Kindell Brothers Win Exciting AuSable Race

The Kindell brothers of National City won Michigan's World Canoe Marathon Saturday edging the favorites, Ed Wojahn and Ralph Sawyer, by one minute and 55 seconds.

It was neck and neck all the way for the two teams vying for the \$1,200 purse. The dramatic finish came just before 6:20 p. m.

Larry Kindell, 27, and his brother, Vic, 31, completed the grueling 140-160-mile AuSable River course from Mio to Oscoda in nine hours, 49 minutes and 25 seconds. Wojahn and Sawyer made it in nine hours, 51 minutes and 20 seconds.

For the first time in the history of the marathon, the lead changed hands after canoes were well under way. This happened four times and the Kindells grabbed the front running slot in the back-

waters of Cooke Dam pond and were never headed.

After the last portage from the AuSable River to Lake Huron, Wojahn and Sawyer narrowed the gap to a little more than 100 yards.

Larry Kindell is a veteran of the marathon, having won with Steve Kolonich, Tawas City, as his partner in 1959. But this was the first time Vic has competed in four years. He started training for this race only two weeks ago.

Wojahn of East Tawas and Sawyer of Oscoda are both former champions, teaming up for the first time this year. They had won five Michigan events this season.

Even though this race was 100 miles shorter than previous marathons, it seemed tougher to the winners because they were pressed all the way. "It seemed about 900 miles to me," stated Larry Kindell while being interviewed at the finish line.

A large crowd was on hand for the dramatic finish in front of the Oscoda Township Park. At the last portage, the canoeists raced across the beach from the river to Lake Huron and battled rough water for about one mile.

The third place team, Rogers and Brown of Roseville, came in 23 minutes after the leaders with a time of 10 hours, 13 minutes, 10 seconds.

Others finishing in the money were: Tinkler and Peterson of Luce Ne, Quebec, and Minneapolis, Minnesota; Hohman and Furtaw, Oscoda; Cline and Champa, Virginia, Minnesota; McEachern and Crerar, Flin Flon, Manitoba; Batdorf and Crellin, AuSable; Steve Kolonich and his son, Gary, Tawas City, and Lancaster and Widing of Holly.

There were 25 canoe teams entered in the race, which started Saturday morning in the backwater of Mio Dam pond.

Prescott Elementary School will have a new principal, Raymond Ross, who previously was a teacher in that school.

Electors of Tawas Area School District will decide the fate of proposed additions to existing school facilities here at a special election tomorrow (Thursday).

Polls located at East Tawas, Tawas City, Tawas and Alabaster Townships will open at 7:00 a. m. and close at 8:00 p. m. Those residents so desiring absent voters' ballots had until Tuesday noon to obtain them from the board of education secretary.

Voters will be asked to approve two propositions, one to allow raising the district's debt limit and the other seeks approval of a three-mill tax levy for a period of five years.

While all registered voters may vote on the first proposition, only taxpayers are eligible to receive a ballot on the latter proposition.

A "yes" vote is needed on both

propositions in order to signify approval of voters.

If successful, the tax levy proposition would establish a sinking fund for construction of needed classrooms over a period of five years.

These are the same propositions which were submitted to voters at the annual school election July 10. Both lost by narrow margins.

Because of the importance of these questions to present and future needs of the school district, the board of education decided to resubmit the propositions to another vote of the people.

Should the two propositions receive a favorable vote Thursday, \$390,000 could be raised during the next five years to finance classroom additions on a pay-as-you-go basis.

This plan to finance construction

of classrooms was developed by the board of education, a Tawas Area Parent-Teacher Association study committee and local residents.

Need for the additional classroom space has been brought on by enrollment increases here during the past several years.

First stage under the pay-as-you-go plan would be to erect a six-classroom unit adjacent to the existing Tawas City gymnasium. This would be done in 1962.

Second stage would provide for the construction of a general purpose room and kitchen at the East Tawas unit and completion of the 10-room Tawas City elementary unit by the addition of four more classrooms. This could be accomplished by 1963-64.

The third stage would provide for the construction of a junior

high school unit and classroom addition at the high school building.

An extensive study of school requirements has shown that grades kindergarten through six at Tawas Area have 236 more pupils than the enrollment for those grades when the district consolidated in 1952-53.

