Hale Downs Melita to Win National Division Toga of NEM

Hale nailed down the lid on the National Division championship of the Northeastern Michigan League Sunday by defeating Melita, 8-3. The victory gave Hale a record of 11 wins and two losses, with one rained out game.

East Tawas, which defeated its cross-town rival, Tawas City, 4-1, is in second place with a 9-5 record. Melita dropped to third place with an 8-5 season total and Tawas City is in fourth place with a 7-6 record.

Hale scored single runs in the second and sixth and then broke loose for three in the seventh, two in the eighth and one in the ninth. Melita scored single runs in the third, fifth and ninth.

Bud Johnson and Bill Bannister both connected for home runs to give Hale an edge in the long blow department. Hartwick hit a solo smash for the losers.

Grant Mousseau was the winning pitcher, striking out eight Melita batters. Templin, with seven strike outs, was the loser.

A game will be held tonight to decide which divisional winner, Hale or Worth, will meet Saginaw and Bay City in a play-off for the right to participate in the National Baseball Congress tournament. The game will be played at Worth.

Coach Co. Consolidates Plants in Baldwin Twp.

In a move toward consolidating its manufacturing operations here, Anderson Coach Company has announced plans to close its "number one" plant near the Michigan State Police Post.

Production employees of the company started their two-week vacation Monday of this week. When they return to work August 28, the company hopes to have most of its production line moved to the Baldwin Township facilities.

Closing the East Tawas building means the end of an era here which began shortly after World War II. Since 1947, some 13,319 mobile homes have rolled out of the green, one-story concrete block building fronting on US-23.

The building into which the production lines were moved was formerly called final finish. Also located there are the paint shop and warehouse.

"We will retain certain of our functions in the East Tawas building, but we are going to attempt to build complete mobile homes at the Baldwin Township plant," stated James Guest, company president.

In addition to improving its operation, the company hopes to reduce the present overhead in maintaining two separate facilities. The two plants are approximately two miles apart.

Mr. Guest said one reason for the move was that the East Tawas building was limited in space. "We are now constructing 55-foot coaches in a plant which was designed for 22-foot models," Mr. Guest stated. "We have expanded this building to the very limit."

Tax Levy Proposal Up for Second Vote Aug. 24

Electors of Tawas Area School District will again vote on a tax levy proposition for construction of needed classrooms in the school district.

Following defeat of the two proposals July 10, the board of education decided to resubmit them to a vote Thursday, August 24.

Those electors desiring to do so may apply for absent voters' ballots up until noon Tuesday, August 22, two days prior to the election.

Voters will receive two ballots on the question of financing construction of new classrooms.

All registered electors are eligible to vote on the question of raising the debt limit. The second ballot asks approval of a three-mill tax levy for a period of five years. Only taxpayers are eligible to vote on the latter.

Voting places are as follows: First Precinct, American Legion Hall. Includes all of East Tawas and territory of Baldwin Town-

10 Top Marathon Teams to Split \$3,050

Winners in next Sunday's AuSable River canoe marathon will be awarded the same cash prizes as last year. Although about six hours of paddling time have been cut from the course this year, winning teams will earn their prizes as competition is expected to be the hottest ever.

To the team which crosses the Oscoda finish line first will go top prize money of \$1,200. A total of \$1,850 is to be split among the next nine teams.

Top canoeists from Michigan, other Midwestern States and Canada will compete for the right to call themselves the world's championship canoe duo.

Several of the Canadian teams are expected to arrive at Oscoda today to start practicing for the tough 180-mile run from Mio to Oscoda.

Included in the course are five portages, four of them over Consumers Power Company hydroelectric dams and one at the river mouth.

A starting gun will send an expected field of 40 canoes down the AuSable from Mio Sunday morning at 8:30 o'clock. The winning team is expected to cross the finish line at the Oscoda Township Park between 5:30 and 6:00 p. m.

'Gasorama'

Stiehl said that maintenance men had been working toward the anticipated move for the past week and that a full crew was to start work Monday of this week.

He said that the building at East Tawas would be used for storage of stock for the present time.

