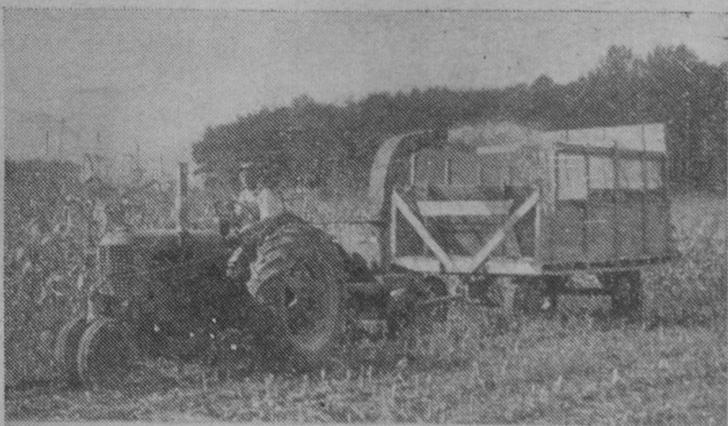

FARMERS OF IOSCO COUNTY are preparing for the long winter ahead and these two pictures, snapped Monday morning at the Britt farm in Burleigh Township, show a corn chopper in operation. In the bottom photo, Elmer Britt checks the growth of this year's corn crop with his two sons, Warren and Howard. The Britt's are busy filling two large silos with corn this week. They said it was a poor year for corn because of the wet spring, but were fortunate enough to have a good carry-over from last year. Otherwise, it was a good year for grains. The Britt's own 955 acres in southwestern Iosco County and farm some 300 acres. The senior member of the family said that farming today was a far cry from when he started back in 1905. The Britt farm is noted as one of the most modernly equipped in the area. They have a herd of 40 head of dairy cattle and 43 head of Hereford beef cattle. Before the advent of modern equipment, filling the silos required a large crew of men. Today, the job is performed by the two brothers. Haying has also been much improved with a new hay conditioner recently added at the farm.—Tawas Herald Photos.

City Receives Final Check on \$34,596 Sewer Grant

Final payment of \$3,460 on a \$34,596 federal grant to Tawas City for aid in construction of a new sewage treatment plant addition was made Monday.

The grant was received from the public health service, which has a program to aid in water pollution control. Final inspection of facilities was made June 29.

Total grant paid to the city was \$1,824 less than the original application. The difference between the two figures represented legal and administrative costs which were not allowed.

Tawas City Water Board authorized Supt. of Public Works Reginald Blubitz to make arrangements and set a date for public inspection of the new facilities. At its meeting Monday night, the board suggested that it be held sometime next month.

Total cost of the project was \$120,000, the majority of which is being financed by a general obligation bond issue passed by Tawas City voters in February 1958.

The new sewage treatment plant addition went into operation last February and the city assumed control from B. H. Sargent Construction Company, contractor, last spring.

Additions to the plant include a new laboratory, new Effhoff tanks and sludge drying beds.

Tawas City's original treatment plant, completed in 1935, was designed to serve a population of 1,300 persons. The new plant is capable of handling a population of approximately 4,400 persons.

Harrison Firm Wins Iosco Airport Job

Jay Woods of Harrison was low bidder on a contract for clearing, grubbing, leveling and bringing to grade a runway for the new Iosco County Airport, to be located north of East Tawas about one-half mile off US-23.

Bids were opened Thursday at Lansing by the Michigan Department of Aeronautics.

Woods' low bid was \$15,940.10. Other bidders were Tawas Sand and Gravel, Tawas City, \$20,318.48; Straits Aggregate, Tawas City, \$20,479.40; Huron Development Company, East Tawas, \$20,970.00; Millbocker, Allegan, \$30,477.90; Surden, Incorporated, Oak Park, \$38,532.

Representing the Iosco County Board of Supervisors at the bid opening were Chairman Glenn Long, Aeronautics Chairman Henry Oates and Clarence Everett.

Engineers had estimated the work at \$21,812. Oates said Friday that it was expected that a contract would be signed with the successful bidder within two weeks.

Iosco County is to receive a federal grant of \$17,250 for airport construction. The grant was to have finalized Friday.

The county has \$9,250 for developing the airport. Matching funds available from the state amount to \$14,000.

Work by the contractor is to be completed by June 1 of 1961. The original contract called for work to be done within 30 days but time was extended because of the late date.

