

Tell Details of Proposed Fire Protection Contract

Details of a proposed fire protection contract between Tawas City, Alabaster and Tawas Townships were revealed this week by Mayor George Tuttle.

A meeting to discuss the proposal was held last Friday. Attending were Tuttle, Supervisor Henry Oates of Alabaster, Supervisor Glenn Long of Tawas and City Attorney Jerry Cotter.

Improvement of fire protection to the two outlying districts and determination of a more equal method of defraying the cost has been under consideration for some time. A preliminary meeting between the three areas was held last fall.

"The present idea for better fire protection is to get the equipment necessary to do a good job," said Tuttle.

Necessary equipment at this time consists of one new, fully-equipped 600-gallon truck, similar to the one owned by Tawas Township. The present Tawas City truck would be converted from a pumper to a combination pumper and 500-gallon tanker.

"The biggest hindrance to firemen when fighting township fires is the lack of water," said Tuttle. "With this equipment, each township fire call could be answered with 1,700 gallons of water and four operating high pressure hoses."

Under the present set-up, township fires are answered with 300 gallons of water and two hoses. With the time loss traveling to a township fire, this could mean the difference in saving or losing a building.

According to a letter sent to the township boards, Tawas City is bearing almost the total cost of furnishing fire protection to the townships. Cost of the operation of the volunteer fire department was approximately \$3,911 during 1959, with a combined return of \$322.50 from the townships.

In a recent survey of other areas where a city gives fire protection to a township, it was found that each township furnished a fire truck, paid a standby charge of \$1,000 per year and fire calls at the rate of \$100 each.

At its last meeting, the Tawas City Council authorized advertising for bids on a new truck. Estimated cost is expected to be in the neighborhood of \$17,000.

A budget of \$6,000 was set up in the proposal for the first year of operation. Of the total, \$3,900 would be for operation and \$2,100 to pay the cost of new equipment over a 10-year period.

The equipment would be de-

precated and a schedule set up for replacement so that the best possible equipment could be used. (See **CONTRACT**, page 8.)

Tawas Lake Dam to Get Engineering

Establishment of a special assessment district to defray expense of engineering on a proposed dam to control the water level of Tawas Lake was authorized last week by the Iosco County Board of Supervisors.

Acting on recommendation of its conservation committee, the board authorized Drain Commissioner Bert Stiekney of Oscoda to obtain the services of a qualified engineer to work on the project.

The engineer is to determine placement and feasibility of such a dam.

Placement of a water level control dam on Tawas Lake has been the subject of much discussion for the past several years.

The legal level of Tawas Lake was set in 1959 by former circuit judge, Herman Dehnke, after lengthy hearings. The judge also made a personal visit to the lake in the company of state experts.

An organization composed of taxpayers has urged establishment of a special assessment district to finance initial cost and future maintenance of such a dam. A second organization of taxpayers opposes such a dam.

The first group maintains that the water level has diminished to an alarming extent over the past years. The second group is of the opinion that such a dam would cause damage to their property through possible flood conditions.

Possible Vote Technicality—

Write-Ins Top ET Incumbents

A record primary vote of 624 ballots cast in Monday's non-partisan election assured the City of East Tawas of several contests in the April spring election. Four newcomers to city politics received more votes than their incumbent opponents.

Before votes were tallied, however, Mayor Elmer Werth announced at a meeting of the East Tawas Council that he would retire from that position at the end of his present term, April 10. Werth requested that his name be removed from the spring election ballot.

C. V. Miller, a write-in candidate, garnered 348 votes to Werth's 203 to earn the right to have his name placed on the ballot.

It is necessary for a candidate to receive 15 percent of the total vote cast to have his name placed on the spring ballot and both men qualified.

It was indicated at the council meeting that there may be a question of the legality of write-in candidates in a non-partisan election. City Attorney Richard Newman is to check election laws and submit a report.

Other races saw Mrs. Grace Klenow tallying the most votes in a three-way race for city treasurer. She had 400 votes. R. E. McElharon, the incumbent, received 103 votes and

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Werth Tells Reason of His Resignation

In announcing his retirement at the end of his present term, Mayor Elmer Werth of East Tawas said he had made this decision the past week "because C. V. Miller has indicated his desire to serve as mayor and I believe he has fine qualifications."