The 1960-61 enrollment for these grades was 854. By 1970, enrollment will reach 924, according to available estimates which are based on census of preschool children.

Grades seven through 12 have seen an increase from 460 in 1952-53 to 691 in 1961. By 1970, the total will have reached 949.

The proposed pay-as-you-go plan allows construction of classrooms, according to the above mentioned three stages, as needs of the district arise.

Voters of East Tawas and all that territory of Baldwin Township east of Sections 19, 18, Seven and Six will cast their ballots at the East Tawas American Legion Hall. This comprises the First Precinct.

Second Precinct includes all of Tawas City and all school district territory in Wilber Township, Sections 19, 18, Seven and Six in Baldwin Township and all territory west of those sections in Baldwin Township. Polls are located at the Tawas City Hall.

Tawas Township Hall will be the polling place for voters of the Third Precinct, which includes Tawas, Grant and Sherman Townships.

Alabaster and Whitney Township voters will cast their ballots at the Alabaster Township Hall, Fourth Precinct polling place.

Youth Dies of 'Bends' While Scuba Diving

Death of a 12-year-old Birmingham boy, who was scuba diving in about 15 feet of water Sunday afternoon at Foote Dam basin west of Oscoda, was caused by the "bends" or pneumothorax.

David Allen Strawser, who was attending YMCA Camp Niskone at VanEtan Lake, was swimming with a group of three instructors, a counselor and seven other campers when the accident occurred.

David and scuba diving instructor, William Campbell, were using the buddy breathing system and had been under water for two or three minutes. Campbell had the air tank strapped to his back and the two took turns using the breathing apparatus.

Campbell told officers that the youth suddenly headed for the surface and he knew something was wrong. It took about a minute or so for Campbell to get the boy to shore where two forms of artificial respiration were attempted. The boy never regained consciousness.

After an investigation by Oscoda Township police officers and Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell, coroner E. D. Jacques ordered an autopsy to be performed on the body.

Performed at a Detroit hospital, the autopsy revealed that he had died of pneumothorax, or an accumulation of air in the oral cavity. Coroner Jacques said this could be caused by surfacing in the water too rapidly and can even happen at a depth of six feet.

He believed that the complete autopsy report would show air bubbles in the blood stream and possibly a burst lung.

The boy was the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Strawser.

Knobole League Pays Off Note

Robert Elliott Jr., president of the Tawas Knobole League, announced Monday that the junior baseball program has met its financial obligations this year.

Following Sunday night's all-star Pony League game, the league had enough money to pay off its note of \$1,200 at Peoples State Bank.

Total expenditure for the junior baseball program this summer was \$2,900.

Although the Pony League and nine-year-old teams have completed the baseball season, the Knobole League will hold a championship play-off game this Sunday, 2:00 p. m., at the East Tawas diamond. The season was officially completed August 14 but several rained out games must be played off this week to determine divisional leaders.

Ed Collier and Ron Priebe were named outstanding players of the Pony League during the all-star game Sunday night. This game saw the team managed by Leonard Goss and John Coyle defeat a team managed by Lyle Berry and Edward Sieloff, 6-5.

Council Shelves Talk on TC Electrical Ordinance

Discussion on a proposed electrical ordinance for Tawas City has been shelved for the time being by the city council.

A model ordinance obtained by City Attorney Jerry Cotter was presented at Monday night's regular meeting. This code had been obtained from a representative of Consumers Power Company and was similar to one in force at East Tawas.

Before the session ended, fault was found with many sections of the code and councilmen felt that if one was adopted it should be rewritten to fit the needs of this community.

Richard Lanski, local plumbing and heating contractor, attended the meeting and expressed the view that he would be in favor of the city establishing electrical standards and provide for inspection of work.

However, Lanski was definitely opposed to any clause in the code which would limit electrical work to those persons holding a state electrician's license.

"Any code that brings safety is good, but if you are going to hurt local workmen, it would not be good for the community," said Lanski. "The council has no legitimate reason to establish a code as stiff as this one... it would drive local workmen out of town."

Lanski said he had hired hundreds of furnace and felt he was well qualified for the work. He said that the plumbing and heating trade was compatible with electrical work and in order to perform a job a person had to have a knowledge of all three.