Ronald Curry Funeral Rites Set Thursday

Funeral services for a former Tawas City man, who died Saturday, September 24, at Bluffton, South Carolina, will be held Thursday afternoon, 2 o'clock, at the Tawas City Methodist Church.

Ronald R. Curry, 57, son of a pioneer Iosco County family, died when a boat overturned on a river in South Carolina. A building contractor by trade, Curry and two other men were constructing a breakwall at the time of the accident.

The three men were in a small boat loaded with railroad ties. Only one man was able to reach shore safely when the boat was swamped.

Born June 12, 1903, in Tawas Township, he was the son of Mrs. Charles Curry and the late Mr. Curry, one-time sheriff of Iosco County. He was a graduate of Tawas City High School.

Formerly employed by National Gypsum Company, he had worked at National City for a number of years and left Tawas City with his family in 1939 to become superintendent of National's board plant at Savannah, Georgia.

He was a member of Tawas City Lodge No. 302, F and AM, of which he was a past master.

He is survived by his wife, Rosalie, Bluffton, South Carolina; one son, Thorald Curry of Tawas City; a daughter, Mrs. Thomas (Marilyn) DeWitt, Bay City; his mother, and four grandchildren. His eldest son, Charles, was killed in Alaska in 1952.

The Rev. Ralph Edwards will officiate at Thursday afternoon's funeral services. Burial will be in Tawas City Cemetery with last rites under the auspices of Tawas City Masonic Lodge.

Kids Swarmed Wurtsmith During Annual Program

An estimated 1,200 grade school children swarmed into Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda, a Strategic Air Command base, Saturday morning for the 12th annual observance of "Kids Day," as guests of the air force and Kiwanis International.

This is the seventh consecutive year that the air force has co-sponsored the event.

Children from within a 100-mile radius of Oscoda participated in the "open house" program that was designed to give them a closer look at the aerospace age in which they are living.

James Abney and Capt. Charles W. Godsey, co-chairmen for the event, reported that the majority of the children came from the communities of Bay City, Pinconning, Frankenmuth, Rose City, West Branch, Harrison, Alpena, Tawas City and East Tawas, Mt. Pleasant and the Oscoda area.

Displays of equipment were set up in one of the huge hangars for inspection by the children and during their three-hour stay they passed over, under and through a KC-135 Stratotanker, an F-101B Voodoo, a C-47 cargo plane, an H-19 helicopter and a T-33 jet trainer.

At noon the kids took time out from their busy inspection schedule to consume some 2,000 hot dogs and a like number of soft drinks. The refreshments were provided by the Kiwanis Clubs and prepared by the base food service section and Kiwanis Club members.

The children also were treated to rides on the base fire truck and watched a sentry dog demonstration.

"Kids Day" is aimed at recognizing the part played by youngsters in the present day society and honoring them as the future hope of the United States, through public ceremonies such as Wurtsmith's open house.

One Objection Heard—

Vote on Proposed New City OK'd by Supervisors

Voters of Oscoda and AuSable Townships will have the opportunity November 8 to decide on the question of whether or not to incorporate as a home rule city.

At last Wednesday's one-day session of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors, a report from the judiciary committee recommending such a vote was adopted by the board.

The committee had accepted and reviewed petitions signed by about 140 residents of the two townships which requested such action. Names of signers were inspected and validated by the two township clerks.

However, a roll call vote Wednesday for placing the question before voters indicated that there would be opposition to the proposal.

Only one supervisor in the county voted against the proposition—but this was Supervisor Charles Smith of Oscoda Township. Supervisor Burdge Ashton of AuSable Township voted in the affirmative.

Supervisor Smith told the Herald he had two reasons for voting "no" on the question: 1. That he was not satisfied with the boundaries of the proposed new city; 2. That with a minimum of population, there would be a maximum of taxation.

Actually, the roll call was merely a formality as the board is required by law to honor such petitions in this situation.

The proposed new city would

include an area of approximately six miles in length along Lake Huron and extending about one mile inland. Census figures indicate that its population would be approximately 3,200 persons. The area of the proposed new municipality does not include expanding Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

Roll Call on—

Bridge Proposal Meets City Objection

Iosco County Board of Supervisors authorized setting up machinery for placing a proposition before county voters November 8 which would ask a one mill tax increase on state equalized valuation for bridge maintenance.

This move was recommended by Iosco Road Commission, which reported last April that many bridges in Iosco County were in poor repair and no funds were available to make improvements.

