Burglars Busy in Iosco Over Holiday Week-End

Burglars were busy in the Northeastern Michigan area over the Christmas holiday. Three breakings and enterings were reported Tuesday morning to local law enforcement agencies. It was reported that several other break-ins are under investigation in Arenac County. Burglars entered the Fuerst and Charters Store at Whittemore sometime over the week-end. Arden Charters, one of the two owners, said that a safe had been dragged into the back part of the hardware and pried open by burglars. This attempt was unsuccessful as the firm had deposited its cash in the bank before the holiday. However, burglars did get away with between \$40 and \$50 in cash from a cash register. Charters said that entry into the building was made by breaking out a rear window. The grocery portion of the building had not been disturbed. He said that burglars had evidently worked several hours in order to crack the safe. Investigating were Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell and Detective LeRoy McCluer of the Michigan State Police Post, East Tawas. Also burglarized were the Arenac Eastern High School, Twining, and the Self Serve Laundry, 224 Newman Street, East Tawas. Only last Friday, Sgt. Frank Roti, commander of the Michigan State Police Post at East Tawas, predicted that there would be several breakings and enterings reported come Tuesday morning. He said that when buildings are left unattended for several days, the chances for burglary increases. He urges area school authorities, in particular, to maintain closer supervision of buildings over week-ends and holidays. He cited recent break-ins at Standish, Sterling, West Branch, Houghton Lake and other area schools as the reason for his warning against the rising incidence of burglary or vandalism. At Houghton Lake, for example, several hundred dollars was stolen from the school office. Burglars made entry into two locked offices by hammering their way through concrete block walls above metal doors. He said that it would be well for school authorities to make periodic inspections over the week-ends, rearrange hours of custodians so as to have someone in buildings during the night, or by maintaining a watchman.

In Lapeer Fire— Burns Fatal to John R. Rood, Retired Atty.

John Romain Rood, 93, died in Lapeer County General Hospital Saturday night of burns received December 19 in a fire in his 12-room home at Lapeer. The fire started when a blazing log rolled from the fireplace onto the floor. Fire blocked all three stairways in the home and firemen had to reach Mr. Rood through an upstairs bedroom window. A retired Detroit attorney, Mr. Rood was regarded as one of the wealthiest men in Lapeer County. His father died when Mr. Rood was a child. His mother was left with five children to rear. Mr. Rood sold apples at the Grand Trunk station in Detroit to pay his way through high school. Then he donned a peddler's pack of notions and worked his way through the University of Michigan, where he was graduated in 1891. Mr. Rood returned to the university in 1898 as a professor and taught there until 1918. He was author of many law texts still in use and was perhaps best known for his work in drafting the legislation setting a 15-mill limitation on property tax. He was also author of several books concerning the United States Constitution. His ornate, 100-year home in Lapeer was a landmark, located at the intersection of M-21 and Saginaw Street. Mr. Rood came to Tawas City about 1912 where he purchased several hundred acres of farm land along Townline Road. He established the Rood Ranch here and engaged in the growing of livestock and practiced general farming. Mr. Rood is survived by a daughter, Dr. Marion B.; a son, Royal D.; a sister, Miss Mabel, and a brother, the Rev. Dwight A. Services will be held at 2:00 p. m. Wednesday (today) at the Baird Funeral Home at Lapeer, with burial in Lapeer's Stiles Cemetery.

Embezzlement Charge Heard by Iosco Co. Jury

Jury trial of Joseph K. Wilson, who is charged with embezzlement, went into its third day Tuesday in Iosco County Circuit Court. The trial had been adjourned Friday by Judge Allan C. Miller until after the Christmas holiday. Wilson was charged February 19, 1960, with the alleged embezzlement of an unknown amount of funds from the Oscoda office of Dobson Cartage Company, Bay City. On complaint of James Dobson, owner, a warrant was authorized by former prosecuting attorney, Paul Harvey. The trial was later delayed because of a technicality which arose out of a justice court arraignment. In this case, Wilson is specifically charged with the alleged embezzlement of two checks, one being issued by the United States Treasury. Prosecution of the case is being handled by Robert Goussey, assistant attorney general. Attorney F. Duane Ross of Oscoda represents Wilson.

Jerry, the 10-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Survant, exhibited "Sambo," a fourth place Angus steer at the show, and "Dumbo," a Hereford Angus cross steer that placed eighth among 54 entries in his class. The first place herdsman-ship award was made on the basis of Jerry's neat and trim appearance of the two steers while on exhibit in the coliseum other than the show ring. Jerry is a member of the "Stardusters" 4-H Club of Burleigh Township.

Radio Station Owner Loses Federal License

The Federal Communications Commission December 20 revoked the license of Roger S. Underhill for operation of radio station WIOS in Tawas City-East Tawas. The commission said its action was based on Underhill's waiver of a hearing on charges stemming from an application for another radio station. He was president and holder of 25 percent of the stock of Capitol Broadcasting Company, which sought a license for a new standard station at East Lansing. The commission found Underhill guilty of "misrepresentations, lack of candor and other disqualifications" in connection with the Capitol application, rejected by the commission September 7, 1960.

