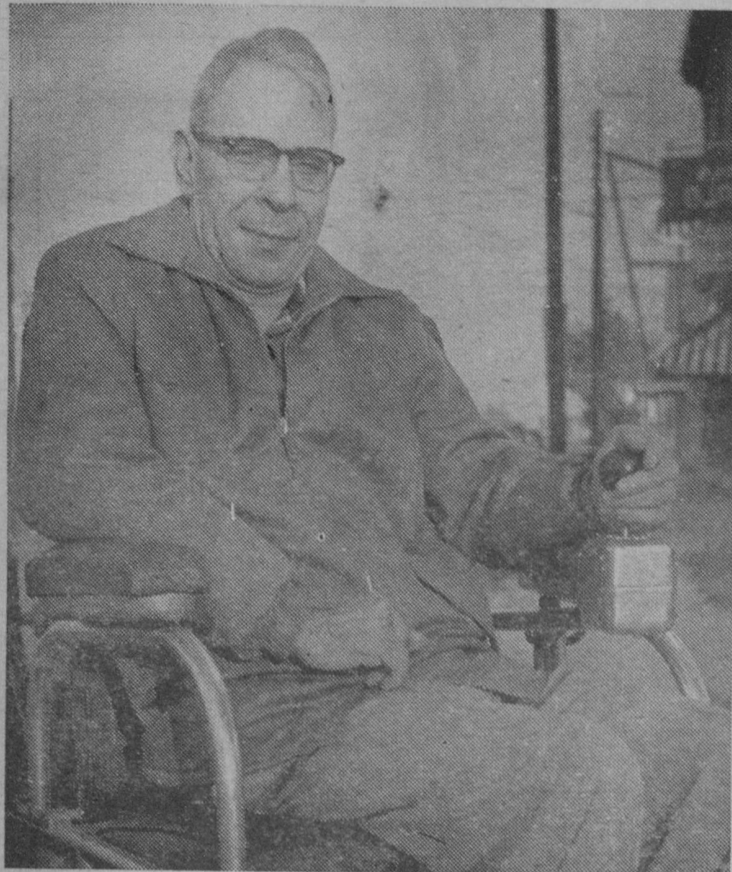

CHESTER DENSTEDT

Chester Denstedt-- Man of Courage

Chester Denstedt of Tawas City, who has been an invalid since August 1930, is a man of great faith and courage.

It took a great deal of both of these qualities to face life after an accident 30 years ago.

When 21 years of age, Denstedt sustained an injury which would affect his entire life. While riding a horse on a farm near Lupton, he was thrown and his neck was broken.

He has been nearly completely paralyzed since the accident and, only in recent years, has regained partial use of his hands.

To get along in life under this handicap has required a lot of fortitude on his part and much loving care on the part of his late parents and many friends.

Denstedt was born and raised on a farm near Hale and spent most of his life there. After the accident, he spent five months in the University of Michigan Hospital and later returned home where he was cared for by his mother until her death in 1950. His father passed away in 1952.

After living at the Lee Campbell home for a short time, he has lived with the Lloyd Johnsons and came with them to Tawas City two years ago.

Shortly after coming to Tawas City, a former school chum provided him with a gift which changed his entire way of life.

Cecil McGirr, a high school teacher at Scottsdale, Arizona, sent him an electrically operated wheel chair. The two men were classmates at Hale and McGirr has been a wonderful friend to Denstedt.

The new wheel chair has opened many new avenues of life to Denstedt. Instead of being cooped up inside the house, he can now travel around town and visit his friends.

The electric motor operating

the wheel chair is powered by two 12-volt batteries and one charge will allow about eight miles of travel.

He has been a "sidewalk superintendent" during construction of the new branch office of Peoples State Bank and is able to visit neighborhood stores to make purchases.

He even attended a baseball game last summer, steering his wheel chair "wide open" at five miles an hour down First Avenue to the ball park.

"I have made many wonderful friends and discovered many old friends while living in Tawas City," he said. "God has been wonderful to provide my every need."

'Spooks' of Any Age Eligible to Enter Contest

Spooks of all ages will be competing for "best costume" honors in the big Tawas City Merchants' Masquerade Party to be held Friday and Saturday of this week.