"We plan to build frames in the old building until we have used all materials on hand. After that, we will purchase pre-fabricated frames," said Stiehl.

The sheet metal shop and final finish will move into the paint shop. Stiehl said that the company plans to use pre-painted plywoods in its operation.

Another change will see a reduction in the number of coaches on the production line at one time. In the past, between 12 and 14 coaches were in various stages of manufacture at one time. This number will be reduced to about five or six.

Mr. Guest said that if business justifies an expansion program, new facilities would be added at the Baldwin Township location. "It would have been impossible to make any more additions to the East Tawas building," he stated.

At present, the company's engineering department is working on plans for a camper-type coach, in addition to its regular line of eight and 10-foot-wide mobile homes of various lengths. It was emphasized that the camper was still in the planning stages.

Tawas to Have 18-Hole Golf Course by Next Year

The Tawas area will have an 18-hole golf course starting next year. With approximately 300 active golfers now in the area, and more taking to the sport every year, the new facilities will arrive at an opportune time.

Alvin J. Zaharias, owner of the Tawas Golf and Country Club on Monument Road, said this week that the new nine holes he is adding to the local course will be ready for play next spring.

The new nine will have watered fairways and total yardage for the 18 holes will be 7,100.

Constructed last year, the sporty new course is located east of the present nine holes on 20 acres of land formerly owned by the late Frank Brown and 40 acres which belonged to the late Anthony Zaharias, grandfather of Alvin.

Although Zaharias originally intended to open the new nine this season, he reached the conclusion that the fairway turf and

greens would be much improved for future play if the course was not used this year.

Situated in a nicely wooded area, several of the holes will cross Sims Creek and five will have "dog legs." Featured will be two 700-yard holes. One, a 775-yard par six, will be the longest in Michigan.

In addition to work on the new course, Zaharias has started a complete reconstruction of the present nine-hole course. Greens are being relocated, a new parking lot for 100 cars is being con-

structed west of the clubhouse and trees are to be planted along fairways.

Two of the principal additions will be construction of a 30 by 60 swimming pool in front of the clubhouse, about where the number one tee is now located, and a practice putting green with 6,000 square feet of playing surface.

The latter two additions, along with the new nine and reconstruction of the old course, will make Tawas Golf and Country Club one of the finest in the north.

Zaharias said that new greens on the present course would be ready for play by 1963.

In addition to work on the new greens this year, some 9,000 drain tiles were installed in the two courses.

Improvements at the modern clubhouse will include construction of a locker room in the basement. It will have 50 three by four-foot lockers. The basement will have an outside entrance.

Constructed in 1952-53 by Zaharias, a bar, dining and dancing area is located in the clubhouse. Future improvements to the building include complete air-conditioning.

Tawas Golf Course was established in the 1920s by the late Frank Brown. Zaharias purchased the course following his death.

Zaharias said that golf play here has increased 100 percent in the past several years. "We look for the sport to continue its rapid growth here and the improved course will provide a major attraction for tourists," he said.

Injured When Car Hit Tractor; Succumbs Later

Funeral services for a Route One, Tawas City, man who received fatal injuries in an accident August 9 were held Monday afternoon at Jacques Funeral Home.

Verne William Kindell of Carpenter Road died Friday afternoon at St. Luke's Hospital, Saginaw, where he was rushed after sustaining injuries here.

Kindell had run his dump truck into a ditch along M-55, 2 1/2 miles west of the National City Road. While attempting to remove the truck from the ditch using a tractor owned by Arthur Musk, a car driven by a Saginaw man struck the tractor and pinned Kindell against the truck.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said that the tractor had no lights. Mrs. Musk, in the family passenger car, attempted to attract the oncoming driver's attention by blinking the headlights from dim to bright several times.

Driver of the other car was Harold M. Hutchinson. Officers said that he had slowed his vehicle but believed that blinking of the car lights may have blinded him. He was not held.

Kindell was rushed to Tawas Hospital for emergency treatment and was removed to Saginaw (See ACCIDENT, page 10.)