In a letter to the council, Werth said: "I have served the city as councilman and mayor for over 10 years, to the best of my ability. Each year as our city grows, it takes more time to carry on the duties of mayor with its ever-increasing problems."

"The plans for a new city hall are now in the hands of contractors and bids will be opened March 6, with funds available to complete this project."

"The volunteer firemen have proposed new equipment to be purchased, along with the suggestion of taking over the complete city garage. This would mean a new city garage would have to be built to comply with their desires. They have also pointed out the need of larger water mains connecting East Tawas and Tawas City."

"I have received two letters from the Michigan Department of Conservation in the past week concerning the state park. In one letter, it requested removal or dismantling of the community building. The other letter requests the city to eliminate free parking on Newman Street in the park, so that the department can better control the park fee."

"The sewage disposal plant needs to be enlarged, due to the growth of our city. This you will hear more about from the health department in the near future."

"There is the ever increasing problem of taxation, not only city, but county and school. I would ask that any time the mayor or council wishes to consult me on any city problem, to do so, as my interest will always be for the betterment of East Tawas."

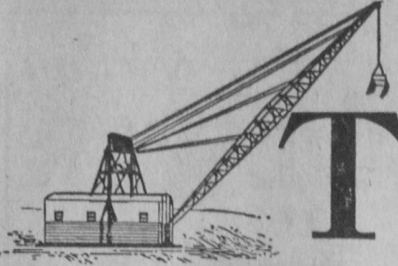
Funeral services were held Saturday morning at the Tawas City Baptist Church. Burial was at Deckererville. Officiating was the Rev. Alfred Miller.

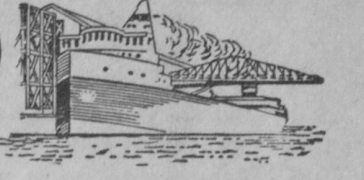

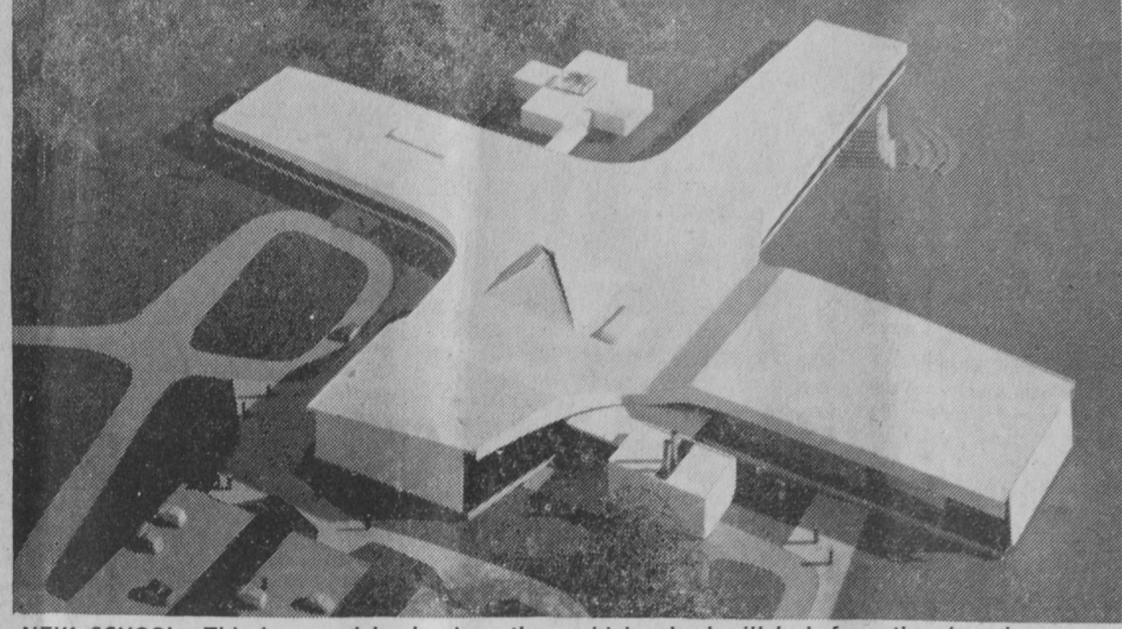

Oscoda School to Cost \$2.5 Million; Accommodate 1,800

Oscoda Area High School students, faculty, administration and area residents, alike, are eagerly awaiting the completion of the district's new high school building.