Two Wurtsmith Officers Killed in Jet Plane Crash

Two Wurtsmith Air Force Base fliers died in a crash of their T-33 jet trainer plane near Danville, Virginia, Friday night. Dead are Capt. Richard E. Pierce, 27, of Mexico, New York, the pilot, and Capt. Arch V. Bracher, 32, Westfield, New Jersey, co-pilot, both of the 445th Fighter Interceptor Squadron. The crash, a mile east of the Danville Municipal Airport, came as the men attempted to land their plane. The body of one man was thrown from the wreckage while the other was in the flaming plane. Firemen doused the plane with foam but it continued to burn more than two hours. A witness at the P. Lorillard Company plant near Danville reported he saw a ball of fire in the sky shortly before the crash. The airport tower had no knowledge of the crash until informed by residents of the area. The men had left Wurtsmith at 5:20 p. m. enroute on a scheduled navigation mission to Seymour Johnson Air Force Base at Goldsboro, North Carolina. Captain Pierce lived at Wurtsmith with his wife, Kathryn, and two children, Nancy, one, and David, three months. Captain Bracher lived at Oscoda with his wife, Joyce, and a daughter, Susan, one. An investigation team began its job of determining the cause of the crash Saturday.

Police Urge Extra Caution Over the New Year Holiday

Emphasizing that the increased drinking and fatigue which accompany New Year's partying add to traffic dangers, the Michigan State Police in preparing for the holiday patrol urge motorists and pedestrians to take extra precautions during the 78-hour week-end. "The New Year is an appropriate time to resolve that, whenever you drive or walk, you will do all that you can to avoid being involved in an accident," said Commissioner Joseph Childs. "Full attention to the safety rules, in cooperation with law enforcement patrols, can help hold the line on the holiday toll." The state police will operate increased patrols from noon Friday, December 29, to midnight Monday, January 1, assisted during part of that time by 106 members of the National Guard. Maximum patrol coverage will be in effect from 1:00 p. m. Sunday, December 31, to 6:30 a. m. New Year's Day, the hours when most year-end celebrating is being done. Seventeen persons were killed in traffic mishaps in the 78-hour New Year's period a year ago, an average of one death every four hours and 35 minutes.

City's Bid of \$2,800 Accepted for Surplus Road Grader

The City of Tawas City was successful bidder on a surplus road grader offered for sale by the United States Forestry Department at its Cadillac headquarters. Tawas City's successful bid was \$2,800. There were 40 bids entered for the equipment. This grader had been used by local forestry department crews in the Huron National Forest until about two months ago when it was taken to Cadillac for emergency purposes. Last year, the city was unsuccessful in its bid on a similar piece of equipment which was offered as surplus. Both Mayor George Tuttle and Reginald Publitz, superintendent of public works, said that the equipment would prove to be very useful in Tawas City's road program and also for snow removal during the winter months.

Congress Unleashes "Watchdogs"

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Dec. 20—Congress today organized a Joint Committee on the Conduct of War, instructing its members to investigate everything from graft and corruption in the services to ineptness in field command.

Creation of the seven-man watchdog committee—most of whom are Republican anti-slavery element leaders—followed growing alarm over the slow progress of the Union Army in the first eight months of its \$1.5 million-a-day-war with the Confederacy.

Named chairman was Sen. Benjamin Franklin Wade of Ohio, 61-year-old son of a Revolutionary War soldier and a member of Congress since 1851.

Other members are Sens. Zachariah Chandler of Michigan, Lyman Trumbull of Illinois and Andrew Johnson of Tenn.; and Reps. D. W. Gooch, G. W. Julian, John Covode and Moses F. Odell.

SEN. WADE brings to his powerful new post a history of outspoken and often stormy debate on the Senate floor on the anti-slavery issue.

He is a former school-teacher and was county attorney of Ashtabula County, Ohio, before coming to Washington.

Chandler moved from his native New England to Detroit, Mich., where he opened a dry-goods store that quickly made him a millionaire. A founder of the Republican party, he was elected to the senate in 1857.

Trumbull defeated President Lincoln in the 1856 Senate race in Illinois. In that state, he also served as a legislator, secretary of state and supreme court justice.

Sen. Johnson, only representative of the loyal South on the committee, is a former governor of Tennessee and a vociferous speaker against slavery. He is a one-time tailor.

Medal of Honor

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Dec. 21—President Lincoln today signed into law a Congressional bill authorizing a supreme decoration—the Medal of Honor—for valorous members of the armed forces.

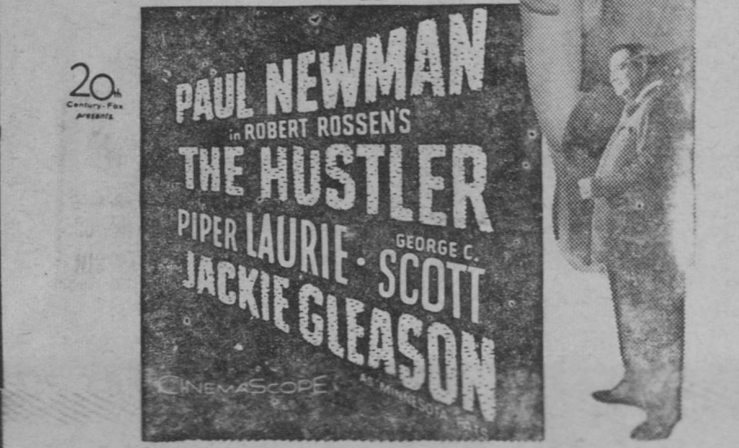