He said that such a code might be just the thing for a large city, but questioned whether Tawas City was large enough to warrant hiring a full-time electrical inspector.

This was about the same view taken by Mayor George Tuttle and the majority of councilmen.

Tuttle said that requiring a license would impose a hardship on many local workmen. He said it was designed for those doing contracting work and not those doing domestic work. "To require a man to have a state contractor's license is going a long way," said Tuttle.

Councilman Cecil Cabbie stated that in time Tawas City would need an electrical code. "Any house wired 20 years ago probably has overloaded circuits to-

day because of the increased use of electrical appliances," he said. Although it was stated that 90 percent of the trouble was caused by adding appliances to overloaded circuits, it was pointed out that any electrical ordinance would not control existing circuits.

Councilman Arthur Wegner, who originally brought up the subject about a year ago, said in a matter of time the state would require an electrical code. He felt the matter should be dropped until such time.

Police Seek Clues in Runaway Rail Car Crash at East Tawas

East Tawas City Police officers are seeking clues which may lead them to persons responsible for sending an unmanned railroad motor car into East Tawas Saturday night.

A motorized tamper car owned by the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company, which was parked near the Baldwin dump road, had been placed on the tracks and its throttle opened wide.

The car rolled through East Tawas about 11:35 p. m. traveling at a speed of about 15 miles per hour.

Police said that a group of local youths tried to stop it. A lever was pulled which released the tamper, causing the car to leave the tracks. One boy was severely cut and treated at Tawas Hospital.

Schaaf Lumber Office Hit by Burglars Sat.

Breaking and entering of the Schaaf Lumber Company office sometime Saturday night is being investigated by state police.

Entry was gained to the rear shop and storage area of the building through an unlocked window. A door leading into the office was forced open.

Papers which were kept in an unlocked safe were dumped on the floor and office desks were rifled. About \$25 in change was taken from the cash register.

Council to Occupy Space When Library Vacates

Plans for converting space at the city hall presently occupied by the library into city offices were discussed at Monday night's meeting of the city council.

At the last meeting, the council authorized leasing the Buch Building for library use. The library is to move into these quarters next month.

Tentative plans submitted by City Superintendent Reginald Bubblitz call for removing a temporary partition which separates the present council chamber from the library. This was installed when the library was moved into the city hall a number of years ago.

City offices would be moved to the front of this room. A counter would be located near the front entrance where water bills would be paid and other city business transacted.

Rear portion of the room would be used for council meetings. This would allow a larger gathering of persons who wish to attend meetings.

A concrete block partition would be removed in the fire hall, which presently serves as a corridor to reach the city office and council chamber. This would allow parking three fire trucks side by side.

Tawas City is to receive delivery on its new fire truck sometime in September.

Also discussed was the possibility of purchasing new office furniture and converting the lawn in front of the building into a parking lot.

Saginaw Man Had Close Call in Boat

A 36-year-old Saginaw man, who was thrown from his speedboat near the mouth of the Whitney Drain Saturday night, nearly drowned before he could be rescued by residents on shore.

Elmore L. Sink, an electrical contractor, regained consciousness while being rushed by ambulance to Tawas Hospital.

Witnesses said that Sink was operating his boat at a high speed. Traveling in circles, the boat hit its own wake and Sink was thrown into the water.

Residents on shore were unable to rescue Sink for several minutes because the boat was making circles around the victim at full throttle. The boat finally grounded itself on shore.

Artificial respiration was applied until an ambulance arrived with a respirator.

Last Sunday, Mr. and Mrs. White and an East Tawas couple were picking berries near Oscoda. One of them looked down and spotted a 28-inch-long rattlesnake. VOTE 'YES' THURSDAY!

Voters of Tawas Area School District will have an opportunity tomorrow (Thursday) to vote on a proposition which would provide adequate facilities for the education of their youngsters. This election is important—you are urged to vote—call your friends and neighbors and bring them to the polls with you!

The same two propositions which were defeated at the July 10 annual election are being resubmitted at this time. One reason for this defeat was the apparent lack of interest shown by many parents... and who should be more interested in schools than parents?

Only 1,112 persons went to the polls in the last election. Combined total of registered voters in the four precincts is about 3,500. Each proposition lost by 10 votes or less.

