## Council Ponders Question of New House Trailer Ordinance

Regulation of house trailers again came up for discussion at Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council. As a result, the council's ordinance committee is to meet next Tuesday night with City Attorney Jerry Cotter to study sample house trailer ordinances.

Discussion on the long-debated subject was touched off when an application from George Neumann for building a four by 12 foot addition to his trailer was resubmitted by Supt. Reginald Bublitz.

This application was denied September 19, the council intending to force the removal of all trailers from the city. It was learned later that passage of an ordinance would have no effect on trailers already situated in the city.

As a result, the council reversed its stand on Neumann's application and instructed the city superintendent to approve construction.

As it stands at present, Tawas City has no provisions in its

building code to prevent house trailers from moving into the city. At the last count, only about five trailers were located here but some councilmen expressed concern over the possibility that many more might move in.


Cotter said that if a trailer problem exists, it may be a matter of zoning rather than further passage of ordinances. He said that he did not know of anything in the zoning ordinance which would prohibit trailers from moving in.

Mayor George Tuttle said that he had never heard of any complaints on trailers from residents in the city. Alderman Howard Hatton said that regardless of complaints, it was the job of the council to pass ordinances in anticipation of problems that might arise.

Trailers are now permitted through ordinance on a temporary basis. Cotter said that some trailers had been situated in the city for more than five years and this "goes beyond the realm of being temporary." Permits for trailers are renewable if owners comply with the sanitary provisions of the ordinance.

Alderman Earl Davis said that it was his opinion that trailers should be allowed in the city. He indicated that he would be in favor of prohibiting use in certain residential areas.

Also discussed was the possibility of limiting the length of time future trailers may be used as dwellings, particularly in cases where owners are using them for temporary residences during the time of construction of a permanent home.

## Supervisors Approved Budget of \$259,724

Largest county operating budget in the history of Iosco was adopted last week by the board of supervisors. Final budget for 1961 was set at \$259,724.

With anticipated fees of \$25,016 coming from services of the county offices, Iosco County will spread \$234,708 on the tax rolls.

Factors which had a part in the increased budget included Iosco's growing welfare load and salary increases to several county officers, which were announced last week.

Largest departmental increase came in social welfare and direct relief. Social welfare's budget was increased from \$15,000 to \$26,000. Direct welfare had an increase from \$10,000 to \$12,200.

During the October session of the board, which concluded Friday, it was necessary to appropriate an additional \$1,500 to direct relief and \$2,500 to social welfare because both departments were without funds under the 1960 budget.

Also coming under the welfare heading, which helped to increase the budget, was a \$3,400 appropriation to medicare, a new joint state-county program which allows for hospitalization for persons over 65 years of age.

In other business, as the board concluded its five-day session, John Henry was reappointed to the county welfare board.

The November meeting of the board of supervisors has been canceled because of deer season. Next meeting will be held December 14.

Although not reported out of committee by the end of the session, the board is expected to take action on a proposed foster care home which was suggested by Probate Judge H. Read Smith.

Judge Smith said that the county was without facilities for handling wayward juveniles and wards of the court. He said that in the past, such children were housed in the county jail, but he pointed out that this was illegal

as well as being unjust to the sheriff's department.

The probate judge said that plans are being studied to house such youngsters in a private home at East Tawas. He asked the board to approve \$600 a year for this purpose. The county also receives approximately \$750 every two years from the state for such purposes.

## East Tawas DPW Men Get Five Cent Pay Hike

A five-cent-an-hour general wage increase was granted to city workers at a meeting of the East Tawas Council Monday night. The council accepted recommendations of its salary and wage committee, which had studied pay scales in surrounding communities.

The wage hike affects eight or nine employees of the city. Laborers, who had received \$1.60 an hour, now receive \$1.65. Truck drivers and other workers with special skills receive up to \$1.95 an hour.

The council approved a road building program for about nine blocks of city streets. Construction is located in the First and Third Wards and streets intersecting Washington will receive a layer of crushed stone in preparation for asphalt paving next summer.

Building permits approved included two for new dwellings. Peter Bernhardt received permission to construct a new residence on Newman Street, while James

Daley was allowed to construct a new home in Bennington Subdivision.

Application for repairs and improvements were approved for Margaret Russ, Darrell Upson, Carrie Swales, Russell Meyers, Clara Bolen, Charles Schreck, Ralph Lixey, Charles Fairfield and Della ReBarge.

## Lift Last Nets of 1960 for Whitefish; Season Showed Some Improvement

With the removal of several completed the 1960 season for nets over the week-end and more to be pulled this week, weather permitting, Tawas fishermen have

"peak" years of 1946-47, the past season ended on an encouraging note for local fishermen.

For the past 12 years, whitefish have disappeared nearly completely from this shore of Lake Huron. Faced with empty nets and a costly operation, most fishermen stored their huge traps to await better days. Some tried their luck elsewhere—others bided their time here with seasonal runs of smelt and perch, operating on a part time basis.

This past season was a little different story—the whitefish have made somewhat of a return and a hungry market has made fishing profitable, although most fishermen continue to operate on a part time basis.