School Board Sets New Truancy Policy; Award Fuel Contacts

With only 21 days remaining before the start of the fall term, Tawas Area Board of Education adopted several new school policies, let bids for fuel and announced departmental changes in the faculty at its regular meeting Monday night.

The board, taking a cue from recommendations last winter by the Tawas Area Parent-Teacher Association, decided that there would be no time off for hunting this year.

Anyone absent from school for reasons of hunting will receive an unexcused absence. This will mean that the student will have no opportunity to make up work which was missed during his absence.

The board also adopted a rigid policy concerning truancy. For a first offense, a student is suspended from school until his parents confer with the principal.

A student will be suspended from school for a second offense until such time as the parents confer with the principal. To be reinstated, the parent must sign a statement agreeing to withdraw the student from school should truancy occur again.

A third offense will find the student being suspended by the principal. A letter notifying parents of the school's action will be sent by registered mail. The student may return the following semester, but only if his parents sign a statement. The reinstatement will be contingent upon the student's good behavior and regular attendance.

IN THE SERVICE— Hale Man Takes Part in Carolina Army Maneuvers

PFC Robert T. Boughner, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry A. Boughner of Hale, is participating with other personnel from the 82nd Airborne Division in Exercise Swift Strike, a massive army-air force maneuver being conducted in North and South Carolina. The two-week exercise is scheduled to end August 20.

Swift Strike, one of the largest peacetime military exercises ever conducted in the United States, will involve nearly 40,000 troops in simulated combat in a maneuver area 100 miles long and 50 miles wide in the Carolinas. The major objective of the exercise is to provide realistic peacetime training for troop carrier elements of the United States Air Force Reserve, tactical fighter and tactical reconnaissance units of the Air National Guard and active army airborne units of the Strategic Army Corps (STRAC).

Boughner is regularly assigned as a machinegunner in Company A of the 82nd Division's 503rd Infantry at Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

The former Hale Area High School student completed basic training at Fort Knox, Kentucky.

A2c Keith A. Schreiber, son of Mr. and Mrs. Allen H. Schreiber, East Tawas, successfully completed a course, Introduction to Mechanical Drawing I, through the United States Armed Forces Institute, Madison, Wisconsin, July 27.

Airman Schreiber graduated from Tawas City High School in 1959. Before entering the air force, the airman was employed as a pin setter for the East Tawas Recreation. He is now stationed with the 4170th Field Maintenance Squadron, Larson Air Force Base, Washington.

Airman Schreiber is continuing his education while in service through the voluntary world-wide education program for members of the armed forces. He is one of more than 297,000 servicemen now enrolled with the United States Armed Forces Institute in correspondence and group study courses. More than 200 intermediate, high school, college and vocational-technical courses are currently being offered by USAFI.

Walter O. Weaver, son of Mr. and Mrs. Francis R. Weaver of Oscoda, completed recruit training August 5 at the Naval Training Center, Great Lakes, Illinois. Military ceremonies marked the end of nine weeks of "boot camp" and included a full dress parade and review before high ranking officials and civilian dignitaries. In nine weeks of instruction, the "raw recruit" is developed into a navy bluejacket, ready for duty with the fleet.

