WINTER SPORTS CARNIVAL LOOMS

'Good' Snowstorm Would Improve Silver Valley Area

Picturesque Silver Valley, in the heart of the Huron National Forest, will be the locale this week-end for the 24th annual Tawas winter sports carnival. While snow conditions have been far from ideal this far this year at the 550-acre park; in fact, there is very little "silver" in Silver Valley at the present time, winter sports officials optimistically hope for a good snowfall before carnival-time.

Last year, the winter sports committee decided to discontinue the selection of a queen to reign over winter sports activities. "We found, however, that our down-state visitors considered the selection of a queen and coronation ball as an important function of winter sports activities and so we have reinstated this to the

will be provided by the Merry Maes of Bay City. Dancing will be from 9 to 12:30 o'clock, with crowning of the queen scheduled for 10 o'clock.

Judges for selecting the queen will be Merridew, Ron Gamble of Greenbush, former WJR staffer and presently with the Michigan Outdoors television program, and Virgil O'Dell, sports director of WJEM-Television, Bay City.

Final plans for the gala week-end were made Monday night by the winter sports committee. It was emphasized that reservations for the perch fry may be made by telephoning the chamber of commerce office or the Holland Hotel. More than 200 persons, both men and women, are expected to attend this affair. A cocktail hour starts at 6:00 p. m. and perch fry at 7:30 p. m. Activities at Silver Valley Saturday and Sunday will include ski racing, tobogganing, ice skating, horse and cutter rides and other snow sports.

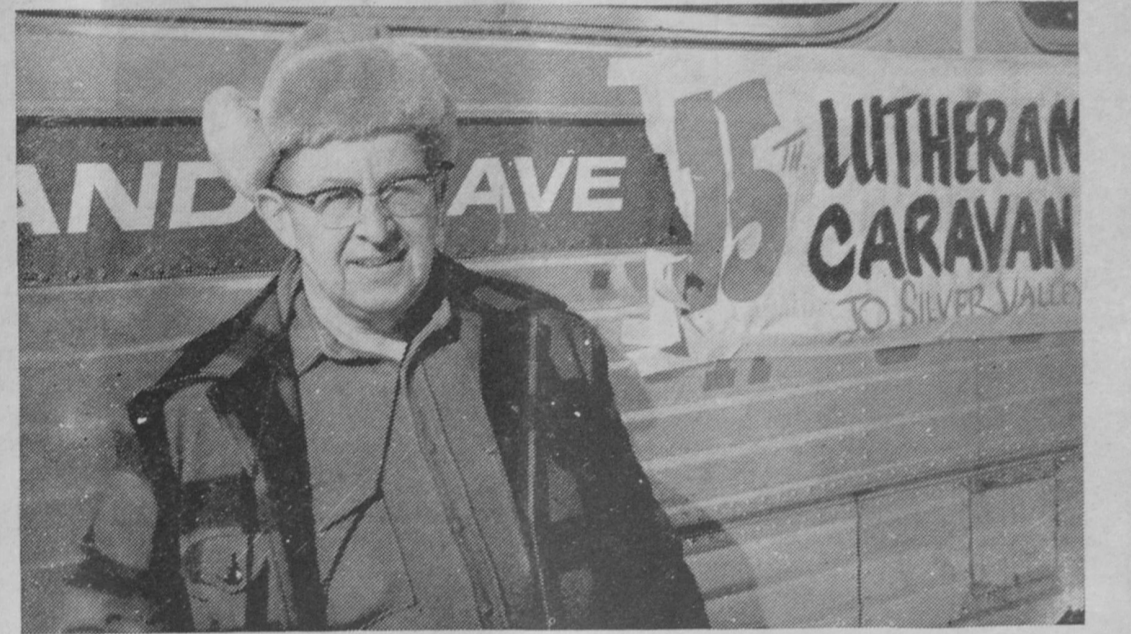
If snow conditions do not improve, the ski area will be closed for safety reasons.

