Base to Have New First-Class Post Office

Wurtsmith will have a first-class post office operated by federal employees in the very near future, if present plans are realized.

Last week Lt. Walter Casey, base postal officer, met with I. D. Rosheim, post office department inspector, to discuss Wurtsmith's existing and future postal needs.

Mr. Rosheim was very pleased with the present postal operation but is anxious to see a classified postal branch for the base. A classified postal branch is one that receives mail direct from other points. At the present time, all base mail comes into the Oscoda post office, is sorted and then trucked to the base.

The first step in giving the base a classified mail room will

be taken this month when a full-time civilian postal employee will be assigned to the mail room to sell postal money orders and stamps. In the past, this service has only been available three hours each day.

After Wurtsmith attains status as a classified mail room, postal deliveries will be made to the Capehart and on-base housing projects by civilian mail carriers, according to Lieutenant Casey.

The new 4,000 box mail room was recently opened in the building that formerly housed the of-ficers dining hall. It was moved to this location last Friday by SSgt Benny Everett, Alc Charles Leach, A2c Anthony Kopecky and

A3c Darrell Sykes. There were long lines on opening day as box holders waited to receive their new box combinations, but these lines, said Lieutenant Casey, will become a thing of the past at the post of-