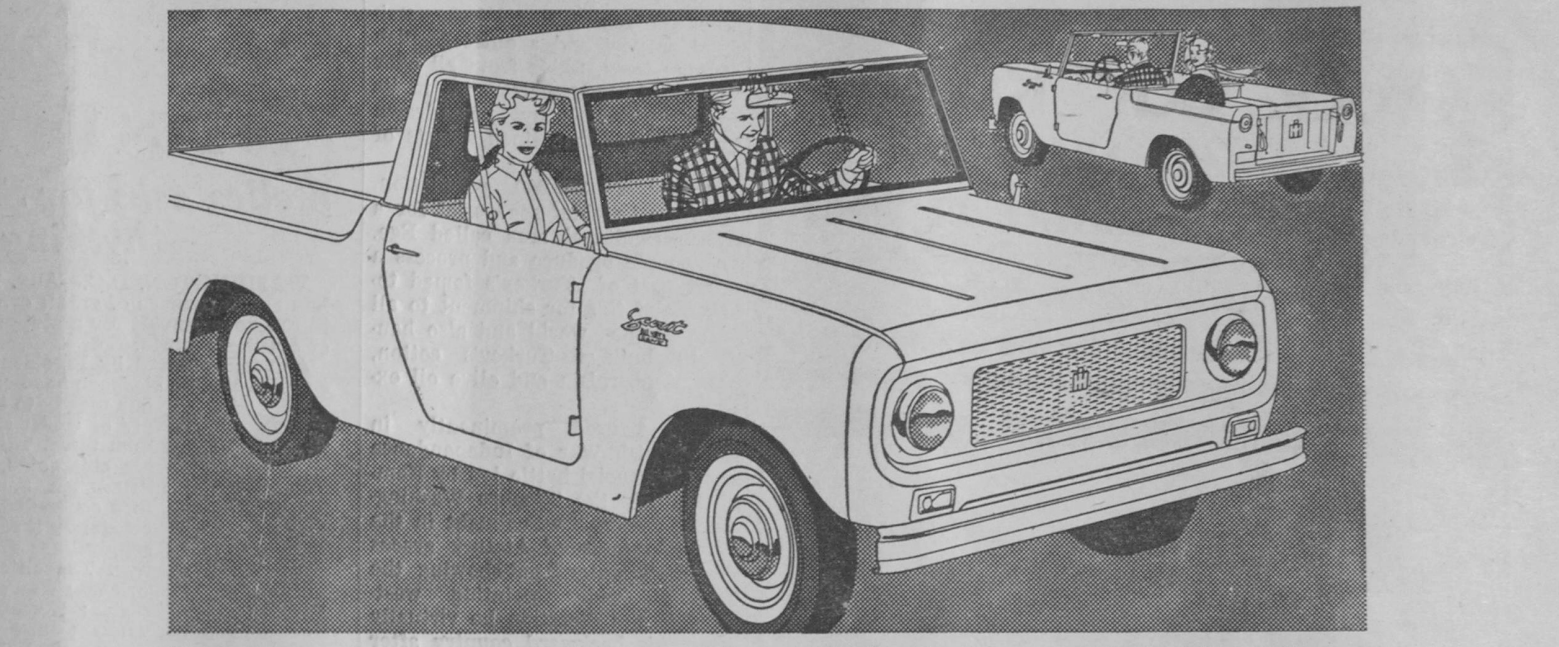

Ankara was a small dusty town of 30,000 in 1923, but today it is the proud capital of the Turkish Republic with a population nearly 500,000. Its wide boulevards, parks, squares and European-style public buildings have a western quality. It is the modern and western character of their capital which pleases the Turks. They are justly proud of the great strides they have made since the founding of the Turkish Republic.

It is possible to trace the city's history accurately from the start of the Hittite period, about 2000, B. C.

After the fall of the Hittite state around 1000, B. C., the region came under Phrygian rule. According to an ancient legend, Ankara was founded by Midas whose touch was reputed to turn anything into gold. The legions of Alexander the Great arrived in 334, B. C., and remained 11 years.

Alexander was followed by the Seleucides, the Galatians and the Romans, who appeared in 25, B. C., and remained until 334, A. D. The Byzantines ruled the area

from 334 to 1073. From the eleventh century on, Ankara changed hands many times.

In 1403, Ankara came under Ottoman rule and prospered as an important trading center on the caravan routes. When the Ottoman Empire collapsed after World War II, the Turkish War of Independence was successfully directed from Ankara by Ataturk. Ankara became Turkey's capital in 1923 with the birth of the republic.

One of the most impressive things to see in Ankara is the Ataturk Mausoleum, where the remains of the founder of modern Turkey repose. It is the largest memorial building in the world.

Overlooking a sheltered gulf on Turkey's Aegean Coast and fringed by soaring mountains, Izmir often has been compared to Naples for beauty of setting. It far outstrips its Italian cousin in age, however, since it was a thriving city 2,000 years before Christ in an era when its neighboring City of Troy fell to the Greeks.

