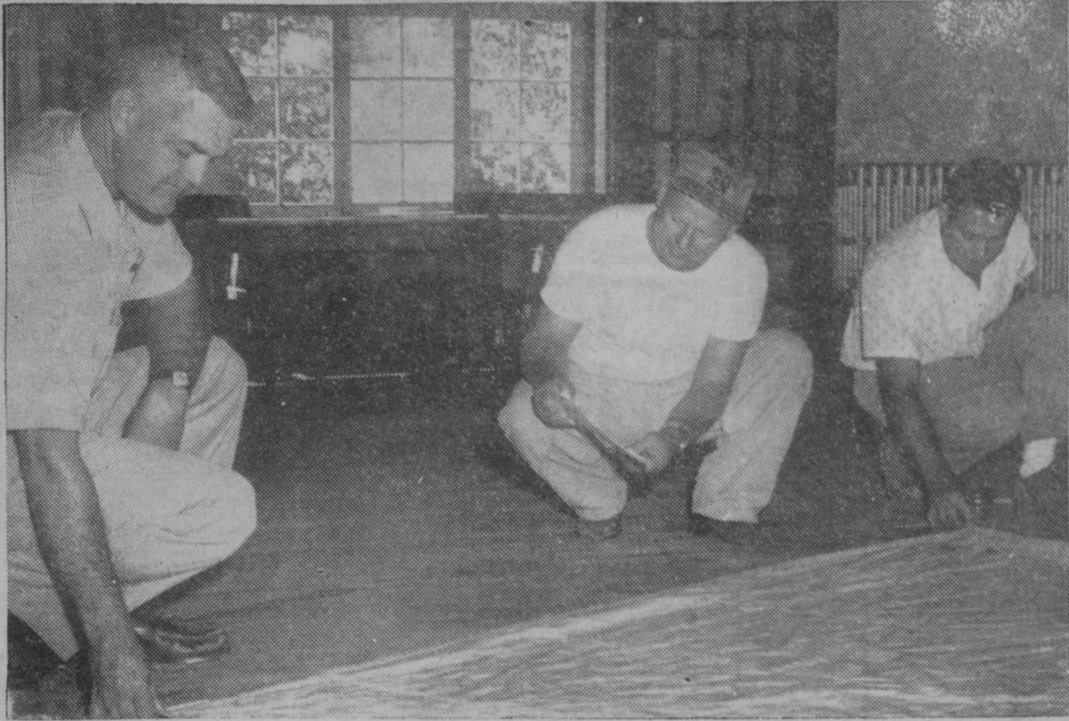


# Tawas Extends Welcome to International Lightning Class Sailors



GEARED FOR LIGHTNING—International Lightning class championship races will be held at Tawas Bay Yacht Club starting Thursday with around 75 of the craft from 18 districts in the United States taking part. A series of qualifying races were to start Tuesday and Wednesday.

Tawas Bay is the site this week for the "world series" of Lightning class boats. Sailors of Michigan have long considered this body of water among the finest found anywhere for the sport of sailing. Residents of the area join members of the Tawas Bay Yacht Club in extending a most hearty welcome to all visiting sailors, their families and guests.

## First Elimination Races Held Tuesday on Bay

Official races in the International Lightning Championship Regatta, the "world series" for sailors in this class of sailing craft, start Thursday on Tawas Bay. A series of qualifying races were run Tuesday and Wednesday.

Some 73 boats have registered for the races, announces Clarence McMullen, who has charge of reservations for the Tawas Bay Yacht Club.

Commodore Ralph Meyers announced that the sailor traveling the greatest distance to attend the regatta was Carl M. Eichenlaub Jr. of San Diego, California.

As usual, Michigan's skilled sailors will be prime pre-race favorites. Henry Cawthra, Grosse Pointe Farms, won in 1958 and Herm Nickels, Lake Fenton, was international champion last year.

As defending champ, Nickels was exempt from qualifying this year, although he won second place in the Michigan district regatta held several weeks ago at Higgins Lake. Cawthra was first place winner in that race.

Other Michigan qualifiers include Dr. John Lesesne, Robert Krop and Charles Grant, all from Grosse Pointe Farms; Wes Wiedrick and James Schudel, both of Detroit; Jim Cogan, Battle Creek; Alex Carlin, Roscommon.

Tawas Bay Yacht Club will be represented by the "Trio," skippered by Herbert Cox and Marvin Mallon. This boat was seventh place winner in the district.

Tawas Bay Yacht Club will be host to more than 500 persons during the regatta. Only planned evening activity at the clubhouse will be a German fun night Wednesday (tonight).