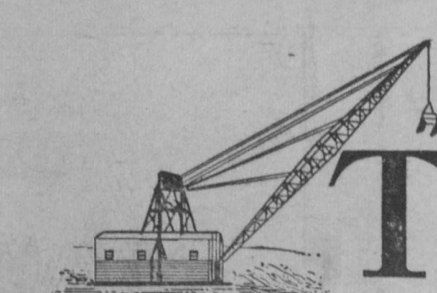

Blood Bank a Reality; Donors Give 292 Pints

Iosco County's long-planned Red Cross blood bank is now a reality. A total of 292 pints of blood were received during the first bloodmobile visit last week. At the two volunteer blood donor centers last Wednesday and Thursday, 125 pints of blood were received at Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas, and 167 pints of blood at the Wurtsmith Service Club, Oscoda.

The blood bank has been operative at Tawas Hospital since October 1. Two pints of blood have been used from the bank and seven pints were donated in the period of beginning. This means that a total of nine pints of blood were needed in approximately two weeks.

Red Cross personnel were pleased with the result of this initial visit of the bloodmobile, reports Margaret McDaniel, head nurse with the bloodmobile. The crew included eight nurses and the driver. A local physician was on hand at all times blood was being taken. Average waiting time per donor was from 35 to 40 minutes.

Louis Awalt, blood bank chairman, reports that a total of 89 hours were worked by volunteers in the Tawas center and 116 hours at Oscoda. There were many hours of pre-planning work,

however, and Mr. Awalt expresses his appreciation to all those who helped.

Iosco County residents are now eligible to receive blood wherever they may be. All that is required is that the Iosco Chapter of the American Red Cross be notified of this need.

Citizens Have Chance to See Tax \$\$ at Work

Tawas City residents will have an opportunity to inspect this community's new sewage disposal plant Saturday when an open house will be held at the new facilities from 1:00 to 6:00 p. m.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz urges everyone to visit this new \$120,000 installation. Major share of the cost of this project was financed by a general obligation bond issue approved by voters nearly two years ago.

The city also received a grant from the federal government to aid in its construction.

Bublitz said that the modern laboratory facilities would be of particular interest to visitors.

Flint Woman Who Took Her Child Released by Police

Charges against a Flint woman, who tried to take her child from the girl's foster parents' home last Tuesday, have been dropped. Iosco law enforcement officers decided Wednesday.

State police at East Tawas said that the case has been officially closed against Mrs. Madeline Aho, 27, who took her daughter, Colene, four years old, from the yard of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Daly in Hale.

Mrs. Aho, a cousin of Mrs. Dally; her mother, Mrs. Loella Wright, and sister, Mrs. Jacqueline Issa, both of Flint, were apprehended by Arenac County sheriff's officers in Standish 45 minutes after the child was taken.

Mrs. Aho, her mother and sister were released. Colene was returned to the Daly home.

The Dalys are in the process of adopting Colene, officers said. She is still a ward of the probate court in Iosco County.

Sewer Main Construction Lower in '60

Sewer and water main construction in Tawas City during 1960 is considerably lower than in recent previous years, according to a report at Monday night's meeting of the water board.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz said that approximately 900 feet of water mains and 350 feet of sewer mains were constructed during the past summer.

For the past six or seven years, Tawas City has averaged about 3,500 feet of mains per year. City crews are presently completing work in water mains in North Park Acres for this year.

Rose City-Hale Lions Clubs Met Monday

A combined meeting of the Hale and Rose City Lions Clubs was held Monday night at the Rose City Restaurant.

Each year, the district governor makes visitations to each of the area Lions Clubs and, in order to promote inter-club visitations, District Gov. C. Dale Bannon of Ludington requested that whenever possible two or more Lions Clubs meet together.

Bublitz Attending Two-Day School

Attending a two-day sewage treatment plant operator school at Higgins Lake starting Wednesday (today) is Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz of Tawas City.

Sponsored by the Michigan Department of Health, the school acquaints operators with proper methods of sewage treatment.

Harvey Gives Opinion on Tax Board Action

According to information from Prosecuting Attorney Paul Harvey, Iosco County's tax allocation board may have acted "irregularly" in granting supplemental requests for tax money after county school budgets were filed.

Harvey had acted on a request from Mayor Elmer Werth of East Tawas, who maintained that the allocation board was incorrect in granting the supplemental requests after the deadline for filing school budgets.

In a letter to Werth Tuesday, Harvey cited the following points from a recent opinion of the attorney general:

1. Local units must file budgets with the allocation board on or before the third Monday of April.

2. The county tax allocation board shall not consider any amendments to budgets subsequent to the final date permitted by law for submission of budgets.

3. The board shall not allocate the maximum tax rate to any local unit in excess of the amount necessary to meet the budget as submitted.