Ancient Smyrna, whose name was retained down to the establishment of the Turkish Republic in the 1920s, was situated across the gulf from the present city in a section now called Bayrakli. The old metropolis was famed among other things as being the birthplace of the blind poet Homer.

The site of the present city is said to have been selected by Alexander the Great, who was inspired by a dream he had on his march through Asia Minor.

The modern City of Izmir combines the features of a busy Oriental seaport and a quiet English country town. Ships from all over the world work their cargo in its harbor while sleepy horse-drawn taxis ply the tree lined streets of the residential area.

A city of 300,000 population, Izmir is the chief sea outlet for a rich agricultural area called Ege. Its people produce and process a great part of Turkey's famed tobacco and figs for shipment to all parts of the world and also handle the bulk of Turkey's cotton, chromium, raisin and olive oil exports.

Izmir figured prominently in the Turkish War of Independence and the crucial battle led by Kemal Ataturk, the "George Washington of Turkey," was fought in the city. A statue of Ataturk graces the city's waterfront showing the Turkish leader pointing westward in the direction he virtually drove his backward country after centuries of Ottoman rule.

Konak Square, the Times Square of Izmir, is nearby, fronting the harbor and flanked by tall government buildings.

Within easy access of the city are the excavated ruins of Ephesus and Pergamum, two of the most famous cities of antiquity. Ephesus housed the Temple of Diana, one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World.

The best preserved relic of old Smyrna lies in the center of modern Izmir—the excavated remains of the ancient agora, or market place, built originally by the Greeks and rebuilt by the Romans after a violent earthquake which razed the city in 178, A. D.

Adana, Turkey's fourth largest city, has a population of 180,000. One of the most prosperous agricultural and commercial centers in Southern Turkey, its chief products are cotton, cereals, vegetables and citrus fruits. Cotton and its by-products account for three quarters of the city's exports.

Ancient Adana gained importance because of its strategic position. Adana is the only point where the Seyhan River can be easily crossed. A bridge existed here even before the great Roman highway was built which crossed the Seyhan at Adana before going eastward to Syria.

The present bridge is said to have been constructed by the Emperor Hadrian, repaired by the Emperor Justinian and repaired again under the Ottoman.

Adana's strategic position explains the many invading armies that have taken the city through the centuries.

In the fifteenth century, B. C., it was taken by the Hittites. Later, it was part of the Assyrian Empire. The city was captured in the fifth century, B. C., by the Persians and in 333, B. C., by Alexander the Great. It was annexed to the Roman Empire by Pompeius and flourished under the Byzantine Empire which followed the rule of Rome.

In the seventh century, Arab armies came to Adana. Leaving the Arabs returned two centuries later. This time to stay longer. The Crusaders took Adana in the twelfth century but it was soon recaptured by Seljuk Turks. It was not until 1608 that Adana was definitely made a part of the Ottoman Empire.

In the northern part of Turkey amidst high mountains and green forests, with plenty of snow in the wintertime and a beautiful climate during the summer, are the three Black Sea towns of Trabzon, Sinop and Samsun.

They are truly isolated, as road conditions are poor; Samsun can be reached by rail, water and air; Trabzon via water and air, and Sinop by water. All three are fairly small cities.

Samsun, the largest and most modern, has a population of 63,000 and is located in the center of the Turkish Black Sea coast. It is one and one-half miles southwest of the site of the ancient city of Amisus, a rich trading city in the first century, A. D. The best qual-

Navy Seeks Private Vessels To Beef Up Port Blockade Welles Asks for Small Craft, Ferries, Anything that Floats

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Aug. 18—Navy Secretary Gideon Welles has asked owners of small craft to make their vessels available to the government for a stepped-up enforcement of the blockade of Southern ports.