Other evening activities will include a perch fry at the Barnes Hotel Friday and the annual awards banquet to be held at the Holland Hotel Saturday night.

Since the first Lightning was built in 1937, this type of sailboat has mushroomed. The association now boasts 7,800 owners from the United States and 23 foreign countries.

Michigan has more than kept pace with the Lightning boom. The state has 18 fleets with the world's largest (50) anchored on Cass Lake near Pontiac.

All Lightnings must conform to a rigid pattern. This means a 19-foot length, 6½-foot beam and approximately 175 feet of sail.

To maintain the identity and singleness of class, the Lightning Association maintains a chief measurer who approves plans and specifications for every Lightning that is registered.

As a further safeguard of uniformity, spot checks are made on all boats at every association-approved race. Thus, the outcome

of competition depends wholly on the skill of the skipper and how well he has "tuned" his boat.

## Two-Way Tie for 1st After Tuesday Races

Bud Olson of Stratford, Connecticut, and William Uhl, Long Island Sound, New York, are in a tie for first place at the conclusion of the first day of qualifying races in the International Lightning Class Championship regatta.

Two races of three heats each were held Tuesday under a clear sky, perfect water and wind conditions.

Henry Cawthra of Grosse Pointe Farms, is in second place. Carter Ford, Long Island, New York, and Carl Eichenlaub, San Diego, California, are in a two-way tie for third.

Bob Adams, Indianapolis, Indiana; Tom Fallon, Buffalo, New York; Tom Allen, Buffalo, New York; James Schudel, Detroit, are in a four-way tie for fourth.

Last qualifying race will be held Wednesday morning. Some 30 winning boats will emerge from the three heats of this race to compete for the start of the international championship races Thursday.

Five races will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday to determine the international Lightning class champion.

Because of the large number of boats entered, the three-day qualifying race was necessary.

Defending international champion, Herm Nickels, is exempt from the qualifying races.

Ronald Armstead of Whittemore, who participated in the Lapeer junior rodeo during the past summer, will be one of the participants.

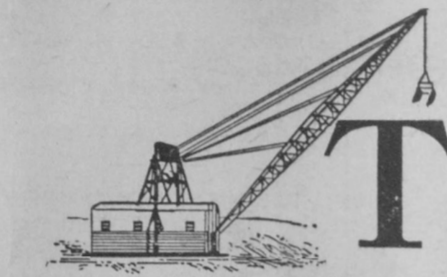
The show will feature top professionals in the rodeo circuit.

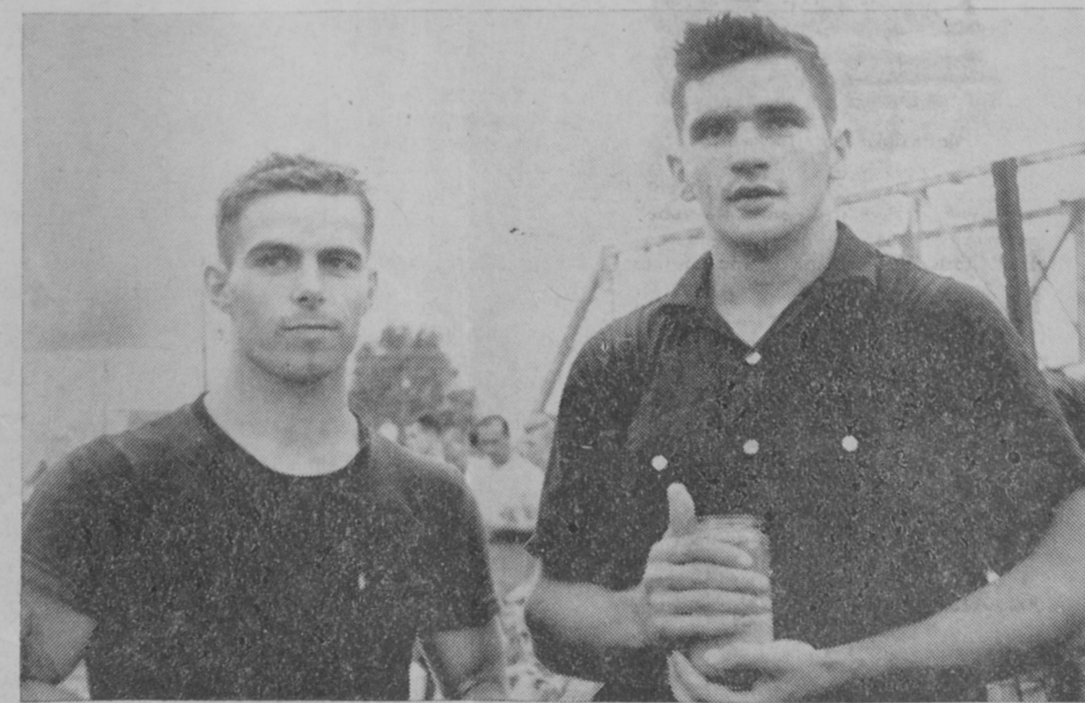
# WOJAHN-McGUIRE WIN MARATHON

## Old Record Time Shattered

The mighty AuSable River, which twists and winds its way from Grayling half way across the state to Oscoda on Lake Huron, has a new pair of champions.