"From this, it appears that there was a rather definite irregularity in the current allocation board proceedings, inasmuch as the final order adopted covers amendments to budgets submitted after the deadline date," stated Harvey.

However, the prosecutor pointed out that any action should have been taken within 15 days from the final order of the tax allocation board.

Werth said that additional tax money granted to schools after the deadline amounted to \$80,000. "I realize that the position I am taking perhaps is not popular with schools or even with the board of supervisors," said Werth, "but the granting of additional tax money after the budget deadline is not in the best interests of the taxpayers."

Future Nurses Organize at Tawas Area School

Fifteen Tawas Area High School students interested in the nursing profession met Monday, October 24, to organize a Future Nurses Organization and to elect officers. Mrs. Ruth Hess is faculty director of the group.

Elected were Linda Teeple, president; Ellen Klingler, vice president; Sharon Sass, secretary; Mary Nagy, treasurer; Diane Beyer, publicity.

Plans were discussed for guest speakers from nursing schools, student nurses and doctors to address the group throughout the year. Group projects to help Tawas Hospital were also planned.

The organization will meet twice a month for the remainder of the school year.

Two Killed in Truck-Car Crash

Driver Faces Manslaughter

An airman and an Oscoda businessman were killed last Wednesday night when a taxicab and a truck collided head-on on M-171 near Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

Killed were Ellis Merle Barber, 41, owner of the Oscoda Cab Company and driver of the taxi, and Al C. William Agamey, 30, a passenger in the cab.

Robert R. Thompson of Davison, driver of the pickup truck, was injured in the crash.

A warrant was authorized Tuesday afternoon by Prosecuting Attorney Paul Harvey charging Thompson with manslaughter. He had been released from Tawas Hospital earlier in the day.

Oscoda Township officers and state police of the East Tawas post said Thompson's southbound truck crossed the center line and hit Barber's northbound taxi head-on.

Agamey was dead on arrival at Tawas Hospital and Barber died shortly after.

Funeral services for Barber were held Saturday at the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, Oscoda, with

Duck Hunter Drowns; Two Companions Reach Safety

A 20-year-old duck hunter was drowned and his two companions reached shore safely when their aluminum boat overturned on the Ausable River late Monday afternoon in the backwaters of Five Channels Dam.

Drowned in 35-40 feet of water was William Boyd, who lived with his wife, Mary, at the Five Channels resort owned by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Boyd.

The victim's body was recovered at 9:45 o'clock Tuesday morning at the point where the boat overturned. Police said Boyd was clad in heavy hunting clothing. He was wearing four shirts, several pairs of pants

and a heavy hunting coat. Police said that Boyd and his wife had been married only about a month.

Boyd and his two companions, Donald and Gary Cleland, 23 and 20 years of age, were hunting about one mile west of the dam.

Donald told investigating officers that a flight of ducks went overhead and the three stood up in the boat and fired their shotguns. The boat overturned, dumping all three into the water.

The trio held on to the boat until it floated to within 40 feet of shore. All started to swim toward safety as they thought the craft would sink. When Donald and Gary reached shore they heard Boyd shout for help and saw him disappear under the water.

The two men attempted to swim toward the victim, but the cold water forced them back to shore. They ran to their car and drove to Boyd's store where state

police at East Tawas were notified.

Two rescue boats were immediately dispatched to the scene. Among searchers who dragged the river until 11:00 p. m. were state police troopers, Iosco County Sheriff's Department deputies, Oscoda Township officers and members of the Oscoda-Ausable Township Fire Department.

Unable to locate the body of the victim Monday night, operations were discontinued and then resumed early Tuesday morning. Joining the search were two state police skin divers, Harry Paulsen of Bay City and Garth Meyers of Flint.

Consumers Power Company opened the gates on the dam and the backwaters were lowered about 11 feet during the night.

Leitz 'Declares War' on Beaver Dams

Faced with several flooded roads in Iosco County last week, Conservation Officer Arthur G. Leitz "declared war" on several colonies of beaver.

Leitz used explosives to blast four troublesome beaver dams on Pickett and Cooper Creeks in Western Iosco County and one dam on the Dead Ausable, south of Oscoda.

The latter dam had flooded Johnson Road and threatened to wash it out, said Leitz. The road had been covered with about four feet of water.

In addition to his trouble with beaver, Leitz had to use a live trap to catch four mink which had become nuisances near Hale. Leitz said that the mink were raiding a local bait dealer's minnow tanks for free meals.