Although ordered by President Lincoln almost four months ago—on April 19—the blockade has been strictly a hit-or-miss affair so far,

due mostly to the inadequate supply of Union ships and sailors to man them. This week Welles and his chief aide, Gustavus F. Fox listed ten Southern ports that, they contended, must be patrolled constantly if efforts to choke rebel supply lines are to become effective. The cities cited were New Orleans; Galveston; Mobile; Pensacola; Norfolk; Charleston; Savannah; and Wilmington, New Bern and Wilmington in North Carolina.

At the time of Mr. Lincoln's order, the Navy had only 40 wooden ships—most of which were, and still are, on foreign station. In his recent appeal, Welles sought donation to the government of pleasure craft as well as tugboats and ferry boats, calling especially for shallow-draft vessels to patrol the tricky approaches to many of the target ports.

Recruiting efforts aimed at swelling the Union Navy, which numbered some 7,000 officers at the beginning of the war, also are continuing. An estimated 300 Southern-born Navy officers have quit to join the infant Confederate fleet.

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Angus Herds Now Accepted in Calf Association

Regular meeting of the membership of the Hereford Calf Association was held August 7 at Reno Township Hall. The membership present voted to accept membership of Angus herds. The amendment to the constitution so stated: "Any person, partnership or corporation whose herd of Angus breeding cattle consists of individuals of which all females are predominately of Angus breeding and sired by registered Angus bulls; and whose membership application has been accepted by the board of directors, may become a member of this association upon payment of the initial membership fees."

Wilton Finley, beef specialist from Michigan State University, met with the group to discuss improving the quality of calves for the October 19 sale. Finley encouraged the use of creep feeders to get calves on grain feed. He explained that the high moisture pasture the cattle are now on was not providing the total digestible nutrition that they need.

Finley also indicated that there will be approximately 8,300 head of cattle sold at the six Northern Michigan sales in the fall of 1961. The 17th annual Hereford Calf Association Sale at West Branch is expected to have consignments totaling nearly 1,800 head.

The meeting, conducted by President James Mielock, was attended by 49 members of the association.

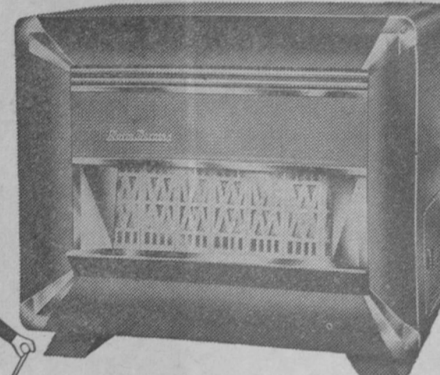

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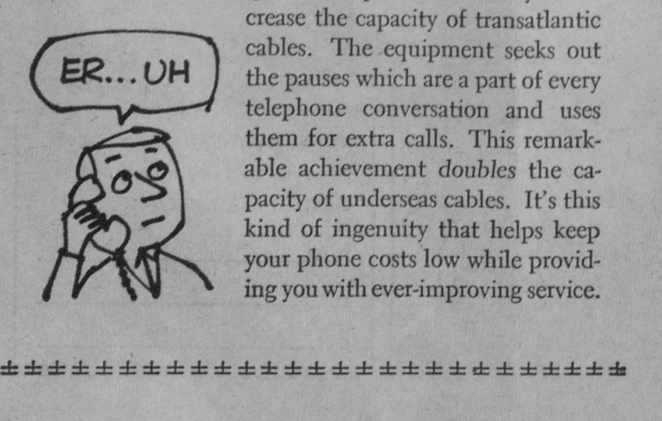

A legal notice advertising these items appears on page nine of this newspaper.

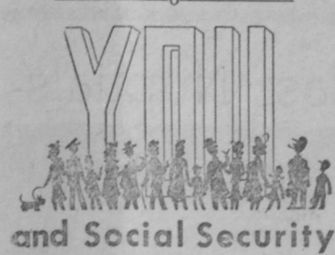
New, slightly used and old articles will be offered and several hundred buyers are expected to take advantage of the opportunity to obtain the merchandise at bargain rates.

