in the weeks ahead. The court's ruling strongly stamped the state's trust title to Great Lakes submerged lands and their waters as supreme to riparian rights. Some shore owners with filled bottomlands have withheld their applications pending results of the case.