Located on an 80-acre wooded site west of Oscoda on River Road, the new \$2½ million dollar school structure is nearly 65 percent completed.

"When the project was first started, plans, specifications and other materials concerning the building were carefully filed away at the end of each day," explains Supt. Robert Richardson.

Now, with construction activities soon to increase, after a slight lag during the winter months, "the top of my desk serves as a file," commented the superintendent, as he rifled through a huge sheaf of papers at hand near his telephone.

Superintendent Richardson has received hundreds of requests from educators and boards of education throughout the country asking for a description of the Oscoda school and the philosophy behind its planning.

Designed by Eberle M. Smith Associates, Incorporated, Detroit, plans for the new school won a merit commendation from the American Association of School Administrators.

"During recent years, the trend has been toward the campus style of architecture, but we are of the opinion that this type of construction is a needless waste of the taxpayers' money," commented Richardson. "It took a lot of study and discussion to break with this viewpoint."

As a result of this philosophy, the new Oscoda school has 50 percent less outside wall space than any comparable structure in the country.

Another break from traditional school architecture is that corridor areas are located outside the building and forced ventilation is incorporated in its design.

With a minimum of outside walls, the center of school activities is located in the exact center of the building, called the "commons."

Board Opposes State's Plan to Assess Taxes

Iosco County Board of Supervisors went on record last Wednesday as opposing Gov. John B. Swainson's proposed tax revision bill.

Calling the bill "one more step toward centralized government," the board's judicial committee suggested that the bill need further study.

Objections by the Iosco Board were as follows:

1. Personal tax assessment should remain under county supervision.

2. The board objected to what it called the additional administrative cost which this proposal would involve.

According to a report made by supervisors who attended a tax conference called last week by the governor, the bill provides for state assessment of personal property taxes.

"Should the state be allowed to assess taxes on personal property this year, next year it will want to take over assessing real property—and in 10 years there will be no need for local government," was the comment of Supervisor C. S. Everett.

A heated discussion developed between Supervisor Henry Oates, secretary of the county Democratic committee, and Supervisor

Paul DuHamel Wins Cornell U. Fellowship

Paul DuHamel, science teacher at Oscoda High School, has been awarded a Shell Merit Fellowship to Cornell University this summer.

DuHamel, who has taught chemistry, physics and biology at Oscoda High School for the past seven years, is one of 100 outstanding high school mathematics and science instructors from the United States and Canada selected on the basis of merit and demonstrated leadership qualities to attend graduate-level summer seminars at Stanford and Cornell Universities. Both schools made their selections from among approximately 1,000 applicants.

The seminars, sponsored by Shell Companies Foundation, Incorporated, were established six years ago to help maintain the quality of the nation's scientific effort by enabling high school teachers to keep up with the

A native of Alma and a graduate of Michigan State University, DuHamel taught previously at Coleman High School. He is a member of the Michigan Science Teachers Association and president of the Oscoda Area Schools Employees Credit Association.

While at Cornell, DuHamel will be encouraged to devote time to any phase of his work at Oscoda High School which he feels requires special research or attention.

No Haircuts---Now Inmates Get Work

No haircuts and now forced labor—prisoners who become incarcerated in Iosco County may soon learn that a term in the county jail is no "bed of roses."

According to action taken last week by the Iosco County Board of Supervisors, jail inmates may be used to work on construction of county roads—if the road commission gives its approval.

Supervisor L. S. Little, proponent of the plan, pointed out that under recent legislation, prisoners may be used, without compensation, on road construction crews.

"Prisoners could be used for brushing out ditches and to perform other manual labor jobs," he commented. "Much work will have to be done on roads this spring and prisoners might just as well earn their keep."

Only last month, the county decided to discontinue the practice of giving free haircuts to prisoners who were jailed for 30 days or more.