Crowned winners of the 240-mile Michigan World's Championship Canoe Marathon Sunday were Edward Wojahn, 21, of Tawas City and Sanford McGuire, 24, of Mikado.

These two young men established a new course record Sunday when they crossed the Oscoda finish line in an elapsed time of 16 hours, 11 minutes and 40 seconds, cutting the previous course record by 30 minutes.

Two other teams in the race also finished faster than the old record to give canoe racing fans one of the most interesting races in the 14-year history of the event.

To win, Wojahn and McGuire had to overtake and pass veteran canoeists and three-time marathon winner, Ralph Sawyer of Oscoda, and his new partner, Irvin McGuire of Mikado, brother of Sanford.

Sawyer and McGuire, who started in 21st position at Grayling, fought their way to early leadership in the race when they paddled at break-neck speed to overtake and pass all canoes in front of them.

Among those left in the wake of Sawyer and McGuire was the veteran team of Steve Kolonich and Larry Kindell, who had set the course record of 16 hours, 41 minutes in 1958 and were in top form for this year's race.

It was not long before Wojahn and McGuire made up their lost time, 2½ minutes, and the two teams battled neck and neck for nearly 12 hours during the race.

The new champions finally took the lead in the backwaters of Loud Dam and were never headed the rest of the way.

Maintaining a steady 70-per-minute stroke, sometimes 72, Wojahn and McGuire gradually built up a commanding lead and there was never a doubt as to the outcome after they portaged Five Channels Dam with a six-minute lead over the second place team.

A downpour of rain during an early Sunday morning thunder storm had no effect on the canoeists, although it did seem to dampen the spirits of the thousands of spectators who were following the progress of the race.

Perfect water conditions and the tip-top condition of the leading canoeists produced probably the finest race in the 14-year history of the event.

As the new champions neared the finish line, they were greeted by loud cheers from about 5,000 spectators who crowded Oscoda. Adding to the carnival air of the finish line were two bands, one a "German Band" and the other being Almont's "Royal Rubes" which has entertained Labor Day week-end revelers along the race course for the past 13 years.

For their efforts, Wojahn and McGuire were awarded first prize money of \$1,200, along with

a trophy. Prizes for the first 10 canoe teams totaled \$3,050, furnished by co-sponsors of the race, the Oscoda-AuSable Volunteer Fire Department and the Crawford County Chamber of Commerce.

The old course record was broken by the first three teams to cross the finish line. Kolonich and Kindell, third place winners, completed the race in 16 hours, 39 minutes and five seconds. Of the 26 teams which started

at Grayling, only 10 finished. Kolonich, National City, 10th. Other finishers were Al and LeRoy Widing of Holly, fourth place; Tom Halcro and Stanley Hall, Oscoda, fifth; Bob Buchanan and Herb Brady, Prince George, British Columbia, Canada, sixth place; Norman Rogers and Blaine Brown, Roseville, seventh; W. L. Lancaster and James Larson, Flint, eighth place; Pat Widing and Ron Frosh, Holly, ninth; Gerald Lauwers and Gary

An international flavor was added to this year's contest with the entry of Buchanan and Brady. They are the international champions of the British Columbia race.

An added attraction at the finish line Sunday was an amateur water skiing show-demonstration given by personnel of nearby Wurtsmith Air Force Base and local residents.

## State Police Have Warrants—

# Flint Men Fail to Appear Here on Kidnap Charge

Two Flint men, who were to appear Tuesday before Justice of the Peace A. J. Goulet, East Tawas, to answer to a charge of kidnaping, failed to make an appearance. Warrants were turned over to Michigan State Police for service.

The two men, Matthew Buder, an attorney, and John N. Bogart, a salesman, had attempted to make a "citizen's arrest" on Genesee County Prosecutor Jerome F. O'Rourke near here August 17.

Iosco Prosecuting Attorney Paul Harvey told the Herald late yesterday afternoon that Buder called his office Tuesday and requested a new date for the justice court hearing.

