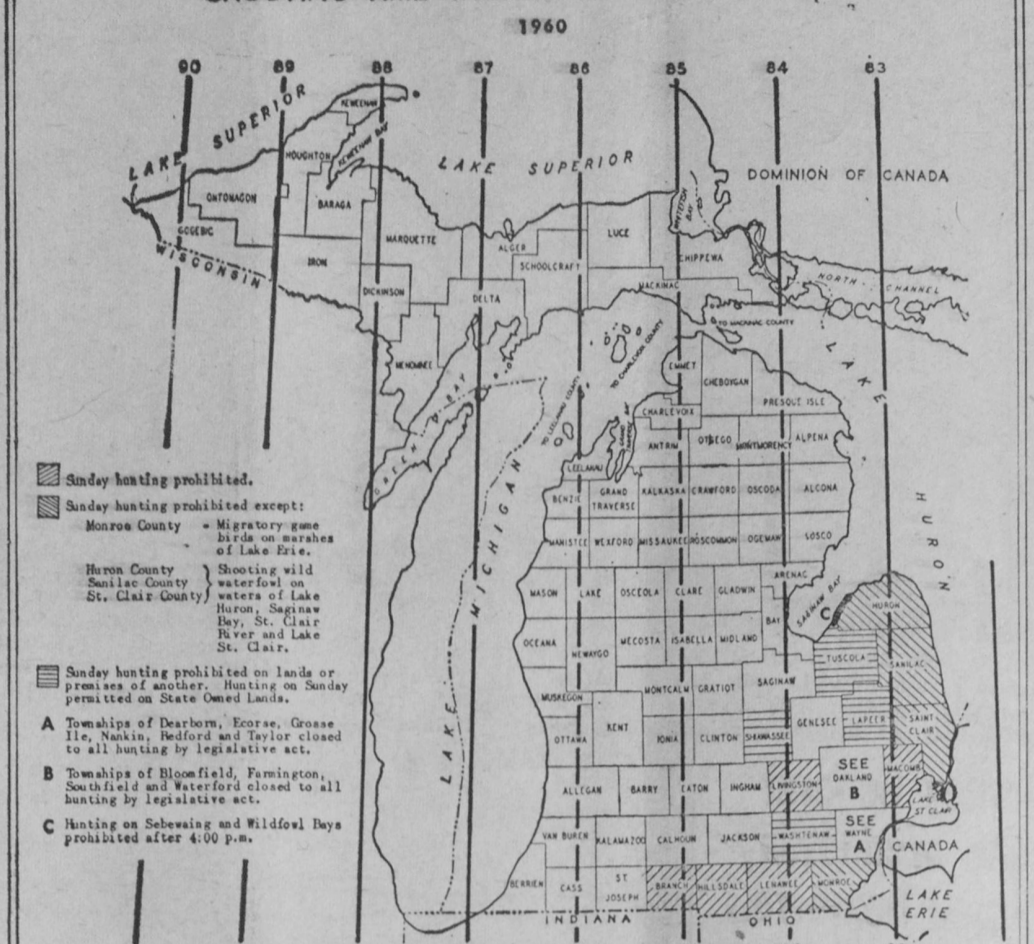

Central Michigan Will Televis Math Courses

Central Michigan University, Mt. Pleasant, will offer both graduate and undergraduate credit for two contemporary mathematics courses which will be televised this fall. The courses are being co-sponsored by the learning resources institute and the National Broadcasting Company. CMU coordinators are Dr. Lauren Woodby and Dr. Julia B. Adkins. The program is not limited to CMU's 38-county service area, but is state-wide. An advisory committee appointed by the conference board of the mathematical sciences is responsible for the course content. Of the two courses offered, one is concerned primarily with basic concepts and is open to selected juniors, seniors and graduate students. The other, for graduate students only, was especially designed for mathematics teachers. The main lectures in the undergraduate course from 6:30 to 7:00 a. m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday will be given by Dr. John L. Kelley, professor of mathematics at the University of California. The teacher education telecasts on Tuesday and Thursday will be by outstanding mathematics teachers now working in public schools. Application for enrollment may be made to Central Michigan University, Field Services, Mt. Pleasant.

SOCIAL SECURITY AGENT WILL BE HERE SEPT. 29

Householders, do you employ a maid, a baby sitter (either an adult or a teenager), a cook, handyman or other household help? Do you pay your help as much as \$50 in cash wages in a calendar quarter? As little as \$4 each week may amount to \$50 a quarter. If so, you are required to report these wages for social security tax purposes, Paul M. Ellifritz, district manager of the Bay City Social Security office, stated today. Let's take an example. Mrs. Brown employs Mary Smith to come in and clean the house two days each week and pays her \$3 each day. This easily amounts to \$50 a calendar quarter. Mrs. Brown should deduct three percent from Miss Smith's wages, add a like amount and every three months send it to the nearest district director of internal revenue with a report of the cash wages paid. Mr. Ellifritz explained that the Social Security Act states that the employer is responsible for reporting these wages for social security tax purposes if they total \$50 or more in a calendar quarter. A calendar quarter is any three-month period beginning January 1, April 1, July 1 or October 1 of each year. A penalty is required by law for failure to make a timely report when one is required, Mr. Ellifritz said. If you employ a household worker, contact your social security office or the local office of the Internal Revenue Service. They can inform you whether or not you should report the wages for social security tax purposes and give you the necessary report forms. A representative of the Social Security Administration will be in East Tawas at the Federal Building Thursday, September 29, at 10:30 a. m. It pays to read the ads.

IOSCO US SAVINGS BOND OWNERSHIP AT NEW HIGH

Iosco County residents were congratulated today for their part in swelling United States Savings Bond ownership to a new all-time high. John E. Hoshbach, volunteer Iosco County chairman for the bond program in Michigan, said that nationwide holdings of series E and H savings bonds stood at \$2.4 billion dollars as of August 31, according to official word sent to him from the treasury department in Washington. Of this total, Michigan residents own about \$2,411,160,000, and Mr. Hoshbach estimated Iosco County's share of the total at approximately \$2,049,485. Mr. Hoshbach said that one of every four Iosco County residents is a bond owner—the national average. He has been county bond chairman since January 1955.

Few people in Michigan have seen a native white cedar tree anywhere near as large as the one recently discovered on the bank of the Au Sable River near Mio by Packaging Corporation Woods Superintendent Ivan Owen of Mio. The giant measures twelve feet, nine and one-half inches in circumference at breast height, or 47.8 inches in diameter.

So far it appears to be the largest white cedar on the Michigan mainland. Inquiry by Packaging Corporation to the Big Tree Committee of the Michigan Botanical Society turned up the information that the Michigan record white cedar is located on South Manitow Island in Lake Michigan, measures 202 inches around or approximately 64 inches in diameter. No tree of size comparable to the Mio specimen was reported by the Society for the Michigan mainland.

Johnson and Owen (see photo) are employed in managing thousands of acres of Michigan woodlands for the company's pulp and paperboard mill at Filer City, Michigan. In their many years of woods experience they have never previously seen a white cedar approaching the Mio specimen in size.

The big cedar is twenty feet from the edge of a heavily fished stretch of the Au Sable, three miles downstream from Mio. Packaging Corporation of America Woodlands Department, Filer City, will welcome information on other large white cedar trees on the Michigan mainland.