The road commission is to investigate the liability and responsibility involved for using prisoners in such work and is to report its findings at next month's session.

THEY MEANT BUSINESS

Lincoln Assassination Plot Details Revealed

BALTIMORE, Md.—Feb. 27—Details of President-elect Abraham Lincoln's pre-dawn ride through this seething port city Feb. 23—and the full story of a fantastic assassination plot that made the secret trip necessary—unfolded here today.

With growing astonishment, newsmen learned that a well-knit plot to slay Lincoln before he reached the capital had been uncovered by agents for several investigating bodies, working independently.

Lincoln finally was persuaded to avoid the danger by leaving his party abruptly at Harrisburg, Pa., and proceeding to Washington incognito.

From all accounts, Lincoln's decision to dart through Baltimore was made after he read a warning letter from William H. Seward, his designated secretary of state.

Seward had sent his son Frederick with the letter from Washington to intercept Lincoln at Philadelphia. SEWARD reportedly advised Lincoln that Army investigators had infiltrated anti-North elements in Baltimore and had stumbled upon a brazen—but determined—assassination plan that had been in the works for weeks.

Leader of the assassins was said to be a lunatic-fringe barber named Ferdinand who had often boasted—at times, to the undercover agents—that Lincoln would be shot or stabbed to death within minutes after reaching Baltimore, while heachmen staged phony fights to divert police.

Aides of Lincoln indicated this warning confirmed similar reports from Allen Pinkerton, famed detective guarding Lincoln, and from investigators of railroads over which Lincoln was to pass on his way to Washington.

And the same plot, according to New York sources, was discovered by detectives from that city sent to Baltimore on the strength of information received by New York Police Superintendent John A. Kennedy.

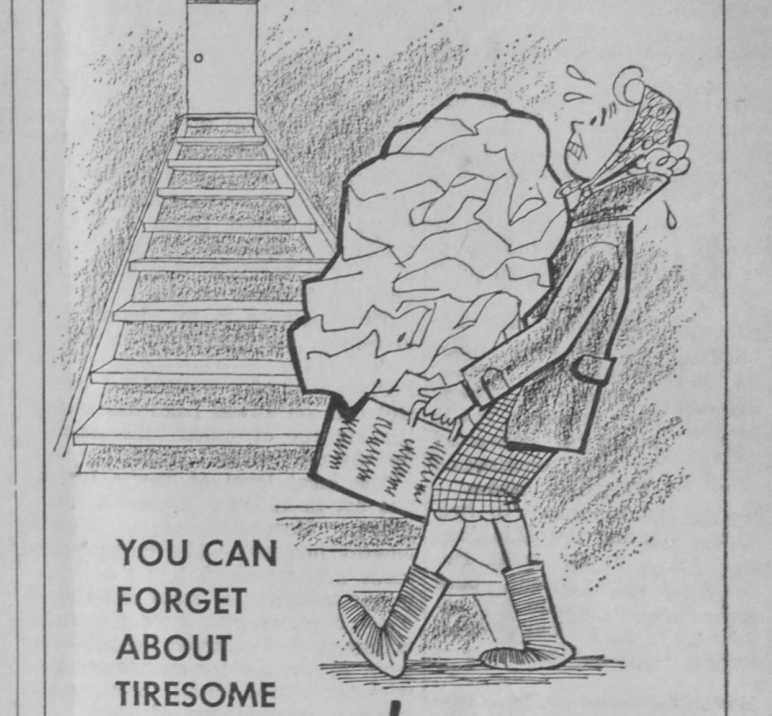

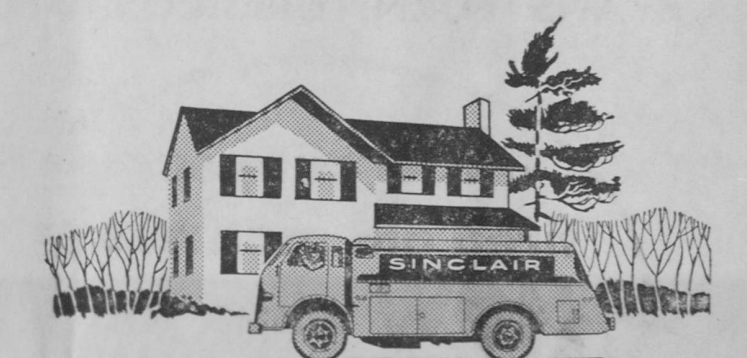

Tawas was able to hold its own in the second half by breaking up Pinny's good passing attack. The winners equalized this, however, by good "outside" shooting.