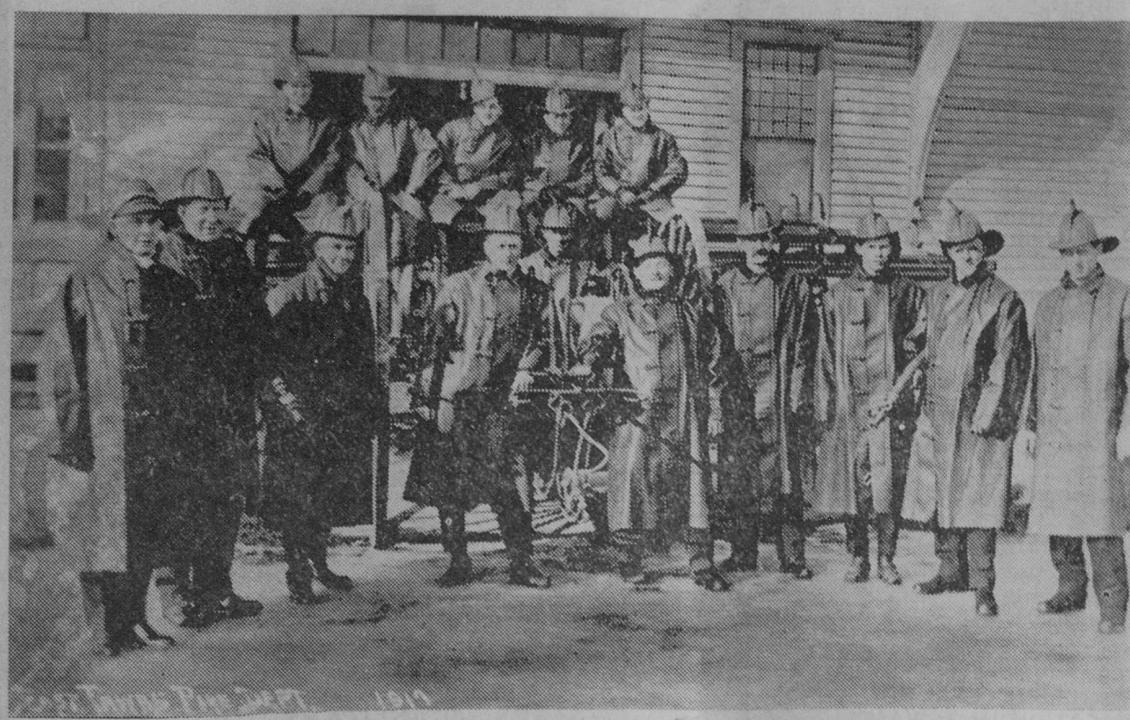

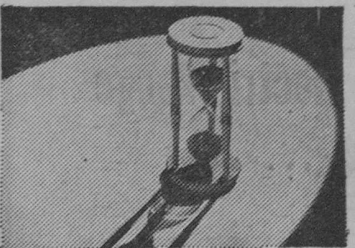

The new product to be handled by Mr. Webb in the counties of Iosco, Ogemaw, Alcona and Osceola is an entirely new approach to the universal problem of creating a clean bottom beach and maintaining it permanently.

Wading and swimming on a beach that is covered with muck and goo can be most repulsive; the cost of removing this organic matter with conventional large dredges and other big machinery can be very high.

To solve this difficulty without great expense, the Beach-Clean Dredge exchanges the slow speed of the costly systems for the slower pace of the "do-it-yourself" machine. Even so, the time required to clear the average size beach with an average depth of mucky matter is amazingly short according to the manufacturer. Moreover, it is the only system devised for the most common type of beach cleaning requirement, i. e., where there is a relatively thin layer of very light organic matter to be removed, leaving the underlying sand undisturbed. The Beach-Clean Dredge consists essentially of a foam filled platform supporting a gasoline engine driven high pressure pump. The latter supplies force to suck up muck, mushy goo, and vegetable matter, including loosened peat chunks, weeds and other small-sized rubbish and deliver it into either deep water or, depending on the model, up onto shore for disposal.