Four boats have operated out of the Tawas River mouth during the past summer. A combination of four partners in one boat, James and Richard Frank, Clarence Greenwood and Edward "Bud" Trudell, netted about three tons of fish.

The Frank brothers, who own the boat with Greenwood, had the misfortune of losing all of their nets by fire last winter. Because of the high cost of twine, the nets could not be replaced.

Trudell, whose family has fished on Saginaw Bay and Lake Huron for nearly 100 years, operating first out of Bay City and later at Tawas City, came to the rescue.

He quit operations here 12 years ago and stored his nets. When the fishing picture looked

better this year, the four men went into business together.

All of the men have retained their regular work and lifted nets twice a week. Trudell operates a road oiling business in Highland Park.

Others operating out of the river mouth on a larger scale have been Theodore "Ted" Trudell (brother of Edward), Edward Coyle and Ernest Brown.

Brown, whose family has based its operations south of the county line for many years, had an ice

machine and fish brought to Tawas City were packed at Browns for shipment to New York. Some of the fish were sold on the local market.

Brown said Tuesday that 22,000 pounds of whitefish were iced and packed during the past summer, which reflects a fairly accurate representation of the catch by all Tawas fishermen during the season.

In former years, the coming of fall would hail the start of the herring run, but this fish has completely disappeared. Jacob Webber, the only gill net fisherman operating out of Tawas City, said that a few pickerel had been netted during the summer. This fish was bountiful in Saginaw Bay many years ago, but, like the lake trout, whitefish and herring, have long since disappeared.

Most of the fishermen pulled their nets Saturday and Sunday (See FISHING, page 10.)

Originally, the couple intended to fly to Hillman in Montmorency County to visit friends, he said, but were not expected by anyone there.

The Scouts were reported missing late Sunday when relatives became alarmed when they did not return from their trip.

CAP officers said they had not filed a flight plan.

Last concert by the chorus was held during Christmas of 1959. The group is now negotiating for a new director to replace Richard Ferguson, who resigned.



### 16 Congregations Represented at Lutheran Luncheon

A luncheon was held at Grace Lutheran Church, East Tawas, October 11 to explain the needs, benefits and services of the newly-formed organization called Lutheran Social Services of Michigan. Sixty-three women representing 16 Lutheran congregations from East Tawas, Oscoda, Alpena, Rogers City and surrounding areas were present at the meeting.

The Rev. Harry Wolf, the executive director of the Lutheran charities group, told the women, who are now part of an auxiliary, about the work of the new organization. He said that Lutheran charity services are not new, but that this is one of the unique states in the union where seven Lutheran Synods, in fact all Lutheran bodies with the exception of the Missouri and Wisconsin Synods, have joined to form one large organization to serve Lower Michigan. He told the women through a series of charts that his 50 staff workers will be out serving all parts of the state in services to the aged, children and family counseling, refugees and other parish services. The non-profit organization is financed by voluntary gifts from members of the Lutheran faith, friends and the United Fund in some areas. He said the main office, Luther Haven (home for older persons), book store and audio-visual departments are located at 484 East Grand Boulevard, Detroit. Pastor Wolf said that although 76 percent of the population of the state is in the Detroit, Saginaw and Muskegon areas, the rest of the state will be served by full time social workers.

Miss Mary Wagner, a graduate

of Central Michigan University, will be a case worker in the East Tawas area. She told the ladies of the boarding care plan which they have for babies and children from broken homes. She astounded the group of women when she told them that couples applying for adoption normally receive children in about nine months to a year. She said that it was the wish of Lutheran Social Services to help make happy families and in most cases they like to have at least two children or more placed in a home. It was their purpose not to see how many homes they could place babies in, but rather how many good homes they could find for the children which they have to place.

Miss Minnie TerRonde, also with the child welfare and family services department, explained the plan for un-wed mothers. She said the girls are given proper counsel in their time of need and also for many months afterward in order that they make the proper emotional adjustments in keeping their babies or placing them for adoption. She stressed that proper care was necessary both for mothers and for adoptive parents and urged anyone in need of these services to go through agencies rather than handle these matters privately. She asked the ladies for baby items which are given to mothers in need.

The Rev. M. C. Hagedorn, director of chaplains, spoke about the machinery to insure that every Lutheran confined to an institution anywhere in Michigan would have a visit by a Lutheran chaplain. He talked about the need for men's socks, razor blades, used razors and many other items. Chaplain Hagedorn told about a unique project originated by his department called the sunshine bag project. It consists of ladies throughout Michigan sewing thousands of small draw string bags in which are placed combs, soap, treats and many other items and given to people in institutions. He said, "I've seen grown men stand with tears in their eyes when there are not enough of these bags to go around. You cannot imagine the joy when an older person tells you that this is the first Christmas present they have received in five years." He encouraged the local women to sew these bags, obtain identical items from Lutheran Social Services and then distribute them to old peoples' homes in the Tawas-Oscoda area at Christmas time.