What more need be said. The success or failure of this election rests on the shoulders of parents and others who are interested in the education of this community's children.

Considerable time and effort has gone into developing a plan which would provide needed classroom facilities to meet present and future needs of the school district.

This pay-as-you-go plan is a good one. It will meet the needs of the district as they arise and will actually amount to a substantial savings over what would be required for a general obligation bond issue.

There is no question that classrooms of Tawas Area School District are overcrowded, particularly in the elementary grades at present.

Existing school facilities are able to handle 1,504 children without crowding. During the 1960-61 school year, there were 1,545 children crowded into these facilities. By 1969-70, the estimated enrollment will be 1,873 children, or a 35 percent overcrowded condition.

The three-stage construction program is designed to meet these needs, as well as for providing the complete isolation of junior high grades from the senior high school.

This newspaper supports action of the board of education in resubmitting the question to a vote of the people. It urges you to vote "YES" on both propositions.

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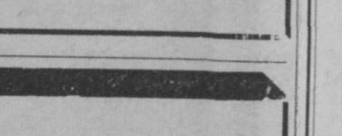

AF Recovery Sqdn. Now in Operation

The new 9506th Air Force Reserve Recovery Squadron, established July 1 for the Tri-City area, has gone into operation and is presently 35 percent manned, according to Lt. Col. John L. McGowan, squadron commander.

Temporarily the unit is operating out of the Saginaw Air Reserve Center, 1210 Court Street, Saginaw, but will move physically to Tri-City Airport as soon as suitable quarters can be found at the airport, McGowan said.

Mission of the unit is to provide recovery assistance for the air force throughout the nation in event of attack. Specifically, the local unit is charged with preparing Tri-City Airport to serve as a safe landing site for USAF or Allied aircraft returning from missions and to provide necessary service to prepare the aircraft for take off and return to a military base or for continued missions.

October 15 has been set as target date for the 9506th to be ready to recover a military aircraft, McGowan said.

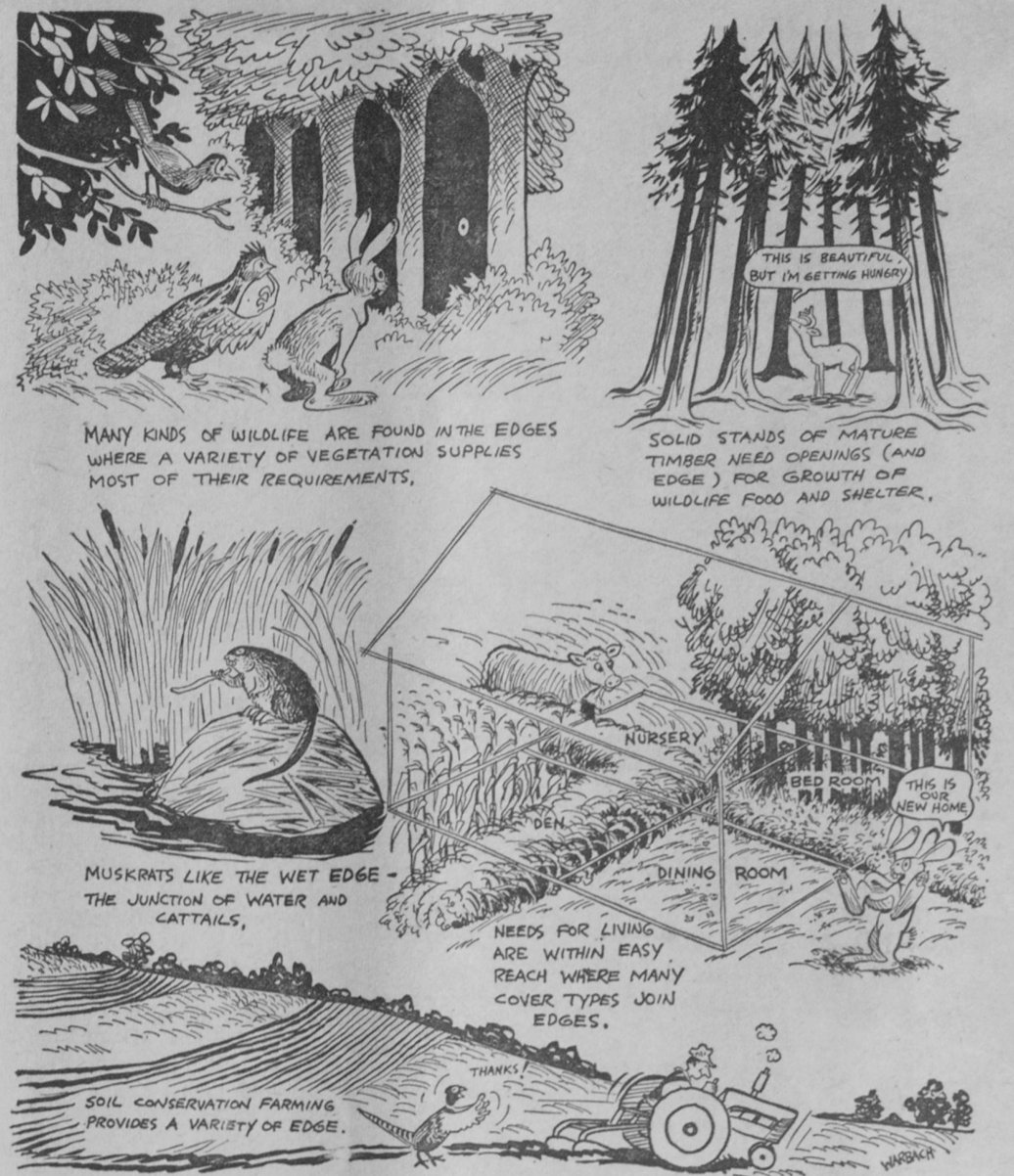
Among those presently assigned to the unit is Capt. John A. Alexander of Tawas City, who holds the position of communications officer in the 9506th AFRR Squadron.