While the smallest dredge is capable of removing up to 20 cubic yards of material per hour, its cost is reported to be under \$600. The cost of operating it is a matter of pennies per hour. The design of the entire unit has been kept extremely compact so that it can be transported in a station wagon or the trunk of most cars. No special skill or brawn is required to set up the equipment.

Dealers in key locations will be appointed by Mr. Webb to handle the units.

Engineering Study Shows State Road Needs; Iosco's, Too

An engineering study showed this week that Michigan will have to spend an estimated 11 billion dollars between 1960 and 1980 to build new highways, modernize many existing ones and maintain them all.

The Michigan State Highway Department estimates existing sources of revenue will provide about 8.1 billion dollars for high-way purposes, leaving 2.9 billion dollars of additional funds needed to meet the 20-year needs.

A county-by-county breakdown of what it will take to meet the state's highway needs between 1960 and 1980 shows a figure of 59.6 million dollars for Iosco. This estimate includes cost of construction, maintenance and engineering on state, highways, county roads and city streets.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said three years of intensive work, costing an estimated \$500,000, went into the needs study. It entailed the most comprehensive analysis of motor vehicle traffic, population and economic conditions ever developed in Michigan for highway planning purposes.

Costs for other counties in this area include: Alcona, 40½ million dollars; Arenac, 60.2 million dollars; Ogemaw, 33.7 million dollars.

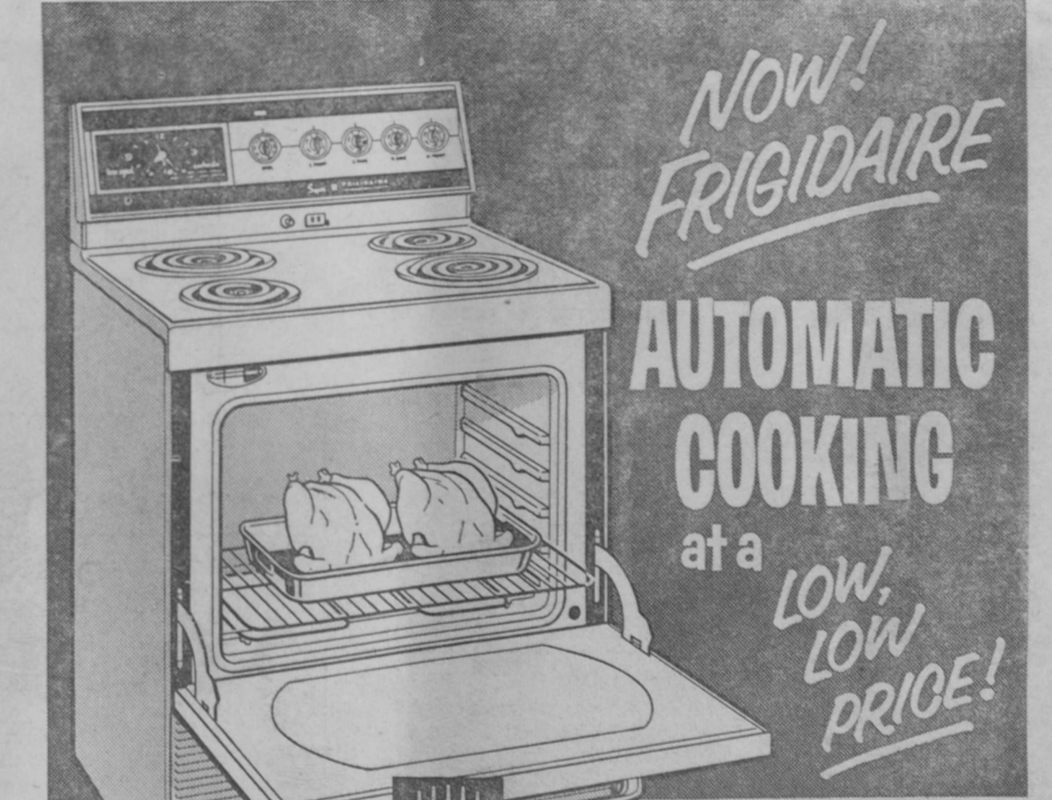