Dems to Revive Torchlight Parade

Iosco Democrats, hoping to revive an old-time political campaign pitch, plan to hold a torchlight parade the night of Saturday, October 29, in various communities of the county.

Chairman Donald Watson of Tawas City announced that any persons wishing to join the procession are to contact Democratic headquarters in Oscoda, located across the street from the chamber of commerce office.

At a meeting of the county committee last Thursday night, Mrs. Florence Stewart reported that the recent "Dollars for Democrats" campaign was the most successful drive ever held in the county.

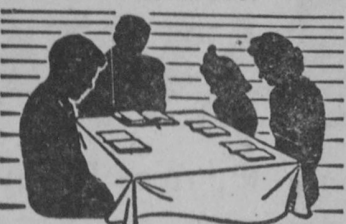

Col. Colley is New Provost Marshal

Lt. Col. Gordon T. Colley, a former OSI agent, arrived at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda, recently to assume the duties of base provost marshal. He replaced Capt. Joseph Bedard, who will work as base police officer until his retirement in June 1961.

The colonel, who calls Martha's Vineyard, Massachusetts, his hometown, comes to Wurtsmith from Hawaii, where he served as commander of the 44th OSI District.

The 19-year service veteran first entered the military service as an army lieutenant in February 1941 and spent one and a half years with the ground forces before entering flight training.

He received his wings at Turner Field, Georgia, in March 1943 and was assigned to a B-24 unit at Alamogordo, New Mexico, as an operations officer. He is still on flight status and holds a command pilot rating.

By November 1943, the colonel was in Italy as squadron commander for a B-24 unit. He remained with the squadron until September 1944, logging 21 combat missions. During this period, he was awarded the Silver Star and Air Medal with two oak leaf clusters.

From September 1944 until 1955, he served tours of duty at Langley Field, Virginia; as an aircraft maintenance officer; attended the command and staff college; was sent to Greenland (1947-48); was provost marshal at Mather AFB, California (1949-51), and from 1951-55, he was an agent with the OSI.

The colonel's first SAC assignment came in 1955 when he was assigned to Westover AFB, Massachusetts, as operations officer for an aerial refueling squadron. He remained at Westover until 1957 when he rejoined the OSI and was sent to Hawaii, to command the 44th OSI District.

