Whittemore-Prescott is New NEM Conf. Member

Three new football coaches have moved into the 1960 picture in the sprawling Northeastern Michigan Conference, expanded to 10 teams this year with the addition of Whittemore-Prescott Area.

Gladwin, which shared the 1959 title with Roscommon and Standish-Sterling Central on 6-1 records, is rated the team to beat this fall on the strength of returning lettermen.

New coach at Roscommon is Rex Harkness, Albion College graduate, who succeeds Earl Haight, now concentrating on his principal's position. Herb Escott moves up to succeed Howard Adams as Tawas Area mentor, Adams joining the staff at Bay City Handy this fall, and Mike Sweeney moves up to the head coaching role at S.S. Central with Hank Minarik now coaching in the Flint area. Sweeney, a Central Michigan University graduate, is the son of the late "Doc" Sweeney, long active in Chippewa physical education.

Returning coaches include Gene Gilbert at Gladwin; Jerry Licott, now in his second year at West Branch; John Kurtz, who succeeded Del Munro at Arenac Eastern last fall; Tom Weede at Houghton Lake; Mel Skillman at Beaverton; Gary Baillargeon at Pinconning; and Sy Wojcicki from the new W-P entry.

Because of the sprawling geography of the conference and the fact each team plays only a total of eight games, league honors are decided on a round robin basis, each team playing seven conference games and one game outside the league.

Opening contests September 16 are a blend of league and non-league activity: Arenac Eastern at Standish-Sterling, Roscommon at Houghton Lake, Be-

averton at Beal City. Gladwin at Clare, Alcona at Tawas Area, West Branch at Whittemore, Cadillac at Pinconning.

Goulet Sets Sept. 27 for Examination of Two Flint Men

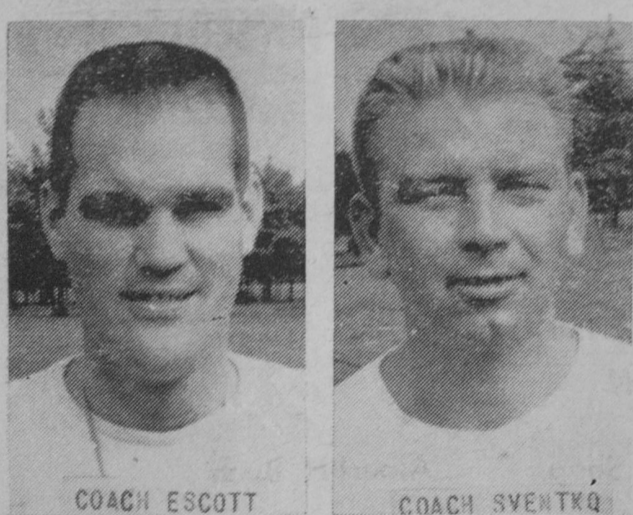