McGowan noted that two officer vacancies still exist in the squadron. Needed are a first lieutenant qualified as information officer and a major qualified as a flight surgeon.

Enlisted vacancies include 60 positions covering all ranks and a wide variety of specialties; such as, fire fighting, communications, information, medical, decontamination, administrative, supply and electronic maintenance.

Only personnel with previous military service and with training in the various required specialties can take part in the new program at present, McGowan said.

The National Safety Council says: Be sure your windshield wiper blades and arms are in perfect condition. You need one ounce of arm pressure for each inch of rubber blade length to sweep off rain or road spray, instead of sliding over it and causing poor visibility.

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Changes in Law Enforcement Laws Effective in Sept.

Several amendments affecting law enforcement which were enacted during the 1961 session of the state legislature go into effect next month.

One important change is that when lighted lamps and illuminated devices are required, no vehicle shall be operated upon any highway of the state with only the parking lights illuminated.

Another change is that any person who sells or furnishes to any minor under the age of 18, without first having procured the written consent of the parent or guardian of the minor, any bulk gunpowder, dynamite, blasting caps or nitroglycerin is guilty of a misdemeanor.

Any person who breaks or enters into any coin operated telephone or a coin device attached to or an integral part thereof for the purpose of stealing or unlawfully removing any money, if in so doing such person breaks, tears, cuts or otherwise damages any part of the telephone or coin

device is guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$200 or by imprisonment for not more than one year, or both.

No person shall operate on any waterway, a motorboat having in tow or otherwise assisting a person on water skis, water sled, aquaplane or other similar contrivance, unless there is in such motorboat, in addition to the operator, at least one competent person in a position to observe the progress of the person being towed.

An amendment to the probate code provides that the age of a person at the time of committing an offense determines what court has jurisdiction.