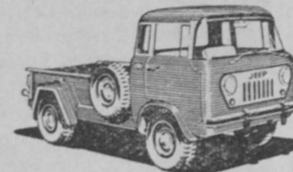

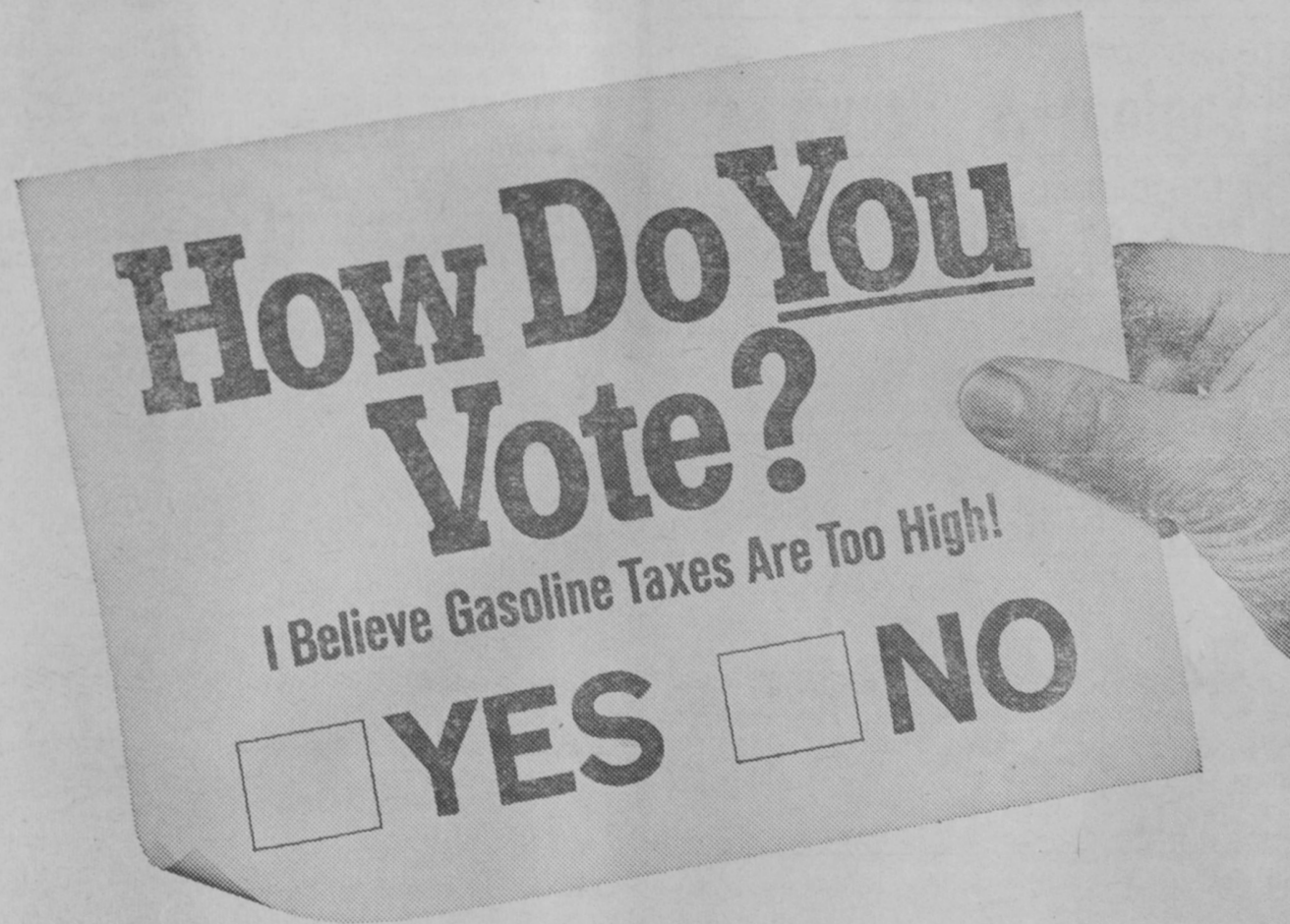

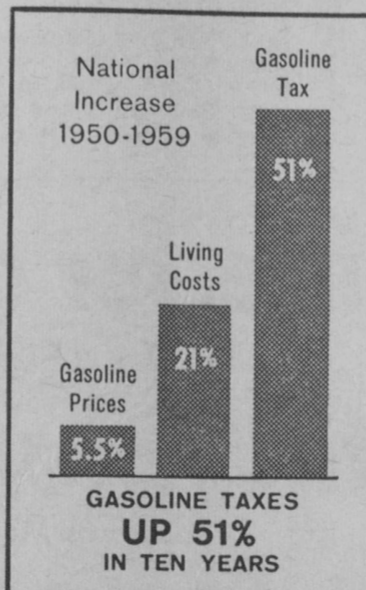

The Braves, looking far from impressive during the first half of last week's game against the Eagles, came to life in the second half and had things their own way for a change.