Harvey had acted against the two men last week after a petition by Bogart against O'Rourke was quashed by four circuit judges in Flint.

The warrant against Buder and Bogart charges kidnaping, conspiring to kidnap, or in the alternative, attempted kidnaping. O'Rourke filed a formal complaint against the two men last week.

Harvey said that the two men's contention that they were mak-

ing a citizens arrest when they tried to seize O'Rourke from his cottage near here had no basis after the circuit judges quashed Bogart's petition.

"The attempted citizens arrest was completely without justification," Harvey said. "Physical violence was very evident on the part of Bogart and Buder."

Bogart's petition in Flint circuit court had charged O'Rourke with conspiracy in withholding documents and a picture used against him in earlier criminal proceedings in which Bogart and Buder were charged with illegally soliciting law business.

## DeRosia Transferred to CG Light Ship

BMC Leon DeRosia, who has commanded the Tawas Lifeboat Station for the past three years, has been transferred to Port Huron where he will take over command of the coast guard's Light ship.

DeRosia has been succeeded here by BMC George Stickers, former commanding officer of the Belle Isle coast guard station.

# Meet Tonight to Plan New City Incorporation

Petitions for incorporation of portions of Oscoda and AuSable Townships as a home rule city are to be presented to the judiciary committee of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors at a special meeting tonight (Wednesday). The meeting will be held at the county building.

Certification of names listed on the petitions which were presented to the board of supervisors at its meeting two weeks ago, have been confirmed by clerks of the two townships.

The judiciary committee is to meet tonight with Supervisor Burdge Ashton of AuSable Township and Supervisor Charles Smith of Oscoda to make plans for a November 8 incorporation vote in the two townships.

A charter-study committee would also be selected by electors.

Working with the committee and the two supervisors on preparing ground work for the election have been Prosecuting Attorney Paul Harvey and County Clerk George Prescott.

The proposed city, which would become Iosco's largest with 3,202 persons, would run for six miles along the Lake Hur-

on shoreline from Jordanville subdivision on the north to a mile south of Johnson Road. It would extend a mile west of the lake.

A complete report on tonight's meeting is to be made at the September session of the board of supervisors.

One version of the story says that he then went out to join his friends. After a while he invited one of them to come and see what he had done.

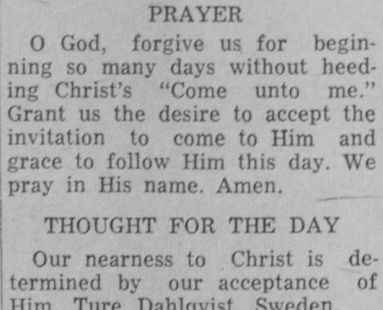

Social Security Act Became Law 25 Years Ago

Today, 25 years after the original Social Security Act became law, over 14 million men, women and children are receiving monthly old-age, survivors and disability insurance benefit checks totaling 900 million dollars a month.

Originally designed to provide only old-age insurance benefits for workers in commerce and industry, these provisions of the social security program have expanded and improved over the years. About nine out of 10 workers in the United States, almost the entire gainfully employed population, work in employment or self-employment covered by social security.

Supervisors' Proceedings AUGUST SESSION

Pursuant to July adjournment, the Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order in August session at 9:30 a. m. by the chairman who ordered roll call.

The following supervisors were present: Ashton, Bellville, Blust, Burgess, Everett, Gerard, Little, Long, Oates, Rodman, Smith, Stephan, Pollard, Webb, Werth, White, Kochenderfer. Absent: Brabant, McKenzie.

Mr. Little moved that the following communication from the clerk of this board be entered upon the minutes of this meeting. The motion was supported by Pollard and carried unanimously.

Mr. Little addressed the board stating that since this board and other boards throughout the state had finally succeeded in securing the passage of a law which would permit county governing bodies to ask and receive good faith deposits before taking actions on petitions for drains, etc., that this group should now take the Floyd Lake petition from the table and move that proper proceedings be commenced and at the same time apply the new law which had been previously mentioned in the amount of \$300.

William McCready requested similar action on the petitions of property owners for the Tawas Lake proposed dam. Mr. Webb stated that there was no reason now why the Bass Lake petition could not be acted upon.

Mr. Werth stated that the drain commissioner should examine more thoroughly all requests for drains. The clerk requested approval of the minutes of the previous session as published. It was moved by Everett supported by Stephan that the minutes as published for July be approved. Carried unanimously.

Mr. Long informed the board that there should be a communication regarding a convalescent home for the board's consideration by 1:00 p. m.

Mr. Oates reported that a deed had been received from the United States government for the land for the airport. Committees were ordered to their respective duties subject to the call of the chair.