Mrs. William Lindholm of East Tawas, the Alpena area representative, organized the meeting. The following committee chairmen served: Mrs. Harold Gould and Mrs. J. J. Austin, luncheon; Mrs. Wayne Vaughan, decorations; Mrs. Clair Nash, registration; Mrs. James Myers, house readiness; Mrs. Elmer Werth, Mrs. Ralph White and Mrs. Earl Hester, hostesses; Mrs. Charles Nash, organ music. Pastor William C. Lindholm gave the devotions and a sermonette, "The Women's Place in the Church."



These official production records were supervised by Michigan State University.





Tawas bounced back before the end of the half to score with Halfback Dick Zaharias slicing over from five yards out. This TD put the Braves back in the game, but the PAT was missed.


Tawas Area's drive started on its own 21 and much of the yardage between that point and paydirt was picked up on the shifty running of Zaharias. The TD play was set up by a 21-yard run by Halfback Jim Campbell and a pass from Quarterback Jim Mick to Campbell on the five.

### Businessmen Favor Sales Tax Hike Over Income Tax

Tawas City Businessmen's Association has gone on record as supporting the proposed amendment which will permit the state legislature to increase the sales tax by one percent.

Approval of the sales tax hike, which would be shared by everyone, including visitors and tourists, would bring an estimated 110 to 115 million dollars into the state's general fund. This is the fund that has been emptied so many times in recent months because there just is not enough tax money to do the job that has to be done.

Another fact that makes the proposed sales tax hike a bit easier to swallow is that each person pays it, a few cents at a time, while buying the consumer goods purchased daily, pointed out the businessmen. The alternative—a state income tax—would mean another deduction from paychecks.

"Michigan has a complete organization set up for levying and collecting the sales tax," spokesman for the businessmen stated. "The only change needed, if the proposal is approved, is to increase the levy from its present three percent to anything up to and including four percent."

"A state income tax, however, would require an entire new organization and all the money and manpower that goes along with setting up another governmental control agency."

### Charged With Carrying Concealed Weapons

An airman who was stopped by police for a defective muffler Thursday night in AuSable Township is being held at Iosco County Jail on charges of carrying concealed weapons.

Pleading guilty to the charge when arraigned in justice court was Larry E. Bullock. He was unable to furnish bond and awaits a hearing in circuit court.

Officers found a loaded revolver, a homemade "blackjack" and a knife under the front seat of the car.

### Great Deal of Planning Went Into Iosco Blood Bank

A Red Cross blood bank program in Iosco County is about to become a reality after a great deal of planning, dreaming and work.

An effort to establish a blood bank program was made several years ago, but insufficient funds and interest made it impossible.

The continued increase in numbers of patients served by Tawas Hospital has made the need for blood even more frequent. The hospital staff has reminded the community repeatedly of these increased demands and the advantages of being connected with a ready source of blood.

Most people do not realize the problems involved in securing blood when and as it is needed. Some of the facts are these: A local blood donor must be contacted, sometimes on the job, when a need arises. At various times, urgent calls via radio and police are issued, especially if one of the rarer blood types is needed. This kind of delay can be dangerous or fatal.

Hospital patients in their home community usually can locate a donor, keeping down the cost of blood transfusions. But, when folks are away, in a strange community and need blood, there is no hometown friend to serve one in need.

Buying blood from commercial storage can be very expensive. The Red Cross blood bank program assures residents of Iosco County that there will be blood available for them wherever they are, providing they notify the Iosco Red Cross Chapter of their need.

These are some of the reasons why the hospital has continued to ask the Iosco Red Cross Chapter to relieve the situation. Work toward the goal of a blood bank program was started in the fall of 1959, according to Judge Allan C. Miller, chapter chairman.

The Tawas Hospital Auxiliary has aided a great deal in the promotion of the program. The 1960 Red Cross fund-raising campaign goal was increased by \$1,700 (an estimated 10 cents per person) to make possible participation in the blood program.

This money covers the expense of administering the program such as processing the blood and its delivery to the hospital.

The local chapter has worked closely with the blood bank center in Lansing. It has secured the approval of Dr. Earl Hasty of the district health unit and all local doctors, along with the cooperation of the hospital which was assured from the beginning.

Among those who have contributed much in time and effort are members of the Red Cross Chapter, the blood bank committee chairmaned by Louis Awalt, the Tawas Hospital Auxiliary with Mrs. Richard Powers as president, Mrs. Frank Wilkuski, Mrs. Paul Sutton and others in the Gray Ladies and those who worked on the Red Cross Campaign Fund Drive which was chairmaned by Miss Leonora Hass.

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### East Tawas Boy Treated For Rabies

A 12-year-old East Tawas boy, Benjamin Schanbeck, who was bitten by a dog two weeks ago, is undergoing treatment for rabies. Iosco County Sheriff's Department, which investigated, said that this was the first rabid dog report in this county in several years.

The dog was struck by an automobile and the youth attempted to remove it from the street. The dog nipped him on the finger. Sheriff's officers disposed of the animal.

A report from the state police laboratory at Lansing indicated that the dog was rabid and treatment of the youth was commenced immediately.