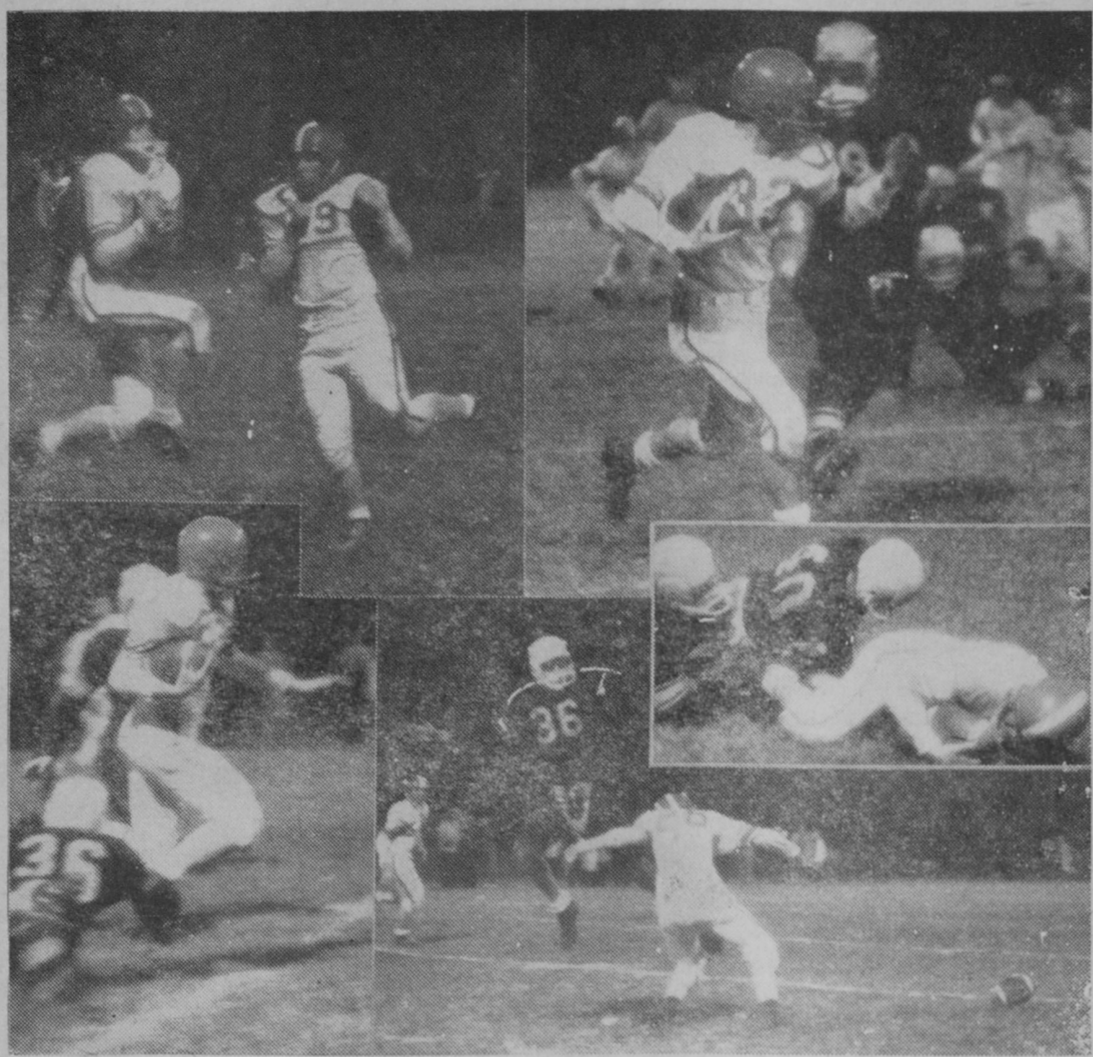

What is The Reformation?

Many men were associated with the Protestant Reformation — none, however, is more identified with this great movement than Martin Luther. Martin Luther was a Roman Catholic priest, overseer of 10 monasteries of the Augustinian order and the leading professor at Wittenberg University in Germany. Luther found through years of study that the church had gradually changed into something different than it was in the beginning. Luther's open "protest" came when other monks began to sell papers for the forgiveness of all sins in order to raise money for the church. On October 31, 1517, he called for a debate and reform movement within his church: This began the Reformation.

Ephesians 2:8-9.

THE RIGHT OF PRIVATE JUDGMENT: Every man is free in his own conscience to decide from the Bible what is right or wrong, and no organization may dictate to him what he shall believe or do; he is free to read any books, think any thoughts on the basis of his own conscience and will be judged by God.

THE COMPLETE SACRAMENT: Both the Body (bread) and the Blood (wine) are to be received in the Holy Communion.

SEPARATION OF CHURCH AND STATE: No church shall prescribe the social and political orders, but the reasoned judgments of all citizens shall elect officials who will genuinely serve the public good and guarantee the rights of differing religious views.

18 Organizations Voice Opposition to Amendment No. 3

Eighteen state-wide organizations, representing business, industrial, professional, governmental and agricultural segments of Michigan, have joined forces in opposing Proposal No. 3 which will be placed before voters November 8.

In a statement this week, the organization said that opposition to the so-called "con con" question was founded upon grave apprehension that the proposed changes in basic rules and procedures in the constitution would be a direct and continuing peril to orderly government.

The proposed reduction in the number of votes necessary to approve constitutional revision undermines existing safeguards against overly-frequent rewriting of the state's basic legal documents, it is charged by the group.

In addition, it is charged that less than a majority of voters may force constitutional revision which violates the American tradition of democratic principles. "Approval of at least a majority has always been required for vital governmental actions," the organizations stated.

"Relaxation of long-standing protection against easy revision of Michigan's Constitution would jeopardize years of judicial interpretations which would be a threat to all citizens reliant on a stable body of law in the conduct of business and personal affairs," the combined groups stated.

Among organizations opposing the con con proposal are County Road Association of Michigan, Farm Bureau, Good Roads Federation, Michigan Institute for Local Government, Justice of the Peace and Sheriff's Associations, Michigan Real Estate Association and others.