Sunday's program will feature ski demonstrations by local enthusiasts, weather permitting. On hand for the festivities will be Chief Red Cloud, a Chippewa Indian, in all of his colorful regalia.

This program is to conclude at 3:00 p. m. in order to allow time for visitors to return to East Tawas to view the ice skating show.

The Tawas City American Legion will operate the large warming shelter and food concession in the main toboggan area and the East Tawas American Legion will have charge of the ski area food concession.

Architect Starts Long-Range Study of School Facilities

A preliminary survey on how to utilize present facilities and where future construction might best serve Tawas Area School was started Thursday by the Bay City architectural firm of Brysslebout, Starke and Hacker.

In charge of the initial study was Miss Rosalyn Gackstetter, a graduate of Tawas City high school and now a member of the architectural firm. Miss Gackstetter, a 1957 graduate of the University of Michigan, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rollie Gackstetter.

First step in preparing the survey, which is to be used for counseling the board of education, was to check blueprints of existing elementary school facilities in Tawas City, East Tawas and Alabaster.

With this information, the architectural firm is to make a layout for each of the existing

school buildings showing how they can be utilized in the overall educational program, along with estimated costs of construction and renovation.

In addition, the architect was supplied with the enrollment statistics along with charts showing location of families with children in the school district and where these children presently attend school.

Supt. Reynold Mick said Monday that some of the questions to be considered include extension of the junior high wing at the main

school building on M-55, whether it is feasible to renovate the Alabaster unit, or build classroom additions on the Tawas City or East Tawas units.

"All of these questions and more will have to be given considerable study before the board of education can make any decision on future expansion of school plant facilities," said Superintendent Mick.

"The object of this survey is to develop long-ranged planning to handle the needs of the district in the years to come," Mr. Mick stated. "Much emphasis is being placed on determining the best possible means of utilizing our present buildings, how they fit into our instruction program and what the cost will be for such expansion."

No specific date has been set for completion of work by the architect.

Former Tawas Man Gassed in Well Pit

William R. Leslie, a field superintendent for the Consolidated Gas Company at Reed City, was rushed to a Big Rapids hospital last Wednesday after being overcome by gas fumes.

Leslie, a former Tawas City man, was working with two other men in the pit of a closed well at the Austin Field near Big Rapids.

He was overcome by fumes which had settled at the bottom of the pit and was unconscious when admitted to the hospital, where he is still confined. He is making slow progress toward recovery.

An employee of the gas company for the past 15 years, he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Leslie of Tawas City and attended high school here.

Tawas Principal to Attend NASSP Conclave at Detroit

Ernest Jordan Jr., principal of Tawas Area High School, will be among 650 Michigan secondary school principals who will attend the annual conference of the National Education Association, School Principals in Detroit's Cobo Hall, February 11-15.

This will be the first time that the NASSP, a department of the National Education Association, has convened nationally in Michigan since its organization some 45 years ago.

Themed "Individual Competence and the National Welfare," the conference is expected to attract a record attendance of more than 7,000 secondary school principals from throughout the nation.

Noted national authorities will spotlight two key issues effecting secondary education: The college admissions squeeze ahead and a report on testing projects of the NASSP.

Some 26 group discussions will center around such topics as supervision, curriculum, student activities, scholarship programs, grouping, junior high organization, testing programs, secondary school programs and developments in science, mathematics, modern foreign languages and English language arts.

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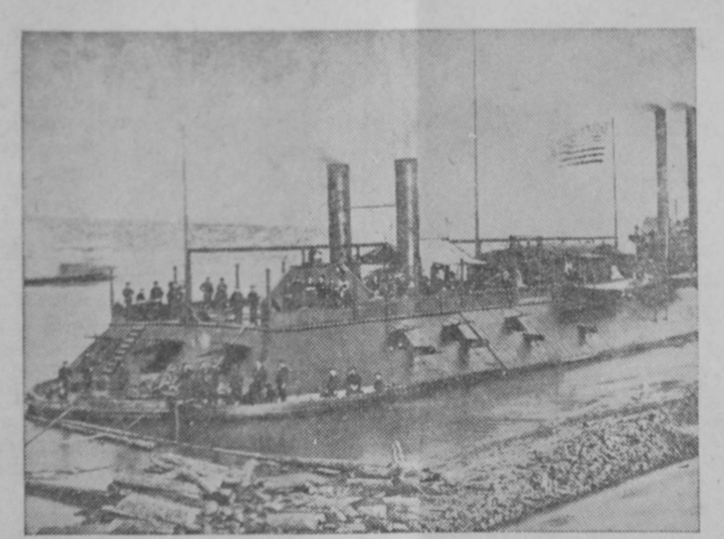