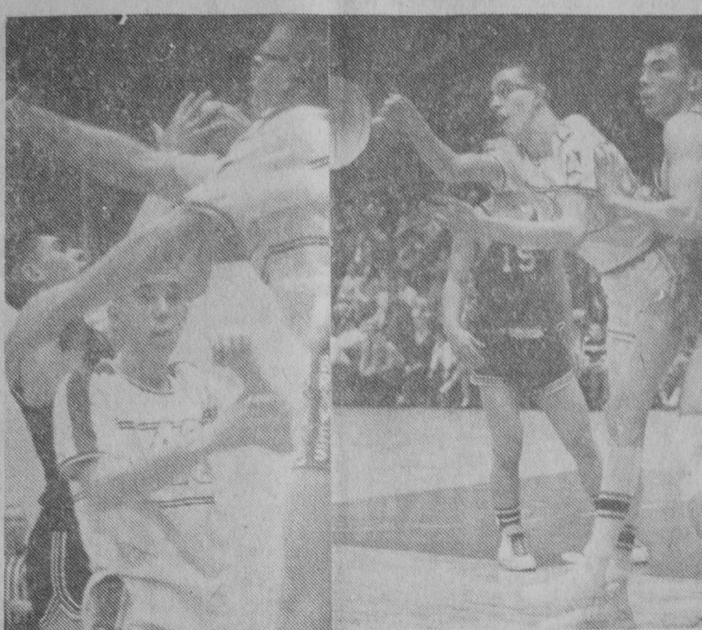
Flynn, sharp-shooting little Pinny guard, topped both teams in scoring with 22 points. Three of his mates also hit in double figures.

(Continued from page 1.) are four wings: The north wing containing the science, vocational and commercial departments; in the south wing, the physical education department; academic classrooms are contained in the east wing, while the music department and auditorium are located in the west wing.

The commons area contains the superintendent and principal's offices, health clinic, counseling department, cafeteria and kitchen.

Some of the features of the new building include a 30-station language laboratory, seven closed television circuits for instruction purposes, a 700-seat auditorium, a 2,000-seat gymnasium and a six-lane swimming pool built to olympic specifications with high and low diving boards.

Laboratory areas in the science department are separate from lecturing areas. The school has a complete photographic laboratory.

The new high school building will have facilities to handle 1,880 students.

The old high school building, originally constructed in 1920, with additions in 1938 and 1953, is presently overcrowded due to normal growth of the district and through the impact of the population increase at nearby Wurtsmith.

Enrollment figures of the past five years indicate the extent of these overcrowded conditions.

In 1955-56, the total enrollment for all grades was 977 pupils. Present enrollment in grades kindergarten through grade 12 is 2,350 students.

"We anticipate that our enrollment will be approximately 3,000 students next year," said Richardson.

A new seven-room elementary school was constructed in 1951. Seven rooms were added to this structure in 1954, three rooms in 1957 and eight rooms in 1958.

Because of the impact of edurally-connected students, the district received an outright grant of \$1,044,000 from the federal government. Recently, the district received a second entitlement of \$374,000 from the government, based on 1,600 federally-connected pupils.

Taxpayers of the district approved a general obligation bond issue of \$985,000 in April 1959 and the remainder of the money for construction is to come from the district's building and site fund.

A recent survey of fire fighting equipment at Tawas City showed that the city has equipment valued at \$3,366 and Tawas Township's 10-year-old fire truck was valued at \$2,500. Tawas City and Tawas Township would receive a credit for this investment over a five-year period.

Cost of each governmental unit, which would not change much from year to year, would be shared according to valuation and population.

Approximate cost for the first year of operation would be as follows: Alabaster Township, \$2,071; Tawas Township, \$1,145; Tawas City, \$2,803.

The proposition is to be presented for consideration to the two township boards in the near future.