Upon call to order at 11:00 a. m., Lester Weis representing taxpayers and electors of Oscoda and AuSable Townships presented a petition to the board requesting approval of the incorporation into a city of certain proposed areas in Oscoda and AuSable Townships. The approval needed was necessary to have the proposal placed on the November ballot. Paul Harvey, prosecuting attorney, stated that this board's only function was to pass on the validity and sufficiency of the petition signers.

It was moved by Ashton supported by Blust that the petition be tabled for 30 days for further study. Carried unanimously. The chair referred the petition to the judiciary committee.

Mr. Harvey informed the board that it had a limited time to act on such a petition and that rather than tabling the matter the county clerk should be instructed to check on the validity and sufficiency of signers and also ask Mr. Anderson for a report on the population figures for the proposed incorporation area from the recently completed 1960 census.

Mr. Ashton withdrew his motion and Mr. Blust withdrew his support to the previous motion. It was then moved by Ashton supported by Smith that the clerk and prosecutor proceed in compiling the necessary information for a report to this board in September.

Upon motion supported and prevailing the board recessed until 1:30 p. m. AFTERNOON SESSION Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m., roll call was ordered by the chairman. The same supervisors were present as at the morning session.

The clerk submitted to the board in writing a communication from A. Don Anderson giving a projection of the census figures from the 1960 census for the proposed area of incorporation of the Oscoda-AuSable area and a check made by the county clerk's office of every 15th signature on the petitions presented at the morning session.

Mr. Werth read the following report of the welfare committee:

Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen: Your welfare committee recommends that \$1,200 be transferred to the direct relief fund. This transfer to be made from the general fund of the county.

It was moved by Werth supported by Burgess that the report be accepted. The motion carried upon the following roll call. Ayes: Ashton, Bellville, Blust, Burgess, Everett, Gerard, Little, Long, Oates, Rodman, Smith, Stephan, Pollard, Webb, Werth, White, Kochenderfer. Nays: None.

Mr. Werth read the following report of the welfare committee, Honorable Board of Supervisors, Gentlemen: Your welfare committee recommends that the board transfer \$4,800 to the social welfare fund out of the general fund of the county. This amount takes care of all hospital medical bills to date.

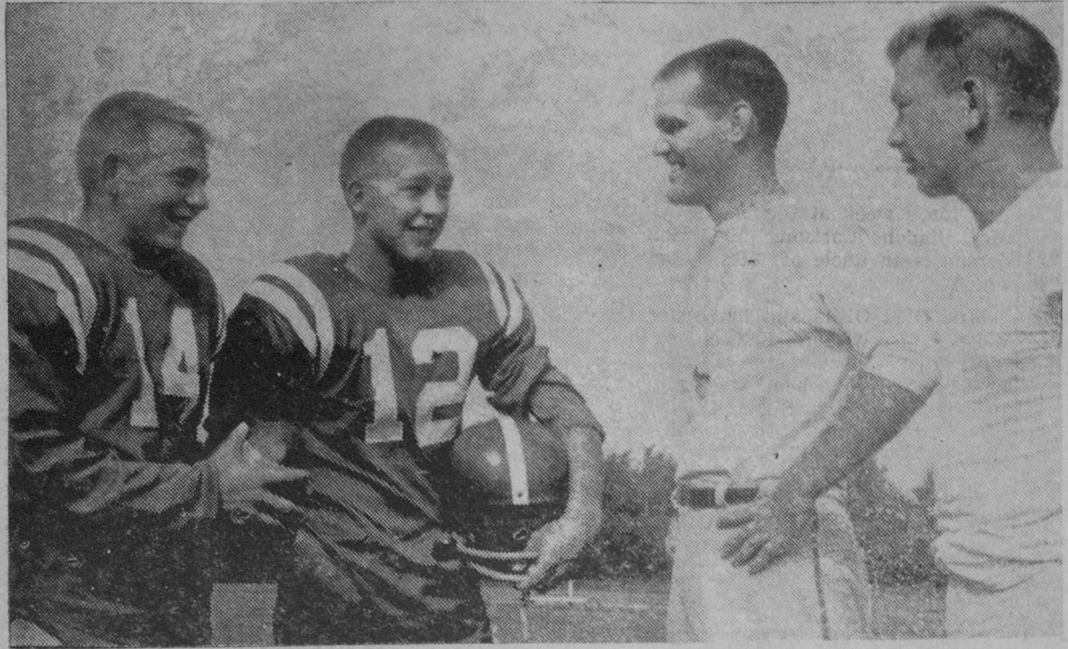