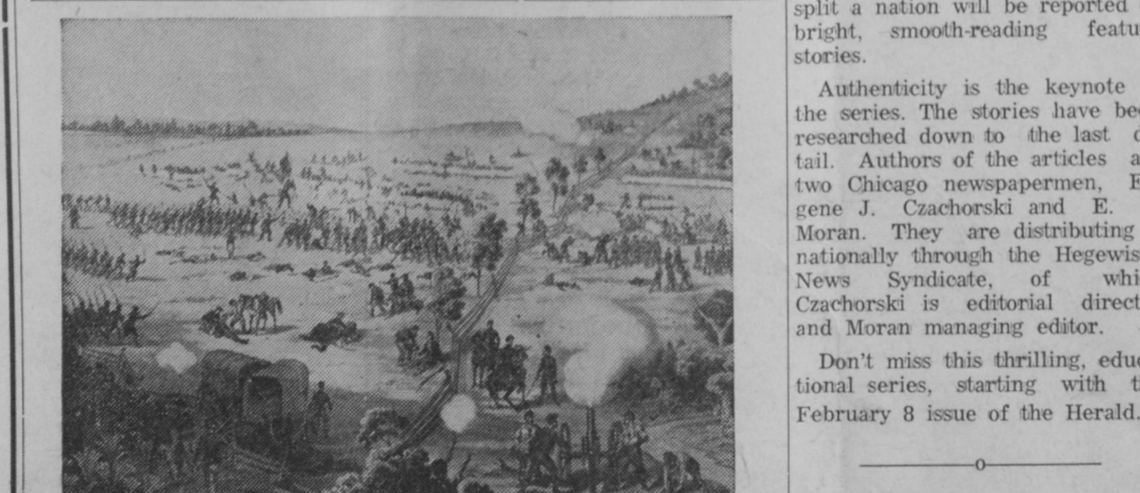

Iosco Residents Buy 99.1 Percent of Savings Bond Quota

Combined purchases of series E and H United States savings bonds by residents of Iosco County were \$322,209 in 1960, equivalent to 99.1 percent of the treasury-assigned quota of \$325,000, it was announced today by John E. Hosbach, chairman of the county savings bond committee.

The 1960 total compared with \$300,402 in 1959.

Hosbach reported the county savings bonds sales goal for 1961 has been set at \$334,000.

Combined E and H purchases of \$25,043,000 throughout the state during December brought the Michigan total for the year to 262.67 million dollars, according to Delmar V. Cote, state director for the treasury's United States Savings Bonds division.

December E bond buying in Michigan amounted to 22.8 million dollars, up 18.9 percent over the same 1959 month, while H bond purchases of \$2,233,000 were 22.7 percent below the 2.89 million dollars bought by Michiganders in December 1959.

For the entire year, Michigan E bond purchases totaled \$238,670,000 or 5.7 percent more than in 1959. The investment in series H bonds for 1960 was 24 million dollars, an increase of 2.8 percent over the 1959 amount.

Cote reported 1960 purchases in Michigan were equivalent to 97.4 percent of the year's quota of 269.6 million dollars.

"Although we naturally are somewhat disappointed not to have attained our sales goal," he said, "it is gratifying that we came nearer to achievement of quota in 1960 than in any of the three previous years. In 1959, sales amounted to 81 percent of the goal; in 1958 and 1957, the percentages were 86.4 and 92.8, respectively."