Roll call on this proposition last Wednesday indicated that it would meet opposition from East Tawas and Tawas City.

Bridges located within an incorporated city would not be included under the bridge maintenance program. All but one supervisor of the two cities voted "no" on placing the question before voters.

Iosco Farm Bureau Tells Views on State Con-Con

At recent Farm Bureau meetings throughout Iosco County, the main topic of discussion was the coming vote on the constitutional amendment for Michigan.

Michigan Farm News, official publication of Michigan farmers, has presented statistics that are unchallenged.

Mrs. Charles Kobs, secretary of Vine Henlock Farm Bureau Group, reports that figures presented the group for recent discussion show that in 1948 over 40 percent of Michigan voters expressed themselves as being in favor on con-con. In 1958, less than 35 percent voted favorably.

"In 1948," Mrs. Kobs said, "over 78 percent of those voting cast a ballot either for or against such a convention. In 1958, less than 62 percent of those voting bothered to cast a ballot either for or against con-con."

A check of the 1958 vote on the issue in Iosco County reveals that 85½ percent of the voters took a stand for or against and the proposition passed county-wide by a 414 vote margin, with 662 voters not marking their ballots, about 14½ percent abstaining.

"The issue in Iosco County, does not appear to be declining," Mrs. Kobs continued, "but the state-wide figures indicate that the general public is losing interest. It is apparent that if the present proposition passes so that a simple majority of those voting could prevail, then one-half of less than 62 percent of voters or just under 31 percent of those voting, could have called a constitutional convention if this simple majority provision had been in effect in 1959."

The group passed a resolution

urging voters to vote no on proposition number three in the November 8 election.

Included were Tawas Bay Insurance and William Look and Sons, Detroit and Mackinac Railway, Anderson Coach, Eagles, Kiwanis, Lions, Audie Johnson American Legion Post, Harbor Lights, The Pool Club, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Barbier Oil Company, Peoples State Bank and Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Largest cash outlay, \$1,100, was for equipment and uniforms. Second highest expenditure was for insurance, amounting to \$300.

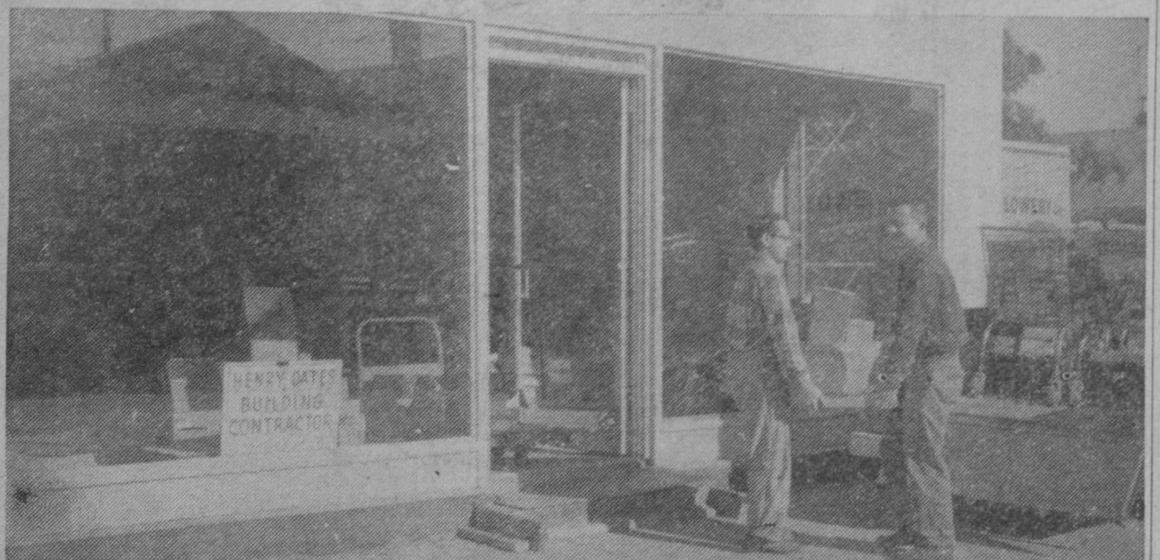
Missed Squirrel, but Lost Control of Car

Medics Promise Flu Shots Again

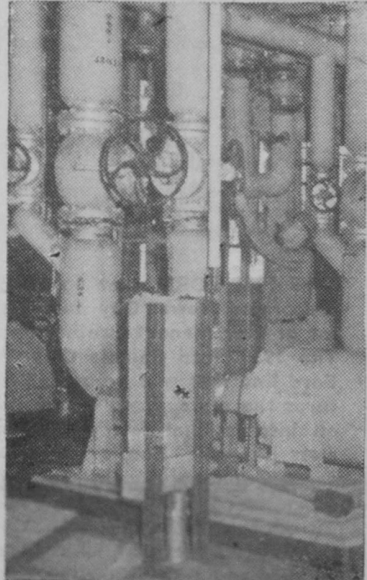

This is part of the program to reduce manpower losses during the fall and winter due to various strains of flu. The shot will be mandatory for all military personnel, according to Capt. V. P. Potloff, administrative officer for the medical group. The captain also stated that the shot would be given to military dependents on a voluntary basis, and if enough vaccine was available, civilian employees would also be asked to take the shots. Heating Plants Ready for Long Michigan Winter

A3: DOUGLAS REYNOLDS
As you may have noticed winter is slowly moving into the Wurtsmith area, and with the cold weather comes the task of keeping the buildings heated. This is no simple operation by any stretch of the imagination but the men who run the base heating plants take it in stride. Twenty-four hours a day, 365 days a year the 379th Civil Engineers three central heating plants are supplying heat and hot water for Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda. Heating plant number one supplies heat and hot water to all new buildings on base. This plant consumed approximately 4,259 tons of coal from July of 1959 to June of this year. Plant number two, which heats the base hospital and other buildings in the area, and plant three that supplies heat to buildings 225, 228 and 245, used up to 7,927 tons of coal during the periods of January 1959 and August 1960. The three plants keep the temperatures of the buildings between 40 degrees in a number of store rooms to protect stored goods from freezing and 85 degrees in the base hospital operating room. Eighteen to 21,000 gallons of water flow through the two 3300 degree boilers in plant one. The water is heated to a temperature of 418 degrees before being pumped through a 25-mile network of underground pipes at the rate of 175,000 gallons an hour. Within the next three years, all base buildings now heated by plants two and three will be serviced by plant number one. A third boiler is presently being added to the plant. Although there are a number of buildings not heated by the central heating plants, central heating personnel still are responsible for the upkeep and operation of single heating units located in various buildings on base. These single units total 122 warm air heating units and 16 miscellaneous coal burning units. With the completion of the Capehart area, a total of 948 oil burners will be added.

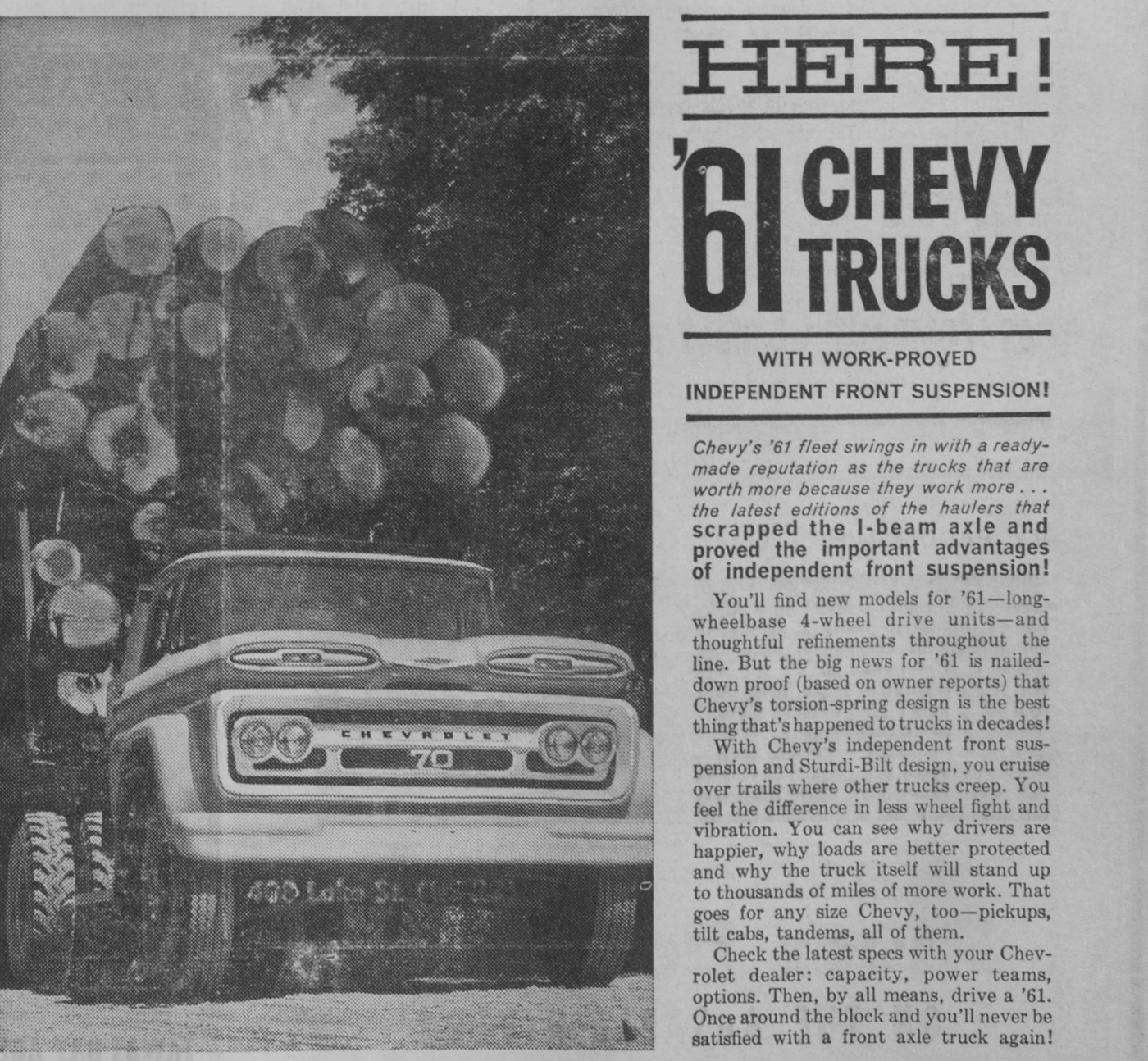


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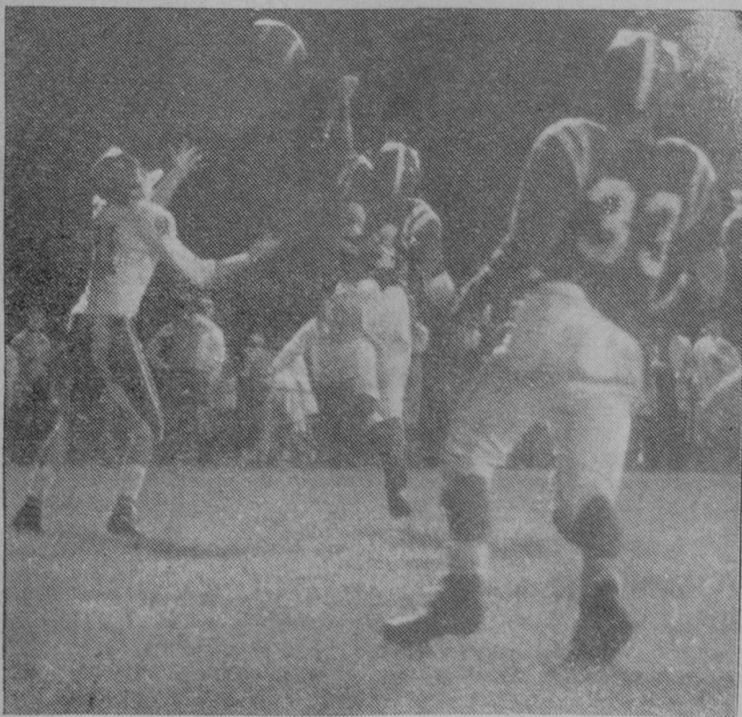

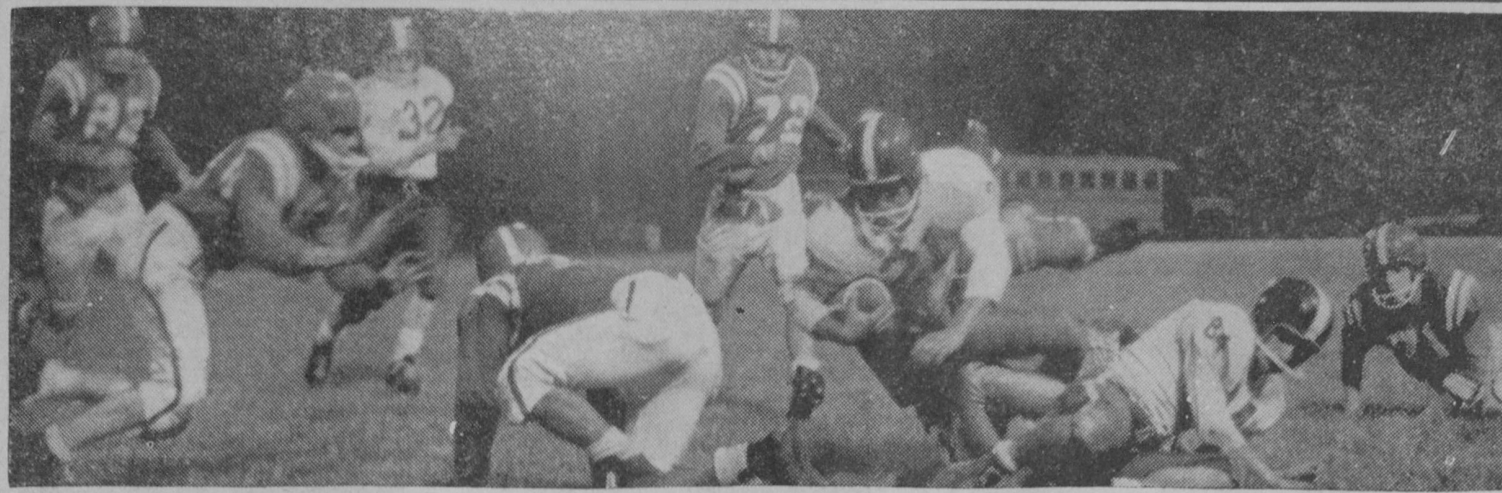

Friday night's game will go down in the won and loss ledger as a defeat for the Braves, but it will also be remembered in school annals of Tawas Area as one of its finest hours.

With a minute and 50 seconds remaining in the game, Humphrey dropped back to pass and, with good protection in front of him, let loose with a long aerial which Campbell gathered in on the 10-yard line and scampered across the goal line for what would have been the tying score.

The play was nullified, however, when officials detected a Tawas player raise his hands on the line after the ball was snapped and offensive holding was called. Tawas was penalized 15 yards and Humphrey's second long pass attempt was intercepted by Charbonneau of Pinny.

Throughout most of the game, the Braves lacked the key block which would have sprung runners loose.

On the other hand, what Tawas lacked on offense, it made up for in its defensive play. Pinconning

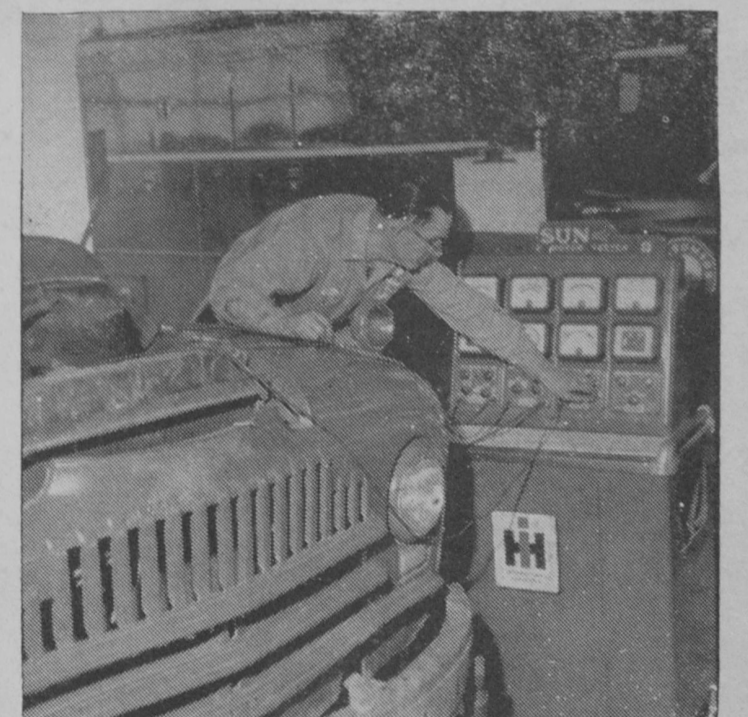
