



MILLAGE VOTE NEXT WEEK

Attention is called to the fact that electors of Tawas Area School District will again vote on a proposed three-mill tax levy which would provide funds for construction of new classroom facilities.

Losing by a narrow margin at the annual election July 10, the same two propositions are to be resubmitted to a vote of the people August 24.

It is again emphasized that this is a very important election . . . one in which all voters of the district should participate. Only 1,112 persons went to the polls in the last election. It was a very poor representation of voters.

The needs of the school district are important, inasmuch as they have a direct effect on the education and future of area children.

There is no question that classrooms of Tawas Area School District are overcrowded, particularly in the elementary grades. It will not be too long when summer vacation ends and this fact will be self-evident.

Existing school facilities here are able to handle 1,504 children without crowding. During the 1960-61 school year, there were 1,545 children crowded into these facilities. By 1969-70, the best possible estimates will see an enrollment of 1,873 children, or a 35 percent overcrowded condition.

This report is based on fact, not fiction. A census of preschool age and school age children is conducted every year by the county superintendent of school's office.

What is needed now is positive thinking on the part of school electors. Every person who is interested in the education and future welfare of his children should vote in this

This newspaper urges a favorable vote on the question of raising the debt limit and establishment of a sinking fund (three-mill tax levy over a period of five years) to finance this construction on the proposed pay-as-you-go plan.