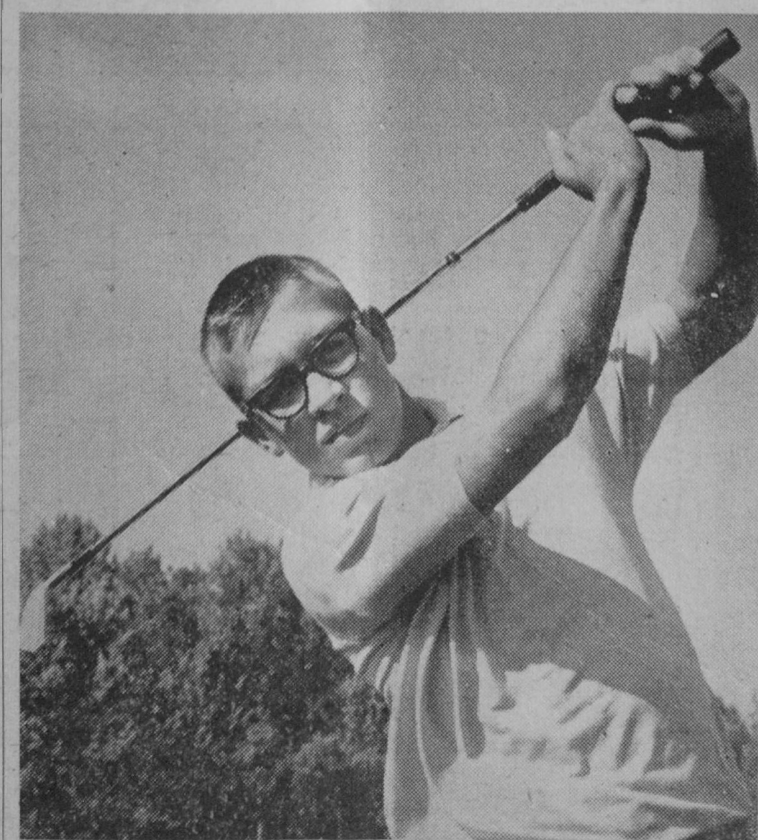

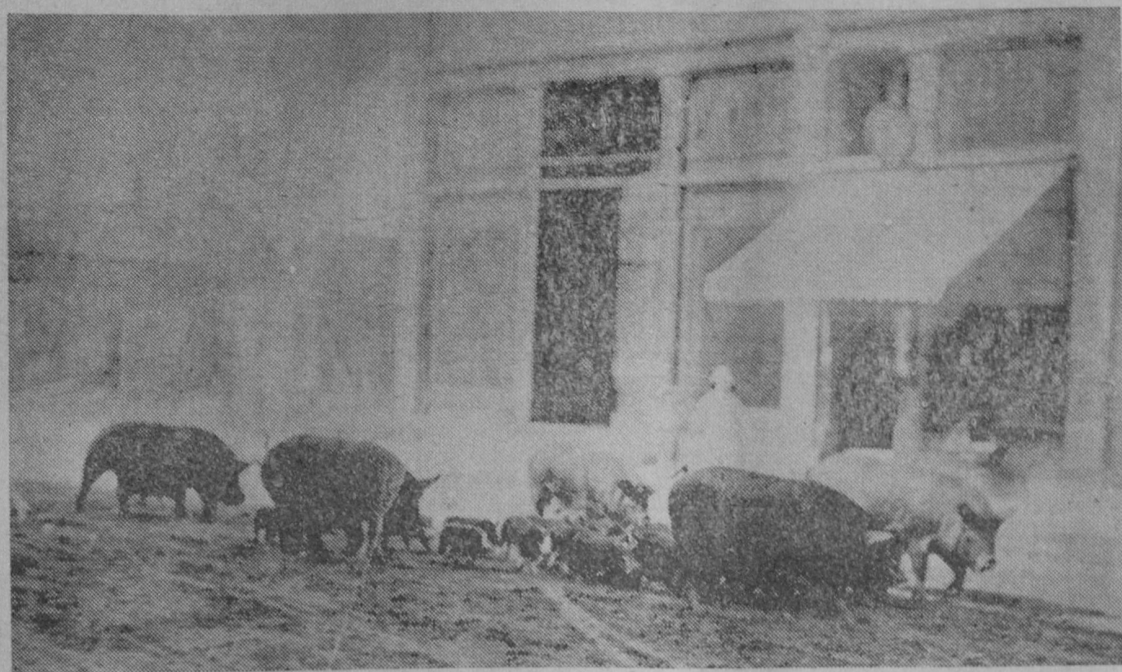

Wheat Producers May Cast Ballots on Quota Referendum

Wheat producers eligible to vote in the 1962 wheat marketing quota referendum to be held August 24 may cast their ballots at the ASC County Office, Room 203, Federal Building, East Tawas, according to Burton A. Partlo, chairman, Iosco County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Growers eligible to vote in the referendum are those who produced more than 13.5 acres of wheat in any one of the years 1959, 1960 or 1961. Producers who signed applications under the feed wheat provisions permitting them to grow wheat for feed use only on their farms for 1961 will not be eligible to vote.

The results of the referendum will determine the kind of wheat program that will be in effect for next year's crop. For this reason, every wheat producer should make his wishes known by casting his ballot at the polling place for the county.

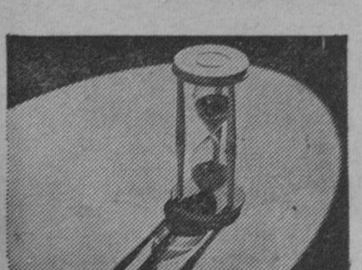

Even Supervisors Can't Agree on State Con-Con Problems

When 17 men from one county can not agree on proposed changes to Michigan's constitution, how can 144 delegates from many counties come to an agreement at a constitutional convention?

This question was uppermost in the thoughts of members of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors following Wednesday's regular monthly meeting.

The discussion on con-con came about when County Clerk George Prescott told supervisors he needed help in filling out a questionnaire prepared by the state clerk's association.

He handed a copy of the four-page document to each member of the board. Before the meeting ended, Prescott said he would fill out his own questionnaire and return it to the association.

Stating that the discussion was not a part of the board's official minutes, Prescott revealed that the board of supervisors was split on most of the important issues.

The board, by a wide majority, favored electing members to the state house of representatives on a population basis. The real shocker to proponents of "equal representation for rural areas in the senate" came when the board was split down the middle on the question of electing members to the senate on a population basis.

"One of the members nearly flipped when the board voted nearly 50-50 on this question," said Prescott. One member declared that if this was the attitude of delegates from other areas, it would mean the end of representation in the senate for Northern Michigan.

The question of an unicameral house (one body) lost by a narrow margin. Members of the board also felt that provisions of the constitution for election of state officers should remain as is.

As could be expected from a rural county, the board felt that provisions governing townships should remain as is. The vote on this question was 17-0.

The board also felt that townships with high population should have more representation on boards of supervisors.

Council Would OK Trailer Park If It Meets City Rules

After considerable discussion concerning an inquiry about establishing a new trailer park here, it appeared Monday night as though the city council might look favorably toward such a park which was properly set up and regulated.

An East Tawas real estate broker notified the council that he had a client interested in establishing a trailer park on property between Sheehan's Sinclair Service and Nielsen's Bayside Cottages on US-23.

This property is zoned commercial and, if allowed, the property would probably have to be rezoned to industrial or a change made in the zoning code.

Mayor George Tuttle said that the council should determine whether the ordinance would allow such a park and that it should require the owner to submit plans for approval before ever allowing construction.

The consensus of opinion was that the property was suitable for a trailer park and that one was needed here. However, it was stated that such a trailer park should meet the rigid specifications and regulations of what the city would allow and not what the state would permit.

Councilman Cecil Cabbie said that he had seen numerous trailer parks in Florida and some in Michigan, but he declared that he had never seen one in this state which would be an attraction to a community.

Gets Jail Sentence on Two Counts

A 23-year-old East Tawas man, charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor and simple larceny, was sentenced to 90 days in jail Friday by Justice of the Peace Frank Berzhinski.

After investigation of several larcenies at the state park, police charged that Robert Martineau had arranged meetings between four juveniles, two boys and two girls.

When questioned by officers, the juveniles said they would slip out of their homes after midnight and meet at the rear of a trampoline lot managed by Martineau. After that they would all go down to the state park to see what they could steal from campers.

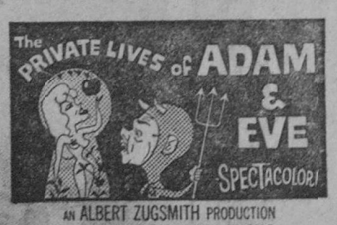

Notices calling attention to the need to register with Selective Service have recently been sent to all high schools in Iosco County for posting on bulletin boards. Similar notices were sent some time ago to all post offices in the county. The notices read as follows:
